We had a very interesting talk on An Unexpected Fourney by Kate Armstrong who helped her mother, Margaret Reardon, write a book about her experiences in the Colonial Service in Africa. Margaret had never travelled anywhere abroad before being posted to Eritrea as a newly-wed in 1945. She later moved on to Tanganyika in 1953, and then in 1961 to Bechuanaland (now Botswana) where Kate grew up and of which she had very fond memories. Margaret later moved to the Gilbert and Ellice Islands and finally the Turks and Caicos Islands before returning to England after her husband's sudden death in 1981. Life was often difficult with creature comforts and medical services thin on the ground. However Margaret was an intrepid character, setting up schools for girls and entertaining visiting dignitaries on a shoestring. There are numerous books about men serving overseas but it was very interesting to get an insight into the life from a woman's perspective. Sadly Margaret died last year aged 98 but did live to see her book published, and was even able to participate in some of the talks promoting it.

Willingham Wheels Helping to Raise Funds for Over Day Centre

Over Day Centre Celebratory Bike Rides, 2019

On Sunday 16 June, Willingham Wheels Cycle Club, together with Swavesey & Over Cycling Group, organised two donation bike rides to raise funds for the Over Day Centre. It proved to be a very popular Fathers' Day activity, with 63 family members (a third of whom were children) and 85 Club riders from several local villages enjoying the event.



The ride for serious riders followed a route of 52 miles from Over including Hilton, Bourn, Old Wimpole, Shepreth, the notorious Chapel Hill, Barton, Girton and Cottenham amongst local villages.

The route for families and casual riders followed the cycleway from Over to the guided busway, then on to enjoy a cake and drink stop at the St.Ives Bus Terminus before returning to Over. This route covered a total of 8.5 miles.

Both rides, with maintenance back-up and first aid, were designed by a British Cycling Route Planner and involved nearly 200 yellow route signs. All riders returned, so no one was lost!

The rides ended at The Green in Over, where riders and families enjoyed a lively social event with live music (from Mystery Train and Cat Pawsey), ice creams, burgers and hot dogs, together with a bar and a wide range of refreshments. All donations and proceeds will go to the Over Day Centre to help maintain and enhance services for older people in several local villages. We anticipate around £3,500 will have been raised, once all costs have been met, so a big Thank You to everyone who took part. We are also most grateful to all our sponsors and helpers and especially to all our volunteers who gave so generously of their time.

1st Willingham Scout Group

We have just returned from our first underground camp!

We visited Kelvedon Hatch Secret Nuclear Bunker, which was operational from the 1950s to the 1980s as the home of central government in the time of nuclear war threats. It is now a cold-war museum and the three-storey underground complex can be hired for an overnight stay.

When operational, the bunker could hold up to 600 personnel and would be completely self-sufficient for over three months (thankfully our camps don't last that long!). The underground accommodation, coupled with the onsite activity centre Nuclear High Ropes, was a fantastic

venue for the Group's camp that we hold every two years. We had 70 young people staying overnight, including some of our Beavers, age six, on their very first night away from home! Our davtime activities



included six high-ropes courses, a tunnel complex and the muddiest assault course ever.

The underground bunker canteen has a scarf from every Scout group that has spent the night underground and it was great to be able to add ours to the display.

Community First Responders – a Willingham Perspective

Community First Responders are volunteers for this NHS service who are trained by the East of England Ambulance Service to attend certain types of emergency calls in the area where they live or work. Our aim is to reach a potential lifethreatening emergency in the first vital minutes before the ambulance crew arrives. Our role is to stabilise the patient provide and the



appropriate care until the ambulance crew arrives on scene to take over the treatment.

To become a Community First Responder we need to be checked by the Disclosure and Barring Service run by the Home Office to ensure we are suitable to work with children and vulnerable adults. Once that is completed, we attend a five day intensive training course that gives us the skills to attend life threatening emergencies. We then spend some time working with ambulance crews to gain experience and we attend monthly training sessions to keep us up to date.

We have three Community First Responders in this area, covering Willingham, Longstanton, Over and Swavesey. Each of us carries a kit containing lifesaving equipment. This includes a Defibrillator, a supply of oxygen, suction equipment, an Oropharyngeal airways device for opening the airway of an unconscious patient, a Pulseox, used for reading the pulse and oxygen saturation levels of the patient, along with glucogel for treating diabetics, and various other items of first aid equipment.

When we are on call we appear on the screens of the Despatchers in the Ambulance Operations Centre. If they receive a 999 call in the area we cover, and it is categorised as life threatening, they will look for the closest ambulance crew to see if it able to respond in the first vital minutes. If that is not possible, they will call the closest Community First Responder and we are despatched to the call. The closest ambulance crew will also be despatched, and our role is to stabilise the patient until the crew can reach the scene.

Willingham Craft Beer Festival

The Craft Beer Festival, held over the last weekend in June, was a great success for the second year running. There was a great atmosphere over the weekend and lots of very kind feedback praising the selection of beers and the organisation. We had some useful suggestions for next year, but I have a feeling that we might draw the line at adding a bouncy castle to the event, sorry!

Over the four-day Festival we saw about 1,700 people, with 260 children. We had a fantastic range of beers on offer, and over the weekend we poured 62 different beers from all corners of the UK. The variety and quality of the beers on offer was better than many city-based beer festivals, and we had a number of people say that we were second only to Cambridge in this respect.



This year we had visitors from the United States! A Mr and Mrs Willingham, who are on a tour of Europe, decided to visit Willingham and discovered our festival. They spent a couple of hours with us and left with festival glasses and a T shirt, promising to return next year with their five sons!

The festival is set up as a Non-Profit Community Interest Company and that means that we will be donating the profits from the entry charges to the two charities that we are supporting this year – Friends of Willingham Library and Willingham Youth Trust. Our costs have been lower this year and our income higher so we have raised more money than last year. Once all the bills have been paid, there will be about £5,000 to share between the two charities.

Our grateful thanks go to our sponsors who are all local companies: Uttridge Accounting Ltd, Cambridge Medical Communication and IT For Starters. Their sponsorship paid for most of the upfront costs and removed some of the risk from the project.

Finally, I would like to mention our tireless and enthusiastic volunteers. We had 23 people who gave up their time to help at the beer festival, working for at least six hours over the four days. We also had specialist help from several other friends in Willingham – you know who you are. Thank you to all volunteers, committee members and friends.

P S Beer and music lovers – don't forget the Festival at the Social Club during Willingham Feast coming up in September. Plenty of beer and some great music!

From the Parish Council

Meadow Road: from Brownfield to Green!

The Meadow Road site, now under the stewardship of the Parish Council, has had a chequered past. It was a good example of a brownfield site because of its past industrial use. Since acquiring the site, the Parish Council has invested considerable time and effort in the regeneration of the land. The site has been levelled. Rubble, hardcore and other waste material have been covered with the topsoil the levelling produced. All visible holes have been filled and old tree stumps and rubbish removed. The Parish Council now considers the site ready for recreational use by villagers – please visit it.

To commemorate the 2020 Anniversary of VE and VJ Days and assist in the regeneration process, the Parish Council is considering planting a wood as well as sowing poppy seeds this autumn. These should be in flower in June 2020.

Crime News

The future of Parkside Police Station in Cambridge is being considered. The building no longer meets the current needs of the police. One option would be to develop a Southern Police Station in Milton. A public consultation about this proposal is now underway and you are invited to take part in this by completing an online questionnaire at: www.cambridgeshire-pcc.gov.uk/get-involved/your-views/have-your-say.

The police are warning car drivers about a new credit card scam. Individuals posing as police or traffic wardens approach car drivers and advise them that they are parking illegally. The car driver is offered the chance of paying a small fine 'on the spot' by credit card. The victim is directed for payment to a machine, which has been tampered with previously so that it refuses to return the card. The police advise the following three steps: check with the local council if you think the fine is not authentic, always shield your PIN number and always contact your bank immediately if your credit card is retained by an ATM.

The Parish Council has decided to take a robust approach to any flygrazing incidents on its land. A new streamlined approach is now available allowing landowners to remove fly-grazing stock more quickly.

Traffic and the Environment

The Parish Council is making two funding bids for highway improvements on Earith Road. The first was to the A14 Community Fund and asked for funding to complete the pavement along Earith Road as far as the Community Orchard. The second, a Local Highways Improvement Scheme application, would introduce a speed reduction 'buffer' zone along Earith Road so that drivers traffic entering the village would not have to reduce speed from 60 to 30 mph in one step. A 40 mph zone would be introduced to encourage speed reductions both in and out of the village.

South Cambridgeshire District Council Enforcement Officers have been serving enforcement notices on developers in Northstowe about breaches of conditions on working time. Our District Councillors are planning to meet with their Enforcement Officers to discuss the flows of construction traffic for Northstowe which travel through Willingham. Complementing this, discussions are ongoing with the County Council to place signs advising heavy goods traffic for Northstowe not to travel through our village.

The Parish Council has also been submitting proposals and making representations to our MP and the Combined Authority Mayor about Fen Edge village bus services. It wants better connectivity between these villages and the Guided Busway. The Combined Authority Mayor acknowledges the need for innovation and is aware of our local demands but notes that his authority has limited funds to provide support.

Long Pond - Long Wait

The County Council is responsible for the fencing around Long Pond. It was originally placed there despite the objections of the Parish Council. The fencing is in poor repair and the County Council has been asked many times to rectify this! The County Council is moving very slowly to deal with the requests.

The Ploughman Hall and Recreation Field

The area around the Ploughman Hall and Recreation Field has been well used by the community and visitors in recent weeks with three well-supported local events taking place – the Willingham Wolves Football Festival, the Beer Festival and the Fen Gallop.

Councillors were invited to visit the pop-up café being tried out by Willingham Youth Trust from its premises. It can be reported that an excellent cup of coffee is available! The opportunity was also offered to observe the Trust's Coding Club. This allows younger members of the village to develop their computer skills in an informal environment. Perhaps there could be a similar opportunity for older village members? The Parish Council thanks all the organisers of these events and their teams of helpers for their voluntary efforts in making sure activities run smoothly and safely and raising the village profile throughout the region. It would also like to thank everyone who took the time to complete the Multi Use Games Area Survey. This has now finished, and the results of this exercise are awaited.

Meeting dates are published on the website, the notice board outside the public hall in the High Street, at the library and are listed below. Members of the public are welcome to attend and speak briefly or ask questions. Names will be taken down at the beginning of each meeting, together with the electoral register number to ensure everyone has a fair chance to speak within the allowed time of 15 minutes in total for all speakers, with three minutes maximum per person.

Meeting Dates: **7 August and 4 September**. The meetings are held in the Octagon starting at 7 30 pm.

The parish council office is open Monday to Thursday from 10 am to 1 pm, except Bank Holidays and there is an answer-phone service outside office hours.

Willingham 110 years Ago

A long report of a court case appeared in the *Cambridge Independent Press* in July 1909, entitled 'Queer Willingham Wager: Three Quarts in an Hour', in which John Wright, landlord of the White Hart was summoned for permitting drunkenness on licensed premises.

The wager arose one afternoon when a man called George Hayden pestered Richard Few to buy him a drink. Few eventually got fed up and said that if Hayden could drink three quarts in an hour, he would pay for them. The drinks were ordered and Florence Nightingale, the improbably named barmaid, brought them in. She claimed in court that she had brought several glasses, believing that the drinks were to be shared by the company present. Unfortunately for the landlord, Florence was in charge at the time, as he was ill in bed and his wife was upstairs dressing.

Witnesses said that Hayden drank three pints quickly 'for a start'. Witness Herbert Parker said that Hayden was drunk when he, Parker, left the house at 3 40 pm, and was nearly halfway through the three quarts. At this time Mrs Wright came in and removed the rest of the drinks, apparently wresting the glass away from Hayden's mouth. Hayden then left the pub and, as he kept falling down, Richard Few had to help him home with the aid of P C Breen, who later testified he had known Mrs Wright for four years and she had given 'no more trouble than ordinary'.

The Bench eventually convicted the defendant and fined him $\pounds 2$ plus costs.

Willingham History – Part 4 A Golden Age in Willingham Reigns of Edward II, 1307–1327 and Edward III, 1327–1377

When John de Ellerker was presented by King Edward II to Willingham as Rector in 1324 he was already a King's Clerk. We know he was sent by the King to Dublin in 1336, where he was made Canon and Treasurer of St Patrick's Cathedral. He was also sent to Bordeaux in France, perhaps because of the success of his Willingham predecessor there. By this time the English possessions in Gascony covered a vast area of south-west France and were administered from Bordeaux on the Atlantic coast. The military campaigns of King Edward III had now brought almost one quarter of present-day France under the English Crown.

Back in Willingham the Church building was being extended, with major additions that stand unchanged today: a Tower and Spire to the west, an Entrance Porch to the south, and a Sacristy to the north. The Sacristy is built entirely of stone, including the roof beams, and it meets all the criteria of an Anchorhold, a place in which someone was enclosed for a Spartan lifetime of prayer and devotion. The narrow South Aisle was also widened to its present dimensions. These additions must have made an enormous visual impact at a time when the village population was still only around 350.

At this time Cambridge University was producing large numbers of priests. It was particularly convenient for the Bishop of Ely to travel south to Willingham, where he had his Manor House. In 1341 and 1343 Willingham was the scene of ordinations on a massive scale. On one occasion alone there were 293 candidates. They were needed to match the great expansion of the Catholic Church in this period. No less than 46,000 churches were built in England between 1250 and 1550. These ordinations must have presented an incredible scene – a procession of 300 priests and ordinands in their flowing vestments passing through the village to a building that now boasted a new Tower and Spire of gleaming limestone.

PASTORAL LETTER

I'm Simon and I've been the new vicar of St Mary and All Saints Church since mid-May.

I am a scientist by background, having studied for a degree and PhD in Chemistry, then working in the chemical industry for eight years before training for ordination. Prior to coming to join you, I was a vicar in the small Suffolk market town of Sudbury for 14 years. My wife is Sallie and our children, Matthew and Judith, have both recently graduated in Science fields.

It has been great to move here and start to get to know you all, although that happens in a national political climate of uncertainty and one with a flavour that is often not very nice.

In chapter seven of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus warns us not to judge, or we will be judged by the same measure. But we cannot function in life without making some judgments. For example, my gutters were cleaned for me a little while ago. When it next rained, one of them overflowed; it had not been cleaned properly. Do I trust the same person next time or not? A judgment is forced on me, as I have decisions to make about future actions based on past events.

Maybe what Jesus is referring to is how often and how freely we pass judgment on others. How many of us have made negative comments about Mrs May and her handling of Brexit, yet have unresolved problems of our own? This situation in particular has brought home how easily we can find ourselves passing judgment. We need to heed the words of Jesus again – to be very sparing in our judgment. There will be times when it is necessary – but I suspect those are far fewer than the number of times we open our mouths to do so.

Later in the same chapter Jesus talks about building wisely. Let us build with our words this summer – there will be enough things going wrong without us adding to the burden of others by passing unnecessary judgment.

May God bless us this summer as we seek to try and do that.

- Wear loose, cool clothing and a hat and sunglasses if you go outdoors.
- Check up on friends, relatives and neighbours who may be less able to look after themselves.

Library Reading Group Book Review

The Children Act by Ian McEwan

Fiona Maye is a respected High Court Judge specialising in Family Law.

There is a crisis in Fiona's personal life coinciding with an emergency legal case of Adam, a teenager with leukaemia who, being a member of Jehovah's Witnesses, refuses a blood transfusion.

Adam is only three months short of his 18th birthday, and Fiona decides to visit him in hospital to discover if he is competent to deny treatment, for denial means certain, and distressing death. She decides that despite Adam's intelligence, the pressure brought to bear on him from being immersed in the Jehovah's Witnesses renders him unable to make a decision. As he is still legally a child, she returns to court and rules that the hospital be allowed to give him the life-saving blood transfusion.

Months later, Fiona's marriage is still tense. She receives letters, first at work and later at home, from Adam, saying he is grateful for her ruling and has become disillusioned with religion. Fiona decides to ignore them. Adam follows her to Newcastle where she is overseeing local cases saying he wants to live with her. Fiona refuses and sends him away. She receives another letter saying he has returned to the faith. Reconciled with her husband, she is told of Adam's death, following a return of the leukaemia and his refusal of treatment now he is over 18 years of age.

District Councillors' Report



Welcome to our update on South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) matters.

Northstowe construction traffic

It is recognised that Northstowe construction vehicles continue to pass through Willingham, in breach of planning conditions. We are arranging to meet Northstowe developers so that we can present them with evidence of breaches and an explanation of the course of action that the Council will take if these breaches do not cease. We will report the outcome of the meeting in a future edition of *Willingham News*.

Zero Carbon Communities Grants

The Zero Carbon Communities Grants scheme was approved by SCDC in May. It will provide funds for local groups to spend on ambitious activities that reduce carbon emissions and reliance on fossil fuels, in addition to helping communities spread awareness and promote behaviour change towards low carbon lifestyles. Community groups will be invited to bid for grants of between £1,000 and £15,000 each. A total of just over £90,000 is being made available for the scheme for 2019/20. At the time of writing we are anticipating that the scheme will have been officially launched and open to applications by the end of July. Community Chest Fund

Community and voluntary groups can currently bid for a share of SCDC's Community Chest fund, which helps fund local projects. More details can be found here: www.tinyurl.com/y5t2cmro.

Streets Team

The SCDC Streets Team services 106 Parishes in over 900 square kilometres. They empty approximately 1,000 litter

bins and 700 dog waste bins each week. Looking to improve the service, and for a trial period, the team has now been restructured to operate in five zones. Covering all of the SCDC services (litter and dog waste bins, litter picking, fly tip removal and dead animal recovery) road cleaning teams will operate in each zone for two weeks before moving onto the next. Residents should email streets@scambs.gov.ukto alert the council to street cleaning issues.

Council Tax and Business Rates Collection

National tables showing Council Tax and Business Rates collection have recently been published and SCDC has retained its place as third best in the country at Council Tax collection. For Business Rates collection we have achieved a national ranking of 16th compared to 26th in the previous year.

Council Housing Update

SCDC is top nationally in the 'Housemark' tables for energy efficiency in its council housing stock and is second for rent collection. The Liberal Democrat administration pledged to double the number of new council houses it builds annually from the target inherited last year of 35 per year to 70 per year. In 2019-20 it is expected that even this higher figure is likely to be exceeded.
