Find Your Inspiration at Fen Drayton Lakes

As one of the RSPB's 224 nature reserves being supported by more than a million members, Fen Drayton Lakes was acquired in 2007 with a unique role within the organisation – to inspire more people to give nature a home. Unfortunately, due to a number of economic and political factors, the aspirations of those involved at the time were thwarted.

But, thanks to the subscriptions, donations, purchases, and time given by all of its supporters, the RSPB has continued to provide the resources needed for the upkeep and improvement of the reserve and its habitats. Islands, reedbeds, and grasslands, which without management would by now be willow woods or scrub are, at the last count, home to over 800 pairs of breeding Terns, Gulls and Wading Birds, the highest number of breeding Turtle Doves of any RSPB reserve, three Booming Bitterns, and countless other Waterfowl, Songbirds and other non-avian wildlife.

This year will see a re-doubling of our efforts in introducing more people to the wonders of our natural world and inspiring them to give nature a home, or at least to support us in so doing. In a world where our children spend less and less time discovering the outside world for themselves, those of us involved with protecting the natural world now see a large part of our job as being to find new ways of ensuring that younger and future generations are exposed to those experiences that just might give them the moment of enlightenment that compels them to join the cause in reversing the decline of this world's biodiversity.

So keep an eye out for new and exciting ways to immerse your family in the nature and habitats of Fen Drayton Lakes.

WI News

At our May meeting, Dr Bill Block gave a talk on his *Antarctic Odyssey*. A qualified zoologist, he worked in the Pennines and Uganda before joining the Antarctic Survey in 1976. He worked for 14 seasons of three to six months away, often in areas explored by Shackleton, experiencing temperatures of 5° to -30° centigrade. He researched into adaptation to extreme temperatures and the very few species of insects there, especially mites.

Bill took us on a fascinating, illustrated tour of the Antarctic: the magnificent mountains, vast areas of snow and ice, huge glaciers, crevasses and icebergs frozen in sea ice, showing us some of the animals and birds that lived there. On an early expedition he travelled on the James Clark Ross ship and a Twin Otter plane (with skis and wheels), via the Falkland Islands to South Georgia. There were no trees and very few plants, other than mosses and seaweeds. Accommodation was often in adapted whaling stations which are modular structures now. Living on Bird Island were large populations of Southern Fur and Elephant seals, Grey-headed Albatrosses and many species of penguins. On Sydney Island, the sea ice came into the harbour and supplies had to be sledged to the research stations. They shared the island with the 'Stinkers' - Giant Petrels that would squirt vile, smelly vomit at intruders. Just as smelly was the removal of all human waste on departure! On Adelaide Island, the jetty has been enlarged to accommodate the Sir David Attenborough Research Ship, and the jetty now intrudes on to the air strip! There are dry valleys on Ross Island where violent winds have blown the snow away. He showed us wonderful pictures of the Aurora Australis and Parhelion lights.

Following his retirement Bill enjoyed working as a tour guide, on the increasingly popular expedition tours to some of the Antarctic areas that he knows and loves so much. It was a superbly enjoyable lecture.

Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebration

Our WI held a very popular tombola stall at the celebration on the Sunday of the Jubilee weekend, helping to raise funds for Ukraine. Great fun was had by all as prizes were won thick and fast. Thanks to everyone who had a go. Despite the drizzly weather, there was lovely community spirit and we were very pleased to take part.

Platinum Jubilee Picnic

The Parish Council donated funds for expenses required to run the Jubilee Picnic on the Recreation Ground. Despite the damp weather, there was a great turnout and those who braved the drizzle enjoyed the stalls, food, drink and displays, particularly the band *Stone Cold Stumble*, who found it hard to get away. A succession of Councillors staffed a table where a map of Council owned properties and land was a useful conversation starter, with many people now aware of where the Landing Ground is. The Council, on behalf of the whole village, are grateful for all the volunteers and particularly to Paul Knighton for the hard work (and worry) that went into organising what was a successful and unforgettable event.

Jubilee Bench

The Council purchased a commemorative bench for the Platinum Jubilee which has now been delivered but sadly too late for the actual day. However, a spot in the QEII field has been chosen and the bench will soon be installed ready for use by parents and walkers in need of a celebratory sit down.

Meadow Road Site Name

The Council have a field on Meadow Road, which has been partly planted with trees and partly left as wild meadow. It is suitable for dogs and walks but currently lacks a memorable name. There was a suggestion box for a suitable name on the Council stall at the Jubilee Picnic and we are now extending the invitation to readers of the *Willingham News* – please submit your suggestions to the Parish Council office at the email address below.

Tennis and Netball Courts

As has already been reported, the project originally intended to provide a Multi-Use Games Area will now have a different flood-proof surface and therefore will no longer be usable as an all-season football pitch. This may still be addressed in the future as a separate facility. The planning application for the new courts has stalled because the planning officers requested a biodiversity report, and it has been difficult to find somebody suitable. We have now appointed an ecologist, and when that report is in, we will be resubmitting the application.

Annual Audit

At the end of May the Council completed the required audit and the auditor found that all the relevant paperwork, policies and finance documentation were in place as required. Thanks are due once again to our capable, diligent and competent office staff and Finance Officer who keep everything running smoothly and efficiently.

Minor Highways Improvement (MHI) Scheme

As we had hoped, the bid we made for speed reduction and road safety improvements to the 30mph section of the High Street has been accepted. The approved scheme has new speed roundels and dragon's teeth road markings, along with raised central islands with hatching, in three locations and additional SLOW and warning signs with 'Reduce speed now' sub-plates. The County Council are still working on last year's MHI schemes, so we have yet to hear of an anticipated date for the installation of these arrangements. We do not expect it to happen until 2023.

could people make that COVID-19 app? From typing an E-mail to making your favourite video game, you are coding.

Even this magazine you are reading right now needed coding to make it and lay it out! The article you are reading now is all about the future of coding – but I just want to warn you there is a big quiz at the end so don't drift off... do not even snore!

There will be many ways of coding in the future, like artificial intelligence (AI) and quantum computing. AI is when a computer can reason for itself. It normally learns from what humans do, but it means it can learn to do stuff itself, like composing music or driving cars. Alexa is an example of an AI because if you ask it 'What is the weather like in Willingham?', it reasons that you are asking about today's weather (not tomorrow's or yesterday's), and that you mean in Willingham UK, not Willingham Georgia, USA!

Quantum computing is where a computer doesn't use binary (just 0s and 1s), instead it uses something called 'entanglement'. This means it can solve totally different types of problems very quickly. So if you lost your PIN code it could do a program that makes lots and lots of guesses very quickly and could guess your PIN code. (I don't know any Python commands that can do that!)

Thought for the Month

In the last few months, we've had one or two delightfully positive events – key amongst them the Jubilee celebrations, but also quite a number of things going wrong: war in Ukraine, soaring inflation, threat of food shortages and heating and fuel prices heading towards unaffordable for many.

I was struck recently by the possible different responses to such challenges. A common response is 'Why? Why has it happened? Who is to blame?' Understandable, but unfortunately it doesn't solve the problem. It was recently pointed out to me that in the New Testament several calamities are recorded: the collapse of a tower which crushed people in Siloam; vindictive reprisals by the local governor; a food shortage causing a famine. In each case, Jesus or the Apostle Paul did not respond by asking 'Why?' but 'What?' Their question was what shall we do about it? How shall we help?

There is a time and place for asking why and learning lessons so future tragedy can be avoided, but I suggest that for the most part that is the job of experts who carry on their work behind the scenes, rather than for we the general public and the press. I rather fear a lot of people are going to need help of various sorts before the end of the year.

Busy Service

Willingham Surgery is currently dealing with nearly 2,000 inbound calls every week. We are also issuing around 1,500 prescriptions and seeing approximately 1,000 patients every week. Every month we refer around 350 patients to secondary care and other community specialists. The surge in demand for the GP is a direct result of the Covid backlog in secondary care and community services.

This pressure is evident across the whole of the NHS and is not unique to Willingham. We are working hard to reduce phone queues and waiting times for routine appointments and ask for patience and understanding at this difficult time. The practice has expanded in line with the growing population in Northstowe and evidence of this has been provided to the Parish Council and the Patient Participation Group. Further information sessions for residents are planned for later in the summer and details will be provided in due course.

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A Nazi Spy in Willingham

On 17 September 1940, Wulf Schmidt, code name Leonhard, jumped from a Luftwaffe Heinkel aircraft in the skies above Willingham to start his crucial mission in England, part of Operation Lena on behalf of the German intelligence service.

The United Kingdom stood alone; Britain's army was in tatters with most of its equipment left on the beaches of Dunkirk. France, our main ally against Nazi oppression, surrendered and had accepted German occupation only a few months previously. The United States was refusing to give any assistance. With an election coming up President Roosevelt, although sympathetic, wanted to keep the US out of the European war. While the USSR at this point was actually benefiting from its treaty with the Nazis by sharing in the occupation of Poland. The American Ambassador and father of the future President Kennedy believed that it was inevitable that the British Empire would fall under Nazi control.

It was a very perilous time for Britain as Wulf Dietrich Christian Schmidt floated down to the Cambridgeshire countryside. However, his mission started to go wrong as soon as he bade farewell to the pilots, Leutnant Wolfgang Nabel and Hauptmann Karl Gartenfield. As Unteroffizier Achtelik assisted him from the aircraft at 11,500 feet, Wulf hit a strut on the aircraft injuring his hand and breaking his watch - but things were only to get much, much worse!

Wulf's parachute training was in the form of hints and tips that he had picked up in the days leading up to his first and only operational flight, while the Germans waited for favourable weather conditions. So, not only did Wulf find himself heading towards a searchlight, part of the defences for RAF Oakington (now within the Northstowe development), but he was unable to control the parachute when the wind took hold of him in the last 70 feet. Wulf was suddenly entangled in telephone lines that he then dragged down to the ground with him, landing very hard some 100 yards away from the personnel manning the searchlight near Belsar's Hill (a future WHIGs topic).

About five minutes after he landed Wulf heard air raid sirens coming from Willingham. Still in agony from spraining his right ankle with his clumsy landing, he was surprised that he wasn't immediately arrested by the military personnel just a stone's throw away. Maybe luck was on his side after all?

The next morning Wulf hid his equipment in the fields around Priest Lane. The parachute was hidden in a haystack while his harness, overalls and flying helmet were covered in a ditch. He found a home for the radio equipment under a hedge and covered it with long grass. Everything else that he needed to dispose of ended up in another haystack as Wulf found the ground was far too hard to dig with a sprained ankle.

After this, Wulf headed down Priest Lane towards Willingham in search of some breakfast, aspirin and a new watch. He bought a new Ingersoll watch in a Barber's Shop (now MAC Hair Studio) and aspirin from a Chemist in Church Street. Then Wulf hobbled his way to Mrs Fields' newsagent (this could now very well be the One Stop but there were two newsagents in Church Street in 1940) where he bought a copy of *The Times* and then limped back to the water pump on The Green to wash his swollen ankle. Next, he had breakfast in a local cafe (many people opened their homes at this time as cafes and so the WHIGs have drawn a blank on where this was, but if you know where Wulf had breakfast, where the chemist was or which newsagent belonged to Mrs Fields then please get in touch at whigsinquire@gmail.com). Wulf's English, which he had learned while working on a plantation in Cameroon, was good but with a distinct accent and since he had appeared in a rural area only to wash his feet with the village pump, he did arouse some suspicion amongst the locals.

So, at around 10 am Wulf was stopped by a villager on his way back to his equipment and asked for his identification. Tom Cousins of the Home Guard was then dispatched to find Wulf. Having found him asleep in a field off Priest Lane, he took charge of Wulf and marched him to his headquarters in the Three Tuns Pub (now the Royal Bengal). There, Wulf was interrogated by Lieutenant Colonel Langton of the 1st Cambridgeshire Battalion of the Home Guard. With suspicions clearly aroused, the County Police in Cambridgeshire were contacted and Wulf left Willingham for a cell in Cambridge just over 12 hours after he had landed. MI5 were then contacted only to discover that they had been waiting for the arrival of a certain Wulf Schmidt and were only too happy to pop out to Cambridge to collect him.

Wulf then went on to be one of the most influential and longest serving double agents during World War Two, assisting the Allies right up to the final days of the war.

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South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) Councillors' Report

Support for Ukraine Refugees

The most recent data shows that 323 Ukrainian guests have now been welcomed to South Cambridgeshire involving 54 parishes. Supporting the government's Homes for Ukraine Scheme, SCDC Officers have already made over 80 welfare visits and more than 400 DBS checks.

Increased Financial Support

The Government scheme provides £200 per guest as a one-off payment to help with essential costs but gives flexibility to local authorities to decide if additional support is needed. In practice, hosts and guests in South Cambridgeshire have found that this money is insufficient to meet the guests' needs between their arrival and when longer-term financial arrangements are in place. SCDC has therefore decided to increase the initial payment from £200 to £350 per guest. This is payable to all guests, including those who have already received the first payment. More information can be found here – www.tinyurl. com/5323xj5j or by emailing ukrainepayments@scambs.gov.uk.

Bike Scheme

Free, good quality second-hand bicycles are being made available to guests as part of a collaboration between SCDC and two local charities OWL Bikes and Camtrust. Helmets and locks are also being supplied free of charge and the Council will also be providing guests with details of a free Bikeability cycle training course, which will include translation. Once a guest applies for a bike and the Council confirms that they are eligible, they will be put in touch with the supplier nearest to them so that they can arrange to collect their bicycle. Further information can be obtained here – duty.communities@scambs.gov.uk.

Free Bus Tickets

A county-wide scheme has been agreed that will see guests provided with 10 free bus tickets. Each ticket will allow unlimited journeys within Cambridgeshire for one day and are not time limited. Arrangements with Stagecoach are yet to be finalised but once the scheme is ready, SCDC will contact hosts with details. All guests will qualify and those who arrived before the scheme launched will still be provided with this support. The tickets are being provided to Cambridgeshire Councils at a discounted rate by Stagecoach, who are keen to support guests, and we are grateful for their support.

Help with the English Language

English language tuition is available for guests from Cambridge Regional College (CRC), Workers' Educational Association and Cambridgeshire Skills. CamRuSS is offering further support for Ukrainian guests and hosts, see <u>www.tinyurl.com/yuu6tn3y</u> for details. CRC are offering a range of post-16 and adult education programmes from September onwards which includes English language tuition, see <u>www.tinyurl.com/2p82bktf</u> for details.

Cambridgeshire County Councillor's Message

Household Support Grant

In March the Government announced the extension of this scheme, which initially ran between November and March, awarding Cambridgeshire an additional £3.58 million to support children, families and pensioners struggling to pay for essential items including food and utility bills.

Government guidance for this round is slightly different, so as a result, the County Council will be offering the following schemes using the funding:

- £1.96m for the provision of food vouchers with a value of £15 per child per week, including the upcoming summer holidays.
 Schools and childcare settings, including childminders, will be contacted directly and eligible parents will be notified.
- £1.2m to support households that include a person who has reached state pension age (66) by 30 September and are experiencing financial hardship in line with the requirements of the scheme.
- A boost for other services supporting those most in need

The Council is partnering with Age UK to provide financial support for those of state pension age who are in financial need. Anyone not sure if they are eligible for support can take a look at the Household Support Fund pages on the County website – www.tinyurl.com/2dut8y5h – to see what funding is available and how to access help.

New Road Classification

This is a new road classification for Cambridge that will determine how different means of transport, whether motorised or active, can access the roads. There are six proposed classifications and views are invited on the overall approach and the proposed classifications. The consultation document (available at <u>www.</u> <u>tinyurl.com/bdcr3rnj</u>) contains sections on traffic displacement, city centre bus routes, pedestrian and cycling priority, taxis, city centre deliveries, vehicle and user exemptions and road safety. The closing date for the consultation is **Monday 18 July** at midday.

Local Transport and Connectivity Plan

This is the Combined Authority's long-term strategy to improve transport and reflect various developments and new policies relating to decarbonisation of transport, long-term changes in travel patterns, new active travel policies, etc. All future transport projects will be guided by the plan. The draft plan is available at <u>www.tinyurl.com/mh43anh2</u>. Various in-person consultation events are taking place across the region including the Grafton Centre on **6 July**. Residents may wish to make comments regarding the importance of public transportation connectivity to villages and improved linkages to key infrastructure via buses and active travel (Guided busway, Cambridge North, etc.).
