# **Old Willingham**



Here, in the 1960s, we see Charlie Ingle who was station master at Longstanton station for many years. He is not at the botanical gardens – he is standing at the end of the eastbound platform! You can see the wagons in the siding behind where goods would be loaded and unloaded. Charlie took great pride in his station and won the 'Best Station Garden' award for the line. The station was opened in 1847 and the line was an important route for goods, bypassing Ely and being strong enough for the heaviest trains. Passenger traffic was always light however, and the line became goods only after 1970 and closed in 1992. Now, of course, the guided busway runs through what remains.

### A Brief History of Willingham 1200 to 1700 Part 7 – National Revolt

### Reign of Richard II 1377-1399

Richard II succeeded to the throne in 1377 at the age of 10. He is said to have inherited the appearance of his father, the Black Prince, but none of his military skills. Initially the country was governed by a Regency Council, but in 1381 it was faced with a major uprising, the Peasants' Revolt. Agricultural labourers had refused to pay a new poll tax and many were still in serfdom to the great religious abbeys.

Local grievances had festered too, especially in Cambridgeshire against a Roger of Harleston, who had a

house in Cottenham. It was promptly burned down. There were riots and much damage to the University and Great St Mary's Church in Cambridge. The young King and his Council met the national leader, Wat Tyler, in London at Mile End and agreed concessions. But once the crowd had dispersed, the King reneged on the agreement and many of the

ringleaders were executed. Although he reigned for a further 18 years, the memory of treachery persisted, and Richard's love of personal luxury and raising taxes led to his eventual murder in 1400 at Pontefract Castle.

Willingham and hundreds of other villages were still recovering from the effects of the Black Death a generation earlier when half the population had been wiped out. There was still a shortage of men to till the fields, the cost of labour had greatly increased, prices increased and the value of land had fallen. This was also the start of what became known as the 'mini ice age'. Winters became colder, rivers froze over more regularly, and snowfall was greater, leading to flooding when it melted. Given the grim housing conditions in Willingham then, this must have been a difficult time for the villagers. However, more prosperous times for the village were not too far away, as we shall discover next time.

#### Five Facts about 5 November and Guy Fawkes

- 1. The Gunpowder Plot was a plan to blow up 2,500 kg of gunpowder on 5 November 1605, which had been hidden underneath the Houses of Parliament. This was to be the day of the State Opening, and the explosion would have killed King James I, and everyone in the building as well.
- 2. Guy Fawkes' role in the Gunpowder Plot was to guard the hidden gunpowder and to light it at the right time.
- 3. Before the Gunpowder Plot could be carried out, Guy Fawkes was arrested. He was guarding the 36 barrels of deadly gunpowder in the cellar of the House of Parliament. At the time Guy Fawkes liked to be known as Guido Fawkes. After he was arrested he gave the name John Johnson to the authorities.
- 4. The Plot failed because King James saw a letter which had been written to Lord Monteagle warning him to avoid the Houses of Parliament on 5 November 1605.
- 5. Guy Fawkes and the rest of the conspirators of the Gunpowder Plot were tried in court on 31 January 1606. They were hung, drawn and quartered for their attempted crime and the plot.

# **From the Parish Council**

#### Meadow Road Site

It has been suggested that the Meadow Road site could be used for electric generation with windmills and/or solar panels. This has been explored in the past but appeared not to be viable. Meanwhile, work on the site is continuing to make it a better amenity for the village. Plans are in place to plant some 50 oak trees to commemorate those from the village who lost their lives in the World Wars, together with wild flowers, especially poppies, which would be prolific around VJ day anniversary. As mentioned previously users should be mindful that this is a work in progress and the ground is uneven in places.

#### Dog Walking

Further to previous articles in *Willingham News*, the dog walking working party set up to look at site options presented their recommendations at the October meeting. Two sites were identified with a total estimated cost of  $\pounds10,000$  for the works.

Option 1: The Community Orchard on Earith Road which is an area about 5 acres planted with trees. This has a boundary along the B1050 which has hedges and a timber rail fence. The fence could be made secure along that boundary at an approximate cost of  $\pounds 2000$ . There is limited parking in the area but an extension of the footpath along Earith Road is planned. There is also the right of way alongside the orchard leading to Milking Hills Drove which allows extra dog walking space.

Option 2: An area between the QEII Recreation Ground, the Ploughman Hall and Willingham Lode could be fenced and gated at a cost of £7000. This amounts to around half an acre being about 200 metres by 10 metres.

It was agreed to start work on option 1 immediately.

#### Traffic and HCVs

The condition of the B1050 should see some improvement soon, as Cambridgeshire Highways plan to close it on **3 November** from 7 am to 5 pm for remedial work. We wait and see how effective this is and for how long it will last. Although the meeting with the Northstowe developers and SCDC councillors (see report elsewhere) does seem to have reduced the HCV traffic to some extent, there are still many of these vehicles travelling through the village.

The Community Roadwatch group has sessions at various locations recording speeds and reporting to companies their speeding vehicles. One 30 minute period in the new 30 mph limit on Station Road showed nearly 60 vehicles exceeding the limit, 33% averaging over 40 mph including a bus and the maximum at 54 mph. The orange flashing speed signs (supplied by Mick George) give real time speeds, but the red/green flashing sign (borrowed from Haddenham recently) seem to give better results as they act as reminders of the actual speed limits. The PC may look at purchasing our own as a better deterrent to excessive speeds.

#### Northstowe

The October meeting saw a presentation from SCDC about a Community Governance Review. Northstowe means there will be a population increase over coming years with additional assets and facilities to be maintained and managed. This will have an impact on existing community governance arrangements. The review will start this autumn and aims to secure an arrangement which reflects the identities and interests of the community in the area. Willingham is involved as changes could affect the village boundaries.

#### Drones

There have been instances of drones being flown on the Recreation Ground. They should not be used on public open spaces, or where there are people around. New laws will come into force on **30 November** which will also require owners of drones weighing over 250 grams to register with the Civil Aviation Authority, and for drone pilots to take a safety test to ensure the UK's skies are safe from irresponsible flyers.

Council meetings are generally held on the first Wednesday of the month in the Octagon, starting at 7 30 pm. Agendas are published on the website, the notice board outside the public hall in the High Street, and in the library. Members of the public are welcome to attend and speak briefly or ask questions (see agendas for further details).

September Meeting

We were visited by Elaine McGregor of the Nordoff Robbins Music Therapy which is the biggest musical therapy charity in the country.

Elaine is a trained, qualified professional who is approved by healthcare organisations to support people living with challenges and difficulties. Nordoff Robbins Music Therapy has seven centres in the country and also work with wider organisations.

Therapists actively involve clients during musical therapy sessions. We were able to watch several videos of Elaine in action with her clients. They were a very varied bunch both in terms of age and in their abilities and disabilities. It was very illuminating to see how music clearly affected their behaviour and communication with others.

The session ended with WI members playing various instruments (mainly percussion) and joining in some songs, led by Elaine.

# Willingham Running Club

Willingham has a new running club. We train every Monday evening and meet at 6 45 pm at the Recreation Ground. We have been running sessions in Willingham since the spring in the form of Interval Sessions.

HI Runners (HI Runners originated in Histon and Impington before it expanded and now our membership base covers a much wider Cambridgeshire footprint) is an England Athletics Affiliated Club and has over 100 registered members. Sessions are run by local Willingham residents who are also England Athletics (EA) qualified run leaders. The head coach is Neil Marsh.



We are a community based running club that welcomes all levels of ability from new to experienced runners. We recently were awarded a grant by GCAN (Greater Cambridge Athletics Network) to help establish and train more EA qualified coaches in order to reach out to more potential runners in the community.

- 5. An answering machine can be useful for screening calls, as can features like Caller Display or Caller-ID which have been free since October 2018.
- 6. Ask the telephone service provider what blocking services it provides for no or low cost. For example; BT Call Protect, Sky Talk Shield, Talk Talk CallSafe or Plusnet Call Protect.
- 7. A call blocking device such as trueCall <u>www.truecall.co.uk</u> or CPR Call Blocker <u>www.cprcall</u> <u>blocker.com</u> can be useful especially for those with dementia or learning difficulties. Alternatively, if buying a new phone, consider one that has built-in call blocking technology.

## **Book Review**

#### Gone Girl by Gillian Flynn.

This is written in the first person by both Nick and Amy, a married couple from very different backgrounds. Amy's is wealthy whereas Nick and his twin sister, Margo or Go, have had a much more deprived upbringing though both have done well for themselves. However, all three lose their jobs and head to North Carthage, Missouri where Nick and Go grew up. Unemployment and poverty pervade the area and married life isn't as sweet as it once was. Then Amy goes missing. It appears she has been forcibly taken as the front door is open, the room is strewn with upturned furniture and broken glass; the kettle has burnt dry, and the iron is still switched on. Is Nick involved? The book has two halves. The first half contains extracts from Amy's diary prior to her disappearance telling of their love affair and Nick's chapters are dated according to how many days Amy has been missing. Books written in the first person can be straightforward personal accounts or the narrator can be unreliable. The reader has to decide. I shan't disclose what occurs in the second half.

Scores ranged from seven to three out of ten. I would recommend the book be read relatively quickly, not drawn out – it's not a difficult read – then you can form your own opinion.

# **District Councillors' Report**

### Northstowe Construction Traffic Update

We have been working closely with developers of Northstowe, as well as colleagues at SCDC Enforcement Team, to improve the problem of unpermitted construction vehicles serving Northstowe travelling through our village. Some productive meetings were held recently with the Northstowe developers, during which we explained the significant issues the village is experiencing with construction vehicles and informed them that residents strongly believe this situation is unacceptable.

We are pleased to report that the Northstowe developers have agreed to do what they can to stop the problem of construction vehicles accessing the site via Willingham and have committed to implementing a number of initiatives. All developers have written to their construction contractors reminding them of their obligations to the transport plan (ie not to use Willingham to get to/leave Northstowe) and that future breaches may result in the termination of contracts. Contractors were instructed to make this clear to sub-contractors.

It has been agreed that signage will be installed at various locations at Earith Bridge, Station Road and in the Northstowe entrances. The signage will state that no unauthorised construction vehicles should use the route through Willingham. In addition, it was agreed that CCTV should be installed at the entrance to Northstowe to identify and monitor unpermitted construction vehicles accessing the site from the direction of Willingham. We are to hold a meeting in early November with L and Q Estates, who oversee development at the Northstowe site, at which the final arrangements for CCTV monitoring will be scrutinised and approved.

We are hopeful that with the developers improved communication with contractors, the new signage and the CCTV this will result in an improvement to the construction vehicles in our village. Having said that, if you witness any construction vehicles using the B1050 to enter or exit Northstowe, please do report these breaches. Evidence of any breaches will help our enforcement officers to take action. Please report directly to planning enforcement via the SCDC website: <u>tinyurl.com/yxj83t5h</u>.

### A14 Construction Traffic

Not all of the construction traffic that travels through Willingham is destined for Northstowe and at a recent meeting with the Highways A14 Upgrade team we raised the issue of A14 construction traffic travelling through Willingham. The team said that most of the aggregates they need for the work comes from borrow pits close to their works and transported along temporary roadways (ie not on public roads). A small amount of material has to be brought in from outside, but they restated that no construction traffic bound for, or coming from, A14 works should pass through Willingham. They said that they would investigate any suspected breaches of their transport plan and if any Willingham resident suspects they are witnessing a breach, they should record the date, time, direction of travel and vehicle registration number and email it to SCDC's A14 officer Kathryn Southwood Katherine.Southwood@ scambs.gov.uk who will take the information to the A14 team. The new Huntingdon bypass should be open in December which will help everyone enormously and it is rumoured that whole project is well ahead of schedule because of the benign weather we have had in the last two winters.

### Surgeries

An additional surgery has been provisionally arranged for **Saturday 30 November** between 11 am and 1 pm in Ploughman Hall. This will be attended by Liz Davy of SCDC who is leading on the proposal for a Northstowe Community Governance Review and can answer residents' questions. We consider that surgeries in Willingham have been successful, and it is for the reason that we intend to increase the frequency of these drop in surgeries next year.
