In the foreground is a well-dressed family in a pony trap with two young ladies wearing large hats. Perhaps they were setting off after a visit. Two young lads can just be seen hanging out of the front door, perhaps to wave them off. Caught by surprise in the background is a thatcher, who is re-thatching the large barn next door. You can see the very long peg ladders used to scramble up and down to the roof. Today, the house remains pretty much unchanged at the front but the barn and shanty buildings running down to the Lode are all gone.

When our family arrived in the village in 1968, we had no experience of skating. Bill was from the balmy New Forest and I grew up in Northumberland where the waterways tended more to the vertical than the horizontal.

Dennis Jeeps discovered this and took us in hand. We were taken to a quiet spot on the lode where Dennis produced a kitchen chair, and we took turns moving up and down, up and down holding the back of it and sliding it along the ice. I think Dennis provided the skates. Only my younger son really became competent as a result of this.

A few years on, when I was in the habit of going to the Friday auctions held by Raymond Munns, I bought a box of oddments one day and discovered a pair of fen runners at the bottom. These suited me well, as the wide blades gave me confidence that I could balance and even move about. I remember going up to Bury Fen one weekday and finding the only person there was Reg Parker, the renowned speed skater mentioned in the article. We must have provided an interesting contrast.

My skating days were over long before the mild winters came along, but I still have the fen runners at the bottom of my wardrobe.

#### Gardening Club Update

A new year, but with the Omicron variant of COVID-19 widespread throughout the country, we have decided to delay our first meeting of the year until **Monday 7 March**, depending on infection rates nearer the time. This meeting will be the Annual General Meeting, at which members can pay their membership subscription for 2022–23. The subscription will be the same as the last time it was paid, £20 per member, subject to the successful resolution of the issues below.

In past years the Gardening Club Committee comprised five or six people. As time went by, members retired, left the area, or fell into ill health, leaving us today with a committee of just three, who have given many years of service to both the club and the Horticultural Show. Unfortunately, none of us is getting any younger and we are not able to do as much as we would like. The present committee feels unable to continue for any longer.

The future of the Gardening Club depends on a new committee being formed, as well as there being a viable number of members to meet our costs.

The cost of speakers has risen and it has become increasingly difficult to find good speakers who are affordable. #### **Over the Garden Fence**

When can we expect Spring? Well, this year, the start of the Spring Equinox in the northern hemisphere is on the 20 March. So, what exactly does 'Spring Equinox' mean? The word equinox comes from the Latin words for 'equal night' *aequus* (equal) and *nox* (night). On the equinox, the length of day and night is nearly equal in all parts of the world. With the equinox, we start to enjoy an increasing number of sunlight hours, with earlier dawns and later sunsets. If the weather is kind to us, your jobs for February and March will include reorganising your garden shed, preparing seed beds and sowing some early vegetables under cover. Also, chit potato tubers (encourage seed potatoes to sprout), protect blossom on apricots, nectarines and peaches and net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off.

### FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

As we move into the final weeks of winter, the Parish Council hopes residents have had a joyous festive season and a Happy New Year. We now have a chance to look forward to the year of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee with excitement and ambition and reflect on the positive things the Parish Council has been doing over the last 12 months.

#### **Environment and Sustainability**

Last year, Environment and Sustainability issues were given a regular place on the agenda with two dedicated councillors, as we endeavoured to fight back against climate change issues. We have made several progressions in this area. Flower tubs have been installed around the village including on the Green. These beautiful displays have been very well received and look very pretty. We encourage as many parishioners as possible to walk around the village to see them.

Another place to visit is our recently acquired Barton's Field, which was generously donated to us last year. The Parish Council has been awarded a grant for hedge planting to reinforce the beauty of the area, a lovely place for family and dog walks. We have also received grant funding for a wildflower strip on the QEII Field to increase and improve biodiversity and wildlife, as it provides homes and food for insects in the form of leaves, nectar and pollen.

#### **Ploughman Hall**

The long-awaited heating project has been completed in the Ploughman Hall. This will not only save money but will make for a more pleasant experience for users. The new heating system will also be much kinder to the environment. The project was funded as a result of the successful Zero Carbon Community Grant application made by our Environment and Sustainability councillors and Section 106 monies.

#### Leisure and Amenities

Work is still continuing with the Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) on the Recreation Ground and the Council will be resubmitting an improved application over the coming months. We are looking forward to seeing this project come to fruition. Last year also saw new equipment put in place at the QEII Field which has since been enjoyed by many.

The Football Association kindly donated a defibrillator to be sited at the Pavilion which has enabled the Council to re-locate the one that was there to the Primary School. In the coming months, in addition to these and the one

at the Library, we are hoping to install another, located in the High Street phone box. We hope that doubling our defibrillator capacity could make the difference in saving a life.

#### Cemetery

Work has been carried out to increase available space for burials in the Cemetery, including hedge works and reclaiming land via the removal of a pathway that has since been seeded and grassed. Despite this, we are becoming more and more limited in terms of burial plots, and have been looking for a new site. If anyone is aware of land for sale that may be suitable for a new cemetery, then please get in touch with the Parish Council.

#### **Roads and Speeding**

The Parish Council has been working in collaboration with the police, the County Council, and our MP Lucy Frazer on the issue of speeding and traffic in the village. Data from our speed loggers indicates that on average, nearly 70% of vehicles are exceeding the 30 mph limits. After a strong bid, worked on by the County Council and supported by Lucy Frazer and our local councillors, we have been successful in getting a Minor Highways Improvement Scheme which means that we will see improvements on Earith Road to try and encourage slower driving speeds entering and leaving the village. These changes are currently due to start next month.

Only call the practice if your condition has genuinely deteriorated. You will then be reviewed by one of the clinical team and appropriate action can be taken with regard to your care.

#### **Vaccination Centres**

If you are due to have your first, second or booster vaccination, visit <u>www.thevaccinators.co.uk</u> for details of all centres in the local area where you are able to receive a walk-in vaccination. Please be aware that the Medical Practice is not offering COVID-19 boosters and is unable to book appointments for you. If you are eligible, please visit <u>www.nhs.uk/Covid-Vaccination</u> or call the National Booking Service (NBS) on 119 to book an appointment in advance.

### Updating Your NHS Records With Vaccinations Received Abroad

If you were given vaccination(s) overseas, and they are one of the four MHRA approved vaccines, these can be added to your NHS vaccination records via the Overseas Vaccination Validation Service, now live via the National Booking Service (NBS). Patients need to book, then take ID and their vaccination evidence to an appointment. You can use this service if you:

- Are aged 18 or over.
- Have an NHS number.

### Fen Drayton Lakes Update



The winter is a busy time on the reserve as we go around the different habitats carrying out work to maintain and improve

them for target breeding species. Come Spring this work must finish to prevent disturbance to the wildlife so it is always a bit of a race against time and weather to get to as many areas as possible.

As in previous years, the reedbeds on Holywell and Elney Lakes have been a priority for our volunteer work groups. We remove willow trees which, if allowed to grow tall, would take the place of the reeds, to entice one of Britain's

most elusive and rare species, the bittern, to call Fen Drayton Lakes home.

Bitterns are medium-sized, brown herons and are reedbed specialists. They are very secretive and difficult to spot as they stalk silently through reeds looking for fish. They are one of our conservation success stories. In 1997, there were just 11 territorial breeding males in the country due to loss of habitat. Following a concerted effort to save this species, that number has increased to around 200 in the UK with two of those being with us at Fen

Drayton Lakes.

Working in amongst the reeds by Holywell Lake can be a bit treacherous as there is standing water and you are presented with a wall of reed stems to push through. Surrounded by vegetation taller than you, it is easy to lose your bearings! But it is a unique experience spending time in the habitat of a bittern.

Over on Elney Lake, we have removed spindly willows from one of the islands to open up new reedbed and you may notice the eastern half of the lake is quite open now. Thanks to this work, bearded tits have colonised and were confirmed to breed on the reserve for the first time last

year. Listen out for their pinging call if you are at any of the lookouts surrounding the lake. You'll be very lucky to see them though, as they blend in with the golden-brown reeds very well indeed.

Thanks to the hard work of the volunteers, Fen Drayton Lakes will hopefully be home to a growing number of these rare reedbed specialists in the years to come.

### South Cambridgeshire District Councillors' (SCDC) Report

#### **COVID-19 Update**

At the time of writing, cases in Cambridgeshire continue to increase dramatically, with the increase in those aged over 60 of most concern. Infection rates are expected to rise rapidly in schools which is likely to have a major impact on parents and hence on the workforce. Together with testing, the vaccination programme remains key to our way out of this crisis.

#### Lateral Flow Test (LFT) Availability

There has been a huge surge in demand for LFTs, temporarily outstripping supply and recently, local pharmacies have not been able to regularly source or supply test kits. For most people this will simply mean that extra patience is needed when ordering tests online. The national system refreshes the delivery slots available every 30 minutes. For those who urgently need tests and are able to travel, an alternative is to collect them from one of the rapid testing centres. You can still ring 119 to place an order in advance of a medical appointment but please do so in plenty of time.

### Proposals for Civil Parking Enforcement (CPE) in South Cambridgeshire

In common with many other villages, we suffer from illegal and inconsiderate parking – a problem that the police do not have the resources to enforce. Proposals for an application to the Department for Transport to introduce CPE are soon to be discussed by SCDC with the aim of giving formal approval for an application later this year. Watch this space!

#### **Digital Champions: A Reminder**

SCDC's Communications Team is continuing to build a bank of 'Digital Champions', who we can call on to help when we have urgent messages to communicate to residents. Volunteers will only be contacted for a limited number of important notifications or updates that require an urgent response on issues such as extreme weather events, flooding, village-wide missed bin collections, or other time-sensitive communications. We have, so far, one name for the village but would like to have one or two others to ensure coverage. If you would like to help, please contact Bill. (cllr.handley@scambs.gov.uk).

### **Cambridgeshire County Councillor's Report**

#### **Making Connections Consultation**

I hope you took the opportunity to submit comments on the Greater Cambridge Partnership's proposals for improvements to public transportation in the area. We highlighted the notable absence of improvements for our residents. Willingham is a sizeable community and at the very least, deserves direct and regular bus services to Cambridge (potentially via the guided busway) and a shuttle service to and from the guided bus, to give residents a viable alternative to private transportation. Disappointingly, none of this was contained in the proposals. We will press for better in the next round of proposals.

#### **Household Support Fund**

The County Council's Household Support Fund is still available to support families who are struggling. It offers:

- Support with food, household energy and other essentials for individuals and families. Residents are eligible to access this support if they earn less than £17,940 per year or are in receipt of certain state benefits.
- Direct food vouchers. As in previous school holidays, supermarket vouchers will be issued to families meeting the low-income criteria for free school meals, funded childcare for two year olds, early years pupil premium, or sixth form students eligible for free school meals.

Letters have recently been sent out sent to approximately 6,000 residents identified as eligible for support. The letter includes reminders of existing financial support, but it also encourages residents to contact South Cambridgeshire District Council's Welfare and Money Maximisation Officer, who can discuss residents' circumstances and signpost any support that may be suitable to them.

#### **Climate Change and Environment Strategy**

The County Council's Climate Change and Environment Strategy will go to the Full Council at its budget meeting in February. It sets a new target for a Net Zero Cambridgeshire by 2045, five years sooner than the current 2050 target.

The strategy commits the Council to focusing its contribution in three key areas: reducing carbon emissions, supporting the development of resilient communities so that they can adapt to the impacts of climate change, and supporting nature and biodiversity.

As part of the Council's plan to achieve Net Zero for its own direct carbon emissions by 2030, the draft strategy sets out how the Council will meet that deadline including:

- Low carbon transport solutions for fleet vehicles.
- Net Zero carbon buildings and generation of renewable energy from Council assets.
- Improving the management of the Council's open spaces to increase biodiversity.

The Strategy also commits to halving the Council's indirect emissions through its supply chains by 2030.

### St Valentine's Day

I do like to find out how our traditions started so I decided to investigate the origins of St Valentine's Day and I found a lot of conflicting stories. Here's how this romantic day (may have) begun and how 14 February is celebrated.

Allegedly the first Valentine's Day was in the year 496. The Romans had a festival called Lupercalia in the middle of February which was the start of their Spring. It's thought that, as part of their celebrations, boys drew names of girls from a box. They would be boyfriend and girlfriend during this festival and sometimes they married. Later the church wanted to turn this festival into a Christian celebration and decided to remember St Valentine.

There are various stories about who St Valentine was. One legend states that he was a priest called Valentine during the third century in Rome. Emperor Claudius II decreed that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, so he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine defied Claudius and performed marriages for young couples in secret. On discovering this, Claudius ordered his execution. According to another legend, an imprisoned Valentine sent the first Valentine greeting after he fell in love with his jailer's daughter. Before his death on 14 February, he wrote her a letter signed 'from your Valentine'. There are a number of martyrdom stories associated with various Valentines, including one who restored sight to the blind daughter of his jailer.

It was a French man who is recorded as having sent the earliest surviving Valentine's poem to his sweetheart. Charles, the Duke of Orléans, was writing to her from his prison cell in the Tower of London following his capture at the Battle of Agincourt in 1415. This letter is now held in the British Library in London. Formal Valentine messages appeared in the 1500s and by the late 1700s commercially printed cards were being produced.

I also found some Valentine superstitions. On Valentine's Day in a leap year, it is the custom for women to ask their boyfriends to marry them. Some people used to believe that the first bird a single woman saw on 14 February would give her an indication of the kind of man she'd marry: a robin – a sailor, a sparrow - a poor man and a goldfinch – a millionaire.

There is a story about Charles II of Sweden who, in the 18th century, introduced the idea of flowers symbolising emotions. The red rose was singled out for love. The number of roses has significance too: a single rose for love, 12 roses for gratitude, 25 roses for congratulations and 50 roses for unconditional love.
