#### **Library News**

Here's a message from Gary Porter, Head of Libraries and Communities at Cambridgeshire County Council:

#### Library Service Recovery

You will hopefully know that whilst libraries have been closed during the pandemic, the library service has been open for you online. I am sure you have been closely following the communications from Government outlining the next stages of the national 'recovery plan'. Libraries are included in Phase 3 of this schedule which is effective from **4 July**. This means that, if the rate of transmission is declining in the country, we can from this date offer some form of physical library service.

#### What Might this Look Like?

It will not be a full opening of libraries. Our priority is the health and safety of all our staff, volunteers and customers in line with Public Health advice and guidance. We are currently planning what our initial phase of reopening will look like but in headline terms this will be:

- Limited opening hours at some libraries across the county to give reasonable geographic coverage
- No mobile library services due to the challenge of making a confined space safe
- A click and collect book service not open access, no browsing as in normal times
- Managed, time limited access to our IT facilities
- Reinstating the phone line so that customers without home IT can contact the service
- The Library at Home service is already partially reinstated but we will look to restore it to all customers

Our approach is to start with a small, carefully managed offer that can be gradually grown in line with circumstances and Public Health guidance and requirements.

The limited offer described above is likely to roll out late July/August but we will communicate exact dates when they are agreed. If the public health situation deteriorates, the country may revert to stringent lockdown measures and if so, we would have to revise our approach to reopening libraries. We live in extraordinary times but at all times the library service is here for you online. We look forward to welcoming customers, old and new, back into our libraries in the future.

Remember, you can still join the library online and download eBooks as well as a huge selection of eNewspapers and eMagazines. You can also access many online reference resources and, for the period of lockdown only, Ancestry. And it's all FREE!

Don't forget to check the Cambridgeshire Libraries' monthly Newsletter and Facebook page. There's lots of information, reading ideas and activities for adults and children.

#### Summer Reading Challenge!

We hope that children have already signed up for the Summer Reading Challenge online and have been reading lots of great books. #### Revised Library at Home Service

Cambridgeshire Libraries can now accept new referrals to the Revised Library at Home Service. In addition to our regular Library at Home customers, this service is open to Cambridgeshire residents who fit a further set criterion: –

> Anyone who usually relies heavily on reading books or listening to audiobooks AND who is shielding or isolating due to age or health conditions under the current COVID-19 Government guidelines.

People accepted for this service will be contacted by a member of the Library@Home Team who will arrange a doorstep delivery of specially chosen books/audiobooks. Deliveries will be monthly (by prior arrangement) and previously loaned books/audiobooks will be picked up when new ones are delivered. Here are a few more recommended books from Wendy Law for you:

### *Wolf Hall, Bring up the Bodies* and *The Mirror and the Light* by Hilary Mantel

This trilogy, a fictional life of Thomas Cromwell, has just had its third part published this year. Thomas Cromwell, who we only really know from history as Henry VIII's dirty dealer, comes alive as a really rounded character and despite the truly terrible things he does, you find yourself coming to love him! The writing is superb and the characters completely compelling.

#### Middlemarch by George Eliot

Set around 1830 but written in the 1870s, Middlemarch is a small provincial town with a huge range of characters. Their experiences of life, love, disappointment, bad decision-making, hope and grief still ring true today and make it a gripping read.

We are really pleased to confirm that we have now been allowed to open the Church again. Following guidance from the Government and the Archbishop's COVID-19 Response Team, we are allowed to open the Church for private prayer only. Initially the Church will be open on this basis daily from 10 30 am – 4 30 pm. Provision is in place for people to use hand sanitisers and observe social distancing while they are in the Church building. If anyone is displaying any of the symptoms of COVID-19 we ask them to follow the NHS guidelines and self-isolate.

At the time of writing, we are not allowed to open the Church for any type of public worship. However, the daily opening of the Church door to our community is a sign that we can look forward to ordinary activities being permitted again. Church services are continuing, but in a different way. Services are being held, recorded and put on the website for you to be able to join in at the normal time of 11 am on Sunday, or whenever is convenient. These can be found at <u>www.5folds.org.uk/ page/simons-sermon-recordings-and-bible-index</u>.

In the audio recordings section, those beginning with MP are the service recordings and those beginning with 5 are the sermons. Simon is making CD recordings available for those not online, so please let us know of anyone who would like a copy. Also please forward your prayer requests so they can be included in our prayers. On our website at <u>www.5folds.org.uk</u>, you can find a range of links to prayer, worship and activities to keep us all connected and encouraged.

We now also offer a weekly online version of Compline starting at 9 pm. The ancient office of *Compline* derives its name from a Latin word meaning 'completion' (completorium). It is above all a service of guietness and reflection before rest at the end of the day. It is most effective when the ending is indeed an ending, without additions, conversation or noise. Using Zoom, it lasts about 15 minutes and includes prayers, responses, a hymn and a reading with the words appearing on screen. The room is open from 8 50 pm with people muted so that we start in silence. In order to receive a link to join us or just to get more details, please email susanmeah@ hotmail.com or hairyclairy2@ googlemail.com. If you don't have a computer, you can still join us by telephone and we can arrange to give you the words in advance. This service is open to everyone and we would love to see people from Willingham, Swavesey, Over, Northstowe and Longstanton.

As I write this, places of worship are being allowed to reopen for private prayer. Unlike Church of England churches, Baptist churches do not normally have their buildings open in this way and we have never done so here. During the lockdown, an increasing number of Diocese of East Anglia churches have been live streaming Mass online. Now the Catholic Bishops Conference of England and Wales has produced a very useful searchable guide to Masses across the whole country at <u>www.cbcew.org.uk/home/our-work/health-social-care/coronavirus-guidelines/live-catholic-mass-online</u>.

It's easy to search just using your postcode or by selecting a diocese. Narrow down your search results by selecting the Mass Type (Daily, Vigil or Sunday) and you can select from the available languages.

### **Pastoral Letter**

As we slowly come out of the lockdown, I hear mixed reactions. Some relieved that we can now go to our favourite venue/shop/hobby; others anxious that with more of us around the opportunity for the virus to spread is greater and might cause a second wave of infection.

Virtually all of us have had to miss something we would really like to do or people we want to see. For me as your vicar, it has been particularly distressing to be ordered to close the church. I fully understand why those orders were given; but at the point in our nation's history when we badly needed to pray, we were limited. Of course God hadn't gone away, but some familiar ways of meeting with him had. I know many of you found that painful too.

So I am pleased that we are beginning to come out of lockdown and that along with many other organisations, the churches are allowed to open in a limited manner. Our first permitted step is to allow people into church to pray on their own. At the time of printing we don't know exactly how this will be managed, but we are hoping to open for a limited time of day with someone on hand to ensure that surfaces can be cleaned as soon as they have been used.

To try and keep everyone safe, we have been understandably instructed to remove anything we might use in common, such as Bibles, prayer books, leaflets, paper and pens, so please do bring your own with you to use. Requests for prayers can be left in the church, please bring them with you. If you don't have a Bible of your own to bring, I do have some I can give away, please ask if you need one.

For the time being our church services continue online, but not in the building. If you cannot access them online, please ask, as I can have recordings made and posted out to you so you can join in.

May God bless us all as we slowly emerge from lockdown.

### People Working in Your House During Lockdown?

We all need people to visit our homes to carry out essential repair and maintenance work. Perhaps the boiler needs servicing or the washing machine is broken or maybe there are mice in the loft! There are the less essential tasks too: decorating, fitting a new bathroom or installing a home cinema. The list goes on.

We would normally spread these tasks out but it's no surprise that many people have been putting things off lately. Delaying or failing to arrange service and repair work can increase different risks as well as costs and work may not get done when you want it due to backlogs.

#### For Householders:

Our personal circumstances differ. You may be comfortable booking someone to visit your house or it may make you anxious. Regardless of how you feel, it would be reassuring to know that the person coming has some procedures to minimise risks. It shows they care about you, themselves and any employees.

You may find working procedures on their website or social media. Perhaps they will email you a copy. Or, you can just pick up the phone and get your questions answered.

The main things you should discuss are:

- The health of people in your household and the same at their end. Agree to notify each other of any change before the appointment date.
- Observing the minimum distancing guidelines. It's usually easy to be in a different room.
- Additional hygiene procedures such as hand washing, sanitising and cleaning. It's worth knowing that these are considered more important than PPE measures.

#### For Tradespeople:

It doesn't matter if you are a plumber, cleaner, painter or chimney sweep. Get yourself a set of procedures and routines and stick to them every time you visit a house. A good set of procedures reduces risks to a very low level. It also makes good business sense to reassure your customers.

There is specific government guidance for working in people's homes at: <u>www.gov.uk/guidance/working-safely-</u> <u>during-coronavirus-covid-19/homes</u>.

It's mostly common sense and will help you identify and minimise the risks to you (or your employees) and the households you visit.

It's easy to do, just adapt someone else's. It makes all the difference, especially to a vulnerable or anxious person. Show you care by publishing procedures on your website or social media or send them directly.

#### **Dental Care in England**

From 8 June, dental practices were allowed to open. Practices will need to prioritise patients with the most urgent need. If you need help from a dentist, contact your dental practice by phone or email and you will be given advice or offered an appointment if appropriate. For urgent dental care you can also use the NHS 111 online service.

### FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

#### **Multi-Agency Meeting**

At a recent multi-agency Zoom meeting, *Willingham Hub* were rightly praised for the work that they have been doing and some astonishment was expressed that they have over 100 volunteers working for them. For anyone that does not know, *Willingham Hub* was set up in March, soon after lockdown, to support anyone in the village who needed help with obtaining food or medicines. A very professional structure was rapidly put in place to meet basic needs and monitor those at risk.

The Parish Council has been very pleased to support this excellent group with some basic tasks such as printing and most importantly, some funding. Fortunately, the Council had an Emergency Plan written many years ago to help deal with problems such as flooding. A pandemic was not foreseen but parts of the plan were still useful in authorising rapid access to cash. When the world returns to a more normal state the plan will be updated.

The meeting was attended by various housing and support agencies as well as County, District and Parish Council Officers and Councillors and Cambridgeshire Police. There was a review of the anti-social problems that beset Willingham last summer and the action taken. The view was expressed that this year has been much quieter with the caveat that we may see more problems as the lockdown is relaxed. As always, everyone is encouraged to report any incidents however trivial. Whilst no action may be taken on an individual case, providing it is logged, it will add to the cumulative picture.

A benefit of lockdown has been the massive reduction in traffic. The flip side has been an increase in speed from a few inconsiderate drivers. The police have been made aware of this but say that they do not have the resources to do anything about it for now. They have asked if the village could restore a 'Speed Watch' team.

Increased fly tipping has been another downside of the lockdown. With the temporary closure of recycling centres and restrictions on vehicle movements, some unsociable folk have used the droves around Willingham as dumping grounds. There is a backlog of mess to be cleared for which we, as council tax payers, will be liable. If you do see anyone dumping rubbish, please give us the details of time, place and vehicle registration number.

#### **Climate Change**

In 2008, the Climate Change Act established a legally binding target to reduce the UK's greenhouse gas emissions by at least 80% in 2050 from 1990 levels. Over the past year or so the dramatic effect of these emissions on our climate has become widely recognised as a very urgent problem and tackling it has moved higher up the agenda. In addition to greenhouse gas reduction, the sustainability of our environment also involves issues such as biodiversity, pollution and plastic waste.

Fundamental change requires international and national commitments, but local authorities also have an important part to play. The Parish Council will continue to engage fully with the County and District Councils, both of which have declared climate emergencies and are working on policies and strategies towards net zero carbon.

#### **Virtual Meetings**

For the time being we have had to suspend our normal meetings but they are all continuing on Zoom. Members of the public are most welcome to join in and can speak, subject to the usual rules on timing. The Parish Council website carries details of meeting dates and times together with a lot of information on council activities. Information is also available on a non-interactive Facebook page.

#### Village Heroes

Whilst the NHS have rightly been applauded for their excellent work, there are a lot of other folk who have quietly got on with keeping services running. The Parish Council is enormously grateful to the store workers who have kept us fed, the Post Office that has kept communication links open and all the other heroes in our village who have risked their own safety for the benefit of us all.

### **District Councillors' Report**

#### Mobile/Community Warden Schemes

South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) recently announced a £200,000 fund to establish new Mobile/Community Warden schemes across South Cambridgeshire. COVID-19 has slowed down the roll-out of the scheme but a tender has now been put together and is open for applications.

This does not affect Willingham as the Parish Council voted to adopt an Age UK scheme at the end of last year. As the village is considered 'strategic' (having a higher proportion of elderly/vulnerable people than most other parishes) the funding for the scheme in Willingham is already secure.

SCDC will fully fund the Willingham scheme for the period 2020-2022. After this, it will transition to annual grant funding and SCDC will work with all schemes to help identify additional sources of funding to help with the transition.

#### **Discretionary Business Grants**

A Discretionary Grant Scheme has just been rolled out to help small businesses who were unable to access the previous tranche of COVID-19 support. This is intended to help them deal with immediate challenges, secure jobs and recover from the lockdown. Eligible businesses include charities, market traders, bed and breakfasts and those operating in shared offices or flexible workspaces. There's also an opportunity for businesses forming part of the supply chain for the retail, hospitality and leisure industries, who have lost a minimum of 75% of their annual turnover as a result of COVID-19. If you know of any businesses that may benefit from this, please let them know. SCDC has a first-rate record in administering the support packages available to small businesses in this pandemic, with around  $\pm 22$  million distributed to almost 1,900 local firms.

#### **Food Scheme**

We have been working with officers of SCDC and the Over Day Centre (ODC) trustees to establish a food scheme for vulnerable people of any age. By the time you read this, the first meals will have been produced and delivered by volunteers, targeting the villages normally served by the Day Centre (including their Willingham clients) but it is intended that the scheme will be district-wide. It is envisaged that production will be ramped up as the ODC kitchen gets into full swing and the volunteer network beds in.

### Automated Number Plate Recognition Cameras at Northstowe

We recently had a very productive meeting with L&Q Estates, the primary developer at Northstowe. We agreed that L&Q should go ahead and install Automated Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) cameras at the entrance to the development. The system chosen is a sophisticated one that will provide data for SCDC Enforcement Officers to use, if they feel there is a need to prosecute clear and repeated breaches of planning conditions. In fact, we all hope that the installation will be sufficient to provide a deterrent. The installation may be affected by COVID-19 backlogs but it is planned that it will go ahead in the coming weeks.

#### July Topics of Interest

- Keeping on top of those dreaded weeds! Weeding is actually a skilled job, and it would be nice to think of it as creative editing rather than something mundane. So never surrender: where's a weed, there's a way. Hand weed where possible. It is amazing what you can do in 10 minutes. Try giving yourself a specific area to work on and have a blitz.
- Deadheading starts now. In many instances, by preventing seed formation you prolong the flowering season, particularly for annuals. Worn-out natural wicker waste paper or shopping baskets strategically placed around the garden make aesthetically pleasing collection receptacles for deadheads, removed yellowing leaves and the general dross of summer gardening.

#### 10 Top Tips To Make Your Watering More Effective

**DON'T** water 'little and often' and don't sprinkle water on exposed soil. Both merely dampen the surface, from where moisture evaporates rapidly, leaving the soil underneath dust dry. Instead water less frequently but more thoroughly and direct it at the base of the plants, so that the moisture reaches right down to root depth.

**AVOID** spraying foliage. Although it cools the plants down on hot days, it fools them into opening their stomata (the pores on the underside of the leaves), so in the long run they actually lose more moisture.

**SPRAY** paths and soil in greenhouses and poly tunnels on

hot days to increase humidity, which helps plants reduce moisture lose through their leaves.

**CUT** down on watering by adding a thick layer of mulch while the soil is moist. Use garden compost, bark chippings, gravel or something similar.

**COVER** the surface of the compost in containers with pebbles to keep plant roots cool and reduce evaporation. This actually generates moisture, as water condenses under the stones at night.

**AVOID** overwatering established plants. Instead encourage them to send their roots deep into the cooler damp soil.

**DON'T** apply high-nitrogen feed as it encourages large, soft, thin leaves that lose moisture quickly.

**USE** high-potash feed to 'toughen up' foliage.

**DELAY** planting woody plants until autumn, when the weather is damp.

**KEEP** up with the latest water-wise garden techniques. National Trust gardens such as Nymans in Sussex, practise water harvesting, water recycling and low-water planting schemes. You'll also find

watering advice at <u>gardenersworld.com/watering</u>, as well as on the RHS website at <u>rhs.org.uk</u>.

#### July Jobs in the Garden

- Check clematis for signs of clematis wilt
- Make sure houseplants are cared for while on holiday
- Water tubs and new plants if dry, but be water-wise
- Deadhead bedding plants and repeat-flowering perennials
- Pick courgettes before they become marrows
- Treat apple scab
- Clear algae, blanket weeds and debris from ponds and keep them topped up
- Order catalogues for next year's spring-flowering bulbs
- Give the lawn a quick-acting summer feed, especially if not given a spring feed
- Harvest peaches, apricots and nectarines

### A Brief History of Willingham 1200 to 1700

### Part 15 – Bradshaw – Cromwell's Man in Willingham

Reign of King Charles I 1625 to 1649 'Commonwealth' of Oliver Cromwell – 1649 to 1660 Reign of King Charles II – 1660 to 1683

#### The Rise of Nathaniel Bradshaw

After the appointment of Nathaniel Bradshaw (an ardent Cromwell supporter) as Rector of Willingham in 1647, there followed a most extraordinary 15 year period in the village. There is no evidence that Bradshaw, a Presbyterian, was ever even ordained; indeed it is said 'he was very averse to the Church until God visited him with smallpox'. After this event he was converted, and soon became well known as a 'barn preacher'. Within two years of Bradshaw's arrival at Willingham, King Charles I had been executed, and the monarchy replaced by Cromwell's 'Commonwealth'. The career of the new Rector went from strength to strength under Cromwell. In addition to his post as Rector of Willingham, he was made Assistant to the Commissioners for the counties of both Cambridgeshire and Huntingdonshire in 1654 to 'eject scandalous, ignorant, and inefficient schoolmasters and ministers'.

However, Bradshaw's twice daily preaching led the congregation to complain that 'he more wearieth parishioners than profit them'. More importantly, when Cromwell died in 1659, and the monarchy was restored under King Charles II, Bradshaw's patronage disappeared.

#### **Cromwell's Death and Bradshaw's Ejection**

After the monarchy was restored under King Charles II, most non-conformist clergy were deprived of their livings, and Bradshaw was ejected from Willingham Rectory, 'leaving 90 devout families at my ejectment'. He promptly changed allegiance and founded the first non-conformist church in Willingham in the house of Francis Duckins but we have no information of where exactly that was. A Congregational Chapel and its Baptist successor were founded in the same year. Bradshaw carried on preaching in Willingham and surrounding villages for a further five years, until he moved to London, just after 'The Great Fire' there. He later returned to St Ives after the Act of Toleration and preached in a non-conformist capacity in Willingham until his death in 1690 (from scorbutic dropsy). In effect, he had preached in the village for the greater part of 43 years. Bradshaw must have retained some kind of favourable relationship with the Rectory after all this time, as he managed to arrange for his own burial in Willingham, in the chancel of St Matthew's Church as it was still known at that time.

#### **Royal Restoration**

After Cromwell's death and the coronation of King Charles II in 1660, there was inevitably a reaction against all things Cromwellian. While Nathaniel Bradshaw had been enjoying the living at Willingham during Cromwell's Commonwealth, the royalist Bishop of Ely, Matthew Wren, had been imprisoned for 18 years in the

King Charles II

Tower of London. When Wren was released in 1660, he wasted no time in compensating his children for the hardships they had suffered during his imprisonment.

Nepotism thrived! His second son, Thomas Wren, had been admitted to Cambridge University as an undergraduate but was forced to leave when his father was taken to the Tower. Despite being denied any financial support from his father, he had somehow managed to transfer his studies to Oxford, where he was said to have become 'much addicted to musick'.

After his father's release from the Tower, Thomas Wren's career was nothing short of meteoric. He was ordained by his father in 1661, appointed as Rector of Willingham and Canon of Ely in 1662, Archdeacon of Ely in 1663, and a Canon of Southwell in 1664. He retained all these appointments until his death in 1679.

The following is an advert from the *Cambridge Independent Press* of 13 August 1920.

'Lost between Willingham and Cottenham on 30 July, GOLD BRACELET. Finder rewarded on returning same to Miss Mildred Gautrey, Cottenham.'

This is of interest to Willingham readers as Mildred Gautrey married Francis Herbert Jeeps of Willingham about two years later in 1922. Many people will remember them living and running the fruit growing business from 2 Church Street.

Francis was a well-known local fruit grower and later Chairman of Cambridgeshire County Council, and he and Mildred were the parents of the England rugby player Dickie Jeeps, also a resident of Willingham.

It's tempting to wonder if Miss Gautrey lost her bracelet while cycling back to Cottenham after visiting Francis Jeeps, but that we shall never know.

### **Strawberries in July**

The height of the English strawberry season is during the time of the tennis championships at Wimbledon in late June and early July. Its cancellation means the traditional partnership of strawberries and cream will not be in SW19 this year.

Usually 28,000 kilogrammes of strawberries would be destined for tennis fans during Wimbledon fortnight. Freshness is guaranteed as the strawberries are picked at

#### Strawberries in Balsamic Vinegar



The vinegar brings out the lush redness of the berries and really enhances the flavour. This quantity would serve six.

500g hulled and halved strawberries

2 tbsp balsamic vinegar

4 tbsp caster sugar

¼ tsp black pepper

A few mint leaves for decoration

Place the strawberries in a bowl and drizzle the vinegar over them. Sprinkle with sugar, stir gently, then cover and let them sit at room temperature for at least one hour, but not more than four. Just before serving, grind the pepper over the strawberries. Enjoy it with a sponge, over ice cream or simply on its own. 4 am, collected from the packing plant at 9 am and then delivered to the Club for inspection and hulling. They are enjoyed by customers on the same day. At the 2019 championships, 191,930 portions of strawberries and cream were consumed at the price, for a minimum of ten strawberries, of £2.50; this has remained the price since 2010.

Here are some other ways to enjoy strawberries:

#### **Pimm's with Strawberries**



276,291 glasses of Pimm's were enjoyed at Wimbledon last year. It's easy to make:

Fill a jug halfway with ice cubes and pour over 200 ml of Pimm's No 1 and 600 ml lemonade. Add six sliced strawberries, an orange cut into wheels, four slices of cucumber and a few sprigs of mint. Stir well and serve in tall glasses.

I'm hoping that, instead of live tennis during this fortnight, classic past matches will be broadcast, so I'll still be able to enjoy the strawberries while watching my favourite sport!

We have consulted our Old Willingham expert Jon Edney about this and he replied as follows:

'Yes, that was the 'Ringer's Rest' pub, conveniently opposite the church tower. I don't know when it closed – probably sixties or early seventies......What you may not know is that there used to be a door in the base of the church tower so that the bell ringers (who would have been paid) could get out without having to stay for the service – probably to head over to the Ringer's Rest!
