Old Willingham



Here is a picture of the High Street taken in about 1920. The view today is not so different with the Public Hall dominating this part of the street as it has since Victorian times. There are a couple of things to note. First this was before pavements were installed and the muddy mess extends from one side to the other with just a couple of small gutters dug at the side of the 'road'. Second, while there is a telephone pole, there are no electricity poles. People still relied on candles or oil lamps and batteries for the radio if they had one. The third notable difference – bicycles but no cars! Just a few cart tracks in the mud.

Message from Team Rector Simon Gill

Dear all

It's been wonderful to be your Team Rector these last three years. The warm relations between the church and village have been great to experience. Unfortunately, I have to be honest with you all and say we are struggling financially.

The costs of running one of the oldest, most historic buildings in the village are significant and are proving beyond our means. Very roughly, it costs £50,000 a year to maintain the building, cover the day-to-day running costs and provide the clergy. Our regular income has fallen significantly short of this for several years. We have only kept going financially due to a one-off legacy in 2020 and by our friends at St Mary's Church in Over paying £10,000 of what we were due to pay in 2021. Our reserves are almost exhausted and without a similar windfall this year we will not be able to pay our bills next year.

Can you help please? Each year we hold a Gift Weekend, presenting the opportunity for us to express our thanks to God for his goodness to us by giving an extra gift to his work in the village. This year the weekend of **22 and 23 October** has been set aside for this – the Church will be open on those days with volunteers present if you would like to make a personal donation. You can give on those days, or indeed anytime this year before or after those dates, by various means including cash, cheques, bank transfer and standing orders. Also, as a charity we can obtain tax relief on your donation where appropriate.

If you feel that you would like to support the Church building but not the day-to-day running costs, then you can do that by directing your donation to our Fabric Fund.

This is a ring-fenced account that is kept strictly for the maintenance of the building and cannot be used for any other purpose.

I do appreciate that in current circumstances we are all feeling the pinch financially – any help you can give will be much appreciated.

Thought for the Month

As I write this it is two days after the death of Queen Elizabeth II and we are preparing for the Proclamation of the Accession of her son as King Charles III. This is a monumental change in all our lives, the like of which has not been seen here for 70 years.

In just a few days we saw a frail but smiling Queen welcoming the new Prime Minister, Liz Truss and inviting her to form a government and just 48 hours later we were shocked to hear she had died.

For many of us to experience a King rather than a Queen will be a completely new experience. We will need to get used to using the pronouns he/him instead of she/her; gradually our coins and paper money will need to change, and many ways of swearing allegiance will need to change in vocabulary. This will take time to work its way through and in between, especially leading worship in the Church, we will have to perform some mental gymnastics to keep up!

Our thoughts and prayers will be with the Royal Family as they mourn the loss of a much loved member of their family – a mother, grandmother and great grandmother. But the country has also lost an important moral compass, valued source of wisdom and lived experience. A new Prime Minister in their weekly audience with the Queen could have expected to receive wise counsel from someone who had seen several PMs and decades of political life, and was therefore well-qualified to share advice and experience.

As it is, albeit he has had such an extended apprenticeship, we have an inexperienced King and a new PM. How will they help each other to grow into their respective roles? Will they be able to advise each other and even give each other support?

This is something for the kind thoughts and prayers of us all as they both learn to shoulder the immense burdens they have to bear – one accepted as fate, the other by choice.

We pray their understanding of vocation underpins their actions for the good of our country and its diverse people.

Only time will tell, but it certainly leaves us with lots to think about!

Future of the Public Hall

Unusually, we are going to highlight just one issue this month, but it is an important one. The Public Hall on the High Street was given to the Parish in 1896 and since that time has been a venue for many village societies and activities. However today, it is only regularly used by the Scouts, Beavers and Cubs and they do not feel it is suitable for their future needs.

So, there is a building which is expensive to maintain and in need of significant improvement. The Lead Councillor for Halls has recommended that we sell it and use the proceeds to help provide a more modern facility for multi-use in a better location.

But it is your building. It was given to the residents. The Parish Council simply maintains it from the taxes you pay, so it is your decision what we do.

Selling Pros and Cons

The arguments for selling are:

- Even if empty, the building will cost over £2,000 per year to maintain
- If occupied, significant funds will be needed for repairs and improvements
- The interior layout is poor with no disabled access to the upper floor
- It is situated on a busy road with no car park
- It has very little outside space

The arguments against are:

- It has been there a long time and has historic interest
- The frontage is a distinctive feature in the High Street

The Decision is Yours

The Parish Council will be trying to gather as many views as possible to enable a decision to be made before the end of the year. OWLS Community Car Scheme – Important New Information

For over ten years the OWLS Community Car Scheme has provided an invaluable service to residents of Over, Willingham, Longstanton and Swavesey who are elderly or who have specific needs. In view of increased fuel costs the minimum charge (up to 10 miles) for a journey increased from £3 to £4 from September.

If a journey is over 10 miles any additional mileage will be at the previous rate of 30p a mile. So for example, a return journey of 15 miles will be £4 minimum charge (10 miles) plus five miles at 30p a mile making the journey £5.50 in total. Journeys are calculated as a return journey from the driver's home. This remains a very affordable service to the local community.

OWLS needs to urgently recruit more volunteer drivers to meet the demand for journeys. Drivers receive 45p a mile (the maximum HMRC allowance) and do not have to commit to any regular days/times although one journey a week would be appreciated. Most of OWLS journeys are for medical appointments but we also offer care home or hospital visiting, local shopping (same village) and occasional social activities, depending on the availability of drivers.

OWLS relies on local volunteers to keep this muchneeded and appreciated Community Service operating.

- Compost, compost, compost: use a three-bin system to give you different piles of compost in various stages of doneness.

- Create your own floral display by cutting a few small flowers from your garden and arrange in small, narrownecked vase.
- Grow a wide variety of vegetables and flowers to cope with climate change.
- Do not be discouraged, plants fail.

County Councillor's Report

Dear residents, here is my update of County Council matters.

Greater Cambridge Partnership – City Access Consultation

Plans from the GCP to consult on a package of measures to deliver significant improvements to public transport, reduce congestion in the city, and to help the environment through lower emissions have been published. These proposals follow the Partnership's 'Making Connections' consultation which concluded that the public was broadly supportive of improvements to the public transport network, as well as its aims to reduce pollution and congestion.

A £5 'Sustainable Travel Zone' (STZ) road user charge is being considered for private vehicles in the city. Various exemptions are proposed in the plans to mitigate the impact on some residents.

Along with the expanded bus services, the GCP plans indicate making buses cheaper. Flat fares have been proposed to be introduced; in Cambridge a ticket could cost £1 to travel in the city, with a ticket in the wider 'travel to work' area proposed to cost £2. This is intended to tilt incentives to use public transportation rather than the private car.

I strongly encourage Willingham residents to participate in this next step of the consultation. This is a very wide-ranging plan that will impact everyone living in the Parish; some positively, some negatively. It is important that the planned improvements to the bus services are carefully scrutinised along with the precise boundaries of the STZ.

Summary of the extracts from the key report on bus services relevant to Willingham are copied below. There has been some recognition of previous comments in the consultation but this is still work in progress:

Rural (as impacts Willingham) – summarised extract from WSP report (Technical Note Bus Proposition Design Summary), page 22

The proposed Bar Hill – Papworth Everard – Northstowe loop omits a number of villages currently served by local bus services, would be expensive to operate and will deprive Willingham, Over,

Swavesey, Fen Drayton and Fenstanton of existing direct links to Cambridge. Many routeings will be perceived as circuitous – Swavesey to Longstanton P&R via Over and Willingham is definitely 'the long way round'.

An alternative scenario would see a combination of core route extensions and Demand Responsive Transport. Citi6 could be further extended in two legs:

- Longstanton P&R to Swavesey, calling at Willingham and Over (hourly); and
- Longstanton P&R to Fenstanton, calling at Swavesey and Fen Drayton, with a possible further extension to Hemingford Grey and St Ives (hourly).

An alternative for Willingham, Over, Swavesey, Fen Drayton and Fenstanton might be a dedicated service to Cambridge joining the Busway at Northstowe.

Fens Reservoir Consultation to Launch in Autumn

Consultation on proposals for a new reservoir in the Fens will launch in autumn, when the water companies' preferred site will be announced. The project aims to provide significant additional resilience for public water supply, agriculture and the environment across Cambridgeshire, Norfolk, Suffolk and Essex. Visit tinyurl.com/mwkh7pw3.

Northstowe's 106 funding

Various options were discussed with the Council Highways Projects teams on traffic calming in Willingham, Rampton and Cottenham that could potentially be funded via Northstowe section 106 agreement. The schemes were considered to be feasible but some elements would potentially require incremental funding from the Parishes or be dealt with as subsequent Local Highways Improvements (LHI) bids.

Warm Hubs in Winter Project

Local authorities are responding to the cost of living crisis by helping communities to set up 'Warm Hubs'. These are places where people can spend part of their day and whilst doing so reduce their energy bills at home. Warm Hubs are to be run from publicly accessible community buildings. They will be run by volunteers, with support and training delivered by Cambridgeshire ACRE. Update on Ukraine Refugees

The most recent data shows that 668 Ukrainian guests have now arrived in South Cambridgeshire involving 69 parishes. Willingham has nine Ukrainian guests. SCDC Officers have now made 245 welfare visits and conducted 725 DBS checks. People who are hosts to Ukrainian guests and/or have an interest in SCDC's ongoing work in this area can sign up to the regular community updates by emailing duty.communities@scambs. gov.uk.

Reminder: SCDC Administered Grant Scheme

Reminder, an SCDC administered grant scheme is open which is designed to help Ukrainian families to integrate into community life. Grants of up to £300 are being offered to encourage a wide

range of events to help reduce social isolation and encourage families to feel involved in their local community and life in Britain. Funding bid support is available from Cambridge Council for Voluntary Service 01223 464696 or enquiries@cambridgecvs. org.uk.

Cost of Living Help

SCDC is releasing information to help residents cope with the rising cost of living. This month's South Cambridgeshire magazine has a two page pull-out containing useful information and the council's website signposts residents to the available support, such as with energy bills, raising residents' awareness of what they are entitled to (Universal Credit, help with childcare costs, Disability and Carers' Benefits and so on) and encouragement to claim entitlement focussed on Local Council tax support and Discretionary Housing payment. Support is also available from a partner, Cambridgeshire Home Improvement Agency, which includes grant funding to replace a faulty or inefficient boiler where the owner's health could be impacted by a lack of warmth.

Update from Fen Drayton Lakes

A small team of wardens, with a large team of volunteers, are responsible for looking after the RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes.

There are a lot of viewpoints around the reserve and most of these become rather overgrown during the summer. Around Elney Lake alone there are ten viewpoints. We don't cut them back during the summer as birds such as reed bunting, reed warbler, and whitethroat all benefit from the reeds and scrub. With the seasons changing it is time to go in with brushcutters to open them up. Cutting reeds is tough going, even with machinery, but the results are rewarding and will last through to next summer.

Cattle grazing plays an important role in managing grassland around the lakes for breeding and wintering waterfowl and waders. With the water levels so low this summer, in some lakes the lowest we have seen since purchasing the site in 2007, cows have been walking around the wooden fencing 'wings' that protrude into the water to stop them leaving grazing areas. Herding cattle back into a field on a recent occasion didn't go quite to plan with the cows running off into a wooded area. A little later, with a lot of 'shooing', they were back in. If you ever find escaped cattle on the reserve, please let us know.

On top of this reserve-based work we have also been organising large-scale contractor works, planning upcoming events, writing reports and doing a host of other tasks on and off site. With all this variety in our day-to-day work, there is rarely a dull moment at Fen Drayton Lakes.
