The answer is that each village raised as much money as possible to donate to Addenbrooke's, who would then provide help to people who became ill or injured. A large parade would tour the village on Hospital Sunday and people were expected to donate what they could afford towards the fund. The sign on the sail says 'LESS TALK MORE SHOVE' and the one on the side 'DOCTORS GIVE THEIR TIME. GIVE YOUR COPPERS' Most of the boys have pointy hats with feathers as shown in the inset – not sure who they are supposed to be. Any ideas?

Our March Hare

The photograph on the cover of this month's edition of *Willingham News* was taken by Andy Richards, while walking on the banks of the Great Ouse River, close to Queenholme Farm.

This is a Brown Hare and in the UK is most likely to be seen on the open grasslands of Cambridgeshire, Suffolk and Norfolk. While it might look a bit like a rabbit, you can tell the difference by noting the big long ears with black tips and their longer legs. This means that they can run much faster than a rabbit. At full pelt they can reach up to 40 mph!

Hares are usually solitary creatures but come March time the females can be seen fighting off any unwanted visiting males, standing on their hind legs and 'boxing' with their front paws. They are so violent in their actions that people used to think that every March they 'had gone mad'!

Hence the saying that someone was 'as mad as March Hare'.

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Willingham Women's Institute



Our next meeting is on **Monday 14 March** at 7 30 pm in the Social Club and our speaker will be Jon Crisp from Cambridgeshire County Council's Waste Education Service with *Recycling Matters*! The talk will be an overview of the importance of waste recycling in protecting our environment including the processes involved in sorting and recycling waste, guidance on which household waste items you can recycle and advice on what we can all do to minimise our household waste.

In January we were joined by Kate Kirk, who gave us an inspiring talk about My Amazing Aunt: Cicely Saunders and the Modern Hospice Movement. Cicely was born in 1918 and, after attending Roedean School, went on to Oxford. When war was declared, she decided to train as a nurse at St Thomas' Hospital and found her vocation, but unfortunately her weak back prevented her from continuing to nurse. She became a Hospital Almoner, public administrator, writer, fund raiser and qualified as a doctor in 1965. Caring for and listening to terminally ill patients formulated her ideas on how the experience of dying urgently needed to be improved. Cicely envisaged a special comfortable place, with fewer rules than hospitals, expert pain management and supportive family care. Her ambition was fulfilled in 1967, when St Christopher's Hospice was purpose-built at Sydenham, the first of many. For the terminally ill, living at home under hospice care also became a popular option. Palliative Care and Research became a recognised medical speciality and career path. Cicely travelled the world, sharing her expertise and enthusiasm. She received honorary degrees and many awards, including the Order of Merit from the Queen and was nominated for a Nobel Prize twice. In 2005, Dame Cicely Saunders died in St Christopher's Hospice, aged 87.

Part 2 – Early Computers

Did you know that 2022 is an EXCITING year for coding? This is because, 200 years ago, Charles Babbage invented the Difference Engine, in 1822.

The Difference Engine was a simple kind of mechanical calculator, but it was one of the first signs of coding.

The earliest computers were SO big. Some were bigger than a room, and definitely bigger than your parents' work computer! But they got extremely hot and were not very environmentally friendly.

For my birthday last year, my parents took me to the National Museum of Computing in Milton Keynes. When I was there, I saw an old (about 50 years old) computer called an Elliott[®] computer. Instead of typing code into it, it used paper strips which had holes in (called ticker tape), and a light shone through the holes and told the computer what to do. The Elliott[®] computer had no screen, but it did have a ticker tape maker and it could even sing happy birthday to me!

A computer now can be as small as a full stop. (As small as the full stop I just wrote, in fact.) The computer that I am writing this on (a Raspberry $Pi^{(0)}$) is about 5 x 8 cm – so it is a lot smaller than the Elliott⁽⁰⁾!

MAC Hair Studio Margaret's Story

Margaret was in her 30s, when she started working with Mary Silk (Bubbles) in the Maison Condor salon in the High Street. Many in the village will fondly remember Bubbles; in those days 'the only thing that was different about hairstyles was either you had a fringe or not!' When Bubbles died about 20 years ago she left Maison Condor to Margaret in her Will. 'I then started to take on apprentice hairdressers and my successful working relationship began with Cambridge Regional College, which still carries on today'.

Margaret moved to her current premises in Church Street about 12 years ago and changed the name of the salon to MAC Hair Studio. This name has two meanings; her name is <u>Margaret Anne Coxall</u>, also her maiden name was McAvoy. She was able to increase the number of stylists whilst continuing to train apprentices. Margaret says 'The apprentices have meant I've been able to keep up with new developments.' But her older clients are still catered for, not just their hair though. Margaret and her staff will collect and take home the less mobile clients, even stopping for a bit of shopping on the way.

One customer told me: 'You see real life in here, but it's professional too. You walk in and not know anybody, then within minutes you're included in a lively conversation. Margaret and her staff, Megan, Charlie, Danielle and Jacque, are genuinely interested in everyone and their families'.

More or less by accident, Margaret started doing wedding hair. 'I did a friend's wedding and realised I really enjoyed being part of someone's important, special day. I then went to wedding fairs and promoted this service. It's not just the wedding day, it's the preparation leading up to it. I couldn't believe how successful this became. I'm just a small village hairdresser!'

Before the pandemic, Margaret endured a lengthy stay in hospital followed by a long recuperation at home. Of course, her loyal staff and clients' kindness was a great support. Soon after her return to MAC Hair, all our lives changed with the arrival of COVID-19. So Margaret was at home again, 'I missed the company of others enormously. It was the worst time I've ever known in business, the paperwork it caused, well, I've never liked paperwork!'

Over a number of decades Margaret has become an integral part of our community. 'When new people come to the village, I tell them what there is here, word-of-mouth recommendations are invaluable. I make my living in this village, I think it's important to promote and support everyone else'.

'How lucky am I to work here in Willingham every day making people happy. It's not work, it's fun!'

Roads and Byways

Many of our residents are very aware of the floods and drainage problems we have periodically here, and some serious worries have been voiced. Much as the Parish Council would like to see roads and gutters cleared more frequently, we have to be guided by the central office's schedules which are these days much reduced due to cost cutting and staffing issues. We could do some things to help, for example try to stop fly tipping in the ditches, which our farmers work so hard to keep clear and free-flowing. Closer to home, if there is a neighbour who needs assistance clearing leaves to be sure they do not block drains – then that would be a helpful thing to do. Meanwhile, taking all our own litter home, or putting it in one of the many bins around should be a sensible and kind habit.

Also subject to centrally resourced operations are the Highways department repairs. Berrycroft and Over Road have been on a schedule for a long while now but the latest information is that both may be actioned this April.

Amenities

As the village population has grown to around 5,000, so has the need for places to participate in essential recreational and social activities. The Parish Council is aware that there are not enough fields for regular sports which we are happy to know are very popular. Down West Fen, the seasonal Bowls Club will reopen as will the Cricket Club. Meanwhile there is a successful Under 6's Football Club and growing number of women playing to include in our 300 strong footballers registered here. Willingham has 12 teams that play in Cambridge leagues. The Parish Council would be very pleased if anyone knows of suitable land that could be bought and annexed to our facilities.

One building owned by Willingham is the Victorian built Public Hall on the High Street. The Scouts are the only group that now use the Hall, but they too are struggling to feel it is fit for purpose in its current condition. So discussions will be held soon as to how best to move forward with this property.

Willingham In Bloom!

To date our fantastic WAG's funds have covered much of the expense of our six village flower tubs. The costs of replanting this year will need to be funded differently so any sponsorship ideas and offers will be welcome. Additional tubs would be a great addition to our village. Although visible from the street, they would need to be placed on private or agreed areas of land. The theme for this summer's tub planting we intend to be red, white, and blue to celebrate our Queen's Jubilee, and if more village flower displays would like to follow that idea – It would look amazing!

New Defibrillator Installed

The Council is pleased to confirm that it has installed a new Defibrillator at the Primary School to add to the existing machines outside the Library and Recreation Ground. The new machine is sited at the front of the school building and there is full public access. Although the machines 'talk you through' the procedures once they are being used, it is felt that some in the village would appreciate the opportunity of some training in advance and the Council is exploring how and when would be best to provide this.

Elections for Parish Councillors here this May are not needed, however there are vacancies on the Council. We welcome Deborah Ramsden, who was co-opted at the full Parish Council meeting in February. Fen Drayton Lakes – Seasonal Report



giving nature a home Here at Fen Drayton Lakes, we wholeheartedly believe that one of life's simple pleasures is to go for a walk in the countryside.

Nothing else can quite beat the experience of being surrounded by tranquil scenes of water, trees, and fields whilst taking in the sights and sounds around you. With the arrival of spring, birds are singing all around, Ducks and other waterbirds are out on the lakes and migrant species are arriving back from their wintering grounds to set up a territory and, hopefully, breed.

With footpaths looping around the majority of our 11 lakes, there is always something to look at. However, we are aware that it can sometimes be difficult to get good views of some of these water bodies. As a nature reserve, our primary purpose is to provide spaces for wildlife which means that many areas are left to develop and provide nesting habitat, shelter, and protection to the inhabitants.

During the spring and summer nesting season, we minimise time spent off-track and don't go into or near the habitats unless we really need to. Birds and other wildlife are easily disturbed and can be put off from using areas where people regularly go, even to the extent of abandoning nests and eggs. This means that viewpoints in the reed or hedgerows can re-grow throughout the season, closing the views.

During the autumn and winter months we work our way around the reserve, re-cutting viewpoints through to each lake. In some areas this serves a dual purpose of not only opening views for visitors, but also improving the habitat for wildlife.

The hedgerows around our entry road, various trails and on field boundaries are some of the best habitats on site for a whole variety of breeding bird species. The bulk of the hedges are Hawthorn, and they tend to be of a uniform age and size. Whilst making a good hedge, this uniformity can lead to it becoming tall and 'leggy' with lots of dense vegetation up high, but little lower down. This isn't ideal for either the health of the hedge or the nesting birds that use it. We therefore implement a regime of Rotational Viewpoint cutting whereby different areas of certain hedges are coppiced each year to encourage denser regrowth at a lower level. As a result of this, the hedgerows contain a patchwork of heights, densities, and growth stages to the benefit of all.

As you walk around the lakes on your next visit, keep a look out in the hedgerows for Thrushes, Robins, Blue Tits, Bullfinches, Blackcaps, and many other species.

County Councillor's Report Neil Gough

By the time this is published, winter will be over and spring will be here. This year marks the first budget of the new Council administration – until now we had to work within the budget of the previous administration. Here is my update of County Council matters.

Civil Parking Enforcement

Subject to approval by the Department of Transport, there is a proposal for two full-time Civil Enforcement Officers, employed by the County Council, to enforce parking regulations in South Cambridgeshire, rather than the police. They will move between the villages, issuing parking fines to people who park where they should not. The agreement of the Greater Cambridge Partnership to underwrite the first five years' costs has made it possible. The process is long, however, and involves the Secretary of State for Transport and Parliament - we don't expect implementation until late 2023.

Highways Committee

The Council is to establish a new process for the implementation of 20 mph schemes which would allow third parties – such as Parish Councils – to make an application for a 20 mph limit in their chosen area, with a number of schemes then progressing following a period of assessment and prioritisation.

Just Transition Fund

Cambridgeshire County Council's Joint Administration proposes to set up and spend a £14 million fund over the next five years to tackle inequality, improve lives, and care for the environment via a 'Just Transition Fund'.

In its first year, if agreed, the 'Just Transition Fund' will support schemes that increase flood prevention in the county, continuing a recent rapid increase in gully clearing. It will also work towards tackling climate change, widening opportunities for children with special educational needs and disabilities, increasing independent living services and expanding direct payments and individual service funds (where adults assessed as needing support can choose and manage their own care services); and expanding the 'Care Together' programme, providing care services close to where people live.

Cambridgeshire County Council Budget

The Joint Administration is to consider a 4.99% rise in order to close the authority's £16m budget gap this year. Next year's funding gap is likely to be even worse. The priority is to balance the budget – not just for the coming year but for the next four years - the incoming administration in May last year faced a potential budget gap of £86m by 2027, if no action were taken.

4.99% would mean an extra charge of £1.04 per week for a Band B, and £1.19 for a Band C household. More than half of all homes in Cambridgeshire are in these two bands. Local government experts, who visited in summer, highlighted that historic decisions not to raise council tax in previous years had led to significant ongoing lost income to support services.

Your GP Practice – Meet The Team

Your GP practice is here to ensure you get the right care from the right healthcare professional at the right time. The practice team is made up of a range of healthcare professionals with the expertise to help treat a range of conditions.

You might not always need to see a GP. Our nurses, pharmacists and healthcare assistants are all trained professionals who can diagnose and treat a range of conditions, helping you to get advice or treatment sooner.

More details about our dedicated practice team are set out below:

- Reception Team and Care Navigators are trained to know about the care and services available to you. They'll talk to you in confidence about your health problem and book you an appointment with the right healthcare professional or service at the right time.
- Advanced Practitioners (including nurses, paramedics and physiotherapists) are qualified professionals who have undergone additional specialist training and are able to assess, treat, diagnose, refer and prescribe medication.
- Practice Nurses support many long-term conditions, run clinics and health checks and can treat minor health problems and injuries.
- Clinical Pharmacists are experts in medicines and can help with prescription enquiries and carry out medication reviews.
- Healthcare Assistants can assist with a range of clinical duties, for example, taking blood samples, blood pressure checks and ECGs under the guidance of the wider healthcare professional team.
- Social Prescribers work in partnership with GP practices and can help connect you to local community services and support networks to help you have more control over your health and wellbeing. when, including if you need to be seen in person, via a phone consultation, via a video consultation, or if you could get help from another service, such as a community pharmacy.

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District Councillors' Report

Solar Together Cambridgeshire

South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) is, once again, participating in the Solar Together Cambridgeshire scheme in partnership with Cambridgeshire County Council. The scheme operates as a group buying scheme for solar panels. Households can register their interest for solar panels – a company called iChoosr then run a reverse auction to get the most competitive price for households, who receive a recommendation for their house and can accept or decline the offer. Biodiversity SPD – What Does It Mean?

A Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) is a technical planning guidance document which carries weight in planning decisions. South Cambridgeshire has just approved a new SPD to better protect and enhance biodiversity when development takes place. Building on front-line experience from local government ecologists, the SPD has been created to guide developers on how to fulfil existing 'green' policies.

Village Watercourse Maintenance

SCDC has the responsibility for the maintenance of some of the watercourses in the village. The ditch that runs along Station Road has recently been substantially cleared. The watercourse running along the side of Schole Road from Long Pond has also been cleared, together with culverts, to ensure it is free flowing.

Not all ditches in the village are the responsibility of the Council, known as Riparian ditches, they are the responsibility of private landowners. Residents on whose land these are located are asked to check that they are clear because any obstructions that impede the flow of water can lead to problems with flooding and waterlogging upstream.

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The Ladybird Boat Trust

The Ladybird Boat Trust's primary role is to give the disadvantaged, disabled or vulnerable people in our community a trip on our beautiful river – The Great Ouse, where there is an abundance of wildlife to see. This is a trip which most of our passengers could never experience in any other way.





Our Boat is *The Ladybird*. It was built in 2006/7 for St John Ambulance. In 2013 The Ladybird Boat Trust was formed to take over the ownership and running of the boat. 'The Ladybird' can accommodate groups of up to 20 people and is fully accessible to wheelchair users. However, to ensure everyone can move round easily, each wheelchair is counted as an extra person. The heated cabin is fully enclosed with large viewing windows; there is also a wheelchair accessible toilet and small galley for tea and coffee. Passengers can also sit out on the front deck.

The boat is licensed to carry passengers by the Maritime and Coastguard Agency and there has to be a licenced Boat Master on every trip. The crew, who are all volunteers, spend the winter training and carrying out ongoing maintenance, repairs, and painting.

The core client groups are from care homes, day centres, special schools and clubs. We also run trips for individuals and small groups. We realise that COVID-19 has left many people feeling isolated and lonely, so this year we are hoping that we can attract more individuals to enjoy friendship onboard *The Ladybird*.

All trips, which normally run from May to mid-October, start out from Hartford Marina and either go downstream to St lves or upstream to Godmanchester or Brampton.

Passengers can choose to have a picnic in the cabin or crew will take tables and chairs out onto a bankside meadow. Alternatively, fish and chips can be ordered and delivered to the boat, or a stop made near a local pub.

Normal starting time for a trip is 10 am and returning at 3 pm but we also run a number of shorter trips, starting at 10 am and returning at 1 pm or leaving at 1 30 pm and returning at 4 pm. Trips operate from Monday to Friday.

The Trust makes no fixed charge for groups or individuals using the boat but does request donations, the amount we get usually depends on the size of the organisation and the funds it has available. For friendship groups like WI or Gardening Clubs we recommend £12.50 per person, which is not a lot for five hours on the river. It costs around £17,000 a year to run *The Ladybird* and about 70% of that comes from donations from its users, with the balance coming from our Patrons and fundraising.

All crew have had double vaccinations and boosters and will follow the current COVID-19 Guidance as we would expect our passengers to also follow.

In 2019, before the Pandemic restrictions, we did over 150 trips. We are all hoping that we will see that number of trips return this year, after managing just 27 trips in 2021. We know that COVID-19 infections, staff shortages and rising costs have hit our core group of passengers really hard and we are looking forward to welcoming regular and new passengers. Bookings now are being taken for the current year.
