Willingham Wheels 'Sofa to 50k'

I'm sure many of you will have heard of the 'Couch to 5K' training plan. The idea is to transform you from 'couch potato' to 'runner', getting you running three miles (5K) on a regular basis in just two months.

British Cycling has come up with a similar idea to encourage you to dig your bike out of the shed and get riding! It is ideal for the complete cycling novice who would like to start cycling for health, fitness, recreation, commuting or perhaps to tackle a challenge or charity ride up to 50 kilometres (30 miles) long.



After the success of last year's programme, Willingham Wheels is running it again and will be starting the 8-week training plan on **Tuesday 9 April**. Rides will usually be on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Sunday mornings. Time commitment ranges from a minimum of 1 hour 30 minutes to a maximum of 6 hours 30 minutes per week.

Under 16s are most welcome but they must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

As an added incentive this year, we will be running a couple of extra weeks to take our 50-kilometre graduates up to 50 miles just in time to take part in the Over Day Centre 50 Mile Challenge Ride on **16 June**!

It's the 1960s and, at the end of Feast Week, a large Salvation Army band plays on the Green. You might wonder why the cars are parked all over the place but, in those days, a road ran right across the Green and along the back. Of more interest is the building in the background, demolished in the 1970s. It was actually an old brick building but after World War II the owner rendered it, adding false beams and painting three scenes in the upstairs 'windows' each with a sailing ship. What a shame this eccentric building has gone!

WILLINGHAM 100 Years Ago

In March 1919 there was still great concern about the amount of land, estimated at 5,000 acres, left underwater or unusable by the recent floods. The Great West had come within inches of flooding at The Hermitage in Willingham parish.

At the Tabernacle the annual collection in aid of the Baptist Union Sustentation Fund was taken. Several services were held, the most popular being an afternoon musical service led by the pastor, Reverend W F Harris. As well as an organ solo by Mr Fred Cole, items included the songs 'A Dream of Paradise' by Miss Jessie Raven, and 'The Holy City' by Mr Bert Conquest. Collections for the day amounted to £5.12.10, double the amount raised the previous year. Jessie Raven later married George Smith and lived in the cottage which is now 1 George Street.

Influenza was still rife. The deaths were reported of Private John William Garner, aged only 19, and Gunner John Rigby. The latter had been an orderly at Willingham VAD Hospital before joining up, and a keen member of Willingham Football and Cricket Clubs.

When the cub section of the scouting movement was founded in 1916, it used Rudyard Kipling's *The Jungle Book* to engage with young people. The characters from this classic story are still part of the scouting tradition. In *The Jungle Book*, Akela was the wise and brave leader of the wolf pack who was mentor to the child hero, Mowgli. Our cub section is currently in need of a wise and brave leader to be a mentor to young people aged 8 - 10 in our community. Without a leader, the section is facing closure at the end of next month, which would leave a big gap in our provision for young people.

Our Scout Group and Explorer Unit have a fantastic team of volunteers working with over 120 young people aged 6 to 18, and we need a little more help to make this sustainable. Volunteering with us is easier than you think. It's an opportunity to work with young people in your community with full support and training. The impact of crime in our community was felt very strongly over the summer, and a lot of research points to the engagement of young people as effective in combating antisocial behaviour. Following this, we invited our PCSO, Tom, to talk to us about the work of the police and gave him an opportunity to engage with some scouting activities. We had a very successful session combining a tour in a patrol car with target archery!



Our group is looking forward to more adventures in the coming year with a number of camps and outdoor activities planned. In June, all our young people will have the chance to spend a night underground in a cold-war era nuclear bunker in the Essex countryside, which promises to be a fantastic and unique experience. At the end of July, our scouts will be joining over 1,000 others representing Scout groups from around the world at the week-long CamFam event held every four years at Huntingdon Racecourse, enabling them to build friendships with young people from different cultures. We will be supporting the Fen Gallop community event on 7 July, so consider joining us for the day to help out. Willingham Wassail

On Sunday 20 January a merry band of revellers met at the Community Orchard for the annual Wassail.



The Wassail is part of a tradition that is over 1,000 years old, going back to Anglo-Saxon times. On Twelfth Night, now 6 January but 17 January in the pre-Gregorian calendar, wassailers would gather in the orchard to wake up the trees and drive out any lurking evil spirits in order to ensure a good harvest.

The dictionary tells us that first of all a Wassail is 'a festive bout of drinking' but it has a serious purpose in celebrating the apple. It's more often celebrated in the West Country and Kent where there is cider-making but Willingham's tradition of fruit growing makes it a natural thing here too.

The Wassail King and Queen, Brenda and Melvyn Smith, were crowned with ivy wreaths and they anointed one of the larger apple trees with bread soaked in mulled cider.

The Son by Jo Nesbo

Sonny Lofthus, a heroin addict, is in prison for murder and is ready to confess to another murder in return for a continuing supply of drugs, until he finds out the truth behind his policeman father's supposed suicide for being 'The Mole'.

He escapes prison and begins wreaking revenge. The novel is told mostly from the point of view of Simon Kefas, a policeman and his father's friend, who is desperate for money to pay for his wife's operation which he cannot afford as he is paying off gambling debts. Sonny is the centre of corruption: prison staff, police, lawyers, a desperate priest, all of them under the thumb of Oslo's crime overlord 'The Twin'.

A crime novel with twists and turns, it is gritty and gripping with a strong storyline like all Jo Nesbo's books. Our reading group thought it was a good story but some of us thought there was a bit too much violent detail. Most of us gave the book a fairly high score out of ten.

East/West Rail Link from Oxford to Cambridge

Councillor Bridget Smith, leader of South Cambridge District Council (SCDC), attended the February Council meeting and spoke about the ongoing focus of SCDC.

Amongst these, Councillor Smith highlighted the east/west rail link between Oxford and Cambridge as being transformational for South Cambridgeshire, bringing improved transport and opportunities for business and housing development.

Last autumn, SCDC wrote to the Government, asking them to give full and thorough consideration to the environment when selecting the route. Councillors are urging people to make sure they have their say during the consultation period, recognising that the information published raises a lot of questions which they will be asking the promoters on behalf of local communities.

Lost and Found

Cambridgeshire Police have joined police forces nationwide by ceasing to take reports of lost property and accepting only certain types of found item. The changes took effect nationally from 1 February after the Chief Constables' Council agreed it as a way of reducing non-essential demand and the associated costs and bureaucracy generated for call centres and front counters.

The police have traditionally accepted responsibility for recording lost and found items, despite there being no statutory duty to maintain a system of recording non-evidential property. Found items dealt with by the police have reduced and a consistent approach adopted across the country. This will help reduce call volumes and remove an unnecessary burden on policing.

If you have lost or found an item, visit the force website for guidance on what to do. Further detail is below.

Lost items

Any loss can be reported online at sites including <u>www.lostbox.co.uk</u>, <u>www.immobilise.com</u> and <u>www.report myloss.com</u> (for an insurance report).

For bicycles, register and report at www.bikeregister.com.

Report lost UK Passports at <u>www.gov.uk/report-a-lost-or-stolen-</u> passport.

Details of losses reported via these methods are made available to police forces across the UK. If you have lost property in a public place or premises or on public transport, contact the location or service provider directly.

Found items

The following categories have been created for found items:

Accepted

Items capable of containing data such as mobile phones or computers, cash and wallets that are identifiable, unidentifiable cash, identity and personal documents.

Not Accepted

Bicycles, personal but unidentifiable items, clothing, keys and jewellery. For non-accepted items, with some exceptions, the finder can retain the property. They are under no legal obligation to hand in the property providing they have made a reasonable attempt to return it to the owner.

Meeting dates are published on the website, the notice board outside the Public Hall in the High Street, at the library and are listed below. Members of the public are welcome to attend and speak briefly or ask questions. Names will be taken down at the beginning of each meeting, together with their electoral register number, to ensure everyone has a fair chance to speak within the allowed time (15 minutes in total for all speakers and three minutes maximum per person).

Meeting Dates: 6 March, 3 April. The meetings are held in the Octagon starting at 7 30 pm.

The Parish Council office is open Monday to Thursday from 10 am to 1 pm, except Bank Holidays and there is an answer-phone service outside office hours.

District Councillors' Report

It's been another busy month on South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) matters, with a successful surgery and time spent out and about talking to Willingham residents about issues that matter to them.

Black Pit Drove

The long running saga of Black Pit Drove appears to be nearing a conclusion. At a High Court hearing in December the presiding judge awarded a temporary injunction, barring any further caravans from entering the site but declined to issue a full injunction because the people currently camped on the site were neither present nor represented. Subsequent to this, another caravan illegally appeared on the site, but our Enforcement Officers were asked by the police not to act, pending further criminal investigations. The second High Court hearing took place on 4 February and it has issued an injunction stating that the caravans illegally camped must be removed. It is expected that by the time you read this, the caravans will have been removed and the land returned to its original condition. Anyone continuing to illegally use the land as a place to live will be in contempt of court and can be sent to prison, fined or have their assets seized. This has been a drawn out, frustrating and expensive process and we have regularly been pressing for action but the multiple ownership of the land, ongoing police investigations and various legal hurdles have thwarted progress.

Construction Vehicles

Residents continue to be affected by unauthorised construction vehicles using the B1050 to serve Northstowe (and the A14) and we receive endless complaints regarding this matter.

Following notification of a recent breach, SCDC Enforcement Officers have written to all developers and their contractors, reminding them of the management conditions in place.

By the time this is published, we will have held another Action Day where a group of enthusiastic residents will have conducted some surveillance in order to identify and report culprits. The evidence required by the Enforcement team must include photographs or videos showing the date, time, vehicle type, name and vehicle registration as well as the vehicle's final destination on the Northstowe site. The more information provided, the more likely the Enforcement team will be able to act. If any breaches are witnessed, we encourage residents to contact us or report directly to Planning Enforcement via the SCDC website <u>www.scambs.gov.uk</u>.

Surgeries

The Willingham surgery held on 26 January was very well attended once more. Due to their popularity, it is our intention to extend the length of future surgeries from one to two hours in duration. The dates of future surgeries are **4 May, 6 July, 7 September, 2 November**, all 11 am – 1 pm in the Ploughman Hall.

Northstowe Health Centre

The Longstanton branch of Willingham Surgery will serve all Northstowe residents until 2021. Willingham practice has plans to expand provision to allow for a larger patient list and have calculated the increased number of GP and Nurse sessions to achieve this – approximately 4,000 additional patients prior to opening the Health Hub in Phase 2. NHS money follows the patient, so if more patients register, the GP gets more money.

The GPs at Over, Swavesey, Milton, Cottenham and Girton have come forward with a proposal to jointly deliver primary health care from the Northstowe Care Hub from 2021. This is currently being considered by the NHS Core Commissioning Group. Details can't be given at present, but they do need to be in place by June 2019 so that the procurement process can start in April 2020 and services start to be delivered from the care hub in June 2021.

Repair Cafés

SCDC helps volunteers to set up new Repair Cafés. Housing

SCDC and Cambridge City Council recently published a draft new Greater Cambridge Housing strategy, setting out how both authorities aim to meet the housing challenges in our area over the next five years 2019 - 2023. The overall aim is to bring forward homes that are affordable, energy efficient and, ideally, close to where jobs are. This aligns with our overall aim of reducing carbon footprint to net zero by 2050. The strategy outlines key priorities such as homes for essential local workers, those on low to median incomes, older people and specialist accommodation for young people or those at risk. It will accelerate the number of homes built per year, types of building companies involved in the delivery, maintain a high standard of design and promote health and wellbeing through housing, working with key partners to deliver homes for our residents. PASTORAL LETTER

During the last few weeks I have had the privilege of conducting a significant number of funerals, special times for families to come into church as they say goodbye to a loved one, saying thank you for their life and recognising all the love which has been shared. They have been times when families have spoken about so much love shared, how people have been respected and real examples of selflessness which have been a real privilege to listen to.

One thing which has touched me is how attentive either members of the families or neighbours and friends have been, always being there for the person as they needed support and care, even if they have suffered from dementia and barely recognised those who gave time and effort to help them. On each occasion, this has been a real blessing, especially where a parent has been supported, when there has been a chance to repay love and care. In these cases, there has been sincere thanks to give, loyalty to have been recognised, and love, in the real meaning of the word, to be recognised and for this together, we have thanked God.

From another perspective, many of us spend our lives in families as the care givers, at the centre of caring and fulfilling the needs of others. As we get older, it is sometimes difficult to acknowledge that we ourselves need a helping hand. This can make speaking aloud our thanks difficult, make us feel even more vulnerable and rub in that we do actually need to accept help from others. We live our life from day to day barely giving a thought to whom we could or should express our thanks, and this can sometimes be painful to those who are trying to offer care.

As a vicar now for over 20 years and in my previous occupation, I have seen this from both perspectives! Of the deep love given by many families for their loved ones but how challenging others find it to admit their own ageing and vulnerability, making it more difficult to accept help. But it is such a blessing that help in both small and more significant ways is offered, and how important a brief word of thanks and appreciation can mean!

Times can be tough for us all from time to time and this should not be underestimated. Life really is hard for lots of us for one reason or another, but to spend a few moments each day trying to recognise the blessings we have, the kind words we have received, can be something which will change our lives and the lives of our nearest and dearest!

Thank you for managing to read this to the end and may we all recognise the many blessings we each receive each day and have the humility to say thank you!

Our mental health is just as important to our overall wellbeing as our physical health. From time to time we might not feel as well mentally as we would like; it's nothing to be ashamed of and statistics show that one in four of us will experience mental ill health at some point in our lives. Whether you're experiencing anxiety, stress, depression, bipolar disorder or another mental illness, there is a range of services to support you in managing your condition. Here is information about just a few, available to everyone living in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough:

- The Keep Your Head website <u>www.keep-your-head.com</u> has a range of information and sources of support for children and adults of all ages. You don't need to be a service user to access the site as the information is available to all.
- The First Response Service is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. If you are experiencing something that makes you feel unsafe, distressed, or worried about your mental health you can contact the First Response Service by dialing 111 and selecting option 2. More information at www.cpft.nhs.uk/about-us/mental-health-crisis.htm.
- STOP Suicide is a suicide prevention campaign which 'seeks to alert communities to the warning signs of suicidal behaviour and reassure them that an open and honest approach to suicide is the best way to prevent it.' More information at: www.stopsuicidepledge.org/resources-and-information.
- The Psychological Wellbeing Service can be accessed by anyone registered with a GP in Cambridgeshire, Peterborough, Oundle, or Wansford - you don't need a referral. This IAPT [Improving Access to Psychological Therapies] service helps people aged 17+ who are suffering from mild to moderate depression and anxiety and offers short term treatments with a focus on 'here and now' problems. This is a service provided by the charity 'Arts and Minds'. Free daytime workshops are led by professional artists and supported by a qualified counsellor and take place weekly. Private Boats to the Rescue

Just around noon in the English Channel private boats sailed to the soldiers. Hundreds of thousands of BEF [British Expeditionary Force] troops were lined up awaiting any signal or sign of hope. While they were waiting, Hitler ordered his troops to retreat.

When our news team interviewed James Campbell Clouston, a Canadian officer, Pier Master on the mole [a narrow wooden walkway mounted on a concrete breakwater], it was his job to save these soldiers but still to tell them help is coming. James Campbell Clouston and all the troops saw the boats coming in and just as that happened the Luftwaffe flew over the boats.

The boats arrived and the soldiers were in a bundle to get on. A boat owner named Paul exclaimed, 'I tried to save as many as I could but you can't save them all'. Another boat owner told us that she saved over 50 troops on her boat and that she went back to save more.

Winston Churchill commanded that if any private boat owners could give up their time and maybe their life to save the vulnerable troops in a harmful area.
