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Old Willingham

This splendid new building is Berrycroft Stores in the 1930s, very different from the building we know today. Sadly, the building was short lived as it caught fire and was completely gutted a few years later. The building we see today was put up in its place and its slightly odd box-like shape is due to war-time restrictions which made building materials scarce. The smaller building on the left escaped the fire and is still there today – although completely boarded up.

Berrycroft Stores The Early Years

It's great how a photo can evoke so many memories. Jon Edney's *Old Willingham* did just this in January with the Ice Skating photo A brief chat with Geoff Rule about his ice skating days then encouraged me to find out more about Berrycroft Stores, which was at one time owned by Geoff's father Frank, and his uncle, Ron Rule. Berrycroft Stores is, I believe, the oldest shop in the village. Geoff kindly invited me to meet his brother Tony, cousins Jane and Chris and Wally Ambrose to reminisce about those early years in the life of the shop.

Berrycroft Stores first opened its doors in 1903 and was then owned by the Jeeps family. Harold B Holttum, affectionately known as HB, was cousin to the grandmother of Chris and Jane and Geoff and Tony Rule. He bought the shop from the Jeeps in 1941. Brothers Frank and Ron Rule then took over the stores around 1946.

As Harold's letter shows, the store sold a diverse variety of goods. Under the Rule's ownership it continued to mainly support market gardeners selling everything from 'a tin tack, Osmirod pen, stone hot water bottle to a small tractor'. In fact, everything needed for a fruit and flower growing village. The growers bought their flower dye, baskets for the collection of flowers, fruit ladders and labels all from Berrycroft Stores. In those days there were lots of growers who dyed their flowers, sometimes deliberately growing white flowers so that they could dye them in whatever colour was fashionable at the time. Cut flowers were then left outside for collection to Longstanton Station and then on for sale in Covent Garden, London and Smithfield Produce Market, Birmingham. This practice continued into the 1980s. 'Everyone grew flowers even if their main job was in Cambridge, because we all had land at the back of our houses – it was a way of life. As children we were always told to "be polite, and go round the back" –that's where it all happened and most people's front doors wouldn't open!' recalls Jane.

Standard flowers for market were:

Pyrethrums, Gladiolus, Sweet William, Scabious, Gypsophilla, Chrysanthemum, Dahlias and Statice.

The shop used to open at 7 am and the growers would come in, having already spent a couple of hours on their land, for cigarettes and chocolate before going back out to work.

The original Berrycroft Stores was to the left of the current shop while Berrycroft Stores as we now know it, was used for storage. As the stores expanded, the shop moved to the current building and looked like the photo on page five under 'Old Willingham'. The building had a pitched gable roof which caught fire during the war and the front part was rebuilt with its flat roof of concrete and tar as there was a shortage of wood. During the war there was an air raid siren on the roof of the shop.

Berrycroft Stores was very much a family business. As the store expanded Ron ran the machinery side while Frank focussed on the horticultural and hardware side. Chris and Jane were born in Berry Cottage (it has the date 1858 above the building) which still stands next to the storage building and their parents worked in the Stores. There used to be lots of storage sheds behind the Stores and Jane remembers playing in the 'Poison Shed', sitting on boxes of DDT and Cyanide for poisoning wasps. Asbestos sheets were stored in the yard and Jane also remembers getting into trouble playing on them, not because they were dangerous but because they were expensive and being brittle could easily be broken. No strict health and safety rules and regulations then!

The shop had a catalogue of the items which they sold and without access to the internet and social media, its reputation spread widely by word of mouth, supplying horticultural goods and spare parts for machinery to Fisons in Ipswich, to places in Lincoln, London, Kent and Luton. There were two drivers for the delivery lorries, one large vehicle and a smaller one fondly referred to as the Sputnik because its existence revolved around Berrycroft Stores! Wally Ambrose was one of the drivers. He joined the store aged $15^{1}/_{2}$, working in the shop initially and when he was old enough, as a driver and loved working there. 'They were a good team and there was lots of laughter'. When he began driving for them he recalls some customers getting money out from under the floorboards and used to time some of his deliveries to coincide with customer's mealtimes!

Berrycroft Stores was quite a big employer in the village. In addition to two drivers, there were two engineers who worked in the workshops behind the stores, carrying out machinery repairs for customers. There was a yardman and four members of staff in the shop and accounts office. In those days they also sold cement and without forklift vehicles had to unload very hot, heavy bags on to their shoulders.

There used to be petrol pumps at the front and both Tony and Geoff helped man these on Saturday mornings. There was a paraffin pump in the yard as many of the homes and greenhouses in the village were heated with paraffin heaters. Back then Berrycroft Stores also used to supply painting and decorating materials, carpets (and even provided a carpet fitting service), bicycles, nails and screws as well as lawn mowers. Back in the day they also supplied fertilizer to Cambridge United.

The sale of lawn mowers and the like continued to be sold in spite of the arrival of the first Tesco at Bar Hill and outlasted Tesco's Garden Centre! The family can remember a

customer wanting the Stores to price match a mower from Tesco but was told that wouldn't be possible as they would want to unpack the item and check it over thoroughly to ensure everything was working properly before selling it. Real customer service!

During a long drought period, Frank and Ron Rule thought there must be a lot of water under ground in the village and using diviner rods found a source on their land, dug a well and installed a pump. This enabled them to demonstrate an irrigation system, Even Shower, which they supplied and which worked in low water pressure conditions.

The Rule family sold Berrycroft Stores to Peter Ling in 1978.

More News from Cambridgeshire Libraries

The Fall of Singapore

In the Spring of 1942, the Battle of Singapore and its consequences had a great impact on many local people. Cambridgeshire soldiers were sent to Singapore to try and save the island from a Japanese invasion. However, the capture of Singapore resulted in the largest British surrender in history. From the Cambridgeshire Regiment, 784 members died in the Far East between January 1942 and August 1945, alongside hundreds of other soldiers from Cambridgeshire who served in other parts of the British Armed Forces. The forced slave labour on the Burma Railway is recalled in many books.

If you have a family or local connection to these events, there are many resources in the Cambridgeshire Local Studies collections to find out more. You can read newspaper reports of the time, including lists of missing and killed. There are also books containing eye-witness accounts of what happened, how they survived the terrors of the subsequent prisoner of war camps and the infamous 'Death Railway'. The Surgery

Disappointment was expressed at the Parish Council meeting in March that another new phase of development had been announced for Northstowe with still no plans for a medical centre. Concerns were raised that the surgery in Willingham was struggling to cope with more than 10,000 patients now registered at a facility built over 20 years ago for a village, at that time, of 3,000.

District Councillor, Bill Handley, said that the problems were county wide and caused by COVID-19 and not Northstowe and that he had been assured by the surgery that they could handle the additional numbers. This statement was guestioned by several Parish Councillors, one of whom cited their own experience in being unable to get a doctor's appointment in under five weeks and having to wait over an hour and a half on the telephone to get a reply.

Councillor Handley agreed to make further enquiries and report back.

Cycle Ways

Plans are underway for expansion of the cycle network in Cambridgeshire. Sadly, they will not help Willingham as the focus will be on direct links (spokes) into Cambridge. The need for cross links was emphasised to County Councillor, Neil Gough. In particular Willingham lacked direct routes to Cottenham and Over. Cycle use in Willingham was not great mainly due to the volume of traffic and the lack of safe routes.

Councillor Gough noted the concerns but said it was unlikely that anything would happen before at least 2024. In answer to a separate question, he said that he would check on whether the planned upgrade to the B1050 would provide a cycle route to the north of the village.

Jubilee Arrangements

The Parish Council was delighted to hear of plans for a Jubilee family picnic on the QE2 field on Sunday, 5 June and agreed to help with some funding. They also agreed to help with proposals from the WI for a new bench on the Village Green and provide a second bench on the QE2 field.

Environment and Sustainability

The Parish Council continues to look at ways of improving their carbon footprint. Two schemes are being considered. The first, which is well advanced, is replacement of the Pavilion lighting with LEDs. The second, which is still at an exploratory stage, is provision of an electric vehicle charging point near to the Ploughman Hall. It would be interesting to know if residents have any views on this second proposal. If you do, please send a brief email to the clerk at the address shown below.

This month I am writing about Python. No, not the snake! Python is a text-based coding language. It was invented by Guido van Rossum from

the Netherlands in the 1980s, and the first version was published in February 1991. It is nothing to do with snakes, but is named after a BBC TV show called Monty Python!

Python is good for simple data storing and maths programmes. It's not the programming language you would want when creating a webpage, but it is great for making your first games!

You can do lots and lots with Python. Some of the programmes I have made are a calendar, a password login, a calculator programme, and games. The favourite programme I've made was a game where you are a plane and you have to collect stars and dodge missiles. You can see a picture of it below, and you can even download the code and play it yourself using the web link!

Python is a good coding language for beginners because it is very readable – commands do what they say! Here's some 'so so simple' Python commands:

- print("____") writes your message to the console
- ___=input("___") asks the user a question through the console, and records their input
- def ____(__): defines a new function
- while True: keeps a command running as long as 'True' is true which is forever!

However, I wouldn't recommend Python for total beginners because it can be confusing. Instead, I would recommend something like Scratch or Scratch Jr, because they have less commands, and you can't spell them wrong! Next month I will tell lots more about Scratch – tune in then!

We do not make appointments via email, but you can register for System Online to make routine appointments with the GP, in order to avoid the phone queue. We have several telephone lines and multiple members of staff answering phones at all times. They will get to you as soon as they can. Please try and keep your call as brief as possible in order to free up our staff quickly so they can help the next caller. Please be kind to our staff who are doing their very best to help you. Any abusive behaviour will result in your call being terminated. Thank you for your support and understanding.

Parking

Please **do not park** in the Surgery car park when you are dropping your children to school.

This is causing serious problems with our patients having adequate parking. Visibility on our access road can be very restricted, and as this is a main pedestrian route to the school, there is an increased risk to children if the road becomes heavy with traffic during school drop off. We will monitor the situation and will ask you to move if you are seen doing this. This is also being reported to the school.

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Willingham Community Plan Group Update



'What is happening with the Community Plan after so much noise in 2021?' You haven't heard from us since December's *Willingham News*, so it is time for an update!

The answer is that we have just finished the paper copy data entry and we are very busy analysing the responses we received. You can expect that it will take some time, thanks to the very many that responded online and by paper copies. If you remember you did not have to answer every section. To give you some idea of the response here is a breakdown of people that answered each section.

- Section 01 (Let's start here!) = 864
- Section 02 (Traffic, Roads & Transport) = 76%
- Section 03 (Your Children & Young People) = 50%
- Section 04 (Housing, Development and the Environment) = 68%
- Section 05 (Leisure, Amenities and Communications) = 65%
- Section 06 (Medical Services, Health and Wellbeing)
 = 64%
- Section 07 (Employment and Business) = 59%
- Section 08 (Community, Governance, Crime & Antisocial Behaviour) = 63%

In addition to the Household Survey the Youth Survey had 114 more responses. We'd like to thank the schools and organisations that facilitated Willingham's children and young adults taking part.

The WCP team would like to give a massive vote of thanks to the team that supported us by delivering and collecting paper copies, knocking on doors and entering the data manually. It really has been a massive project and we could not have got such a good response without you generously donating your time.

Lastly thanks to everyone that filled in the survey. As well as analysing the numbers, we are also analysing your many very helpful comments and remarks. Excuse us while we go quiet again, there is a massive report to write!



Update from Fen Drayton Lakes

Spring birds are returning and, once back, they waste no time filling the airwaves with their lovely, lyrical melodies. Each year millions of birds pour into the UK to take advantage of the warmer weather for breeding. Indeed, temperate areas are more productive at this time of year for nature than rainforests. This energetic boom of growth fuels an emergence of insects which in turn gives birds a lot of food to eat.

Migration is a treacherous business, but for the birds that make it back there are big gains to be had. The glut of food in the spring allows them to have large broods and produce lots of young. Some species can have up to 15 chicks in a nest, which is a lot of mouths to feed!

At Fen Drayton Lakes we are lucky enough to receive lots of migrant birds which are dominated by the warblers. These small birds have mostly travelled from Africa with some having spent the winter as far away as South Africa. One such species is the willow warbler which migrates up to 8,000km to reach here. It crosses mountain chains, seas, rainforests and the largest desert on earth, all to breed in a particular patch of trees on the nature reserve. We have managed the habitats to ensure areas of scrub such as hawthorn and bramble, reedbeds and woodlands are in good condition, which warblers adore. Many of these birds prefer the edge of the habitat, where scrub meets grassland or reeds meet scrub. This is where biodiversity is highest and provides the most food. On a calm morning it is possible to hear ten different species of warbler at the reserve but seeing them all can take a number of visits.

Come down to the reserve to look for these charismatic birds around the trails. This is the best time of year to see them as many will sit out to sing, putting aside all risks from predators to attract a mate. If you are lucky, you may also hear the fluty melody of a nightingale or the classic two-note call of the cuckoo, both of which can be found with luck.

Watch Your Step

Did you know...? Over half of England's threatened bird species nest on the ground. We can all contribute to improving the fortunes of declining birds such as corn buntings and lapwings by sticking to paths and keeping dogs on leads in the spring and summer months. This will boost the odds that these threatened species can breed.

The #WatchYourStep hashtag is our campaign to raise awareness of the impact on nesting birds and to share how people are helping. Search for the hashtag if you are on social media to get live updates or get involved.

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South Cambridgeshire District Councillors' (SCDC) Report

Wild Minds

Our Wild Minds programme has opened for registration with an expanded programme. The age range has been widened to invite 12–17 year olds to register (sessions will be run in separate groups of 12–14 year olds, and 15-17 year olds). The courses, which are free, will also now run in two locations, continuing at Milton Country Park and a new scheme being run at Wandlebury Country Park.

Overseen by a clinical psychologist the courses provide support for young people with mild anxiety, low mood and depression and aim to improve self-confidence and self-esteem; the courses are aimed at young people who may otherwise go without help because they do not meet the NHS threshold for mental health care.

The sessions run for an hour and a half, for eight weeks, with different activities on offer each week, spending time in small groups in a therapeutic outdoor environment with qualified activity instructors and trained youth workers. Young people who would like to attend, or parents or carers who think the course may be suitable for a young person in their care, can register now online.

Focus on Nature

SCDC has just published a Biodiversity Supplementary Planning Document which you can see at <u>tinyurl.com/2p9ewzf4</u> and which supports the Doubling Nature Strategy published last year. It details how all new development must protect, preserve and enhance nature and encourages Parish Councils to develop their own nature recovery plans.

Anglian Water Third Consultation – Cambridge Waste Water Treatment Works

Anglian Water has launched its third consultation on the relocated Cambridge Waste Water Treatment Works – the last consultation before the plan is fixed in this month. There is an updated design, reducing the height of the tallest elements with a smaller site, trees planted to screen the site and a mix of habitats that complement those in proximity to the site. Following lobbying by SCDC, they now promise a biodiversity net gain minimum of 20% across the entire site.

They are aiming for 'negligible' odour through an improved design. Storm capacity will be handled by both internal and external storage and the quality of the treated water going into the River Cam will be much improved.

It's proposed that access to the site will be via junction 34 off the A14 and there will be enhancements to walking and cycling routes. Further details of the consultation can be found at: <u>tinyurl.com/3npxbn69</u>.

Water Supplies

You may have read or heard recently about a drinking water pollution incident concerning Cambridge Water. SCDC heard, via a journalist, that there may have been a pollution incident in South Cambridgeshire around Duxford, Shelford and Stapleford. SCDC immediately contacted Cambridge Water who are responsible for the delivery of clean drinking water to this area. SCDC's responsibility for drinking water extends to a small number of private water supplies - private wells and bore holes – and all of these were immediately tested and confirmed to have water that is deemed to be 'wholesome.'

Cambridgeshire County Councillor's Report

Spring is well and truly with us – I hope that you're enjoying the lighter evenings. Please continue to take care when travelling around as icy roads can persist at this time of year.

Here is my update of County Council matters based upon the full report given to the Parish Council.

The Primary School – Flood Risk Scheme

The Primary School has been identified as one of five schools in Cambridgeshire that are at risk of surface water flooding and that experience some degree of flooding on a regular basis. These schools could benefit from a Sustainable Urban Drainage Solution (SuDS) scheme to reduce risk on their own site as well as in the surrounding area. The Environment Committee will be asked to approve funding through the Environment Fund of £75,000 for a SuDS in Schools project covering five schools across Cambridgeshire. This scheme could unlock partnership further funding of £300,000 from the Department of Education and Anglian Water. We expect to have heard the outcome of the application by the end of March. The schemes would commence in financial year 2022/23.

Greater Cambridge Partnership – Greenways

At its meeting on 17 February, the Greater Cambridge Partnership Joint Assembly was advised that work on the Greenways is continuing. Officers are continuing to work with landowners to acquire land. Ultimately, compulsory purchase could be used.

The St Ives Greenway will include a shared cycle and pedestrian route between Cottenham and Oakington leading on to the Guided Busway. The works will include a solution to the intermittent flooding at Swavesey Lakes that sometimes makes the access path impassable.

Civil Parking Enforcement

South Cambridgeshire District Council's Cabinet confirmed formally they will support the County Council's application to the Department for Transport for civil parking enforcement in the district. Introducing civil parking enforcement in South Cambridgeshire will see responsibilities for dealing with illegal parking shift from Cambridgeshire Police to Cambridgeshire County Council. This will mean drivers parking illegally, such as on double yellow lines, could be issued a ticket by Civil Enforcement Officers and ordered to pay a penalty charge. This arrangement is in place in Cambridge City and many other areas.

The County Council will now prepare an application to the Secretary of State for a Special Enforcement Area, via the Department for Transport, to introduce the scheme. Subject to the approval of this application, it is expected that civil parking enforcement could begin in South Cambridgeshire in the autumn of next year. In South Cambridgeshire, the upfront costs of introducing civil parking enforcement will be funded by the GCP, including a full review of road lines and signs. They will also cover any financial deficit of the scheme for the first five years.
