Most of the men who enlisted in the army from the village would have been in this regiment. Presumably his parents wanted this photo, hoping it would not

be his last. The apprehension on his face says much. Sadly, he would soon be in the thick of it as the regiment fought in the battles of the Somme and Passchendaele where casualties were high. Unless someone can tell us, we don't know his name but, if he did survive, he would have returned much changed - a man not a boy.

Update from RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes

Work is underway on a new family trail to open in the spring. The route will take in several different habitats whilst being less than a mile long; perfect for seeing a little bit of what the reserve as a whole has to offer. Leaving the car park through the gate at the end, the trail will go north through our sandy area of 'early successional grassland', through the small wood and out into the flood plain meadow along the river before looping back with views over Drayton Lake and Holywell reedbed.

You may have heard that we are looking to improve our visitor facilities over the next few years. These improvements, of which the new trail is a part, have been in the planning stages for a long time, so we are pleased to say that real progress is now being made.

The first stages of this project involve providing more visitor facilities to enhance your experience, such as repairing and improving tracks and surfaces, creating wild play features for children and families, opening new trails and providing much needed permanent toilet facilities, helping everyone to enjoy their visit even more. We hope these improvements will benefit all our visitors and that you will support us in this next important step for the reserve.

To help fund these improvements, we will shortly be introducing a £2 car park fee for non-members of RSPB visiting Fen Drayton Lakes. Further details will be posted on our reserve blog post in due course at <u>www.rspb.org.uk/</u><u>fen-drayton-lakes</u>. RSPB members and Blue Badge holders will not need to pay. This small car parking fee will help us ensure we are maintaining facilities to a high standard for our visitors' comfort and safety. As a charity, we need to maximise opportunities to raise income wherever possible, to financially support our charitable purpose of conserving wildlife and habitats.

Winter is always busy on the reserve with many birds from northern Europe spending the winter with us. At this time of year, you may be able to spot fieldfares, bullfinches, woodpeckers, herons, great crested grebes and hundreds of over-wintering waterbirds such as goldeneyes and teal. We hope you'll come and see us soon.

Rebecca Ableman

You may well have heard about the recent death of village resident Becky Ableman. While walking back home with her daughter Autumn on Thursday 22 September, she was knocked over by a lorry on Station Road, and while she managed to push Autumn out of the way, Becky suffered from a severe head trauma. She was air lifted to Addenbrooke's by the East Anglian Air Ambulance team and was in the care of the Neuro ICU, who did all they could for three weeks to try and bring her back to her family. Sadly, Becky passed away on 16 October surrounded by her loved ones. She leaves behind her partner Chris and their two-year-old daughter Autumn.

Chris wants to commemorate Becky's life by installing a bench and adopting a tree in the Community Orchard. The Orchard is a place that Becky, Chris and Autumn always enjoyed visiting and Chris feels this is a fitting way to remember Becky. They and others can enjoy sitting in the Orchard and reflect on Becky's life. It will give Autumn the chance to be close to her mummy as she grows up.

With the support of *Willingham News*, Chris has set up a 'Go Fund Me' page for village residents who feel they would like to send a message of sympathy to Autumn and Becky's family by helping to fund the bench. At Chris's request, any proceeds beyond the cost of the bench will go to East Anglian Air Ambulance, who airlifted Becky to Addenbrooke's Hospital and to the Neuro ICU there who treated Becky, in Chris's words, 'with such respect and dignity, and helped us throughout the whole ordeal'.

The survey has been completed. It involved an online questionnaire supplemented by a printed version and a youth survey of those aged 11 - 18. A huge amount of work went into preparing the survey: meetings, social media, and an army of volunteers ensuring that every door in the village was knocked on and every resident was encouraged to participate. The coronavirus pandemic was still in full flow for much of this period and has certainly slowed us down. However, there is a silver lining in being a little slow, as the results of the 2021 Census are now starting to be reported.

We would like to thank every person and organisation that helped us, especially everyone who filled in the survey. We are deeply grateful for their trust and honesty, sharing details of their lives and what they care about. We have read every comment and they are constructive, passionate and, sometimes, deeply moving.

The Community Led Plan Group, made up of unpaid volunteers, intends to deliver a comprehensive survey report on the current situation in the village, in relation to all individual circumstances and aspects of community life. The report will be a fair reflection, free of bias (or politics), of the views of the village residents at the time. From this information we will make evidence-based recommendations for action to local, regional and national authorities. Here is a reminder of what the report will cover:

Survey and Report Structure

- 1 'Let's Start Here'. An introductory section completed by all respondents with free-text entries, coded and compiled into a manageable report section
- 2 Traffic, Roads and Transport
- 3 Your Children and Young People (including Education)
- 4 Housing, Development and the Environment
- 5 Leisure, Amenities and Communications
- 6 Medical Services, Health and Wellbeing
- 7 Employment and Business
- 8 Community, Crime and Governance
- 9 Youth 11 18. A stand-alone survey and report

We are now looking for people with professional experience in these areas to 'sanity check' our conclusions against the data and recommendations they contain. This will involve reading and giving feedback on 10 - 15 pages in your field of expertise. We are also looking for someone with design and superior Microsoft Word skills who can help pull together the final report. Winter Illness

A lot of winter bugs are already circulating in our communities. It might feel like you've been ill forever, but some things do take a while to clear. For example, an ear infection takes at least four days, a blocked nose two to three weeks, a cold one to two weeks, a sore throat one week and flu two weeks. You can get medication from the pharmacy to help relieve the symptoms whilst you recover.

Here are some small things you can do that will make a big difference to help the NHS this winter:

- Get your flu vaccine. Whether you have one for free or need to buy one from a pharmacy, it's really important for you and your family to be protected this winter.

- Use your local pharmacy. They are experts in medication and can provide lots of self-care advice and medicines for winter bugs.

The Legend of Fisher's Ghost

Every year in November there is the festival of Fisher's Ghost in the town of Campbelltown, Australia, near where my family and I lived.

On 17 June 1826, an English-born farmer from Campbelltown named Frederick Fisher suddenly disappeared. His friend and neighbour George Worrall claimed that Fisher had returned to England, giving Worrall power of attorney over his affairs and saying that he would not be returning to Australia.

Four months after his disappearance, a local man named James Farley ran into a local hotel in an agitated state saying he had seen the ghost of Fisher sitting on the rail of a nearby bridge pointing to a paddock beyond the creek. After some disbelief, a police search of the paddock revealed the remains of Fisher and Worrall was arrested for the crime, confessed, and was hanged.

The ten-day Festival of Fisher's Ghost dates back to 1956, with a parade, fun run, art award, music, children's events and fireworks. Every year people gather at the creek near where the ghost is supposed to appear, my family included, but we did not see him! In November, it is supposed to be warm, but it always seems to be cold by the creek. Although still known as Fisher's Ghost Creek, it has now sadly mostly been converted into a storm water drain.

Maintenance of St Mary & All Saints' Closed Churchyard

Parishioners may not be aware that the churchyard immediately surrounding the church building is a 'Closed Churchyard' (ie no longer used for burials) and is separate from the Parish Council's maintained cemetery.

Some years ago, the responsibility for the continuing maintenance of the existing grass, trees, monuments, paths, walls and gates in the Closed Churchyard was passed to South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC).

You may have noticed that the grass is regularly cut by contractors. Other jobs are tackled on a 'needs must' basis. Unfortunately, the coronavirus pandemic and lockdown stalled a schedule of proposed tree and monument maintenance. This was then exacerbated by a complete change of the staff at SCDC who were responsible for overseeing Closed Churchyards. Earlier this year, representatives from SCDC, Ely Diocese, the Parish Council and St Mary's Parochial Church Council (PCC) met in the Churchyard on a number of occasions to try to move things forward. Each of these four bodies have to agree to any proposals, and this takes time.

The good news is that last month the 'trip hazard' of the old churchyard boundary wall was removed and the ground levelled in such a way that the old boundary can still be identified. The lower limbs of several trees within the Closed Churchyard have now been raised and, by the time you read this, it is anticipated that the pathway from the front of the church to the Octagon will have been cleaned. This should mean that folk can access the Octagon without fear of being caught by low branches or slipping on the path.

In the longer term, it is anticipated that discussions between SCDC, the Parish Council and Ely Diocese will result in the restoration of the main gate off Church Street, which is currently unusable as well as the reconstruction of parts of the old boundary wall between the churchyard and cemetery. Such works require the submission of Faculties to Ely Diocese, and these can take some time to work through the system. But watch this space!

It is hoped that next year a new path from the Octagon door to the cemetery will be approved by Ely Diocese and laid. A generous bequest from the family of late church members will make this a possibility. Sue West

Public Hall Update – Joint Statement with Willingham Scouts

During the first public meeting it became clear that the hall users and Parish Council were working to very different timescales for the required investment in the Public Hall. The consultation had been arranged by the Parish Council on the premise that the hall users needed urgent investment, which is not the case.

The public consultation to date has been very beneficial. It has elicited a great deal of historical detail regarding past uses, identified a few misconceptions about the current use and management of the hall and identified a number of positive suggestions on how the community can make future use of the facility or the proceeds of its sale.

As a result of the less urgent timelines, we have paused the current consultation until next year when we will propose a longer-term plan to review the future of the building.

Highgate Farm Footpath

A resident expressed his concern at the lack of a footpath from the village to Highgate Farm and how dangerous it can be, especially in winter when the verge is muddy and slippery. His concerns are shared by the Council, but the cost of a footpath is greater than the limit for Minor Highways Improvement Schemes and we can only continue to lobby the District and County Councils for this much needed safety measure.

Flower Tubs

The Gardening Club has now taken over managing the six flower tubs and we are delighted to see a village group involved. All the winter pansies in the tubs have been donated by Sue Hayden in memory of her husband Rodney, who sadly died in October.

Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) City Access Consultation – Closing Date 23 December

Please comment on the GCP proposals for 'faster, cheaper, more reliable bus services and safer cycling through the introduction of a Sustainable Travel Zone', that is, a road user charge. The consultation can be accessed at: <u>www.consultcambs.uk.engagementhq.com/makingconnections-2022</u> and there are hard copies at the library. Our village's residents could end up paying the road user charge without the benefit of a better bus service. We will be on an hourly rural loop taking in Longstanton, Bar Hill, Papworth Everard, Swavesey, and Over, so will have no direct bus to any major town or to Cottenham, and no busway buses passing through Willingham, as requested by the Parish Council. No timetables are included so we don't know whether we would at least have Sunday and evening services. The proposed lower fares are welcome.

New Route 5A – Use It or Lose It

Back to the present, and Stagecoach's withdrawal of the 5 service through the village has been temporarily covered by a subsidised 5A route through Longstanton, Swavesey, and Over. If we are to retain this service beyond March, it is essential that it is well used. Loss of it would also mean that the hourly route in the City Access consultation will be an improvement after all.

New Councillor

At our October meeting we co-opted Mick Gibbs as a new councillor. Please join us in welcoming him to the Council, which is now at full strength.

Age UK Community Warden Scheme

Sarah Thompson from Age UK and the Community Warden, Joanne Twinn, gave a presentation on the scheme. There are currently 17 people being supported, 11 from Willingham and six from Over. The initial two years full funding from South Cambridgeshire District Council will end next year, and so a contribution from the Parish Council has been requested. This was considered along with the many other demands on Council funding at the Finance and General Purpose committee meeting in November.

The girls had a fantastic time, the most popular activities being hearing about the early women aviators, being able to go into all the planes and the hot chocolate!

Lucy Frazer – End of Year Update

As Christmas approaches, I wanted to reflect on the past year and let you know a few of the matters I have been working on, on your behalf.

This year has not, so far, been without its challenges whether the spiralling energy costs or the war in Ukraine. We have also recently sadly mourned the death of our late Queen, who served us with grace and dignity throughout her reign. I was pleased to attend the proclamation both in Westminster and in Cambridgeshire to welcome King Charles III as our new monarch.

I know constituents are concerned about the war in Ukraine and I have been humbled by the response of so many families who have supported refugees. Many families across our area have opened their homes to those fleeing conflict, and I was pleased to hold an event in the summer to bring together some of the volunteers, organisations and families involved.

I know that cost of living is a real concern, and I am committed to helping constituents find the support and advice they need. In my previous role as Financial Secretary to the Treasury, I was proud to work with ministerial colleagues to introduce a package of measures to help tackle the cost-of-living crisis. These included a £400 discount off energy bills. Since then the Government has gone further with the introduction of the Energy Price Guarantee which caps the price per unit of electricity and gas from 1 October for at least six months. This price guarantee will save the average household £1,000 per year, compared with the previous energy price cap announced by Ofgem in August. In the coming months, the Government will consider how it supports households with energy bills beyond April 2023.

I continue to campaign for better infrastructure and connectivity in our area. I have pressed the case for dualling the A10 where up to £6 million worth of funding has now been made available for a feasibility study to examine significant upgrades to this major road (including dualling), improvements to Junctions 37 and 38 on the A14 and better rail links and bus services.

Speeding and traffic has been a concern, and I have worked closely with the Parish Council, the police and the County Council on this issue. The village was successful with a bid for a minor highways improvement scheme for improvements on Earith Road to try and encourage slower driving speeds entering and leaving the village. I am pleased that this has taken place and will continue to work with local stakeholders to ensure that the village is a safe place to live.

Dear Residents,

I would like to wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a prosperous New Year. Here is my update of County Council matters:-

Cultivate Cambs Grants

The County Council has announced that the next deadline for Cultivate Cambs grant applications will be **16 December**, with preapplication advice appointments beginning the month before.

Cultivate Cambs awards grants of £2,000 to £15,000 for new initiatives, supporting adults and older people with care and support needs, and children, young people and families, to live independently and be safe and well in thriving and inclusive communities. The fund is open to voluntary and community organisations and social enterprises based inside and outside Cambridgeshire, as well as public sector organisations within Cambridgeshire. Project proposals must benefit Cambridgeshire residents and also reduce pressure on council services. See: <u>www.cambscf.org.uk/cultivate-cambs</u>.

Bus Services

A stay of execution has been approved for the routes which Stagecoach East announced would be withdrawn from 30 October. The Combined Authority went out to urgent tender with potential operators the following day, with the aim of continuing those services. This process was successful and the new contracts with bus operators will run until the end of March 2023 for the 5A (Citi 5 beyond Northstowe), and the 8A (Citi 8 beyond Cottenham).

I am pleased that the 5A service has been restored and will be very interested to hear how the service is working for residents.

The current position is that the total cost is expected to be about £1.25 million, funded by the Combined Authority. Nevertheless, this stop gap only operates until March 2023 and highlights the precarious nature of commercially operated bus services in our community.

Cost of Living Crisis

South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) is responding to the cost-of-living crisis in a number of ways. The following highlights what the council is doing to help:

Warm Hubs

These are community spaces where residents can enjoy a safe, warm, and friendly environment this winter. The first of these was opened last week and more are to follow - up to 25 of them. The Octagon and Baptist Church have both registered and been given the 'green light'. The hubs are being funded by the NHS Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Integrated Care System and delivered by the charity Cambridgeshire ACRE in partnership with SCDC. www.cambsacre.org.uk/ introducing-warm-hubs.

Discretionary Housing Payments

This is an SCDC fund which supports residents on Universal Credit or Housing Benefit with housing costs. The Council is planning to add an extra £100,000 to this fund to support more people. Discretionary Council Tax Discounts

This is an SCDC fund to support people who are not eligible for the Local Council Tax Support scheme but are in extreme hardship. For those who qualify, the Council may be able to offer a discount to help make Council Tax instalments more affordable. Charitable Giving

SCDC is proposing to establish a grant fund which will be used to provide lower cost options for cooking and staying warm to those in need, such as slow cookers and electric blankets. Residents and businesses who are financially able will be welcome to contribute towards this charitable fund. The Council will allocate £15,000 to get it up and running. Community Chest Criteria Amended

SCDC's popular Community Chest provides grants to voluntary and community sector groups, charities and public sector bodies wishing to further improve quality of life locally. Recently, the criteria were amended to allow bids that include contributions for any project that has a positive impact for communities related to the cost-of-living crisis.
