Ice Skating on the Fen

Talking to friends Kathy and Keith Elsome over coffee about this month's Old Willingham photo has set in motion several phone calls and prompted me to find out a little more about this sport and the impact it has had on many of our locals. Keith suggested I should speak to George Harding who used to regularly participate in the sport of speed skating. 'Everyone went out skating as soon as they could tie on a pair of fen runners,' George told me. The last race he participated in was at Sutton Gault. He hung up his skates and sold them to Mel Scrivener in 1999 when he had his hip replaced. Mel Scrivener still has George's skates and takes them out each year to check them over. Mel and his father used to skate at Wicken Fen whenever possible. Later when Mel met Pat they used to regularly skate on either Mere or Bury Fen when the conditions were right. Pat's father also used to skate on Mere Fen and so she was brought up skating on the fen as were many children in the surrounding villages. 'It was just a way of life in those days with the bad winters,' Pat told me.

George then suggested I speak to Rodney Hayden who, he said, was a much better and more successful skater than he was. Rodney wasn't available but his wife, Sue, told me that as Willingham and the surrounding villages were predominately agricultural areas, if there was a bad winter and the land couldn't be worked, everybody used to skate. 'There wasn't much else you could do'. Rodney himself began skating in the early 1950s but it was already a well-established winter sport by then. The keen skaters used to hope for a hard winter and without mobiles relied on the 'jungle drums' to spread the word that Mere Fen at Swavesey or Bury Fen towards Bluntisham were frozen.

Sue also told me that when her daughter was at the primary school, the then Headmaster, used to allow her to have the odd afternoon off when the fens were frozen. A skater himself, he said you had to grab the time when the conditions were right! It could be village hearsay Sue said, but it was thought that people also used to skate on Long Pond in Rampton Road and also on an area of land that is now Brickhills. Apparently people have also been known to skate with tilley lamps.

Other names which came up in various conversations were Reggie Parker and his son Stephen who became very successful at the sport, winning various competitions, David (Duggie) Smith, Ray Manning and Geoff Rule, all of whom were very keen speed skaters. Geoff Rule's family feature in the 'Old Willingham' photo opposite Geoff still has his set of speed skaters but participated for fun rather than getting involved in competitions.

The Fen Skating Association still meets annually but the last time Bury Fen was skated on would be about 11 years ago. For conditions to be right a frost is needed for several successive nights. Will it happen this year?

There must be many locals who also used to enjoy this sport. We would love to hear from you if you used to participate in speed skating. Have you still got your 'fen runners'? Send your story to us at willinghamnews@ gmail.com.

Willingham Gardening Club

OVER THE GARDEN FENCE:

Our December talk, *Coping with Climate Change*, given by Nigel Start was well received. Climate change affects us all with the extremes of weather it brings. Nigel's talk looked at ways we can adapt our gardening techniques to create more resilient gardens that we can continue to enjoy. The talk considered potential winners and losers in the types of plants we grow as well as giving a very knowledgeable insight into the difficulties facing gardeners today, and in the future. Strategies were suggested to help in garden planning, looking after the soil, watering, coping with pests, and the selection of plants better able to cope with our changeable weather.

As usual, there will be no meeting in January.

Tips to Keep you Busy Over the Next Few Weeks

Have a good sort out in your shed – wash pots and trays, clean tools, and try and find a space to hang up the larger items. Clean lawn mowers and strimmers.

Houseplant leaves can become dusty like any other surface in the house. This will reduce the amount of light getting to them, especially in the darker months. Use cotton wool dipped in water to gently clean the leaves. Remember to water plants more often in dry centrally heated rooms over the winter months.

Keep an eye on outside plants in pots and troughs as they too can easily dry out over the winter if there is little rain. Keep pots raised off the ground to prevent water logging and if we have very cold weather and the water in the pot freezes you could lose your plants.

Remember to serve up a treat for our garden birds. Make sure that their drinking/bath water containers are kept clean and ice free.

Check trees, flowers and shrubs on a regular basis. Strong winds can damage and untether climbers, so keep them securely attached to supports. Ensure tree ties, stakes and guards are securely in place and not biting into the bark, and gently re-firm the soil around the root ball if frost heave looks to have lifted new plantings.

New Year Greetings, to all residents of Willingham, from your Parish Council.

Councillor Vacancy

We have a vacancy for a new Councillor. If you would like to apply then contact Mandy Powell, our Parish Clerk, (details below). Applications need to be in by 12 noon, on **4 January**.

We shall not be having Parish Council Elections in 2022, as following the Northstowe Governance Review, elections were held early in 2021. The next Parish Council election will be due in 2026. Our councillors have been elected for five years.

Due to the Christmas holidays, the next Parish Council Meeting, will be held on **Wednesday 12 January**, 7 30 pm in the Octagon.

Barton Field

As previously reported, following the granting of a 'Zero Carbon' grant, work is underway, planting a hedge and preparing an area for a 'Wild flower' space.

Cemetery

Hedge work, is being carried out on the North East boundary, to reduce the thickness.

Reclaimed ground is being prepared for grassing, in order to provide some more burial plots.

Budget

The Parish Council, after much debate, has agreed an 11% uplift, in the Precept for 2022/23.

This is caused by the Council being required to undertake more and more work, some through legislation and some through work being delegated. The Council did not wish to take this action, but found itself with little choice in balancing the books. Money will still have to be taken from reserves. The uplift for a Band D property will be 17p per week, or £9 per year.

Bus Network Upgrade Proposal for Greater Cambridge

In November/December, the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) ran a survey on its proposals for 'major improvements to our bus network through more frequent, more reliable services', which actually leave Willingham worse off. Your Parish Council registered a strong protest and encouraged residents to do the same. Our current direct Bus Service 5 to Cambridge is replaced by a rural hourly bus, on a loop connecting Swavesey, Papworth Everard, Bar Hill, Longstanton and villages in between. There are no direct links to any urban centre or Cottenham, or to the Sixth Form colleges in Cambridge. Cottenham by contrast, has a service to Cambridge every 10 minutes, with an express bus once an hour.

The consultant's report on which the proposal is based almost completely disregards Willingham. It is missing from the map showing the existing bus network and from the majority of the

maps showing details of the new proposals. We have proposed that some buses (say two an hour) are diverted from the Busway, as originally promised, to provide direct links to Cambridge and St Ives. Alternatively, we need a frequent feeder service to the Busway.

County Councillor Neil Gough attended our last Council meeting, on 1 December. This gave Councillors an opportunity to express our concerns to him about this proposal. It seems that the GCP group, overseeing improvements to bus services, had outsourced the work to a Consultancy.

When the agenda for the groups next meeting is published, we can forward questions relating them to specific items on this agenda.

Cycleway's Consultation

The GCP is also looking at upgrading the 'Cycleways' network, and has produced a report on responses to a survey held in the summer. The Parish Council had responded that we only have one inadequate shared-use cycleway and needed more.

There are numerous comments in the report on the need for more links between rural locations and to education centres, and we will continue to press that this is taken into account in the final proposals.

Dog Walking

We are conscious of the ongoing demand from dog owners, for some central open space, where vehicles can be parked, and dogs allowed to roam safely off their leads. Unfortunately, we do not have any such space, nor have we been able to purchase, rent, or lease any. If you know of anyone that is prepared to offer land for this use, then please let us know.

COVID Testing

All patients will need to have a negative PCR test before they attend the surgery with any COVID related symptoms. This includes cough, high temperature, chest infection/URTI, colds or flu.

Receptionists will not be able to book patients displaying these symptoms in for an appointment until a COVID test has been carried out and patients will only be allowed to visit the surgery in person upon presenting proof of a negative test result. This applies to all patients regardless of vaccination status.

Colds and winter bugs can mostly be treated at home with rest and medications from your pharmacy. If possible, make sure you stay away from babies, young children and vulnerable adults until you are better.

Update from Lucy Frazer

I met over recent months with the Parish Council, the police and the County Council to discuss concerns raised with me by constituents about speeding on the B1050 through Willingham. I have seen data from the Parish Council's speed loggers which indicates that on average nearly 70% of vehicles are exceeding the 30mph limits.

The Parish Council have submitted a bid for work to emphasise the change in speed limit on entering the village and to narrow the appearance of the road through the village, which should deter speeding and overtaking.

As discussed during our meetings, I am in full support of the Council's bid and hope that these measures will improve road safety for my constituents in Willingham.

I have been proud to recognise those in our communities that have gone above and beyond to help others throughout the pandemic: collecting medication and groceries, to looking out for elderly neighbours or volunteering for local causes. I am pleased to have recognised this hard work through the Cambridgeshire COVID Community Champions Awards that I have organised, spotlighting these stories of selfless acts. I will shortly be announcing the winners and holding a special event in Parliament to recognise the hard work of nominees. Their stories will be shared on my website and social media as well as with the local community.

In September I was appointed to a new post in government as Financial Secretary to the Treasury and am pleased to have played a role in the recent Budget.

Community Chest Grants and Community-lead Plans

The council has increased the maximum amount of Community Chest funding that can be applied for from £1,000 to £2,000. These grants are available to voluntary and community sector groups, charities and public sector bodies wishing to further improve quality of life in their communities. COVID-19 Update

In South Cambridgeshire the COVID case rate is at some of the highest levels seen throughout the pandemic. The vaccine programme is having a huge impact on health outcomes and hospital admissions for COVID are significantly lower than the pre-vaccine days. However, general hospital admissions are rising. The new Omicron variant is now present and spreading in the district.

With continued pressure on local services, the period of 'enhanced response area' (ERA) status has been extended. This accelerates vaccinations to the 12–15 year olds and booster vaccinations in the areas where they are needed most. The ERA also allows the local authorities to enhance controls and testing in schools.

County Councillor Report – Neil Gough

A very happy and prosperous New Year to all Willingham residents. I hope that the festive period was both fun and restful for you.

Here is my update of County Council matters.

COVID-19 Update

At the time of writing (early December) COVID cases in schools have risen significantly. Pressure on staffing resources is now critical and a number of schools are close to closing classes on safety grounds. However, attendance continues to be high. Vaccination rates among Cambridgeshire's 12 - 15 year olds are at or above the East of England average in all districts, and all are higher than the England average.

Household Support Fund

Cambridgeshire's Household Support Fund, funded by the Department for Work and Pensions, has been created to help people experiencing immediate financial hardship to pay for food, energy or other essential items. The scheme will run until **31 March**.

Support is offered in two ways:

- Support with essential items: residents are eligible to access this support if they earn less than £17,940 per year, or are in receipt of certain state benefits.
- Direct food voucher scheme: supermarket vouchers will be issued to families meeting the low income criteria for free school meals, funded childcare for two-yearolds, early years pupil premium, or sixth form students eligible for free school meals.

Local Flood Risk Management Strategy

The County Council's Environment and Green Investment Committee approved a draft revised Local Flood Risk Management Strategy, which is now out to public consultation. The new strategy will cover the period 2021 -2027. It has been updated to reflect the effects of climate change, changes in policy and legislation, the increased importance of working in partnership – and of course the winter 2020 floods.

Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) Consultation: Making Connections

This is an important consultation on GCP proposals for transforming public transport, cycling and walking and reducing pollution and congestion. It will shape the specific proposals that will come forward next summer. In my view, the proposals offer some improvements in some areas but still fall short of creating frequent and reliable links (via link-buses and cycling/walking) for the Fen Edge villages to enable residents to access the major pieces of infrastructure (busway, railway stations) and places of work and study.

The proposals cover:

- A new bus network, offering more frequent services, with longer operating hours, more rural connections, and new routes into our growing employment sites. More information at <u>tinyurl.com/mr43uz9b</u>.
- Creating space for improvements to walking and cycling and our public spaces.
- Options for raising money to pay for improvements.
