Update from Fen Drayton Lakes

When looking out over Ferry Lake in the spring and summer, particularly from the picnic tables near the car park or from the northern view shelter overlooking Ferry Mere, you may notice some rafts floating out on the water. You can see these same constructions from the hide on Moore Lake. These are our tern rafts and are specially made artificial nesting platforms for common tern.

Common tern are fantastic birds that spend the autumn and winter in Western Africa before coming up to breed in Europe. With their long, slender wings and long outer tail feathers they fly agilely over the lakes, earning them the nickname 'sea swallow', energetically turning and swooping up and down as they catch small fish from just below the surface.

Unlike their coastal nesting cousins, common tern can often be found on inland lakes in the breeding season. As ground nesters, terns do not build nests in trees. Instead, they lay their eggs directly on the ground or on a small pile of vegetation, usually favouring sandy or gravely areas where their eggs and chicks are adapted to be well camouflaged.

Whilst we have several islands on Moore Lake and a single island on Ferry Lake that our terns nest on, these tend to be crowded with nesting black-headed gull that push the common tern to the edges. We therefore take out rafts and anchor them in the lake near the islands to provide some much-needed extra space for the terns, timing their deployment for after the gulls have begun nesting to limit the number that will attempt to use the rafts.

It doesn't take long for the terns to find the rafts once they are out and begin claiming nesting spots. When visiting the reserve, keep an eye out for birds flying overhead carrying fish to bring in to incubating partners or chicks on the rafts.

Over the Garden Fence

What to Water First When it's Sizzling Hot

With our spring and summer weather patterns changing over the years, gardeners may feel deeply conflicted by the blue, cloudless skies and relentless sunshine. What about our plants, lawns and allotments? Here is a basic guide to your top watering priorities in a heatwave and some ingenious tips. They are in order of priority.

Small Plants in Small Pots

Thirsty annuals and young vegetable plants in small pots, are the most vulnerable. Group pots 30 cm diameter or smaller together and, if possible, give them a spot out of direct sun to reduce stress. Place saucers under pots or place several pots in trays together to save water. Water that isn't taken up by the plants will gradually evaporate and contribute to the humid micro climate that massed plants create around themselves.

Large Plants in Large Pots

Don't lose valuable feature plants that you've nurtured for years. Keep an eye out and water mature containerised shrubs and trees. Move pots out of direct sun if you can.

Anything You Want to Eat

If you want home-grown crops this season, you'll need to prioritise all fruit and vegetables; raspberries, stone fruit, apples, tomatoes, potatoes and onions – anything that swells and ripens needs watering to succeed. This is the moment to feel smug about having installed a rain barrel on the allotment and wish you had put in two more. Think seriously about putting in a micro-irrigation system if you're a raised bed/patio grower.

Newly Planted Trees or Shrubs

This is not the time to let one or two-year old trees and shrubs fend for themselves. The first few summers after planting are a critical time – so to encourage deep root formation, keep up the watering. Scrape away any mulch before you water and give a can full each time, every few days. Use the old trick of creating a mini-circular embankment about 60 cm in diameter around the base of each trunk so that the water collects. There are other tricks for deep watering trees and shrubs, a piece of piping or a plastic bottle with the bottom cut out sunk into the ground can direct the water deeper into the ground and it also evades evaporation.

Leave the Lawn Alone

The standard advice in a heat wave is don't water your lawn. Although sun baked grass turns to a deep-fried crispy brown, it recovers very quickly once rain arrives. However, if your lawn is a much used area and you feel strongly about keeping it green and springy, give it a deep soak in the evening for every four days of sunshine and feel silly when it rains afterwards.

Don't Forget the Sun Lovers

Certain plants love to bask in the sunshine – get your pelargoniums (the bright red ones aka bedding geraniums) out in the sun. The same goes for other Mediterranean types, for example, rosemary, lavender, bay, and olives. If dusty collections of succulents and cacti haunt your windowsills, give them a surprise holiday outside.

Water Late Evening

Apply water direct to the soil, not the plant foliage.

Reading Group – Book Review

Last Letter Home by Rachel Hore

Not a short read at 551 pages but an easy one and ideal for holidays at home or wherever. The story switches between events in the Second World War and the present day. This is an intricately woven story of love, jealousy and intrigue. The main character, Briony Wood, a history lecturer, stumbles on a mystery while on holiday in Italy that had its origins in the early 1940s.

Working through letters and photographs, she slowly unravels the main traits which finally lead to her revealing secrets relating to her own family. While busy with this research, she uncovers the true nature of her relationships with those closest to her. There is lots of atmosphere throughout the novel and the ending, for those romantically inclined, is perfect.

The average score given by the book group was 7.1 out of a possible ten.

Free Summer Holiday Scheme for Children in Receipt of Free School Meals

A scheme to provide holiday childcare, activities and food for children in Cambridgeshire is now taking bookings. Any child receiving benefits related free school meals is eligible to access free holiday provision under the Holiday Activity and Food (HAF) programme. Funded by the Department for Education (DfE), it enables local authorities to coordinate free holiday childcare, including healthy food and enriching activities. The programme will be delivered by approved holiday scheme providers and childminders.

Up to four weeks of activities will be offered and each eligible child will be entitled to up to 64 hours of free holiday childcare throughout the school summer holidays. More information can be found at <u>www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/haf</u>.

Eligible children will be able to access:

- Fun and enriching play opportunities
- At least one meal a day
- Sessions on healthy eating
- Support for families with guidance on how to source, prepare and cook nutritious and low-cost food

Part 27 – Victorian Willingham – Religious Rivalries

Reign of Queen Victoria, 1834 – 1901

Baptists v Anglicans

Ever since the 1660s when the Dissenters in Willingham split from the Church of England there had been fierce rivalry between them. The Dissenters were Congregationalists initially in Willingham, and from 1714 met in a thatched meeting house in George Street next to the George Inn. They formally adopted the Baptist tradition from 1789, and grew rapidly in numbers during the 1800s. In contrast, the Anglicans at the Parish Church suffered from having no resident Rector for much of this period, although there was always at least one curate who lived in the village. The Baptists took full advantage of this, and by 1830 had expanded so much they found it necessary to replace their 'old thatched meeting house' with a new Baptist Chapel on the same site on the east side of George Street. It opened in 1830 and, with its gallery, seated 750.

By the 1850s Baptist attendances in Willingham were exceeding 400 on Sunday mornings and 700 in the evening, with a large Sunday School for children in between. The Baptists believed very strongly in the importance of Sunday Schools for children and they had regular attendances of well over 100 in the mid-century. Throughout the 1840s and 1850s there were fierce arguments between Baptists and Anglicans at public meetings over the future of education in the village, before final agreement was reached to build the British School in Fen End in 1856.

Baptist Internal Splits

With this astonishing rate of growth it was perhaps not surprising that the Baptists would experience some internal dissensions themselves. There were various secessions in 1814, 1820 and 1838 to form separate congregations, but the most dramatic was in 1875 when a new Pastor, William Jackson, led a breakaway group to build a new Baptist Tabernacle directly opposite the 1830 Chapel in George Street. In contrast to the rather plain old Chapel, the architecture of the new competing Tabernacle was quite ornate with twin towers and pinnacles. It too had a gallery. The two buildings remained (and competed) for another 100 years until their demolition in the 1970s and 1980s respectively. The present Baptist Church in George Street stands on the site of the demolished Tabernacle.

A High Achieving Anglican Rector – But Rarely in Willingham

Meanwhile the Anglicans at the Parish Church undoubtedly suffered during this period from absentee Rectors. They were generally eminent academics at Cambridge University and elsewhere, who spent little or no time in Willingham. The record of John Graham, the Rector who was appointed in 1843 is certainly impressive. When he arrived he was already Master of Christ's College, having twice been Vice Chancellor of Cambridge University. He is said to have 'enjoyed the close friendship of Prince Albert and the respect of the Queen'. Perhaps such good connections helped when he left Willingham in 1848 to become Bishop of Chester.

Methodists and Salvation Army

To complete the religious scene in Victorian Willingham, the Methodists and Salvation Army also arrived. The Primitive Methodists had a Chapel in Church Street early in the century, which closed in 1865. The Wesleyan Methodists established themselves in a barn in 1836 and recorded attendances of between 65 and 107 at each of three services on Census Sunday in 1851. They built a new Chapel in 1852 overlooking the Green with seating for 160. A Salvation Army 'barracks' was established in 1887 and thrived with its own Officer and band. It was replaced by a modern building in Silver Street in 1969.

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Proof of Vaccine – NHS App

From 17 May, people in England who have been fully vaccinated against COVID-19 can demonstrate their vaccination status for international travel. A full course is currently two doses of any approved vaccine. Vaccine status will be available from:

• the NHS App which you can download from app stores.

It may take more than a week for your identity to be checked and verified so you can use this service.

If you cannot access this online service, and you have had two vaccines, you can request a paper letter from the NHS by calling 119. Only call 119 if you are due to travel abroad in the near future and have had your second dose more than five working days ago. It may take seven working days for the letter to arrive.

This practice is not able to provide you with a letter that shows your COVID-19 vaccination status.

When you're planning your travel, check the latest information on the gov.uk website. Make sure there is time to get proof of your vaccination status before you leave.

Staffing and GPs

At the end of May Dr Jankovic left the practice after a long career in the village. Our rapidly expanding team are delighted to welcome Dr Greg Trilling and Dr Vidhya Viswam to the practice as permanent GPs. They are already settling in well and proving to be a big asset to the surgery. Many of you will be aware that Dr Brown is expecting her second child in the summer, and will be going on maternity leave from the beginning of August. You will be seeing some familiar faces in the surgery, including Dr Suter, as she continues to locum for the practice to keep us fully staffed.

Coils and Implants

We are working hard to reduce waiting times for contraceptive implants and coils at the surgery. We now have three GPs who are trained in this procedure.

Unfortunately, due to the unprecedented demand on the surgery during the pandemic, we do have a long waiting list for these procedures. Patients have the option to self-refer into the iCaSH service by phoning 0300 300 3030 to be assessed. Clinics are available in Huntingdon and Cambridge.

Anti-Social Behaviour

The Ploughman Hall has again been the subject of various reports of anti-social behaviour, including trees whose bark was stripped away, which leaves them seriously vulnerable to disease. There has also been a recent incident of criminal damage to CCTV cameras and intimidating behaviour towards parishioners. Following correspondence with the Parish Council, police patrols in the area have been increased and they remain vigilant on this issue while investigating all reported crimes. While the Council and our police liaison continue to work alongside the police as much as possible, we urge you to contact the police if you witness any anti-social behaviour.

As the weather improves and the hot summer days arrive once again, we will all be out and about more than ever as families, children, and our older residents, enjoy the easing of COVID restrictions. It is imperative that everyone feels safe at all times in our wonderful local community and that anti-social behaviour is firmly opposed, no matter what kind it is. We do not want a repeat of the summer of 2019, which was very distressing for many parishioners.

COVID-19 and Outdoor Spaces

With national restrictions easing, the Ploughman Hall and Pavilion are starting to open up more and more to regular users although sadly we are not yet in a position to be able to make these venues available for party hire etc. However, we look forward to opening the doors for these types of events in the future. With usage of the neighbouring QE II Field increasing as we move into the summer months, please make sure all current guidelines are being followed and that people are acting appropriately. Unfortunately, we have had some incidents of people leaving soiled nappies in the play park, so we would like to remind everyone to take these items home with them as well as being responsible in respect to littering.

As part of the COVID-19 pandemic recovery, the WEA: Adult Learning Within Reach is offering an excellent service to village residents. The WEA provides support and learning for people who face barriers in returning to education, job search or work. All-weather Sports Facilities on the Recreation Ground

Following the winter flooding, sadly our plans for an all-weather multi-use games area (MUGA) on the lower Recreation Ground

were found to no longer be feasible in the planned format as the proposed sand-dressed surface would have been badly damaged. However, that surface was a compromise to cater for three main sports – football, tennis, and netball – but ideal for none. We now have an improved and revised plan that splits the project into two, with a hard permeable tarmac type surface for tennis and netball at the location of the original MUGA which occasional flooding would not harm, and a 3G rubber crumb football pitch on the upper Recreation Ground that simply replaces one of the grass pitches. While this will be more costly it has many advantages, and it may be easier to attract grant funding.

Council Meetings

The Council is delighted to welcome two newly co-opted Councillors, Simon Clark, and Andrew Cook, following our most recent full Council meeting. Andrew has rejoined us while our newest Councillor, Simon, has been appointed as the Deputy Lead for Leisure and Amenities. We would also like to take this opportunity to welcome our new County Councillor, Neil Gough to the parish and we look forward to working closely alongside him and all our other elected officials on the important issues that we, as a village, face. Additionally, our deepest gratitude and appreciation must also be expressed to the departing County Councillor, Tim Wotherspoon for all of his dedicated service, candid humour and particularly for his efforts to address flooding and climate change during the past four years. We wish him all the best going forward.

After 13 months of online Zoom meetings, the Council has now returned to physical meetings which are currently being held in the larger venue of the Ploughman Hall for the full Council or the Octagon for committees, this is due to social distancing guidelines. The date for the next meeting is **Wednesday 7 July** – at a venue to be confirmed.

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Dear Willingham News,

Like many others in the village I received a request to complete a survey (supported by the Parish Council) on housing needs in Willingham. I responded to the survey and attach my letter of response in the hope that *Willingham News* might print the letter so that other village residents will know that an opinion on housing has been expressed to Cambridge Acre (the author of the survey) and to the Parish Council.

'Dear Cambridge Acre,

I am responding to your request for information on the housing need in the Willingham parish.

First of all, I have to state that I am not in favour of further housing development in Willingham whether it is in the form of private or affordable homes.

In the time (15 years) I have lived in this village, having previously lived in neighbouring Longstanton, there has been significant housing development of which, I assume, you and your organisation are aware. You will have access to the relevant statistics, I am sure, which will also show that the development in Willingham is ongoing, continuous and current.

I will not pass opinion on the development in Longstanton except to say that if similar developments

continue to take place in this area a number of current residents will be considering moving house to another part of the country.

The usage of main roads in and out of Willingham has increased significantly in recent years, in spite of the upgrading of the A14, and with further local housing development will continue to do so. The state of these roads is appalling as a result of increased daily traffic and poor/non-existent maintenance. At least twice a day, the traffic density resembles that of Cambridge city at its busy times – the current infrastructure of the village barely copes on several levels.

The best that could happen if this housing need continues to rise exponentially is to provide a by-pass to Willingham (as has happened in Longstanton) so that the residents of Willingham feel that the 'village environment' has been retained. One would like to think that the Parish Council, in their support for the survey, has put forward this point of view.'

Update from South Cambridgeshire District (SCDC) Councillors

COVID-19 Matters

At the time of writing this report, rates of COVID-19 continue to decrease across the whole of Cambridgeshire and in every district they are now well below the national and regional average. The most recent data shows that Cambridgeshire had four COVID-19 cases per 100,000 population - well below the England average of 23.6 and the regional average of 18.6. Hospital admissions remain low and there have been no COVID-19 deaths since the end of April. Although this is very encouraging, past experience has shown how quickly this can change and the public is encouraged to continue to follow the rules and to understand that getting back to a more normal way of life depends on all of us and the actions we take. People are still being called to have their second vaccine and it is very important that people have both doses to give them the best possible protection. Thanks to Val Thomas, Acting Director of Public Health, for the above information.

Zero Carbon Communities Grant

As the closing date is **30 July**, we want to emphasise that Community groups can now bid for a share of £100,000 from the District Council's Zero Carbon Communities Grant scheme, which has already funded more than 35 grassroots projects to tackle climate change. Grants between £1,000 and £15,000 are available. The money comes from business rates from renewable energy sites, like solar farms, in South Cambridgeshire that the Council retains and earmarks for use in green initiatives like this.

Non-profit groups or organisations that are based in the district and Parish Councils can apply. Other groups, such as social enterprises and community interest companies can apply as part of a partnership led by a Parish Council or

not-for-profit groups. <u>tinyurl.com/yp9pxewm</u>.

'Wild Minds' Outdoor Activities for Young People

Fourteen to 17 year-olds can register free for eight outdoor activity sessions at Milton Country Park, where they can try their hand at bush craft, yoga, survival skills, water sports on the lake and much more, for the benefit of their wellbeing. The sessions are 90 minutes long and are run on Sunday afternoons as part of an eight-week programme, in which small groups of teenagers are supported by skilled instructors as well as trained youth workers. The course is designed to help teens tackle things like mild anxiety or low mood, or to improve self-confidence and esteem.

The courses have been developed by South Cambridgeshire District Council together with Cambridge Sport Lakes Trust (which runs Milton Country Park) and is also supported by a Clinical Psychologist. Willingham Community Plan Update



By the time you read this, the Willingham Community Plan Group (WCPG) will have held

two public meetings to consult on the content of the 2021 survey. It truly is a team effort and we have been delighted by the response. If you would like to be involved it's not too late. Contact the team by phone or email details at the end of the article.

So how does a survey of Willingham residents' opinions change anything? What does it take? Let's see what happened after the 2008 survey concentrating on young people.

It Takes a Village to Raise a Child

Although the Connections Bus visited the village as a mobile youth club, the 2008 survey identified that 'The youth of Willingham are keen to have more facilities to express and enjoy themselves within the village'. Lack of public transport or safe cycle ways meant there were few activities that young people could access and few facilities to support them within the village. More worryingly 40% of young respondents expressed worries about intimidation and the village was concerned about vandalism. The recommendation was 'The provision of the following should be explored: a youth club/drop-in centre/café, dedicated building on the Ploughman Hall site, an all-weather sports pitch, tennis courts, a skate park, a swimming pool, an integrated indoor sports facility to cover multiple sports, a shelter and seating on the Recreation Ground'.

From Bus to Baptist Church

Young people needed somewhere immediately. The Willingham Action Group (WAG) was formed by some members of the 2008 plan group. They worked with the Parish Council to deliver the outcomes of the report. Part of WAG was assigned to address youth matters.

The WAG Youth Group became Willingham Youth Trust (WYT), registered as a not-for-profit charity. Rev Trev, Hilary Wylie and the Baptist Church stepped up to set up a youth club at the Baptist Church. As the club developed, they added equipment to offer table tennis, snooker, board games and several computers. Working in partnership with the youth bus and Parish Council, the plan was to provide a longer-term home for the youth club by converting part of the Ploughman Hall into a youth facility. That needed money!

Knockout Fundraising

Grants from the Parish Council and the District Council and Section 106 grants provided the main funding, but more was needed. A sub-group of WAG championed fundraising to improve the provision of play equipment (more next issue) and to renovate an area of Ploughman Hall to be dedicated to young people. Who could forget the 'It's a Knockout'! The fundraising efforts of Caroline Hyde, Caroline Stoneham, Catherine Atkins and Karen Chamberlain were amazing. In the end a staggering total of over £65,000 was raised for the WYT premises.

WYT – The Next Generation

Over the last ten years or so there have been many people involved. Bonnie Twiss and Emma Mason with their team kept the centre going with other fund-raising events (including more Knockouts) and opened the youth centre as a cafe for users of the QEII play area during the summer school holidays and at weekends. The leadership of WYT has now been passed to Jack Stinton (Chair), Vicky Richards (Secretary) and Frances Watts (Treasurer). They have the task of reigniting the Youth Club post-pandemic. We are delighted that they support the WCPG on the 2021 Youth Survey.

Scorecard!

Have we done everything listed in 2008? Absolutely not.

- ✓ Willingham Youth Trust charity funded dedicated youth club with own premises.
- Skate park, football wall, fitness equipment as part of the QEII field (more next month).
- ☑ The Multi-Use games area (MUGA) is being rethought after site flooding issues.

Could we do more? It's time to revisit what's needed to make the village a great place for young people to live. The 2021 survey will include a special questionnaire for young people 11-18 to have their say. This will be completely anonymous and fully compliant with the privacy and GDPR rules. Look out for the orange logo and don't be surprised if your young people pester you to fill in the survey for adults in September!

There are many heroes involved in these groups to whom Willingham owes thanks. They got involved, got stuck in, and committed many hours of voluntary time. If you can't see your name, please take this as full acknowledgement and appreciation of your role. This story shows that the survey will be just the start. It needs money and dedicated people coming together to make things happen. Be part of it.

Cambridgeshire County Councillor Neil Gough



It's been a very busy month since my first introductory article as your new county councillor. The new council has been sworn in and a new joint administration has been formed between the Liberal Democrats (20 seats), Labour (nine seats) and the Independent group (four seats). Liberal

Democrat Councillor Lucy Nethsingha has been appointed as leader with Labour's Elisa Meschini as deputy leader.

We have an exciting, comprehensive and ambitious agenda for change with tackling the climate emergency at its heart across all policy areas.

Twenty mph for Cambridgeshire Villages

Councillors attended a webinar on 22 April hosted by the '20's Plenty for Cambridgeshire' Campaign. Along with Bill Handley and Dawn Percival, I have, for a long time, been supportive of a 20 mph speed limit through our villages and the information provided at the webinar reinforced the need to slow down traffic on mainly residential, village roads.

Up to now, it has been necessary to show that the average speeds are 24 mph or less before we can change the speed limit from 30 mph to 20 mph. However, the way this condition was implemented by Cambridgeshire County Council made it difficult to introduce the change. The new County Council administration agreement includes a pledge to make it easier for villages to introduce speed limits of 20 mph.

The '20's Plenty for Cambridgeshire' Campaign is campaigning for 20 mph to become the default speed with 30 mph or 40 mph speed limits being exemptions, where appropriate.

This is a key element in the new County Council joint administration's agenda.

Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan for Cambridgeshire

This Plan is an early stage policy document that is potentially very important for prioritisation of local walking and cycling routes. It may be several years before monies come forward for these projects and works can take place but identifying the best routes means that the County will be in the best position to bid for future.

Please take a look at the proposals. Are these the right routes? Are there alternative routes which we should suggest? Please let the County Council know your thoughts via the survey and I would like to hear them too. The consultation runs through to 11 59 pm on Tuesday 13 July. Respondents are invited to complete the survey and/or mark cycle ways and footpaths they would like to see created or prioritised on our map. This information will then be analysed and presented to the County Council's Highways and Transport Committee for their review tinyurl.com/4xb3s9dv.
