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Full Steam Ahead for Scouting Adventures in 2022

After a two-year wait, 1st Willingham Scouts were finally able to return to overnight adventures for their young people last month. Camps, and other nights away from home, are a core part of the experiences we provide for our young people as they are a huge catalyst for developing independent skills and new friendships.

Our Beaver section (age 6 - 8) start collecting their 'nights away' badges with a simple, local overnight camp and progress on this journey through Cubs (age 8 - 10) and Scouts (age 10 - 14). By the time they move on to Explorers (age 14 - 17) they will already be completing expeditions carrying all their kit or spending a whole week away on camp.

For our Scout section, the expedition challenge is a key part of their programme where they are required to plan and carry out a two-day expedition to explore somewhere new. Last month they undertook a trip by train from Cambridge to Sheringham on the North Norfolk coast to complete this award.

Given some broad parameters for the expedition, our Scouts spent an evening meeting getting to grips with the East Anglian rail network, using train timetables to work out how to get from Cambridge to Sheringham (and back), along with a hike route plan to take them along the scenic North Norfolk coast.

Our trip included:

- A two-stage train journey on the way out, followed by a 7 km hike.
- A trip on the North Norfolk Railway steam train and an overnight stay at Sheringham Youth Hostel, with the Scouts planning, purchasing and cooking their meals.
- A visit to Sheringham lifeboat station and a town treasure trail, followed by a three-stage train journey on the way home.

We were very fortunate to have the company of four Young Leaders from our local Explorer Scout Unit who made a massive contribution to the success of the weekend.

We had a fantastic weekend away with all the Scouts achieving their expedition challenge award and are looking forward to more adventures in 2022.

Old Willingham

Willingham is rightly proud of its Parish which Church is Grade 1 listed а building and contains an amazing amount of history going back to the 1200s. The current church was built on top of an older church probably dating back another 300 years. Some fragments of this can be seen in the porch. What is



less well known is that the building had been allowed to descend into serious disrepair due to a series of 'absent' rectors in Victorian times. These men just took the tithes and money but spent little or no time in the village. This fuelled the rise in non-conformist churches such as the Baptists and Methodists.

The arrival of Reverend Watkins in the 1890s changed all this. He lived in the village and invested his own money in restoring the church to what we see today. The entire east end had to be re-built and this month's photo, taken during this work, shows how bad the old building had become. The maintenance of the building is still the responsibility of the local village and not the Church of England and it is an expensive task.

Memories of Willingham 50 Years Ago – Part One

This article is an attempt to describe our village as it used to be. As my memory is not perfect I'm sure to have missed some things out and I apologise for this.

When our family moved to Willingham in 1968 it was a very different village from the one we live in today. To begin with it was much smaller then. No Saxon Way, no Balland Field, no Pyrethrum Way, and hardly any of the smaller developments we know today. When we arrived, Wilford Furlong and Brickhills were very recent additions to the area, and at that time had a resident warden.

The general appearance of the village centre was rural. Our house in High Street had a working farmyard on one side and a cold store for fruit on the other. Opposite to us there was a large flower grower, and the bottom of our long garden adjoined a pig farm. As well as its farms and small holdings, Willingham was famous for its many orchards of which sadly only Ray Manning's remains today.

Most of the inhabitants or their spouses had lived in the village all their lives, and although there was a sprinkling of people from neighbouring villages, I think we were only the second family with university connections. Some people were a little suspicious of us, but our immediate neighbours were friendly and welcoming and as I had grown up in a much smaller and more remote place I soon felt at home.

The younger women and girls might have jobs in Cambridge, but few of the men worked outside the village, and even those that did tended to work some land in their spare time. The majority of people had large gardens which they put to good use. One gentleman, who was a recipient of meals on wheels, always provided his own vegetables, mainly asparagus when it was in season.

The other use of gardens was the growing of flowers. This employed many women and very hard work it was too. In the 1970s some newcomers to the village found flowers growing in their new gardens and attempted to carry on with the trade, but the two I knew gave up after their first season. I reckon you had to be bred to it. A great feature of the village then were the towers of flower boxes on the pavements waiting for the carrier to take them to Longstanton station to be sent away to market.

Next time, I'll talk more about the village amenities at that time.

SPOTLIGHT ON LOCAL BUSINESS Bebe and Ju Crafts



This month, in our 'Spotlight on Local Business' feature, we talk to Mel Pinter about her craft business which is a mix of selling online through Facebook and Etsy, faceto-face through craft markets and running craft workshops.

Q What is your business all about?

I make and sell macramé items. Macramé is a form of textile produced using knotting techniques and can be used to make everything from wall hangings and plant hangers to jewellery and accessories. As well as macramé, I also make a few decorative origami items such as greetings cards and garlands.

Q How did you decide on this?

I discovered macramé back in the summer of 2020 and instantly fell in love with its versatility. By the autumn, I had made so many pieces I had two choices: stop or start selling it to make room for more! Positive encouragement from friends and a chance Tarot card reading was also a big push factor.

Unfortunately, more lockdowns and home-schooling put the brakes on things a bit, and with little in the way of craft fairs and events taking place last year, I didn't have much in the way of outlets. Thankfully, this year, with things returning to normal, there are lots of craft markets popping up, which will give me the chance to showcase my wares.

It's a daunting prospect to take the plunge and launch into something like this, particularly if you've already got a stable job and you're thinking of making the switch. But lockdown for me, like for many people, forced my hand and I have no regrets.

Q What difficulties have you encountered?

Although social media has the potential to be a great tool for promoting and selling products, I won't pretend that it comes easily to me. Navigating the different platforms and trying to figure out how they work for business has been a frustrating process. Also, putting myself out there and having a constant presence is often very time-consuming and something I admit I still don't do very successfully.

Q What is the scope for future development of the business?

I have just started advertising macramé workshops; the next ones will take place on **7 and 21 May** – one in Oakington and the other at Queenholme Farm, Willingham. With my



background teaching in and а love for macramé, it seemed combining the two was the obvious next step. These are beginners for get who to make their own

plant hangers.

Q How much time do you devote to your business each day?

I often get asked how long it takes me to make one thing or another, and the honest answer usually is: 'I don't know'. I find myself in such a mindful and meditative state when I'm doing crafts that I completely lose track of time. I make the most of the hours that the children are at school to do most of my work, but like any working parent, there are times when I find myself staying up late or getting up early to fit things in.

Q How difficult is it to balance running a business and running a young family?

It's not always easy trying to respond to emails when I'm at the park or make up items and get them posted when the kids are at home and need my attention.

Q What tips would you give someone starting up a similar venture?

I thoroughly recommend joining online communities of people that share your interests; I have found them particularly helpful. These days, there are forums and groups for every hobby and pastime imaginable. Macramé groups on Facebook have been invaluable in offering me advice on the craft itself but also input on selling products, displaying products, packaging and much more. I also spend a long time on Pinterest and Instagram searching for inspiration.

In terms of materials, it has taken me some time to find the best products and suppliers. This is something that's ongoing. Buying materials mainly online means you don't always get it right. So be prepared for that. It takes time and money to find out exactly what works for you.

4 Scratch

Scratch is a programming language that children to can use make programs and learn about code. Scratch was invented in 2003, by two

people called Mitchel Resnick and Yasmin Kafai in the USA. They invented it for children to learn about coding. It is now a really famous language – at the start of 2022 there were more than 92 million Scratch projects that had been created by 'Scratchers'. Some of these are mine!

In Scratch you use things called blocks (little jigsaw pieces) and you put them together. Blocks are basically commands. Blocks include 'Say' (which is *print* in Python), 'Ask' (which is *input* in Python), and 'Wait' (which is *sleep* in Python).

You can share your code by using a studio, which is a gallery of some of your projects. You can also change other people's code, which is called 'Remixing'. This can be useful for learners.

Scratch is definitely easier to use than Python. This is because in Scratch it's hard to get your code wrong, because the blocks have a special shape, which means only the right blocks go in the right places. In Python you have to spell everything correctly, and you have to type it all in perfectly or you get an error message.

My favourite project I ever made in Scratch was a secret spy program which sang the folk song The Lincolnshire Poacher then produced a secret code. It was based on a real secret radio program called a 'numbers station' but that is a story for another time!

Review of Sonic Forces By Tommy Barrett

Hello there, my name is Tommy and I have loved video games since I was three or four. As fellow Sonic fans know, Sonic the Hedgehog 2 has just been released, so I am



doing this to celebrate the second Sonic movie. With all that out of the way let's get to it!

OK, so first thing I want to say about this great game is

my favourite feature: the main character is designed by the player.

Those Ninja Characters!

Like many primary school children this spring term, my grandson caught COVID-19. He was pretty poorly to start but soon got his crazy energy back, and, as a former teacher, I was given the task of Zoom teaching while he was recovering. It was then Science Week, which suited me. However, that Friday was World Book Day. For this he was keen to dress up to represent his Ninjago books and characters.

Knowing nothing about these Lego figures, and even less about Ninjas, meant I had to do a bit of research, and what a fun and interesting task that turned out to be!

Historically this set of people had very ordinary, everyday lives, practised meditation and self-control and wore clothes of their humble work. However, their underlying motivation and drive was to support their family and clan. If that meant espionage or fighting to ensure their support, safety and well-being, then they would do this. It amounted at times to civil war between clans. Therefore, their weapons traditionally were not really the great samurai swords but shorter easily concealed kattana swords, chains, a sai (a three bladed knife), or similar readily hidden weapons linked with their trades. Women too were equally involved and carried similar weapons for fighting. I did discover in my research that women had an extra weapon they could use to their advantage: they could poison a very long fingernail or two ready for injecting venom into an enemy. That would work as a snake bite or frog poison does. Amazing but scary stuff!

Cricket insects were regular pets which could chirrup or make their scraping noise very loudly when encouraged. This would be very useful, for example when disguising cracking twigs or rustling leaves as a Ninja crept through a forest.

The Surgery

Representatives of Willingham Surgery (and the Longstanton branch) gave a short presentation to the Parish Council at the April meeting, also attended by several parishioners. It was well received. The Parish Council had received many comments regarding the perceived poor service from the practice following the pandemic and recent lifting of restrictions. Much of this was felt to be due to the impact of Northstowe. However, figures presented at the meeting showed that while the proportion of Northstowe patients had increased over the past few years, this was compensated by removal of patients in other areas such as Bar Hill and Cottenham. Overall patient numbers had increased by 22% and staff by 24%.

The presentation explained that the Surgery, in common with most in the country, continues to be affected by the pandemic, particularly in relation to isolation requirements. Due to the nature of the business, infection of a member of staff or their family prevents them attending the Surgery. Also, they are restricting numbers attending the Surgery to reduce potential spread of the virus. Other challenges include dealing with the COVID-19 backlog and increased transfer of work from secondary care. They are aware of long waits to answer phone calls, but little can be done as all calls need to be answered by the receptionists and their complexity varies greatly.

Waiting times to get appointments was raised as a major concern and the practice was focusing on reducing them, trialling new formats. For urgent cases, there are some appointments available on each day with others within 48 hours once the initial allocations have been filled. The current wait for a regular appointment is 14 days or so.

See the Surgery page in this magazine for details of an open meeting in the Octagon on **17 May**. Hopefully many residents with issues will be able to attend to make their comments. We will invite the practice to come to a future meeting to outline progress on these issues.

Roads and Traffic

It has been proposed that the temporary road closure of Thoday's Close at the school arrival and closing times be made permanent. This will pedestrianise the road with non-residents' vehicles prohibited between $8 \ 30 - 9 \ 30$ am and $2 \ 45 - 3 \ 30$ pm Monday to Friday, term time only. The proposed privatisation of parking offences will help to enforce this.

The footpath to the Community Orchard should proceed soon. This will include the 40 mph buffer zone extending some 400 metres beyond the bridleway. Hopefully this will also include repairs to the potholes at the start of the bridleway, though it has been noted that this isn't really a parking area so there is no requirement for this to be done.

Road marking repairs, such as at the traffic lights and along

Berrycroft, are probably going to be carried out this summer. Yellow lines are under review and are unlikely to be repaired or extended until the result of the application to privatise yellow lining, which is unlikely to be before the end of next year.

As roadside bushes and hedges are starting to grow, can residents please ensure the footpaths are accessible to all by cutting back where needed so as not to block pedestrian and wheelchair passage.

We continue to monitor traffic using the SIDs (Speed Indicating Devices) currently on Station Road and Earith Road. These give warnings when traffic is speeding and log dates and times of traffic flows. Results from these devices since 2018 can be found at: <u>roadwatch.org.uk/Cambs/Willingham/index.html</u>.

Cemetery

The removal of the footpath on the northern side of the cemetery has resulted in an additional 20 burial places. While this will help most immediate needs, we still require an additional location to meet future demand. We are examining potential locations but will be interested if we could be told of any suitable and available sites.

Barton Field

Walkers are reminded that access to and from Barton Field is from Black Pit Drove only, and all other land around is private and not to be used.

Meetings

The next meeting of the council on **4 May** is the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council at which the chairman, committee members and lead councillors are elected and various procedures are agreed. This is followed on **18 May** by the Annual Parish Meeting at which various organisations give presentations and accounts of their activities.

Village Hero Retires



In April we said goodbye to Mike Tidball and Amanda Radford who have relocated to Needingworth. Mike and Amanda moved into Willingham in October 2004, for Mike a cultural shift for a northern lad whose spare time was dominated by football and beer, to set up home with Amanda on her 'home turf'.

Living next to The Duke of Wellington pub,

not unsurprisingly Mike's initial introduction to the village and its inhabitants was by the way of spending many hours at the bar. The first involvement in village affairs came after Mike responded to the call for volunteers to undertake the Parish Plan for Willingham early in 2006, becoming part of the core group. Following the publication of the Parish Plan, Mike was one of the founder members of the Willingham Action Group (WAG) set up to promote and realise the objectives of the Action Plan. As a result, Mike became more involved in village life taking on the lion's share of the work that WAG projects and initiatives involved. Those of us also involved were aware of the many hours Mike dedicated to the work of WAG. Other non-WAG activities included acting as a community car driver, a Willingham News distributor and more recently co-ordinator of the Food Bank operations during the two COVID-19 lockdowns. Amanda was also involved taking on the role of WAG Treasurer.

Asked what Mike felt were notable achievements, he replied: 'the QEII redevelopment, establishment of the Willingham Youth Trust and subsequently the Youth Club itself, the Community Orchard and the many social activities promoted by WAG'. As to any regrets: 'volunteering to lead the Feast Pilgrimage walk to Ely three times, despite being blessed three times'.

His considerable effort was recognised in 2012/13 by receiving the District Council Village Hero Award, having been nominated by the Parish Council. Although never a Parish Councillor, Mike worked closely with the Parish Council and with their support and collaboration much has been achieved. Parish Council Chair Derek Law adds: 'Mike was a regular attendee at council meetings and was often the only parishioner present. His contributions, knowledge and support, always presented with the calm voice of reason even in stormy times, will be greatly missed.'

What would Mike like to say about his time in Willingham? 'I have a very warm and positive feeling, especially in respect of friendships made through being involved with village life and around many a dinner table.' Anything negative? 'Perhaps a feeling that Willingham has missed out in the past on community facilities and improvements compared to other villages.'

So, in conclusion one might say that Willingham's loss will be Needingworth's gain but Mike intends adopting a low profile concentrating on his overlooked interests of reading, films and music, continuing sporting activity and taking more holidays, thereby ensuring a year-round sun tan is maintained.

Members of WAG, and I am sure other friends, wish Mike and Amanda well in their new home and we look forward to reciprocal visits to local watering holes.

District Councillors' Report

Waiting Times at the Surgery

Responding to concerns in the village about long waiting times for GP appointments and telephone responses, a recent meeting of the Parish Council was addressed by staff of the village's GP Practice. In an excellent presentation they explained that these problems are not unique to Willingham and are being faced by medical practices all over the UK as they deal with a backlog of problems related to the COVID-19 pandemic. They stressed that the issues are unconnected to the increase in the number of Northstowe patients which is already expected and planned for by both the Willingham and Longstanton practices. To cope with the extra demand, surgeries are operating a triage system to prioritise patients based upon medical need. There's a fuller account of the meeting in our online version of this article.

Ukrainian Refugees

The District Council is incredibly busy responding to the Ukraine crisis, putting systems in place to undertake large numbers of DBS, home and welfare checks, make payments to Ukrainian individuals and their hosts, and to deal with many related issues. The picture changes on a daily basis and the council's webpage, which is frequently updated is here: www.scambs.gov.uk/community-safety-and-health/support-for-ukraine.

COVID-19 Update

From recent national news stories, residents will know that COVID-19 is still very much with us so we should continue to be cautious when in confined, indoor settings. The growth rate of new infections has been somewhere between 3% and 6% every day and, on 22 March, around 220 people were acutely ill with the disease across all Cambridgeshire hospitals. There is increased uncertainty in both national and regional estimates now, due to changes in testing policy, which make trends less clear and predictions less accurate and reliable. Zero Carbon Communities Grant Scheme

The Zero Carbon Communities Grant Scheme, which is now in its fourth year, has so far provided £310,000 to 51 grassroots projects working to tackle climate change in South Cambridgeshire. A new round of grants has just opened and closes on Wednesday 1 June. This year, groups in South Cambridgeshire can apply for between £1,000 and to £15,000 from a pot of over £120,000 which comes out of business rates from renewable energy sites, like solar farms.

Cambridgeshire County Councillor's Report

Dear Residents

May marks the first anniversary of my election as your County Councillor. It's been a very great privilege serving you and I am proud of what we are achieving. Here is my update of County Council matters.

County Highways

The latest quarterly meeting with the Local Highways Officer took place on 25 March. A large number of issues were raised with him, including the need to resurvey the effectiveness of the recent gulley clearance in certain places in Willingham. He pointed out that the season for line-painting is coming and we ran through a number of areas where there were problems particularly at junctions. He also mentioned that there will be a major programme of parking enforcement (lines and advisory signage) to be undertaken with the introduction of Civil Parking Enforcement.

A number of other Highways issues were raised and the officer committed to respond. The condition of the bridleway adjacent to the Community Orchard was discussed but it was concluded that this was not a Highways matter. So I will raise this with the team responsible for the bridleways to see what can be done to address the maintenance and root causes.

A14 Trees

I was very pleased to support the motion at the County Council, brought by my LIberal Democrat colleague Councillor Edna Murphy from Bar Hill, relating to the lack of maintenance and care over the thousands of trees planted alongside the A14; many of those trees are now dead. Councillor Murphy's motion called on the County Council to ask National Highways to publish facts and figures on a regular basis about the tree planting work - including how many are alive and how many have been replanted - as well as report regularly on the progress of the initiative to councillors. One of the legacies of the major A14 project was for tens of thousands of trees to be planted, but that risks being spoiled unless National Highways makes sure the trees are maintained and replaced when necessary. It was hoped the tree planting would create noise barriers for people who live by the busy road and would also make a positive environmental contribution. However, the Council has said the initiative is failing in both these areas.

National Highways is responsible for the A14 and agreed the tree planting programme with the County Council. Following the motion's success, it is gratifying to note that National Highways has reacted positively to address the issues.
