Old Willingham

For most of the 1800s Willingham suffered from 'absentee rectors'. These men had no interest in the village and typically lived in Cambridge or even London, collecting the income and paying a curate a small wage to run services. The church had no maintenance and by the 1880s was in a sorry state as seen here. This changed when Reverend John Watkins arrived in 1890. He not only lived in the rectory but set about restoring the whole church at his own expense – during which time he discovered the amazing wall paintings. It is thanks to John Watkins that today our village can be proud of this wonderful Grade 1 listed church.

Alan Robinson, our father, passed away on 29 January and we would like to thank everyone in the village who paid their respects to him either by sending a card or by attending his funeral on 14 February.

He was born in the village in 1923 but grew up in Over until he was called up for war service after which he and Amy set up home in Cambridge. They moved to Willingham 67 years ago and for the first 35 of these, Dad was the postmaster. In this job he was known to and knew every inhabitant when, of course, the population was much smaller than now. Over the years he was involved in the Parish Council, the Parochial Church Council and the Willingham Combined Charities, WAMADS, the tennis, gardening and carpet bowls clubs besides finding time to be a Special Constable, a devoted husband and loving father.

We are very grateful to the people who continued to visit Dad right up until his last week when he had to be admitted to hospital and also in the few days when he was in Arthur Rank House. His carers were always pleased to see visitors to break up his day when he could no longer walk in his beloved garden.

The funeral service was conducted by Reverends Jenny Hill and Stephen Gilbert in a way which Dad would have approved of and enhanced by the organ playing of Dick Lingham, and we thank them all and Andrew Cook, funeral director, for their care and attention.

We would also like to thank those who donated to the two charities, Alzheimer's Research UK and The Macular Society in Dad's memory. Both these conditions have affected our family and we have seen how difficult it is to live with them. Funding for research is much needed.

We miss Dad but will always remember him and the kindness of people to him in his later years.

Traffic

Whether stationary or moving, it is one of the most discussed issues affecting Willingham.

Stationary

Following issues regarding parking around the Primary School in Thodays Close, new yellow lines have been marked out restricting parking to improve safety for both pedestrians and drivers. This has caused problems further afield where people are now parking, especially at the junction of Long Lane, Silver Street and the doctor's surgery, and is also making it difficult for residents to enter and leave their properties.

Speeding

We have two interactive speed signs (SID) supplied by Mick George Ltd. These have been on Earith Road and now one has relocated to Over Road. This is very effective in alerting those who inadvertently find themselves over the limit. In conjunction with this, Community Roadwatch are conducting speed and vehicle checks, counting lorries in particular, and informing companies if their marked vehicles are travelling over the limits. Unfortunately this doesn't help with speeding in Church Street, Long Lane and other roads.

30 mph Limit on Station Road

After a protracted period of discussion and lobbying with County Council Highways, we have been notified that the works order has finally been placed with the contractor and we are now awaiting a start date for the work to commence. This will extend the 30 mph limit almost to Stanton Mereway. The SIDs will be used to help to reinforce this as well.

HCVs

The issue of Heavy Commercial Vehicles coming through the village has caused distress to many. HCVs travelling to Northstowe and the A14 upgrade are not supposed to come through the village but use other routes. The council have lobbied strongly to get this checked and the operators prosecuted. A further issue is the proposed gravel extraction at Willow Hall Farm in Haddenham by Dennis Ltd, which anticipates 90 - 150 HCV movements per day for eight years. Originally all these were planned to only travel through Earith to St Ives for processing, but now with on-site processing and following objections, they have suggested the B1050 through Willingham was a perfectly viable alternative, especially if the

destination was Cambridge. We have protested strongly to the County Council planning authority about this.

Affordable housing on Station Road

Parishioners may be aware of the development being constructed on Station Road. This is of 22 affordable housing homes (rented and shared ownership) with priority being given to Willingham residents and applicants with a connection, whether through work, residency or family, to Willingham. Parish Clock

The Clock stopped working before Christmas and upon investigation it came to light that a full overhaul was needed. Work has been scheduled to start at the beginning of April.

Cemetery Gates on Church Lane

Following ongoing issues with the gates and feedback from parishioners experiencing difficulties opening them, the Council are looking into the feasibility of replacing them with hardwood gates.

Meeting dates are published on the website, the notice board outside the Public Hall in the High Street, at the library and are listed below. Members of the public are welcome to attend and speak briefly or ask questions. Names will be taken down at the beginning of each meeting, together with the electoral register number to ensure everyone has a fair chance to speak within the allowed time (15 minutes in total for all speakers and three minutes maximum per person).

Meeting Dates: **3 April, 1 May** (Annual Meeting of the Parish Council), **15 May** (Annual Parish Meeting). The meetings are held in the Octagon starting at 7 30 pm.

The Parish Council office is open Monday to Thursday from 10 am to 1 pm, except Bank Holidays and there is an answerphone service outside office hours.

100 Years Ago

11 April 1919 saw the closure of the Red Cross VAD Hospital which had been running in the Church Hall and part of the Rectory since January 1915. During that time 1,059 patients were treated there, and many of the convalescent soldiers had taken part in local social and fund-raising events.

The *Cambridge Independent* recorded that many letters had been received from 'the boys' saying how much they had appreciated their time there, and how much at home they had felt during their stay in Willingham.

Reader's Letter

I read with interest in *Willingham News* that the Cubs are looking for a new Akela. It brought to mind my own memories of the years I spent as both ACSL and BL in Willingham. I was 'Chil' in the cubs, and 'Pooh Bear' in the Beavers.

It was my late father, Tony 'Chick' Fowler, who started scouting in Willingham in the early 1960s. An avid scouter all his life, he encouraged my brother and I to do likewise. My brother was a Cub then a Scout and then a Venture Scout, and now my nephew is a Cub, and loving it! I went through Brownies and Guides and was a Ranger for a while, but I wanted to be a Cub Leader, and was an Instructor first before training to be an ACSL.

In my day, the boys wore the infamous green caps, and some even had green garters on their socks! They had imperial neckers - Dad insisted that they were imperial not purple - and green jumpers, which kept the boys warm in winter, but in which they melted in the summer. I have memories of red faces on hot days, but they didn't seem to care, and ran about regardless.

I also have memories of camping at Abingdon. On the first night no one got much sleep, because the boys were too excited. My dad always maintained that he slept like a log, and never heard a thing.

All the boys were encouraged to tie a piece of wool round the handle of your mug so we know whose was whose, but chances were that they all got muddled up anyway, and after camp, the boys would go home with only one sock and someone else's mug or plate.

I remember at one Friday Grand Howl at camp, a leader from Cambridge told all the boys to 'Wet your flannel and your soap and squeeze your tube of toothpaste before you go to bed, then, when you get home, your mums will think you've had a wash and cleaned your teeth'. Most of the boys took a brand new tube of toothpaste to camp with them, and a brand new bar of soap! I expect that when they got home on the Sunday evening, there were a lot of mums dunking their scouting offspring into hot soapy baths, to tidy them up again, ready for school in the morning!

Another memory is of Church Parades. My Dad always said that the big Carol Service in the Wesley Church by the Four Lamps in Cambridge was the start of Christmas for him.

I remember the Cubs walking into the old Methodist chapel for a service, and, as they were about to sit down, I was told by an elderly lady, 'They can't sit there, the roof is falling in, and that is where the plaster lands'. On another occasion, I was in the Methodist Chapel with the Beavers, and the minister asked, 'Could the Beavers could please stand up?' I had to explain that they were, in fact, standing up, but the backs of the pews were hiding them.

Eventually work commitments took over. I was a Nanny, and there wasn't much time left for me to carry on with Scouting, so I had to give it up.

I wonder if anyone reading this remembers those far gone days of the monthly newspaper collection, the Hovercraft and Bob-a-Job week?

Paul and I are moving away from Willingham soon, so this is probably the last article I shall submit to Willingham News. It is a lovely magazine, and I hope it continues to flourish!

And I really hope that the Cubs find their new Akela - go on, put your name down and give it a go, after all, it's only an hour a week.

PASTORAL LETTER

THE LONG AWAITED GARDEN OF COMMUNION WITH GOD

'For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God' (Romans 8: 19)

Always it is all about Easter. The first and the most important event of each year. It does not really matter that Jews consider it still like a big lie of the Christians – the body of Jesus was stolen from the tomb and hidden; it is only a question of time when the evidence of that lie will be proved.

The Sunday of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ is the final resolution of the problem of death. The Death happens – but has no more the ultimate power.

Lent is a beautiful season of the liturgical year when the Word of God, celebrated every day, is leading those who would like to live again, the story of salvation beginning with Moses and the liberation of the Hebrews from the slavery of the pharaoh of Egypt. The Passover and Crossing of the Red Sea did occur over 3,500 years ago and was only the image of the future Victory of Jesus Christ over Death, Sin and Division. It is sad to see that contemporary understanding of the event of the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus is so low or completely gone in some places. We have received many concerns over recent months from pedestrians and local residents regarding the junction where the surgery road meets Long Lane, and the speed at which some drivers are exiting/entering the road. One concerned resident emailed us as follows:

'As someone who walks along Long Lane most days of the week, I would raise my concerns about the speed with which a number of drivers exit the surgery car park access road onto Long Lane with no consideration for pedestrians crossing the junction. Being aware of the risk I'm now careful to listen out for the sound of an approaching vehicle and stop, which a person with a hearing disability or impaired mobility might not be able to do.'

Please can all patients using the car park drive slowly and take particular care at this junction. It is a main thoroughfare through the village and is particularly busy during school drop off and pick up. The car park is intended for the use of visitors to the surgery, and parents should not be parking here for school runs. Help us minimise the movement of vehicles in and out of the junction during peak times.

District Councillors' Report

Welcome to our update on South Cambridgeshire District Council matters.

Black Pit Drove

Frustratingly, at the time of writing, the seven unauthorised caravans remain at Black Pit Drove. The occupants are now in breach of a High Court injunction and South Cambridgeshire Enforcement Officers and the Police are urgently working with other agencies on plans to carry out recovery of the land as soon as possible.

Unauthorised Construction Vehicles

Two action days have been held to conduct surveillance of construction vehicles in breach of the Northstowe traffic management plan. With the help of a number of local residents, evidence was collected which is now being reviewed by the enforcement and legal team at SCDC.

Additionally, developers and contractors have all been reminded of the correct route to enter and leave Northstowe and enforcement action is being pursued in some cases.

We hope that the action now being taken will deter other companies from using the unauthorised route, but we will continue to monitor the situation. SCDC Business Plan and Budget

At February's full Council meeting, Councillors backed a five-year Business Plan as well as SCDC's budget for 2019/20. Following a public consultation, the four priority areas are:

- Growing Local Businesses and Economies including a single point of contact to support businesses through planning and making it easier for small local businesses to bid for Council contracts.
- Housing that is Affordable for Everyone to Live In including doubling the number of Council homes built each year, reducing running costs on new homes and focusing on working with partners to help provide alternatives to using cars.
- Being Green to our Core developing a plan for a carbon-neutral future, exploring opportunities for green energy generation and improving air quality.
- A Modern and Caring Council by being an employer of choice for people with disabilities and ethnic minorities, generating an income from investments to offset cuts to national funding and improving online transactions.

The budget includes plans to generate a quarter of the money the Council spends on services from investments within five years.

Council Tax for the average band D home will increase by $\pounds 5$ per year, equivalent to 10 pence per week. The average band D charge for 2019/20 will be $\pounds 145.31$, one of the lowest council taxes in the country. SCDC's total budget it has available to spend on services in 2019/20 is nearly $\pounds 21$ million, however, we must save a further $\pounds 3$ million over the next five years.

Additional Green Bin Charge

Bin collection services in Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire are being streamlined. Last year it was decided to implement charges for additional green bins, aligning with Cambridge City. All residents with additional green bins have received a letter advising them of the change and the need to pay for a permit to continue using their extra bins. The first green bin remains free.

If you already have an extra green bin and subscribed by 8 March, you should have received your permit in late March. A grace period of one month runs from 1 April and in this period those bins without permits will still be emptied. Crews will leave cards on bins without permits to remind residents to subscribe.

From 1 May, those additional green bins not displaying a permit will no longer be emptied. Residents who don't subscribe can keep their bins and join up later if they wish. From 1 April anyone ordering an additional green bin must pay for the permit at the time of ordering.

Council Tax Increase on Empty Homes

Across South Cambridgeshire, there are 100 properties that have been empty for between two and five years. Demand for housing remains very high so to encourage empty properties back into use, the council is replacing the current arrangements as follows:-

- Homes empty for two years or more will be charged double their regular Council Tax. This comes into effect from 1 April.
- Homes empty for five years or more will be charged a 200% premium on top of their regular Council Tax. This comes into effect from 1 April 2020.
- Homes empty for ten years or more will be charged a 300% premium on top of their regular Council Tax. This comes into effect from 1 April 2021.

During a recent public consultation on these proposals, almost two in three respondents backed the changes.
