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Old Willingham



Here is Harry Beaumont who wound the Parish clock in the Church Tower, taken sometime after 1959 when he took over the job. The clock was installed in 1887 to celebrate the Golden Jubilee of Queen Victoria and likely replaced an earlier clock. It is driven by a heavy weight on a rope which had to be wound back up twice a week. Over the years various dedicated people took the task of winding until 1990 when an electric motor was installed. Rather than winding all the way, this runs every few minutes and just pulls the weight up a few inches at a time. Time keeping is adjusted with small weights on the pendulum – pennies in the old days! The clock has been running for 135 years and here's to many more!

OCTOBER

October is the month of gold with trees of red and brown. There is beauty in the countryside, each village and each town.

Soon little creatures scurry by, the sun has an Autumn glow for October is the month of gold giving us an unforgettable show.

Our aim at Avalon Eco Farm Meadow Road, is to reduce our carbon footprint so we have installed a heat pump and as many solar panels as possible on our roof.

This is our experience working with Anglian Energy, the installer:

Solar panels: For aesthetic reasons, we installed 15 integrated roof panels, which look great, however the installation cost was about £1,500 more than standard solar panels. The existing roof tiles needed removing and the back integration panels and flashings needed to be installed prior to the panel installation. It took two men two days to complete. We installed a single inverter as we do not get shading on that strip of roof and could only install 15 panels; we do not have triple phase electricity at the farmhouse. A 3.2 kw battery was installed in the loft so that we could benefit from electricity storage. An I-Boost and a new 170L unvented cylinder were installed in the airing cupboard. The I-Boost heats up the hot water and when there is excess electricity produced by the solar panels, gives us free hot water.

Heat pump: We chose to install an air to water Daikin Altherma high temperature heat pump, as it is designed as a direct replacement for any boiler without the need to change radiators, unlike a low temperature heat pump.

The Daikin system consists of an external double fan compressor and an internal hydrobox. The hydrobox replaced the old oil boiler and is connected to the double fan unit situated on the outside wall of the utility room by using insulated refrigerant pipework. In total the installation of the heat pump took five days; three days with two plumbers and two days with two electricians.

Willingham News Distribution Co-ordinator – Help Needed!

We are very lucky to have *Willingham News* delivered free of charge to every house in the village by our wonderful volunteer distribution team. Sadly, our stalwart Distribution Co-ordinator, David Clarke, will be standing down in December. We thank him heartily for all his work over the years but now need to find a way to replace him, either by one person or a small team. The tasks involved are:

- Collecting the magazines from the printers in Cottenham
- Weighing, bagging and labelling the magazines into the rounds
- Maintaining a list of the delivery team and people willing to cover holidays and sickness.

If a few people were to come forward, it would mean sharing the work over the year. This is a crucial role and without it the current operation cannot continue.

As it stands, we should be more carbon efficient and are all electric; reducing noise as well as the awful smell of heating oil inside the house. It took a while to get used to the thermostat and to understand what we needed to do to keep the house warm and cosy.

Our next step is to examine the efficiency and size of our radiators as our current ones are probably over 50 years old. New high efficiency radiators will improve efficiency and may allow us to achieve desired room temperatures at lower flow temperatures, thus further reducing both cost and energy usage.

At the time of installation, the new heat pump was eligible for two grant schemes: a £5,000 subsidy through the Government Green Homes Grant Scheme (GHG) and the Renewable Heat Incentive (RHI). Under this scheme you receive quarterly payments which are indexed linked over seven years to a capped maximum of around £9,500. However, if we had chosen the £5,000 GHG this subsidy would have been deducted from the total payable under the RHI scheme and we would have received reduced payments over the next seven years.

We did not opt for the $\pm 5,000$ GHG because the RHI grant was better value, allowing us to receive a credit of $\pm 1,100$ per year for seven years. The Government has now ditched the GHG, but the RHI is still available.

One of our reasons to make the leap to an electric heating system was the knowledge that the government will be requiring all new builds to install electric heating in residential properties from 2025 onwards. And, more importantly we are an eco-farm after all!

Reading Group Book Review

Erebus by Michael Palin

In 2014 the wreck of an old sailing vessel was discovered at the bottom of the sea in the Canadian Arctic. She was the Erebus, missing since 1845. Originally built as a warship and named after Erebus, the god of chaos, she had been refitted for exploration in the treacherous conditions of the seas around the Poles. During 1839-1843 she successfully explored the Antarctic, mapping and gathering vast amounts of scientific data, though failing in the main mission of reaching the magnetic south pole.

The book describes the battles with appalling weather, but also lighter moments such as dancing on the Antarctic ice on New Year's Eve 1842! But on her next trip in 1845 to the Arctic to find the Northwest passage her luck ran out and after a few sightings over a couple of months she was never seen again. Rescue attempts over the next few years, plus more recent expeditions, eventually pieced together that the ship had remained trapped in ice for three unusually cold winters, and none of the crew survived.

Given the grim ending to this tale, it was not to everyone's taste, but those of us who persevered found it a fascinating account of long-distance sailing in the mid-nineteenth century – the navigation, the scientific work and the lives of the sailors on board. There were also glimpses into the world back home, and the English-centred world view that prevailed at the time.

The Aldreth 950 – Hereward's Last Stand!

Steve Moore, a photographer and history enthusiast who lives in Willingham, has alerted us to this commemorative event celebrating the hero of the Fens, Hereward the Wake, on the 950th anniversary of the defeat of his forces at Ely. Steve will be a guide waiting for walkers at Belsar's Hill from 12 pm on **Wednesday 27 October**.

The defeat at Hastings has been described as the

most cataclysmic moment in English history. However. pocket one of resistance stood out on the Isle of Eels, where an outlaw known as Hereward organised guerrilla warfare against the Normans. Hundreds of Normans seeking glory only found a



watery grave in the Fens just outside Willingham. Only once William had defeated Hereward could he truly claim to be the Conqueror. William forced a beachhead on the Isle of Eels on 27 October 1071 at Aldreth but could Hereward escape William's advance?

Wednesday 27 October: 'On the Conqueror's Trail' Commemoration Hike

Halloween

Of course you know Halloween takes place on the last day of October, but here's something you might not know. The word itself literally means 'hallowed evening,' and was previously known as All Hallows' Eve. All Hallows' Eve (31 October) and All Saints' Day (1 November) both paid homage to saints ('hallows' = saints). The name was eventually shortened to 'Halloween.'

You might like to try making this pumpkin soup, perhaps with the help of a grown up, particularly when you remove the peel! The pumpkins you use for carving aren't really suitable as they don't have much of a taste but you can buy edible pumpkins.

Quick, Easy, Pumpkin Soup Ingredients

1 edible pumpkin, peeled, deseeded and cubed. Or you could use

- butternut squash.
- 1 potato, peeled and cubed
- 1 large carrot, peeled and roughly chopped
- 1 onion, chopped into smallish pieces

and include some in the next issue.

2 tablespoons of olive oil

4 tablespoons of vegetable stock

powder. You could use chicken stock.

Method

- Heat oil in a pan and fry all vegetables gently until golden.
- Add 2 litres of water to the pan and stir in stock powder.
- Bring to the boil and simmer for 20 minutes until all vegetables are soft.
- Using a stick mixer liquefy all the soup until it's nice and smooth.
- Taste and season with salt and pepper accordingly.

Highways

Following a series of complaints on illegal or inconsiderate parking, and the refusal of the police to deal with it, the Parish Council has asked about Civil Enforcement. Our County Councillor, Neil Gough, is looking at a possible solution working with the Greater Cambridge Partnership. It will need formal approval and authorisation from the Department of Transport but, hopefully, may be a way forward.

Councillor Gough has also set up regular quarterly meetings with the Highways Officer and the Parish Clerks from Cottenham, Rampton and Willingham. Communication with Highways has been a problem for some time and the new arrangement, whilst unlikely to solve all the issues, should certainly help improve the process.

We are quite often asked about a bypass. It is something that the Parish Council has lobbied for over many years. Sadly, there is not much hope of any near-term solution. Highways did a paper exercise a few years back into possible routes to the east of the village and to the west. The ground conditions on both sides of the village are difficult and low lying. The estimated cost of either route was in excess of £50m.

The Surgery

Various problems have been reported to us regarding difficulties in obtaining appointments or receiving responses to calls as the surgery has tried to deal with the additional workload from COVID at a time of rapid expansion in patient numbers. The matter was raised at our September meeting. Councillor Handley confirmed that the issues were not restricted to Willingham as the NHS struggles to recover from the impacts of the pandemic. This would take time and he asked that residents be patient whilst the NHS recovered.

Defibrillators

The village has two installed, on the pavilion and at the library, with a third one planned for the old phone box on the High Street. A fourth unit has now become available, funded by the Football Association. The best location for it is still being reviewed. If you have a view, please send a brief email to our clerk (details below). The unit needs connection to an electricity supply.

Environment and Sustainability

Proposals for improved bus and cycleway networks are being encouraged at both national and local government level. The existing provision in Willingham is poor and the Parish Council has contributed to two Cambridgeshire surveys on cycle ways and submitted a proposal to our MP covering both bus routes and cycle ways. A copy is available from the Parish Office.

The work to replace the heating in the Ploughman Hall with a low-carbon infrared system, with a 50% grant from the SCDC Zero Carbon Communities, was completed in September. In the spring, we hope to organise an event in the Hall on low-carbon heating of homes for residents. The Zero Carbon Communities e-newsletter, available from the SCDC website, contains information and advice, including examples of other projects in the district.

The Orchard at the top of Earith Road is looking in fine condition and at the time of writing is well loaded with fruit. It is a Community Orchard so no-one is going to mind if you want to help yourself but please leave some for the rest of us.

Meetings

In line with government advice, it has been agreed to lift the restrictions on numbers using the Ploughman Hall and the Pavilion. Full Council Meetings will return to the Octagon for a trial period of three months commencing with the next meeting at 7 30 pm on **Wednesday 6 October**. Planning meetings will continue to be held in the Octagon if available.

Part 30 – A Vibrant Willingham Ready for the 20th Century

Reign of Queen Victoria, 1834 – 1901

Queen Victoria Jubilee Clock

By 1887 Queen Victoria had reigned for 50 years and the village decided to celebrate this Golden Jubilee with a clock paid for by public subscription. The obvious place to house a striking clock was the Church Tower as a peal of five bells had already been installed in it for over 300 years. The firm of Potts and Son was given the contract to design, manufacture and install a clock to strike the hour and each quarter hour on the existing bells. The clock was designed to be wound weekly by hand, accessed by the existing narrow spiral staircase. The maintenance costs, including the clock winder's fee, were to be covered by the Parish. The clock continued to be wound manually each week for 100 years until it was replaced by an automatic electrical winding system in the 1980s. A complete overhaul was carried out by Smiths of Derby in 2019 who were greatly helped by the discovery that many of the original drawings and tooling were still in existence, as they had subsequently taken over Potts. Since the overhaul the clock has proved to be remarkably accurate.

A New Village Doctor

In 1888 Dr Robert Travers Lewis arrived in the village after the death of Dr Ellis. He and his wife were Irish and came to live in Church Street. He was a surgeon and physician and, at age 32, not long qualified. His skills must have been tested severely by having to cope with endless epidemics of infectious diseases in the village which frequently led to the complete closure of the school. Whooping cough in 1890 was followed by diphtheria in 1892, smallpox and measles in 1894 and mumps in 1895. There were no antibiotics or

vaccines to help him either. In 1891 he was very involved in one of the worst of the many Willingham fires. A labourer, Beasley Rogers, became trapped under a burning oak beam, breaking his arm in two places, burning his back, neck, hair and head, and becoming unconscious. He was treated on the scene by Dr Lewis and eventually recovered. This fire had started in the premises of Mr Thoday, a drapery, grocery and general store that stocked oil and petroleum, which exploded. Dr Lewis must have been very busy that day.

Willingham Public Hall

1896 saw the completion of the Public Hall in the High Street. The concept of the building was 'for recreational activity for young men to benefit themselves' (no mention of women!). In effect, it was to be the village's first Youth Club and had been

strongly driven by Mr H G Few, who donated the land in the High Street. Mr Fred Crisp, a successful stockbreeder of Shire horses and Aberdeen Angus cattle, donated the building and furnishing cost of £600. The design allowed for ground floor accommodation for a caretaker, a strong room for the security of parish documents and a games and smoking room, while the first floor was for a reading and meeting room. It was all to be well lit and well heated. It opened in 1897 with 160 subscription members and certainly appears to have been well used, especially in the winter months. The Cambridge Independent Press reported on 15 February 1898 that a framed oil painting of Oliver Cromwell, 'a valuable acquisition', was presented to the committee, to be hung on the north wall opposite the fireplace in the reading room. Where is it now?

A Vibrant Willingham – and What Was to Come

For a fen village, Willingham was in a strong position in 1900. The population was expanding, housing standards were improving, education was thriving, churches were full and the local economy of agriculture and horticulture was buoyant. Shops in the village ranged from butchers to tailors and workshops from blacksmiths to wheelwrights. The village buzzed. Overseas, the British Empire was at its height and Great Britain still ruled the waves. At least that is how it must have seemed to a Willingham school-leaver in one of those school photographs in 1900. He or she could not in their wildest dreams have guessed that the

> next 50 years were to bring two world wars, an influenza pandemic and the great depression, but also electricity, telephones, antibiotics, cars and aircraft.

Community Plan – Targeting the Five Cs!

Most will agree that creating a community characterised by the five Cs is a highly worthwhile ambition. We want to contribute to making Willingham as self-contained as possible (Complete), with everything easily accessible (Compact), benefiting from good communications (Connected), offering a wide variety of facilities (Complex) and with many opportunities for social interaction (Convivial). All this requires a plan that, to quote ACRE (Action with Communities in Rural England), 'brings a community closer together, realises the resources and skills available of members of that community, and takes control of the community's future needs in terms of services, housing, health.'

There is talk of a 'Power of Well-being' being given to our local councils, enabling them to respond to issues identified through community planning by undertaking actions which are not already the responsibility of another agency (or acting on behalf of another agency). So, whether a Community Plan, a Parish Plan or a (significantly more complex) Neighbourhood Plan, having a 'plan' with solid community backing is our best chance to move matters in a more favourable – or less unfavourable – direction than would otherwise be the case.

Having consulted various bodies, a statistician and the excellent Cottenham Neighbourhood Plan, we are now at the editing stage with the first phase of our own plan – the survey questionnaire.

Our aim is to get the questionnaire to you in both online and in printed form by mid- to late October. It will then be up to you to add that 'solid community backing' by making sure you complete the survey and get it back to us, preferably at drop-off points like the Post Office and the Library, but we will also collect! In the meantime, we would like once again to appeal for volunteers to deliver the hard copies.

Over the Garden Fence

Thanks to all who have contributed photographs and notes to this year's Virtual Horticulture and Craft Show. It's pleasing to see more of you taking to the outdoors and getting in touch with the practicalities of growing your own vegetables and flowers.

This has been a challenging year for gardeners and farmers, the erratic weather conditions impacting on agriculture, fruit and vegetable growers and gardeners generally. The evidence points to climate change being upon us, so what should we grow next year to survive and flourish?



Mis-shapen Carrots Try cleaning these carrots! One of a few possibilities regarding mis-shapen carrots is an excess of nitrogen and the development of many small roots instead of one central one. Avoid this by cutting back on fertiliser/manure use, and if

your soil needs feeding, use a low-nitrogen formula. Also, avoid growing carrots after nitrogen-fixing legumes in a crop rotation scheme, placing them after nitrogen-hungry brassicas instead. So long as you provide the right soil conditions and keep on top of watering, you'll be rewarded with a fruitful harvest of sweet, crunchy roots from early summer to late autumn and beyond.

Food for Thought

It is that time of year to start thinking about the spring flowers and bulbs. Wallflowers by name, glamorous backing dancers by nature. The scent and stained-glass shades of wallflowers (*Erysimum cheiri*) make them the ideal partner for spring bulbs so planting should be well on its way now.

District Councillors' Report

Important update on the (New) Local Plan – Preferred Options The next stage of the Local Plan – the preferred options stage – has been published by the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service (a partnership between South Cambridgeshire and Cambridge City Councils). Over 690 sites were put forward by landowners in the first stage 'Call for Sites' but only 19 (3%) of them are being proposed for acceptance and, of those, many are extremely small. Of 11,000 new homes proposed, only 384 are planned for rural villages, none of which are in Willingham.

Environmental considerations are paramount and only four of the sites put forward met the rigorous tests to allow development in the Green Belt – two being extensions to research sites of national importance and two housing allocations close to excellent public transport (the guided busway and a railway station).

The plan sets a high bar for building standards, including policy recommendations for low carbon buildings and, for the first time ever, a 'Call for Green Sites' was issued and the proposals include new green spaces and wildlife projects.

Finally, and very importantly, this Local Plan will put constraints on the amount of development if the water issue is not resolved and our chalk-streams protected. Central Government and the water companies have to invest in this in advance of further growth and if they cannot, or do not, there will be no option but to scale back growth.

A New Website for South Cambridgeshire

SCDC's Business Support team is working on a new website to promote everything there is to see and do in South Cambridgeshire. This is to support the local economy by encouraging tourists to visit the area and for local people to spend more time in the district.

The site will be launched in the autumn and SCDC and the team is inviting local businesses and event organisers to secure a free listing by submitting information and photos online via a short questionnaire. Afghanistan Refugees

SCDC Housing staff have been working on plans to resettle three Afghan families, provide a home and essential support in response to the international crisis. South Cambridgeshire District Council's five-year (2020-2025) Business Plan commits to working with national, regional and local partners to support the needs of refugees and asylum seekers. Council owned homes are not being used to house these three families and it will not have an impact on the waiting time for local families who are already on the Council's housing waiting list.

Launch of Six Free Trees Scheme

SCDC has just launched the 'Six Free Trees' scheme. Every Parish Council in South Cambridgeshire can apply for six free trees which they can plant on their land. This follows last year's hugely successful 'Three Free Trees' scheme.

Parish Councils have been offered a choice of six native trees which can be either pot grown or bare rooted.
