Willingham Feast – The Arrangements So Far

With various organisations coming together to kindly provide events, the Feast is now scheduled to go ahead in the period from 23 September through to the weekend of 7/8/9 October.

It will kick off with the Social Club's Beer Festival on 23/24 September (and possibly the afternoon of the 25 September if there is any beer left over!). The Social Club has also organised Custard Comedy night for Friday 7 October. From 25 September, the Funfair will be in town, opening on Thursday 29 September and closing on Sunday 2 October (no later than 6 pm). Let's hope they get some decent weather!

There will be an Art Exhibition in the library by the Octagon Art Group on Saturday 8 October, 2 30 – 5 pm and Sunday 9 October, 11 am – 3 30 pm. Also in the library will be various fun quizzes for both adults and children offered by Friends of Willingham Library, who will also be running a Secondhand Book Stall in the marguee situated on the Green opposite.

With the recent disruption in Berrycroft for utilities, I thought it would be interesting to look back to when the main drains were first installed. This picture, from 1965, is taken where Rumbles Fish and Chip Shop now stands and shows the previous shop with its proprietor, Mr Bester. As can be seen, there is a massive trench made for the new drainage system. Prior to this people had to dispose of their waste in cesspits or as best they could. It was a massive construction project affecting every part of the village and compounded on Berrycroft by an underground stream which had to be pumped out constantly while digging. The huge pump is visible in the photo.

Nevertheless, persevering, green-fingered enthusiasts in the village have been growing and harvesting a bounty of beans, beetroots, gooseberries and rhubarb. Other local gardeners have been working on projects ranging from a new pond to a wildflower garden.

In August, the club was treated to a tour of Hygate Flower Farm. Lindsey Clark, the owner, gave a wonderful talk describing the development of the farm from its inception just a few years ago. The farm has overcome challenges, from floods to soaring temperatures, and has yielded a fantastic range of beautiful flowers as a result of Lindsey and family's continuous hard work and dedication. Lindsey often has flowers to buy on a first come, first served basis at the entrance to the farm on West Fen, just past the Recreation Ground.

Summer Trip

There was no meeting In August as usual, but a group of members met up for lunch and a Seasonal Highlights tour of Cambridge's Botanic Garden. As well as looking at the beautiful plants in the many diverse areas of the gardens, we learned about John Henslow, Professor of Botany at Cambridge University, 1825 - 1861. He moved the garden to its current site from the centre of town and designed it to host an amazing tree collection. He was particularly interested in studying the difference environment makes to the growth of plant and tree species. For example, a pine tree grown in a snowy region is thin and compact with small leaves. The same species growing in a warmer climate spreads out widthways with longer branches and larger leaves. Professor Henslow was originally asked to join the crew of HMS Beagle as Ship's Naturalist and, not wanting to, suggested his protegé, Charles Darwin take his place. What a momentous decision!

As autumn draws on why not consider giving WI a go? We're not all about 'Jam and Jerusalem' any more! Book Review from the Library Book Group

Humankind: A Hopeful History by Rutger Bregman

This is definitely a book with a message. It's that humans have evolved to be co-operative, so that most people are, deep down, pretty decent. Recent research on human evolution emphasises the uniquely high level of cooperation in our species, and Rutger Bregman illustrates this hopeful view of human nature with vivid examples of real-life co-operation and empathy. Using these examples, he vigorously attacks the older, incorrect idea that natural selection cannot account for the degree of co-operation and altruism shown by humans. His examples include the 'Blitz Spirit' (which surfaced also in bombed German towns and cities), and other crisis situations such as the sinking of the Titanic, the Twin Tower attacks and Hurricane Katrina, where helpfulness was more in evidence than panic, in spite of myths to the contrary. Bregman also debunks well-known experiments such as Zimbardo's 1971 'prison', where ordinary people apparently mistreated others when they had the power. Later investigations have shown that the experimenters manipulated their subjects into providing dramatic results. Even nine month old babies prefer puppets which are helpful to each other over puppets which are mean, further evidence that our impulse to co-operate is not just a veneer of civilisation.

Reactions to *Humankind* in our reading group ranged from awarding it eight points out of ten to finding it unreadable. Several people felt that the succession of anecdotes failed to add up to a coherent argument. The message is a hopeful one, but not entirely clear in presentation.

Footpath to the Community Orchard

Hopefully by September the new footpath to the Community Orchard, plus the accompanying speed reduction measures, will be complete. This is the culmination of a lot of work by the Parish Council that goes back to 2019 with our successful bid for an A14 legacy grant for the footpath. Unfortunately, there were numerous delays while the complex specification was agreed and additional funding put in place. Following further discussions between the Parish Council and Highways, the scheme was extended to include the narrowing of Earith Road to 6.2 metres for the 80 metres of that new footpath, the 30 mph signs being repositioned to the other side of the Orchard entrance and an additional 40 mph buffer zone added with new enhanced road markings. Not only will the Orchard now be more accessible to residents, but there should be a reduction in speeding.

The Parish Council has regular quarterly meetings with the County Council regarding local Highways' areas of concern. Hopefully next month the hedges and trees can be cut back so they do not obstruct pedestrians or block the view of drivers or signage, which is an item regularly raised by our village road and pavement users.

Electric Cars and Local Charging Points

The Parish Council has been investigating the feasibility of placing electric car charging points in the village to serve those who have electric cars, especially those who cannot easily charge their vehicles outside their properties. The Ploughman Hall car park is the best site for these, however since charging points are still evolving and would be costly for the parish, the Council would now like to have feedback from parishioners as to their interest and possible usage. If you would make use of these charging points were they to be put in place, please email our Clerk.

Public Hall: Its Future

We have an amazingly successful and growing Scout Group in the village and lately, this group has been the only regular, frequent user of the Public Hall. However, the Scouts too are now finding the Hall no longer fit for purpose. Although the Parish Council has managed the property, installing new doors, heating, disabled toilet facilities and so on, the building continues to need Parish money spent on its upkeep. The Hall was bequeathed to Willingham parishioners with the Parish Council as custodian back in 1896 and it is the parishioners who now have to decide how we all move forward. The Parish Council will therefore be arranging a public meeting to gather opinions and ask parishioners if they feel the Hall should now be sold and a more useful alternative facility be built elsewhere.

LEAP: Local Energy Assistance Partnership Programme

The Council would again like to make parishioners aware of this free programme specifically set up to assist those most vulnerable to, at risk of, or already in fuel poverty. There are excellent energy advisors on hand who can give advice via telephone or home visit to both tenants and private residents in South Cambridgeshire. An Update from Fen Drayton Lakes

As we start to head towards Autumn, another breeding season on the reserve is coming to an end. As in previous years, this one has had mixed success with some species doing well and others sadly not doing so well.

We were optimistic that bittern would once again be present in the reedbeds on Elney and Holywell Lakes this year. As it turned out we had more bittern than anticipated with three territorial males calling on the lakes in the Spring. This is our highest ever count and it would have been unthinkable just 20 years ago when there were fewer than 50 in the whole of the UK.

In past years it has been very difficult to get accurate counts of nesting black-headed gull and common tern on our islands due to overgrowing vegetation inhibiting views. This year, with the aid of our drone, we have been able to get much more accurate counts for the first time and it seems that all the work we carried out in winter with the new floating fence on Ferry Mere, as well as the contractor work to reprofile the same island back in September 2021, has paid off with black-headed gull numbers reaching around 600 pairs on the island in May. This represents a significant increase compared to previous years but may be in part due to a large decrease in the number of gulls on the Moore Lake islands.

In May, four avocet were seen moving between Ferry and Moore Lakes. It isn't unusual for avocets to drop into the reserve in the Spring as they head to breeding sites, and they have been seen mating in previous years before moving on. This year however was different, as it didn't take long before two nests appeared on one of the islands on Moore Lake. This represents the first breeding attempt by this species since 2013. In total six chicks hatched, but this was bittersweet as, mirroring what happened last time, none of them managed to fledge. Hopefully they will return next year, maybe nesting on Ferry instead, where the high number of black-headed gulls will offer more protection to the chicks.

With our kilometres of dense hawthorn hedgerow,

ample supply of fresh water, and bare ground for feeding, we are host to a probable six turtle dove territories this year, at least two of which have a likely female in attendance. With luck we will see fledged young soon perched up somewhere on site before they head off on their treacherous migration back to Africa.

As Autumn and Winter progress over the next few months, we will be busy carrying out habitat management work around the reserve to get it into the best possible condition for the 2023 breeding season.

South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) – Councillors' Report

South Cambridgeshire Markets Toolkit and Directory

As part of SCDC's Business Plan commitment to grow local businesses and economies, the Business Key Projects Team has been working with local traders, communities and businesses to help establish and expand local markets within the district. A Market Toolkit guide now exists for anyone who is considering starting a market in their village and the online Trader Directory is designed to list the talented marketeers across the district, see <u>www.scambs.gov.uk/business/south-cambridgeshire-markets/market-toolkit</u>. Northstowe News

The Full Council of SCDC recently approved the allocation of almost £15 million of funding to enable the building of the Community Buildings at Northstowe. All of the necessary preparatory work for the Phase 1 Pavilion has been done and building work should begin in the next few months.

You may be aware that there has been press coverage and social media traffic recently related to concerns about the lowering of water levels in ponds and watercourses locally and the reasons for it. SCDC plans to hold a special meeting to cover this issue in the near future and a representative from the responsible authority, the Environment Agency, will be invited to answer residents' questions. SCDC has recently set up a FAQ page on the de-watering, which is well worth a read: <u>www.scambs.gov.uk/community-</u> <u>safety-and-health/northstowe/northstowe-groundwater-</u> <u>investigations</u>.

GP Waiting Times

At a recent forum in Northstowe, the practice managers of Willingham's GP surgery gave an excellent presentation on patient numbers and waiting times. They showed that longer waiting times for appointments is caused by a national shortage of GPs and nurses and the residual effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. They explained, with data, that dealing with the increasing population of Northstowe was planned for and is not impinging on their surgeries at either Willingham or Longstanton or in other local surgeries. Until the Northstowe Civic Hub is delivered in Phase 2 of construction, they intend and expect their GP numbers and ancillary staff to increase as the town grows. The Surgery will be repeating the talk to the public in October in the Ploughman Hall, and we would recommend you attend. We will give details and a reminder nearer the date, as will the Surgery.

Update on Ukraine Refugees

The most recent data shows that 594 Ukrainian guests have now arrived in South Cambridgeshire involving 69 parishes. People who are hosts to Ukrainian guests and/ or have interest in SCDC's ongoing work in this area can sign up to the regular community updates by emailing duty.communities@scambs.gov.uk. Initial responses to a survey of local hosts strongly indicates that many are planning to remain part of the 'Homes for Ukraine' programme. Further information can be found within the 'Looking Ahead' section on our Information for Homes for Ukraine hosts website: www.scambs.gov.uk/communitysafety-and-health/support-for-ukraine/informationfor-homes-for-ukraine-hosts. The monthly £350 host payment continues for a period of 12 months. Grants of up to £300 are offered for events and activities to help reduce social isolation and encourage families to feel involved in their local community and life in Britain. SCDC's free bike scheme is being expanded and more donations of bicycles are needed. TAG Bikes in Huntingdon is joining OWL bikes and Camtrust in the initiative. The scheme offers each guest a free, fully refurbished cycle, with helmets, locks and a 'Bikeability' cycle training course, which includes a translator. County Councillor's Report

Dear Residents,

By the time this is published the summer break will be heading to an end. If you took the chance to holiday, I hope you had an enjoyable time. Here is my update of County Council matters:-

Highways Maintenance Meeting

I reported last month on the most recent quarterly meeting, where the key issues were relating to the condition of cycle paths, including vegetation overgrowing. I am also awaiting an update on the programme for the painting of the white lines specifically around junctions in the village.

Civil Parking Enforcement

Surveys of existing parking restrictions in preparation for the introduction of Civil Parking Enforcement are underway.

Traffic Schemes – Northstowe Section 106

The delayed meetings with the Highways teams on possible schemes to calm and deter incremental Northstowe related traffic took place on Tuesday 2 August. A notional budget allocation has been made to each of Cottenham, Rampton and Willingham.

A10 – Ely to A14

The Highways and Transport Committee has accepted £4 million from the Government delivered through the Combined Authority, to develop plans for changes to the A10 from Ely to Milton. A County and District Councillor working group will be established to oversee this process. No decision has yet been made on whether the eventual proposal will include any element of dualling, or whether it will consist solely of junction improvements. The Government has stipulated that a lower cost option than dualling should be assessed, and that all modes of transport should be considered. The work will also need to integrate with Greater Cambridge Partnership schemes and with infrastructure for the large development at Waterbeach. Carbon impacts will also be considered.

Public consultation is expected in early 2023, followed by the selection of a preferred option, and a full preliminary design and environmental statement completed by the end of 2024.

Local Transport and Connectivity Plan

The Council is finalising its comments on the Combined Authority's draft Local Transport and Connectivity Plan. It has welcomed the general direction of the Plan, but wants

Local Highways Improvement (LHI) Updates

The LHI working group is continuing to meet to review every stage of the LHI process, and make recommendations to the Highways and Transport Committee.

20 mph Schemes

A working group is finalising criteria for assessment of 20 mph applications. It has already decided to remove the requirement that existing speeds in an application area should already be 24 mph or less. It is important that potential scheme concepts are progressed as there is sure to be a prioritisation process for the first cohort of schemes to be developed under this new budget.

Community Flood Groups

A new conference will aim to bring Cambridgeshire's Community Flood Groups together to share knowledge in combatting flooding. Cambridgeshire Flood Groups Conference Day will take place on **Thursday 22 September**. The conference, organised by Cambridgeshire County Council, will take place at The Club in Alconbury Enterprise Campus.
