Water Works in Willingham

Residents of several streets in the village have received letters from Cambridge Water warning of works starting late July running until mid-December to replace water mains in these areas. Works are starting around Berrycroft and adjoining estates before moving towards the Over Road. It is expected that there will be some traffic disruption over the period with temporary lights controlling the traffic in affected areas.

Esther Overton – Author

Meet the local 13-year-old who wrote and published a book based on the real-life history of Willingham.

At a loose end during lockdown, Esther Overton decided to find out more about her local area.

What she discovered inspired her to write and publish a book telling the story of a family of children who had grown up on her street – and to give the proceeds to an incredible cause.

For Esther, books and stories have always been an important part of life. So when lockdown struck and she found herself bored at home, she decided to





see if any interesting real-life stories had happened in her local area's history.

She was excited to discover that her namesake, Esther Thoday, also lived on Berrycroft during the 19th century, and had six children. The family's story – which involved the tragic death of one of the six siblings – reminded Esther of *Little Women*, one of her favourite books. She decided to write her own book inspired by the story of the family, whose successful fruit and flower business changed the lives of many who lived in the village. Esther describes it as 'a story of growing up – it's about finding your foundations and discovering what's important.' The resulting book, *What Binds Us*, is now published and available on Amazon.

While writing her book, Esther became aware of another story, about Kumar, who was just seven years old when he became trapped in slavery in a brick kiln in South Asia. Esther had heard Kumar's story at a local festival, where Alianore Smith of International Justice Mission (IJM) was speaking, and she was shocked to learn that an estimated one in four of the 40 million people living in slavery today is a child – just like Kumar. IJM, in partnership with local authorities, learned of Kumar's situation and brought him and the other exploited workers to safety. Today, he is a successful graduate and qualified social worker, working to protect others who have experienced slavery.

Esther was so moved by Kumar's story that she decided to donate the proceeds from her book to IJM, to help find and bring to safety even more children like Kumar. She wants to raise awareness of the fact that 'slavery still exists today. There are more people in slavery today than any time in history – and it happens to children too.'

Memories of Willingham 50 Years Ago – Part Two

This article is a continuation of a piece that Anne wrote in the May edition of Willingham News about her memories of the village in the late 1960s when she first arrived. This part is about the amenities in the village at that time.

Although the village was smaller 50 years ago, it had more shops than it has now. Among these was the Co-op, but there were four other grocers as well and two butchers right in the village. The bakery at the corner of Church Lane still produced bread on the premises. There were two newsagents, two banks and two hardware stores, which also stocked agricultural supplies. Fewer people had cars but petrol was available at several locations including the Berrycroft Stores. The village also had its own dairy, delivering milk daily. Although there was nowhere to buy clothes a van came round, I think from Sutton, with basic men's and boys' clothing.

As well as the Parish Church, villagers could attend the Baptist Tabernacle, a very large building on the site of the present modern Baptist Church. The Old Baptist Church was directly opposite the Tabernacle, the Methodists were located in the building next to the library (now a private house) and the Salvation Army had a relatively humble building on Long Lane.

Although five pubs flourished there were fewer venues for socialising than we have now. The Public Hall in High Street, where dances and film shows had been held in the past, was by then very run down and events and meetings generally took place in either the Church Hall next to Willingham House or the Social Club which was not the well-equipped building we know today. The flourishing WI met monthly in the Church Hall. There was no Pavilion on the Recreation Ground, although the village had both football and cricket teams. Another regular event was the Friday auction at Raymond Munns where local people would take an hour off work to socialise.

Willingham Feast is still observed in October but it was a much grander occasion then. Large Salvation Army bands would visit from as far away as Kent and were billeted for the weekend with local families. They played in various locations but most people turned out to hear them on the Green on Sunday afternoon. While they were playing, the caravans and lorries of the Fair arrived and waited in Church Street to set up their attractions as soon as the service was over.

The Surgery was located in a small bungalow on Station Road, and we even had a dental practice in the village. There was as yet no library, although the present building, which had been a gas showroom since gas was first installed in the village, opened in the early 1970s. However books were available from the County Library through the school where a selection was laid out on a table in the staffroom, I think on Friday afternoons.

There was a resident policeman in Haden Way but there seemed to be little crime for him to deal with. Back doors were used more often than front doors and were usually left unlocked, as were cars.

Importantly the village had its own old people's home in Willingham House itself, and they also provided very superior meals for 20 villagers by arrangement with the Cambridge Meals on Wheels service. I always felt that I would like to end my days there.

Local Transport and Connectivity Plan – Have Your Say Before 4 August

There is a new and important survey from the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority on long-term transport strategy. Get more information and a short survey form at <u>www.yourltcp.co.uk</u>. It will guide all future transport projects in the region. For South Cambridgeshire it draws on the work already done by the Greater Cambridge Partnership on a proposed new bus network and on cycleways that the Parish Council and residents commented on last year. The Parish Council was highly critical (see January's *Willingham News*).

It is really important that Willingham residents once again put their views, even if only in the general comments box – questions 8 and 9. They will be read. The Parish Council's priorities are a better public transport link to the Guided Busway – either a frequent shuttle service or some buses leaving the busway – and a bus to Cottenham. We also need more cycleways, especially to Cottenham but also to Over and Earith, and improvements to the narrow and dangerous shared use one to Longstanton. See the Parish Council website for more information.

Flower Tubs

This summer the Parish Council has organised planting of the flower tubs around the village that were supplied last year by WAG with a community chest grant. The theme is red, white and blue in recognition of the Jubilee. Most of the plants were obtained from Hayden's Nursery in Mill Road at a discount, for which we are very grateful. Next year we hope to arrange some sponsorship. The Council is again indebted to our volunteer waterers without whom this would not be possible – Sue Shimmens, Paul and Carolyn Knighton, the Scouts and the Parish Clerk.

Wolves Football Festival

Over two weekends in June, the Parish Council was able to host the 'Football Festival' on the Recreation Ground, which was organised by Willingham Wolves. It was the second largest such festival in East Anglia and a huge success. It also hosted the largest girl's tournament in the county. 272 teams participated involving 2,228 players between the ages of 6 and 15. There were an estimated 1,500 spectators. This event really put Willingham on the football map.

Fen Gallop and Primary School Summer Fete

The very popular 'Fen Gallop' involved around 400 runners in a10K and 4-mile chip-timed run on 2 July. The Primary

School Summer Fete took place later on that day.

These two events along with the football festival depended on the huge amount of work put in by teams of volunteers. It is very encouraging to see the Recreation Ground being so well used.

Community Warden Scheme, Willingham and Over

Joanne Twinn of 'Age UK' is the Community Warden for Willingham and Over. Currently there are four people using this valuable service in Willingham. The work carried out is varied but tailored to the needs of the individuals concerned.

Hot Weather

Most of us welcome hot weather, but when it's too hot for too long, there are health risks. In England there are on average 2,000 heat-related deaths every year. When hot weather hits this summer, make sure it doesn't harm you or anyone you know.

Why is a Heatwave a Problem?

The main risks posed by a heatwave are:

- not drinking enough water (dehydration)
- overheating, which can make symptoms worse for people who already have problems with their heart or breathing
- heat exhaustion and heatstroke

Who is Most at Risk?

A heatwave can affect anyone, but the most vulnerable people are:

- older people especially those over 75
- those who live on their own or in a care home
- people who have a serious or long term illness including heart or lung conditions, diabetes, kidney disease, Parkinson's disease or some mental health conditions
- those who may find it hard to keep cool babies and the very young, the bed bound, those with drug or alcohol addictions or with Alzheimer's disease
- people who spend a lot of time outside or in hot places those who live in a top floor flat, the homeless or those whose jobs are outside

The Top Ways for Staying Safe When the Heat Arrives

- look out for others, especially older people, young children and babies and those with underlying health conditions
- close curtains on rooms that face the sun to keep indoor spaces cooler and remember it may be cooler outdoors than indoors
- drink plenty of water as sugary, alcoholic and caffeinated drinks can make you more dehydrated
- never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle, especially infants, young children or animals
- try to keep out of the sun between 11 am to 3 pm
- take care and follow local safety advice, if you are going into the water to cool down
- walk in the shade, apply sunscreen and wear a hat, if you have to go out in the heat
- avoid physical exertion in the hottest parts of the day
- wear light, loose fitting cotton clothes
- make sure you take water with you if you are travelling.

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District Councillors' Report

Update on Ukraine Refugees

The most recent data shows that 508 Ukrainian guests have now arrived in South Cambridgeshire involving 67 parishes and our district continues to host the most Ukrainian visitors in England. SCDC Officers have now made 158 welfare visits and conducted 451 DBS checks. People who are hosts to Ukrainian guests and/or have interest in SCDC's ongoing work in this area can sign up to the regular community updates by emailing duty. communities@scambs.gov.uk.

A new SCDC administered grant scheme is now available, designed to help Ukrainian families to integrate into community life. Grants of up to £300 are available to encourage a wide range of events to help reduce social isolation and encourage guests to feel involved in their local community and life in Britain. Parish councils, community groups, informal groups or individual hosts can apply. Further information and funding bid support is available from Cambridge Council for Voluntary Service 01223 464696 or enquiries@cambridgecvs.org.uk.

Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment (PNA) Survey

The Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Health and Wellbeing Board (HWB) is currently running a survey for residents' thoughts about pharmaceutical services. The PNA survey asks what is important to you, how easy it is to get and use medicines or equipment and whether there are other services you need or want. New Electric Bin Lorry

The Greater Cambridge Shared Waste Service has just taken delivery of its second fully electric bin lorry. The E-Rotopress has an unusual shape, with a constantly revolving body that contains a corkscrew which compacts the waste and has far fewer moving parts than a traditional bin lorry. The power saved by this mechanism means the machine can travel longer distances. The truck has a top speed of 56 miles per hour and can carry up to 12 tonnes of waste.

Census 2021 Results

The first results from the 2021 Census have just been published. These include population and household estimates for England and Wales at local authority level. Figures for the South Cambridgeshire District show that our population has increased in the last 10 years by 8.9%, from around 148,800 to 162,000. The Census also reveals that the population of Cambridge has increased from 123,900 to 145,700 (an increase of 17.6%) since 2011. The East of England has seen the largest growth in population of any region in England, rising to 6.3 million people, an 8.3% increase from 2011. County Councillor's Report

Dear Residents

I hope that you are all enjoying the summer; if you're going away on holiday I hope that you have a great break. Here is my update of County Council matters.

Decentralisation

The Council's Strategy and Resources Committee has agreed the policy framework and design principles for its programme of decentralisation and has approved the next steps and pilot approach to put it into place. The principles are that

- 1. A greater proportion of the Council's resource (workforce and budget) will be invested through decentralised approaches and structures.
- 2. We will involve communities in our decision-making, design and activity.
- 3. We will deepen relationships with voluntary and community sector organisations, District, Parish and Town Councils, other public sector partners, and community groups, working together through our democratic roles and most suitable governance structures to deliver the best outcomes for communities.
- 4. Social, economic and environmental impacts will be given equal consideration in our decision-making processes.
- 5. Our local presence should seek to be navigators and reference points for all local public services. Opportunities to apply this approach should be pursued by the Council's land and property functions.

A number of opportunities for pilots are being considered including, for example, decision-making on Local Highway Improvement (LHI) schemes.

Highways

The latest quarterly meeting of the Parishes with the Highways maintenance team took place on 23 June. The key issue raised was the need to address the overgrown cycle paths (Cottenham-Rampton) and (Cottenham-Histon) and on Earith Road.

The first spending from the Council's new Just Transition fund has been agreed:

- £2.175m over four years has also been awarded for a business case for the first phase of the Council's plan for Cambridgeshire to reach net zero carbon by 2045.
- £1.7m has also been awarded for flood work and nature restoration. I have submitted suggestions for highway flooding hotspots from all three villages in the division to be considered as part of this scheme.

Waterbeach Waste Facility

Preparations are happening at the Amey waste park at Waterbeach in advance of major works to reduce odour emissions. The works will allow district councils to continue to deliver collected waste to Waterbeach for transfer to alternative processing sites and to landfill from August while the odour emission works are done. These are necessary to comply with new legal requirements.

Updated operating procedures for the transfer station use have been submitted to the Environment Agency for their approval. A planning application has been submitted to the Council's Minerals and Waste Planning team seeking approval for the works proposed.
