Willingham 80 Years Ago

In September 1939, many villages in Cambridgeshire, including Willingham, were receiving evacuees from London. *The Independent Press* of 15 September reports that '164 children from Popham Road School, Islington as well as 20 privately evacuated children with several teachers and helpers, have been received in the village. A committee has been formed to deal with all matters relating to the welfare of the evacuees'. The committee was made up of 12 members, the chairman being the Rector Canon Bywaters and the joint secretaries were M E Blueman (Headmaster) and Miss P Boulton. Although this is not mentioned, the usual arrangement at first was that the local children attended school for one half of the school day, and the evacuees for the other half.

Popham Road School no longer exists. After several changes of name after the war it was demolished, and a school called New North Academy now stands on the site.

Readers' Letter

Dear Editors

We are writing with regard to an item last month's *Willingham News* and the announcement by the Parish Council that the Meadow Road site is now ready for recreational use after having undergone a successful transition from brownfield to greenfield site. On 5 August, we took up the council's suggestion to visit the site and were dismayed and also concerned at what we found.

There is no signage indicating the location of the site but we eventually identified it as lying just behind two concrete barriers, about 0.6 of a mile from the junction of Rockmill End and Meadow Road. Just behind the concrete barriers we found several heaps of waste which included pieces of glass, ceramic, old shoes, a jerrycan, gas canister, broken plastic, dirty textiles, and much more. While it is surely a good sign that this litter has been assembled for removal, it did not make for a pleasant welcome to this newly designated recreation area.

As we continued to walk around the site, we encountered more scattered litter and many serious tripping hazards. With the exception of the central strip of the field, the ground is exceptionally uneven, with pits, holes and deep ruts. Many of these pits and ruts are covered in long grass, which makes them difficult to see before you walk into them. We also found pieces of rubbish - wires, pipes, plastic - that seem permanently wedged in the soil and so are further safety hazards. Away from the central track, there is also abundant bramble, nettle and wood sharpened by flailing that visitors will need to avoid.

Based on our own experience, we cannot in good conscience recommend that anyone visit the Meadow Road site until these safety concerns have been adequately addressed. That is why we are frankly shocked that the Parish Council could be so irresponsible as to declare this site ready for use as a recreation area and even encourage residents to visit it at this time.

We are also concerned about the additional expense that will be necessary to adequately secure the site as a safe and clean recreation area. We aren't sure this is a sensible investment of parish funds when there are so many other important community needs.

Bear Grylls Welcomes 1st Willingham Scout Group to Camp

The last week in July saw 22 young people from Willingham join 1,600 scouts and guides from across the world for a week at our local jamboree, CamJam, which is held every four years at Huntingdon Racecourse. We were treated to a fantastic surprise when Bear Grylls, Chief Scout, dropped in by helicopter to welcome us all to the camp. He gave us an inspiring opening speech and told us: 'scouting is a great gift that many people wish they could be involved in, so make use of every opportunity that scouting gives you'.

CamJam is a fantastic opportunity for 10 - 17 year-olds to experience some really diverse aspects of scouting. There were over 50 activities throughout the week which included scuba diving, go-karting, sailing, stilt walking, fishing, wood turning and screen printing. We had great evening entertainment with a nightly cinema screening, live bands and a talent show, as well as the traditional camp fire. The weather, with downpours, tropical sunshine and high winds, provided us with some interesting challenges! But the most rewarding aspect was the opportunity to mix with young people from around the world. Our tents were sandwiched between scout groups from Uganda and Ireland who shared in our experiences and our young people also made friendships with scouts from Canada, Sierra Leone, Sweden, Pakistan, Switzerland and France, as well as many groups from other parts of the UK.

South Cambridgeshire District Council says: Thank You for Recycling Right.

Most of us recycle right but there still some items that cause problems for the Materials Recycling Facility. It costs Greater Cambridge Shared Waste Service £10,000 every month to remove and dispose of incorrect items from recycling collected from blue bins. They reduce quality and, if there are a lot of them, it can cause large quantities of materials to be rejected and not recycled. Your Council Tax money is therefore wasted, instead of being spent on improving local services. These items do not belong in your blue recycling bin:

- nappies, wet wipes, sanitary towels black bin
- tissues and kitchen roll green bin for composting
- black bags black bin
- clothes, textiles, shoes donate, swap, place in textile or shoe bank, take to the Household Recycling Centre (HRC)
- food and liquid remains remove any food and rinse containers, and empty all liquids from bottles. Squash and replace caps before recycling.

Yes, This is Happening in Willingham: Let's S.C.R.A.P. Fly-Tipping

Fly-tipping is the illegal disposal of waste. It can be anything from a bag of waste to a truckload. We all have seen abandoned items in the countryside, villages and towns. But leaving items by HRCs, charity shops or by bins are all fly-tipping too. Around two thirds of fly-tips come from households, so it is crucially important that you understand your Duty of Care to avoid a £400 fixed penalty notice or an unlimited fine.

Together with other partners in the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Waste Partnership (RECAP) we have launched the S.C.R.A.P. Fly-Tipping campaign to help residents to understand their responsibilities. Follow the S.C.R.A.P. code below to make the right choices when asking someone to remove your waste. To help us deal with fly-tipping incidents on-line report efficiently, please them to us at www.scambs.gov.uk/environment/envirocrime/ or by ringing 03450 450 063. If you witness fly-tipping, call 999 to report crime in action but please do not put yourself in danger. When reporting fly-tipping, please note as many details as possible:

- the exact location, date and time
- the size of the fly-tip and type of waste
- photos or a description of the fly-tip and fly-tippers
- details of the vehicle registration number, description and direction of travel

Resignation

The Council are very sorry to say goodbye to Jamie Smith. Jamie has worked tirelessly on behalf of the parish during his time with us and we wish him all the best in his future endeavours.

MUGA Survey

Thanks to all 197 residents who completed the survey. From the comments it is clear that the vast majority think that a MUGA will be an excellent addition to the village sports facilities. Most respondents

already participate in at least one sport, mainly weekly. Football was mentioned most often (30%), followed by netball (13%), tennis (12%), running (10%), and hockey (6%), and around half of respondents travelled outside the village to pursue their sport. Interestingly, in answer to which sports respondents might want to play on a Willingham MUGA, tennis was most popular (30%), followed by football {28%}, netball (21%) and hockey (11%). All the age ranges were covered, with most in the 36 - 45 group but next were the 5 - 15s and there was good representation from the over 55s. The survey results will be available on the Parish Council website from early September. The next step will be to draw up a detailed plan.

Dog Walking Facility

The availability of the privately owned 'set aside' field for dog walking was removed towards the end of 2018. Since then the Council have been looking at alternative options to accommodate dog walkers in the village. The Council considered the loss of the set aside field in November 2018 and May 2019. At the May meeting the Council considered proposals put forward for using the Recreation Ground and QEII Field and agreed that neither site would be suitable for dog walking.

Following various representations from parishioners at recent meetings and correspondence received, it was agreed that, if the required number of Councillors requested the May decision be rescinded so that amended and further proposals could be considered, then this would be added to the August agenda.

This request was received by the Clerk and various options were considered at the meeting held on the 7 August. After careful consideration the Council agreed that, whilst the recreation ground was still considered an unsuitable location for dog walking, the Council would form a working party to carry out a feasibility study of possible sites at the Ploughman Hall and the Orchard. It is hoped that the council will consider the results of the study at the October meeting. The Council will also continue to work on improving the Meadow Road site which will provide approximately four to five acres of open space for dog walkers and parishioners to enjoy.

Meeting dates are published on the website, the notice board outside the Public Hall in the High Street, at the library and are listed below. Members of the public are welcome to attend and speak briefly or ask questions. Names will be taken down at the beginning of each meeting, together with the electoral register number to ensure everyone has a fair chance to speak within the allowed time (15 minutes in total for all speakers, three minutes maximum per person). Meeting Dates: **4 September, 2 October** in the Octagon at 7 30 pm.

Willingham History Part 5 – The Black Death

Reign of Edward III 1327-1377

William de Hauberge became Rector of Willingham in 1339, followed soon afterwards by Adam de Lynham in 1342, who stayed for 28 years. Adam stayed in Willingham much more than his predecessors. The fact that he left a breviary, cope and a full set of vestments to the Church was perhaps an indication of his affection for the place. There is perhaps another reason that kept Adam de Lynham in Willingham for so long – the Black Death.

Bubonic plague, or the Black Death as it came to be known, arrived in England from Europe in 1348 through the ports. We now know the bacteria were spread by fleas carried on black rats, and it spread northwards at a terrifying speed. First symptoms were a blackened tongue, high fever and the rapid spread of boils across the whole body. Most died within one week. Few recovered. It affected rich and poor, peasants and

priests in equal measure, but in particular younger men and children. It seemed to disappear after 1349, but recurred in 1361-2.

The disease killed no less than 40% of the entire population of England. I can find no specific figures for Willingham (Parish records of births and deaths did not start until 1559), but we do know that 50% of the populations of Cottenham and Oakington died, so it is likely that deaths in Willingham would have been on a similar scale. On this basis, Willingham's population of around 275 in 1340 would have fallen to barely 140. With half the village wiped out in such a short time, the effect on village life and work is difficult to imagine. In the diocese of Ely, 350 out of 650 priests died. But Adam de Lynham, Rector of Willingham was not one of them. He lived through it all until 1375.

Willingham had a new Rector in 1370, Robert de Sustede. His name illustrates the continuing dominance of the Normans in English life, over 300 years after the Norman conquest. No fewer than eight of the first 12 rectors of Willingham had names of French derivation. He was a



Doctor of Law and was involved in the two Inquisitions which took place in Willingham in 1370 and 1371. These were held in the Bishop of Ely's Manor House in Fen End. The Bishop of Ely still owned most of Willingham, as his predecessors had for 250 years. In 1370 he owned a windmill in Rampton Road (now no longer standing), and he also owned three fish ponds known as Dernlode, Frithmere, and the Stacks. These fisheries played a very significant role in the Willingham economy of this period, providing employment and subsistence in fishing, fowling and reed gathering.

Robert de Sustede's ability in law led to him being sent to Rome by King Edward III in 1371, to act for William de Wymondham, the King's personal physician. We know that he started on his journey with a yeoman and two horses through the ports of London and Sandwich, and he is most likely to have followed the pilgrimage route of Via Francigena across France and over the Alps via the St Bernard Pass. This distance was 1,100 miles and was known to have taken 12 to 14 weeks on horseback. In fact Robert died in Rome. One wonders whether he couldn't face the journey back!

Cancellation of Friday Walk-In Surgery

As of **6 September**, we will unfortunately be unable to offer the Friday afternoon Emergency 'walk in' clinic from 4 - 6 pm at Willingham Surgery. Limited appointments will be available on Friday afternoons, but these must be made in advance by contacting reception. If you call with an emergency on Friday afternoon, the receptionists will ask for a brief description of your problem and arrange for a clinician to decide whether you need attend the surgery for treatment before the weekend. Please note, you should not contact 111 until after 6 pm, when the surgery is closed.

Flu Vaccinations

We expect to start receiving our vaccines at the beginning of September, with further deliveries in October and November. There will be three different flu vaccinations available:

- All patients aged 65 and over will be offered FLUAD, recommended by the government as being the most effective vaccine for this age group.
- Patients between 18 and 64 years AND in an 'at risk' category will be offered the quadrivalent vaccine which should offer more protection than the ones given in previous years.
- Children over the age of two will again be offered the nasal flu vaccine. School age children in Reception and Years 1 5 will have the vaccine at school.
- The surgery will give the nasal flu vaccine to children born between 1 September 2015 and 31 August 2017.

Saturday Flu Clinics

In order to provide vaccines as early as possible, we will be offering a limited number of Saturday morning flu clinics this year. The first date is:

Saturday 14 September, 10 am – 12 noon – Flu Vaccines for Over 65s.

We are expecting the vaccines for those aged under 65 to be delivered from the beginning of October, and will announce the Saturday morning clinics for this in due course. Further flu clinics are scheduled throughout the week, so please contact reception for details and make your appointment.

Pharmacy 2U

You may have received a leaflet in the post inviting you to get your repeat prescriptions from a company called Pharmacy2U. This is a distance selling company (internet only) which has nothing to do with the surgery and it is not funded or operated by the NHS. Patients should be aware that in choosing to use an online Pharmacy like this you cannot have any face to face contact. They are only allowed to deal with patients by post, telephone or internet. Prescriptions are delivered via Royal Mail at your own risk. We believe that an internet business like Pharmacy2U is no substitute for your local dispensary.

If you've taken a walk along the top of the river bank in Willingham lately, you may have spotted some rather exotic looking creatures grazing the pastures.

A little piece of Peru now exists in the furthest corner of the village – a herd of alpacas – and the numbers are growing!

We first visited an alpaca breeder in January 2018, and we were instantly captivated by these docile, yet inquisitive animals, with their doe-eyes and luxuriously soft fleeces. With very limited knowledge of alpacas, we started researching and reading everything we could, and by the summer of that year, we welcomed our first four pregnant females to our farm.

Fast forward only 12 months and we now have five breeding females, six yearling males and four cria (babies) that we have bred ourselves. To say that alpacas are addictive would be an understatement! We are well and truly under their spell!

So, what are our plans for these captivating creatures, I hear you ask? In the spring of 2020, we will be offering Alpaca Experiences on our farm. Visitors will be able to trek with their own alpaca along a scenic route by the river and enjoy a fact-filled couple of hours learning all about alpacas. We also plan to offer Alpaca Yoga sessions, and creative workshops including knitting and crocheting with alpaca yarn. Alpaca

fleece is a stunning natural fibre, that is not only incredibly soft, but also hypoallergenic as it contains no lanolin, making it perfect for anyone with sensitive skin. Alpacas come in 22 natural colours, ranging from white through to black, with many shades of fawn, brown and greys in between. The yarns can be dyed, but we choose to sell our yarns in the beautiful natural colours produced by the animals themselves.

The White Queen by Philippa Gregory

Set at the time of the Wars of the Roses, this book tells the story of Elizabeth Woodville, King Edward IV's queen. She is one of England's less well-known queens, a commoner, besmirched by her enemies as the poor Lancastrian widow who seduced the golden son of York, Edward IV, by witchcraft.

Here history is brought to life through the words of Elizabeth, whose husband, Sir John Grey, a Lancastrian, has been killed in 1461 fighting the Yorkists, and his lands confiscated. Elizabeth waits by the side of a road for the arrival of the victorious King, hoping to petition him for the return of her lands. There is an immediate attraction and they marry secretly in 1464. Over the next 18 years, Elizabeth bears him nine children, while Edward continues the fight to keep his kingdom. At his death, Edward gives his brother Richard guardianship of his sons, Edward and Richard, despite Elizabeth's misgivings. Richard seizes power and incarcerates the two young boys in the tower. The mystery of what happened to them still exercises historians to this day, and Gregory offers an alternative theory.
