Old Faithful Gets a Facelift

As many who read the article about Old Faithful in Willingham News of May 2017 will recall, the clock in the church tower – affectionately known as Old Faithful – was paid for by public subscription marking the Golden Jubilee of Queen Victoria and has since been owned and maintained by the Parish Council. You may have noticed a difference if you've walked past the church recently as Phil King explains.

After more than 130 years of service 'Old Faithful' decided late in 2018 that enough was enough and, despite several attempts to revive it, the hands remained stubbornly fixed at a quarter past eight. Smiths of Derby were recommended as the experts in the field and were asked to make an inspection.

Smiths had the advantage of not only being experts but also the company that had acquired the original manufacturer of the clock, Potts and Son. That gave them access to some of the original drawings and tooling. Their recommendation was for a complete overhaul of the mechanism and refurbishment of the face to restore the original colours.

The work commenced at the beginning of April. At the time of writing it is not complete as some components need replacement and will have to be specially manufactured to the original specification. Hopefully, it will not take too long and before May is out, we will have our old friend back in full working order.

A rather poignant picture this month. It is the day the Salvation Army moved to their new hall on Silver Street. Originally the Salvation Army hut was on the east side of Long Lane, opposite Short Lane. Then it moved to a larger hall on the west side. Eventually the modern new hall was built and the day of opening arrived. At the top we see the Army band assembled at the old hall, closed for the last time, and at the bottom Mrs Freda Few leads the procession into the new facility amid crowds of onlookers. It is sad that the hall has now closed but the Salvation Army continues to do wonderful work both locally and nationally.

As a result of researching the date of the opening, I received the following letter:

The Salvation Army Church was opened on 19 July 1969. The ribbon was cut by Mr George Mustill. All the money raised for this came from the generosity of the village. Mr Charlie Barton gave the land (where his shop stood) and every Saturday afternoon Cecil Collis (my dad) and his team of willing workers would be off on his lorry to collect all the old newspapers and take them to the waste paper company in Cambridge for cash.

Ray Munns would do a furniture auction of donated furniture while Jean, his lovely wife, would hand over her kitchen to the ladies of the corps to make and sell tea and cake. It was hard work but it was all paid for by the opening day.

May I take this opportunity to say a huge 'thank you' to everyone who helped and supported us then and over the years.

Willingham Windmill Open Days

Willingham 100 Years Ago

After the VAD hospital closed in April 1919 the remaining contents had to be disposed of, and on 30 May CW Underwood placed an advertisement in the *Cambridge Independent Press* describing the items which he would be auctioning off in the near future.

The most important of these was a large (27' by 15'6") timber built structure which had been used by the convalescent soldiers as a recreation room, but lesser general effects included: A Very Large Lamp and Frame With Brass Reservoir; 4 Large Tin Boilers with Strainers; Bagatelle Board, Balls and Cue; Stove with Piping and Kerb; 5 Feather Pillows, 13 other ditto, 7 Bolsters; 32 Men's Coloured Day Shirts and 8 Pairs of Pants.

Station Road Speed Limit Change

There has been positive progress by Cambridgeshire County Council to extend the existing 30 mph speed limit on Station Road to the south of Westfield (towards the Park-and-Ride), including the placement of adequate signage. This should be in place by the time you read this.

Loss of the Set-Aside Field

The loss of the set-aside field behind the Recreation Ground has been a loss to the village, in particular the dog walking fraternity who are keen for the identification of an alternative solution. At the time of writing options are still being investigated and remain a challenge, but at least this issue is eased with access to footpaths in the countryside, including the footpath towards Over that is approached through what was the set-aside field.

Willingham Youth Trust Pop-Up Café

The Parish Council has supported a grant application for the Willingham Youth Trust to provide a pop-up café at the Youth Centre, which is intended to be a benefit to all of our community. The opening times are expected to initially be over a number of weekends, with the possibility of extending this if the café becomes viable. It is understood that, apart from the normal tea, coffee and soft drinks, there would be a tuck shop serving healthy snacks and sweet treats to start with (which may include locally baked cakes).

The Youth Trust is advertising for volunteers to assist with the café on the Willingham Facebook page (and in this month's magazine). This sounds like an exciting venture and hopefully parishioners will support this novel idea.

Parish Clock Refurbishment

The Council undertook the identification of a suitable company who had the capability of repairing and refurbishing the clock at the Parish Church. Work started in April and hopefully you will be hearing its chimes once again this month.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting is scheduled to be held at the Octagon at 7 30 pm on **Wednesday 15 May**. This meeting is open to all Willingham parishioners and is an opportunity to speak on matters that are pertinent to the parish. At the meeting reports will also be received from our District and County Councillors, along with those from our village bodies (such as clubs, charities and services). The details of previous minutes of Annual Parish meetings can be found on the Willingham Parish Council website. willinghamparishcouncil.gov.uk.

Meeting dates are published on the website, the notice board outside the public hall in the High Street, at the library and are listed below. Members of the public are welcome to attend and speak briefly or ask questions. Names will be taken down at the beginning of each meeting, together with the electoral register number to ensure everyone has a fair chance to speak within the allowed time (15 minutes in total for all speakers – three mins maximum per person).

Meeting Dates: 1 May (Annual Meeting of the Parish Council), 15 May (Annual Parish Meeting). The meetings are held in the Octagon and they start at 7 30 pm.

A Brief History of Willingham 1200 – 1700

In this new series Alan Fawcitt tells the story of Willingham as it grew from a small settlement in the Middle Ages to a thriving village over 500 years. Its location midway between the important cities of Ely and Cambridge gave it significance throughout this period as Alan explains.

Introduction

In medieval times the clergy were the only fully literate people in the village and we have a remarkable record of the Rectors of Willingham covering this period in a paper presented to the Cambridge Antiquarian Society in 1956.

Their track record was quite staggering. In addition to their religious role here, 20 Willingham Rectors over this 500-year period held posts that included Baron of the Exchequer of Ireland, the King's Ambassador to France (twice), King's Messenger to Rome, Master or Provost of four Cambridge Colleges, Vice Chancellor of the University of Cambridge (twice), Chaplain to one Queen and one King and Assistant Commissioner to Oliver Cromwell. I have attempted to weave a brief history of the village around the known backgrounds of these people and of the national events taking place during their 'reigns' in Willingham.

Part 1 Willingham in 1200 – The King's Visit, reign of King Henry III, 1216-1272

In 1200 'Wivelingham' was a small fen village with a population of around 150 living in 30 to 40 small, dark, single-storey cottages, wooden framed, with mud, wattle and straw walls, damp floors and thatched roofs. The fens to the north were undrained swamp with just one causeway

track linking Cambridge to Ely. Apart from the old Roman road from Cambridge to Huntingdon, the few other rutted roads alternated between dust baths and mud baths. But in the early 1200s two great building projects commenced in the centre of the village which, by their sheer scale, were to change both its appearance and importance totally.

The first was the construction of the Bishop of Ely's Manor House behind the church towards what is now Fen End where the Sports and Social Club stands. For 500 years, from 1109 to 1601, the Lord of the Manor of Willingham was the Bishop



of Ely who was both powerful and wealthy. The Manor House was built by 1238, using 50 oaks given by King Henry III, and it contained accommodation for the visiting Bishop and his guests. We believe that in 1244 one of his guests was King Henry III himself. The Manor House consisted of a hall with two chambers at its upper and lower ends, a 'knyght' chamber, a 'clerk' chamber, a chapel and a treasury (to store the rents due to the Bishop as Lord of the Manor in kind and in money). It was possibly fortified. No trace remains of the building now, but Steve Redman, who lives in Willingham, has researched this in some detail and built a scale model of how it might have looked.

The second project was even larger and this one does still stand in the village today. We'll be looking at that in more detail next time.

PASTORAL LETTER

Dear friends

If you have family and friends in the age group 8 –18, you will probably know someone who is struggling with life. According to a recent BBC News article, poor mental health among children and young people has been described as an epidemic and an 'escalating crisis'.

The number of children seeking help from Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) in England has more than doubled over the past two years. What is it about our culture that is so drastically failing our kids? There are some pretty obvious clues.

In education, this generation are the most tested in our nation's history. Even from a young age, children are becoming aware of where they fit in the academic pecking order, and are under pressure to perform.

Secondly, and more profoundly, young people are searching for meaning. When they ask, 'What does it mean to be a person of significance in 2019?' the world doesn't offer them a clear answer. Our culture encourages them to find the reason for themselves. But that is a challenge their still-forming minds are not equipped to face.

Place all this in the context of the communications revolution, where every check of the inbox is an up-to-theminute popularity rating, it is not hard to see why teenagers might question their value.

Our observation is that young people are longing for something to live for. And they expect it to come from beyond themselves. They need to be part of a story that is bigger than their own small world. We all do. God has 'set eternity in the hearts of men' according to the Bible. That means, intrinsically we are aware we were made for more. And we are dissatisfied with glib answers that ignore our spiritual needs.

The good news is that in Willingham, young people have an opportunity to explore any questions they might have about purpose, identity and faith. Always in an atmosphere of acceptance, friendship and in the midst of some crazy fun, our church-based clubs and groups help teenagers explore what they believe. And it's no surprise that for some it has been a source of hope, a story of light in the darkness.

And what's good for them is good for us too. Let's make room in our lives for the history-shaping hope of Jesus.

Gradually, Lou manages to get Will involved in different situations and he in turn takes an interest in her life, showing her how she can widen her horizons. But will she be able to change his mind in the end?

On 19 March SCDC Enforcement Officers, in partnership with police officers and bailiffs, took direct action to remove the traveller encampment on the Black Pit Drove site. Faced with the imminent threat of eviction, the occupants of the eight caravans, who did not have planning permission to reside there and were in breach of a High Court injunction order, moved peaceably, returning a few days later only to collect their horses.

Reader's Letter

Dear Willingham

I stayed in Willingham in Summer 1945 during my school holidays. My uncle George was in the RAF, stationed at Oakington working on Lancaster bombers during World War Two. His wife (my Aunty Audrey) looked after the then small village pharmacy – they lived there and I stayed there.

I was in Willingham when the first 'A' bomb was dropped on Hiroshima and remember that day well. (I visited many years later during one of my work visits to Japan – my career was in research and the safety of new medicines.) Also I clearly remember VJ Day, the street party and the Italian POWs dancing and celebrating too!

I have written a small document about those days in Willingham, the fens, life, the pharmacy etc. Nowadays I devote a lot of time to writing memoirs. I am approaching 87 years now. Willingham was a very different place then as was life itself.

If anyone out there is interested I can easily and gladly send you a copy of my memoir or talk about Willingham in 1945. I would be delighted if you could send me a contact – perhaps a local historian.
