Buggies in Willingham



Over the past couple of years, I have started to use a buggy (mobility scooter) in Willingham. There are two classes of mobility scooters – class 2 and class 3 – which have different rules. All mobility scooters are allowed to drive at up to 4 mph on the pavement. Class 3 scooters are also allowed to drive on the road at up to 8 mph. They are registered with the DVLA and have a registration number but do not have to have a number plate. Cyclists will be relieved to know we are not allowed in cycle lanes and I have no intention of tackling the A14!

We don't have to wear helmets and by law do not have to be insured, although it is very wise to be covered in case of damage, accident or breakdown! On the whole driving in Willingham is a good experience and I find that most people are helpful and friendly. In fact, one incredibly kind lady had seen me looking cold on the buggy and brought me a blanket. I still can't believe how kind that was.

There are some disadvantages; in places the pavements are very bad, as pedestrians know only too well. Silver Street is particularly difficult and sometimes there is no suitable bit of lowered pavement and so you have to go back. If it is possible, it is easier to drive on the road with great care. Occasionally a driver gets impatient, but most are good and give one a wide margin.

The extension of the path to the Community Orchard is very welcome and I look forward to being able to get safely to Highgate Farm.

There are lots of buggies around now. Perhaps we ought to start a Buggy Club!

The Bereavement Journey

Are you finding life tough after a bereavement and it seems hard to move on? Do you need to talk through what happened and how you are feeling? If so, this course may be for you.

As part of our commitment to care in the community, the 5folds Churches will be running another presentation of *The Bereavement Journey* in Willingham, starting in February. This is a five-week, group-based course, to help you explore what's happened and how you might start to move on with your life. This is a secular programme, open to anyone over the age of 18 years. There is an optional sixth week, looking at bereavement and faith but there is no requirement to attend that if you don't wish to.

This latest course will begin on **Friday, 3 February** running from 10 30 am to 12 30 pm in the Octagon, situated behind St Mary and All Saints Church. You do not need to attend any church locally or elsewhere and the course is open to those of any faith or none. Light refreshments will be served.

Previous attendees have spoken warmly of the help the course has given them and the value of attending. Each session is led by Jan Payne, who is experienced and trained in bereavement care. She is assisted by those who bring to the sessions their own valuable experience of being bereaved and then moving on.

There is a cost of £10 per head (total) to attend. This goes solely towards meeting the spiralling costs of heating the hall for each session and course materials.

Before Christmas we planned a visit to St Ives from our home in Earith Road, travelling via Church Street and the guided busway, basing our trip on the Stagecoach timetable. We left home in the morning; all went well and we arrived in St Ives as planned. We started our return journey that afternoon and caught the guided bus as anticipated. However, on arrival at Longstanton, we found that the bus to Church Street had been cancelled. On checking at the site office we were informed that all the number 5 buses were cancelled for rest of the day. So, we were stuck – we were not fancying the walk back to Earith Road as we are both retired and have health problems.

We have no personal transport. Fortunately, we phoned a friend who kindly picked us up and took us home. What if they were not available?

Well done, Stagecoach! If you want people to use the service you have to be reliable.

Why not use a small shuttle bus, say a 12 or 16 seater, doing the circuit around the four local Villages? It must be cheaper than a trundling double decker.

Also, people would use it if they knew that it would come round approximately every three quarters of hour and would, hopefully, be more reliable.

Thought for the Month

As I cycle around between churches and visiting people, I have to be careful of the potholes. Some are big enough to cause a cyclist to fall off. I notice two methods used to repair them. I watched as a workman shovelled tarmac into a hole then simply stamped it into place with his boot before moving on to the next hole. The patch lasted about a fortnight before the hole started to reappear. Recently some of our bad patches of road in Willingham have been dug up and resurfaced and months later the repair is still good. I am no expert on highway maintenance, but I strongly suspect the more lasting repair is hugely more expensive, hence the need for the simpler patching as well.

This isn't a moan about our method of road repair – I'm grateful that any is being done – but an illustration of the difference between longer term solutions and quick fixes. In all areas of life, we sometimes need quick fixes while more lasting solutions are arranged, but I've been struck recently about how infrequently God is reported as doing quick fixes in the Bible. The Israelites suffered harsh conditions in Egypt for some 200 years before being delivered. They were later in exile for 70 years. Prophecies of 'end times' (meaning a Roman counterrevolutionary invasion) that appeared to be imminent, were actually fulfilled about 30 years later.

I wonder how often in life we reach for quick fixes when we would be better spending our efforts on longer term solutions. Now I'm thinking of our own personal lives and activities, not council repairs. What do you need to give careful attention to as 2023 gets underway? May God guide you into wise solutions as you ponder its issues.

Saint Valentine's Day 14 February

Who was Saint Valentine?

Saint Valentine was a Roman saint born in 226. He is commemorated in Western Christianity on 14 February and in Eastern Orthodoxy on 6 July.

From the Middle Ages, his day has been associated with a tradition of courtly love. He is also a patron saint of epilepsy, asthma and beekeepers!

Saint Valentine was a clergyman – either a priest or a bishop, who ministered to persecuted Christians in the Roman Empire. He was martyred and his body buried on 14 February, which has been observed as the Feast of Saint Valentine (Saint Valentine's Day) since at least the eighth century. A common legend states that St Valentine defied the Roman Emperor's orders and secretly married couples to spare the husbands from war. It is for this reason that his feast day is associated with love.

People call on him to watch over the lives of lovers, of course, but also for interventions regarding beekeeping and epilepsy, as well as the plague, fainting and traveling. As you might expect, he's also the patron saint of engaged couples and happy marriages.

Pancake Day

Just in case it is helpful to have to hand – here is a Pancake Recipe for Shrove Tuesday on **21 February.**

Simple Pancake Recipe

Ingredients for 12 Pancakes

- 100g plain flour
- 2 eggs
- 300ml/½ pint semi-skimmed milk
- 1 tbsp vegetable or sunflower oil, plus extra for frying

Method

• STEP 1

Put the flour in a large bowl and make a well in the centre. Crack the eggs into the well, pour in a splash of the milk and, using a balloon whisk or wooden spoon, start to stir from the centre of the bowl, drawing the flour into the eggs and milk. Beat the mix until smooth (get any lumps out now while it's thick), then stir in the rest of the milk until it's the consistency of single cream. Stir in the oil. The batter will keep covered in the fridge for up to a day at this point. Stir well before you use it.

• STEP 2

Put a non-stick frying pan or crêpe pan (one with a 20 – 23cm base is ideal) over a medium heat. Pour 1cm oil into a heatproof jug and keep it to hand. Add a drop of oil to the pan, swirl it around, tipping any excess back into the jug. Pour in a ladleful of batter, tilting the pan and swirling the batter to give a thin, even layer. Leave the pancake alone for 30 seconds, no prodding, or until it starts to colour around the edge. Don't crank up the heat if this takes longer – as you'll scorch the bottom of the pancake and it won't flip well.

• STEP 3

With a fish slice or palette knife, ease the edge of the pancake away from the pan, then loosen underneath. Check that the bottom is golden, then turn it over in one quick movement or give it a flip. Cook for another 30 seconds before turning out onto a plate. Eat straight away. If you're making ahead, stack the pancakes on a plate and cover with cling film. Pierce the film, then reheat in the microwave on High for one minute or until piping hot.

Although the character count is limited on the form, please try to give as much specific and concise information as possible. We really think it is easier for most people than waiting on hold to speak to a receptionist, but would love to hear your feedback.

If you do not have access to the internet or find it difficult to use a computer or smartphone you can call reception instead and they will complete the triage form on your behalf.

You can access the new patient form via the NHS app or from our website. (Link available on our home page.)

Please note – The practice will respond to your enquiry within 2 working days. If you need urgent assistance for an acute problem, please continue to call our reception team for an appointment on the day. Continue to use 111 for medical help when we are closed, or 999 for a life threatening condition.

Phone System Upgrade

We know the queue to speak with our team can take some time, we have therefore listened and upgraded our phone system to help us manage calls more efficiently.

Patients now have the option to request a 'call back'. Your place in the queue will be held, and the surgery will automatically call you back when you get to the front of the queue.

If you want to cancel your appointment, you can now select option three and leave an answerphone message for our reception team so you no longer have to stay on hold.

Footpath to the Orchard – Earith Road

Following a successful bid, the Parish Council were able to obtain the necessary funding to install a footpath to the Orchard. This funding has created a safe way for families, dog walkers and other walkers to get to the Orchard and enjoy the space.

Fourth Defibrillator Installed

The Parish Council has been aware of the need to have a defibrillator sited in the southern part of the village. You may have noticed the latest one that has been installed on the High Street. It is in the old Telephone Booth near the bus stop. All defibrillators require a constant supply of electricity. This does mean that positioning of one is limited. Other defibrillators are situated at The Pavilion on the Recreation Ground, the Library, and outside the Primary School.

Buses

Many residents have a requirement for a regular bus service. Over the past year there has been a reduction in the service offered and this has caused problems for those without a car. This has made life difficult for those needing to reach the Sixth Form education in Cambridge, who work in Cambridge or have to attend hospital appointments. The Parish Council has made representation at each consultation which has been put forward. Proposals received have not recognised that residents of Willingham frequently work in Cambridge, attend Addenbrookes Hospital and make great use of the Sixth Form Colleges along with other schools in Cambridge.

The Council have also written to our Member of Parliament. Lucy Frazer MP has been supportive of our concerns about the very limited number of buses that go to Cambridge.

We do hope that as we have kept you informed of the consultations through *Willingham News* and the Council website and that you, as parishioners, have also recorded your concerns on the relevant platforms/website listed.

Supporting the Village

The Council seeks to support a range of groups in the Village to help with 'caring, well-being, and personal development'. We continue to support the Community Warden Scheme and the Community Lifeline Scheme as well as the Willingham Youth Trust and the free use of the Recreation Ground for under 18s football and other sports.

Green Spaces – Contributing to a 'Better Environment'

The Diamond Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II included suggestions for 'A Green Canopy', encouraging us to plant trees to improve our environment. We shall be doing this with a few trees in the next few months in the Cemetery, Meadow Road and Barton Field. We are replacing trees/shrubs which die and replanting hedging which unfortunately was removed.

The Future

The Ploughman Hall is well used and bookings are doing well. The heating has been replaced over the year with a different system. With regard to the Public Hall, the time has come to assess its future use. The result of the Public Consultation will be assessed and will be a point of reference for any future decisions.

Growth in the Greater Cambridge Area

The Greater Cambridge area is a place that attracts businesses and while this creates growth, jobs and prosperity, a growing workforce needs somewhere to live. The high cost of living here leads to many people choosing to live some distance from Cambridge and then commute to their workplaces in the city with the commensurate increases in congestion and pollution. It's bad now and the projected growth means it is going to get much worse. More houses, especially those that lower paid 'key' workers can afford is one answer and another is to improve the active and public transportation in and around Cambridge.

The government has put up huge sums of money aimed at tackling the traffic problem and this led to the setting up of the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) to advise on how that money should be spent. Their 'Making Connections' plans for massive improvements to public transport, cycleways and footpaths, funded by a 'Sustainable Travel Zone' road charge is designed to reduce congestion and pollution by discouraging car use. The proposals are that public transport would be improved before any road charge is introduced and then the funds generated by the road-charge will be used to maintain and improve services still further. The consultation on the GCP's plans closed just before Christmas. The public response was very high, and it is going to take some months for the data to be analysed but let's hope that this leads to a scheme that reasonable people can accept and the County Council can vote for.

Local Plan Update

SCDC has just published an update about the emerging Greater Cambridge Local Plan. Recent work has shown that the additional projected growth is going to lead to a demand for more houses. The planning authorities are given no choice but to plan to meet the demand. The government adopts a notorious 'carrot and stick' approach; local authorities that deliver the number of houses that the government demands continue to have local planning control, whereas those that do not lose the ability to decide what is built and where. This was what happened prior to 2018, which resulted in hundreds of houses being built outside of agreed village limits, including in Over and Willingham.

There are serious constraints on housebuilding in our area due to a lack of water availability. So much so, that there are plans to transfer water from other areas and to build reservoirs in the Fens, but these are medium to long-term solutions and the problem needs to be resolved more quickly than that. High-level discussions are therefore currently being held to determine how the current Local Plan house numbers can be delivered, given the potentially serious consequences for water supply. In parallel, work on the emerging Local Plan is ongoing and an important draft plan consultation is due to be held in autumn 2023.

Disabled Facilities Grants

The Cambridgeshire Home Improvement Agency (HIA) offers a range of grants to people with disabilities living in South Cambridgeshire, to help with the cost of adapting their homes. These government grants are aimed at people with disabilities and older people on low incomes or low-income benefits. More information is here: hia@cambshia.org.

Campaign for more Homes for Ukraine Hosts

The SCDC campaign for new potential hosts for Ukrainian guests is ongoing. Our pool of hosts stood at over 600 when the Homes for Ukraine scheme first launched last year, but this has now reduced considerably. We need help finding more so that, where possible, Ukrainian guests are able to stay with alternative hosts close to where they have previously been living. Anyone who can offer help simply needs to text ROOM to 88802.

End of the GCP Consultation on Congestion Charging

The Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP)'s Consultation on Congestion Charging ended on 23 December. When I was studying with the Chartered Institute of Public Relations, we looked at several horror stories of public engagement plans which fell apart on contact with the public. Such campaigns, I think, can do more harm than good by dividing groups that should be united towards a common goal, stifling productive conversation and collective action.

As an independent Cambridge City Councillor for Queen Edith's ward, Sam Davies wrote 'the proposals are couched in language designed to make people feel bad about their current transport decisions. To many people this instinctively feels like unfair criticism, because what the data tells us is that Cambridge's residents already make responsible transport choices - the ONS' 2021 census data shows that Cambridge continued to report a far higher level of walking and cycling commuters (49 per cent) than the national average (14 per cent). Buses already account for 7 per cent of Cambridge commuting journeys, not much different to the 9 per cent achieved in London.'

I appreciate that some may disagree with my focus on the Congestion Charge. However, I can think of nothing with the potential to so negatively impact Willingham residents, who have to rely on private transport to access their NHS. The purpose-built M11 access roads, on which we rely, play no part in causing congestion in Cambridge City and I consider that they should never have been included in this proposal.

I urge everyone to do all they can to resist what I consider to be a flat rate Poll Tax that will hit the low and no paid hardest, while also putting a paywall between residents and their NHS hospitals at Addenbrookes.

The Police and Crime Commissioner's 2023-24 Police Funding Survey

Our elected PCC has launched his 2023-24 Police Funding Survey in which he is taking soundings for increasing the policing part of council tax by 5.8%. For a property in Band A, this would be an additional 19p per week, or 29p per week for a Band D. I encourage Parish Councillors and Residents to make their views known.

Report of Cambridge County Councillor – Neil Gough

Government – Funding Settlement

Just before Christmas the Government issued its 'provisional local government finance settlement'– the annual indication to councils of the money they will have available for local services next year.

The Government proposes that Cambridgeshire County Council's 'core spending power' (the overall revenue funding available for council services) should increase by 9.5%. Unfortunately, that is less than the current rate of inflation, so overall it will buy less at a time when there is great pressure in many service areas.

Half of the 9.5% will come from the council's power to raise council tax – in other words, the Government expects local taxpayers to shoulder a lot of the extra costs.

Making Connections Consultation

The Greater Cambridge Partnership *Making Connections* 2022 consultation closed on Friday 23 December. Around 23,000 responses have been received, and the Greater Cambridge Partnership expects to publish a final report on the consultation outcomes and next steps for consideration by its Board in June.

The consultation is about proposals for public transport improvements, and better cycling and walking options, as well as about the element which has been most talked about – a congestion charge. Any decision on a charge for driving on roads in Cambridge – or anywhere else in the county – would be a matter for Cambridgeshire County Council.

Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA)

Buses continue to be a hot topic especially in our area. The CPCA is the transport authority responsible for passenger transport across our area, working within a legislative framework and a deregulated bus system. The CPCA Board agreed a draft Bus Strategy on 30 November and went for 6 weeks public consultation on 9 January. The Strategy will then go to the Authority's Transport and Infrastructure

Cambridgeshire and Peterborough was one of a majority of local transport authorities to be given no funding by Government for its Bus Service Improvement Plan. This funding is intended to support new approaches to bus provision, not directly subsidise bus routes. The Authority is working with partners to prepare a revised Plan reflecting the priorities of the emerging Local Transport Connectivity Plan and the draft Bus Strategy. This will be presented to the Transport and Infrastructure Committee and the Board in May / June.

The majority of bus services in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough are run commercially by private operators, and the CPCA has no control over these. The Authority currently subsidises 73 services across its area. Full support for 18 services and partial support for a further five began in October 2022 after Stagecoach withdrew from these services – this includes the Willingham 5A service. There is an option to extend the contracts for these by one year from the end of March, and final decisions on these will be taken in February or March following the setting of the CPCA's budget and taking account of the draft Bus Strategy.

The GCP Making Connections proposals included an enhanced bus network and mechanisms for both upfront investment and ongoing subsidy. The CPCA will need to consider the effect of this on its own work.

Finally, the CPCA is also working with bus operators to understand the scale and effect of driver shortages and how it can provide support through its skills programmes. The current impact of these shortages is seriously undermining the reliability and utility of the bus services in our area, and I have received several emails and calls from residents complaining about the impact this is having on them.
