Old Willingham



This splendid house was on the High Street. Its site is now occupied by Osbourne Close next to The Bank pub. The identity of the gentleman on horseback with a big white beard and top hat is unknown – but is likely the house owner. A number of these larger houses or 'villas' were built on the High Street in the early Victorian period around about the time the railway came to Longstanton (1840s). The arrival of the railway transformed the status of Willingham and enabled expansion. Fortunately, all these villas on the High Street have survived with this one exception.

Book Review

Riccardino, by Andrea Camilleri

This is the 28th and last of the detective stories featuring Inspector Montalbano. It was written early in the series, with instructions that it was not to be published until after the author's death.

Montalbano is woken one morning by a telephone call from a stranger, Riccardino, who has dialled a wrong number and tells him to hurry up to the meeting. Montalbano says he'll be there in ten minutes, and goes back to bed. When Riccardino turns up dead later in the morning, Montalbano investigates a crime with widening ramifications involving the church hierarchy and the Mafia, while enjoying superb Sicilian food and arguing with his superiors.

Unusually for a crime novel, the detective also gets into extensive arguments with his author. The author feels readers are becoming bored with politics and the Mafia, Montalbano is determined to uncover the truth, and they have very different views on how the book should end.

The nearly unanimous opinion in the Reading Group was that this venture into metafiction is unfortunate, it creates confusion and makes this last Montalbano novel difficult to read. All of the scores, apart from a six, were four or five out of ten, in spite of a good plot and some wonderful Sicilian characters.

The last Ceilidh at the Ploughman in October raised £250 for the same cause – here is how it was used:

We were able to transfer £250 to Yuliya (in Kyiv) in January. These funds helped six families with children/ young people with severe disabilities to receive basic food

Do you have breathing difficulties? Did you know singing can help?

Singing is a great way to improve the way you breathe and get the best from your lung capacity.

The *Cambridge Singing for Breathing Group* is meeting online, using Zoom, on Thursday afternoons 2 30 – 4 pm and we're looking for new members!

Kay Barrett, founder of the group, says:

You don't need any singing experience to take part – it's all about what it feels like, not what it sounds like. The camaraderie of the group, the guided relaxation, the breathing exercises and the singing are so much appreciated by everyone and the health benefits transfer over into daily life. Being online, singers can join from the comfort of home, even when they are feeling unwell. We sing with microphones turned off, which can actually be very liberating! You simply sing along with the leader, learning uplifting songs often in call and response style. We also use multi-track recordings so we can enjoy singing rounds and harmonies. parcels and some hygiene items – all this happened

- within a week of our money transfer
- with zero admin costs here or in Ukraine (all your donations are used to help the most vulnerable).

Yuliya adds:

This month I managed to stretch out the money you sent to help six families. This happened because I was offered help to order through a wholesale outlet (the prices are cheaper but I normally cannot buy there as quantities I order do not qualify for wholesale) and also because someone offered to drive me (I don't own a car) so I could personally deliver all the goods to all six families in Kyiv.

The only problem was delivering the packages. Many families live in high rising buildings and power cuts mean carrying shopping all the way without elevators!

Every parcel contained the following:

- 2.5 kg of rice
- 5 kg of dry pasta
- 1 kg of raisins (mums blend raisins with honey to make vitamin rich treat to boost children's nutrition in these winter months)
- Several packs of baby soap
- 2-3 packs of wet baby wipes very handy for mums looking after disabled children
- Soft cakes.

I also added some presents that were given to me by one of the local monasteries: children's books (for those families where children will be able to understand them) and sweets (these sweets will be probably eaten by the mothers – it is good to have something for the mums to give them energy).

Singing for Breathing

Do I have to pay?

Those who can afford it are invited to give a ± 3.50 donation each week, but this is not essential - we want everyone to be able to come.

Do I have to come along every week?

We know that appointments, sickness, family commitments and such can get in the way! Just come along when you can.

I have Long Covid, can I join?

The gentle pace, breathing exercises and relaxation can be very beneficial, but do check with your doctor or respiratory physio, especially if your symptoms are severe.

Willingham Combined Charity

Willingham Combined Charity provides housing for those in need, with accommodation in the Josiah Smith Memorial Homes and a bungalow in Haden Way. We also have two sites which provide allotments, one in Westmeadow Close and the other in Church Street behind the property which used to be the Almshouses.

The six bungalows in Over Road, built in 1967, take their name from Josiah Smith. In 1952 his daughter, Hilda Smith left 11 acres, stock and money, and land at Houghton to build the Josiah Smith Homes in memory of her father.

Since 1505 there have been several charities in the village. The first charity, known as a Pauper Charity, was set up by Henry Greaves. In 1615 the second charity was formed by the rector Dr William Smith, Provost of King's College, Cambridge. In 1693 Robert Osborne gave a rent charge of 3/4d for the poor. Not much is known about this charity which was lost by 1938. The fourth charity was set up by Samuel Saywell by will in 1709. In June 2000, Willingham Combined Charity and Josiah Smith Homes Trust were amalgamated into the Willingham Combined Charity.

In 1874 the criteria for the almswomen was as follows:

Poor women of good character who have resided in the village for three years and who from age, ill-health, accident or infirmity shall be unable to maintain themselves by their own exertions.

If any almswoman be guilty of insobriety, insubordination, breach of rules, or immoral or unbecoming conduct, the trustees may remove that woman.

Today the objects of the charity are:

- The provision of housing accommodation for persons (of whom two must be women) who are in need, hardship, or distress and have resided in the area of benefit (the Parish of Willingham in the County of Cambridgeshire) for not less than two years prior to their appointment.
- 2. The provision of housing accommodation for women over the age of 60 who are in need, hardship and distress who were born in the area of benefit.
- 3. Such charitable purposes for the benefit of the residents as the trustees decide.

There are 12 trustees: one ex-officio trustee, two nominated trustees and nine co-opted trustees.

The ex-officio trustee is the Rector of the ecclesiastical parish of St Mary and All Saints.

The nominated trustees are appointed by our Parish Council.

Green Spaces and Environmental

Every gardener will appreciate it takes time to develop an open space and such work is never-ending. However, we can report that following a lot of input by the Greens and Boundaries Councillors, the Meadow Road site has been recognised by both the Wildlife Trust and the Cambridge ACRE team as an area of importance and which will benefit from support and improvement. Around 400 whips are to be donated for hedging which will need planting, and help would be much appreciated with this work. Also, a large wildlife pond, funded largely by National Lottery monies and Heritage aid is to be put in place at the far end of that field, supervised by the ACRE group of experts. Villagers already benefit from this field as an additional place where they can engage with nature, and it is good to know this hard work will make it an even better outdoor, natural space to be appreciated by all.

Meanwhile, Barton Field (off Black Pit Drove, Rampton Road), is becoming more established. The weather does not seem to have damaged the remaining hedging along its length – which will be in-filled shortly – and we can report that the field is well used by local walkers. With the help of our Willingham Action Group, we have reached the point where we can celebrate the field with unveiling its large information board. All being well, on **2 April** at 11 am, we should be able to meet and enjoy a community gathering there; everyone is welcome!

Spring and nesting time is fast approaching, so this is a gentle reminder that March sees the end of serious machine-driven hedge-cutting and tree works, and if hedges are encroaching on our footpaths, correcting that now would be helpful since after that date only smaller hand-tools may be used.

Buses: The Latest

The serious shortcomings of the new 5A bus service have been highlighted in recent editions of *Willingham News*. The Parish Council have written in strong terms to the Combined Authority, who subsidise the service until March, pointing out that the timetabling problems and cancellations have deterred passengers. We hope that they listen and the subsidy will continue beyond March to give a proper assessment of passenger numbers. A revised timetable was created in February.

However, even if the service were run perfectly, it still might not attract sufficient numbers to make it viable. Obvious deterrents are that it only runs in one direction round the loop, is only hourly, and it means taking two buses to get to any local centres such as Cambridge or St Ives.

Stopping this bus route would be a disaster for those with no other way of travelling the 1% miles to the Busway, so we must

find a way to continue it. Also, some sort of congestion charge for Cambridge is inevitable, so in the longer term we need a fast convenient link direct to Cambridge. The Parish Council repeatedly makes these points in responding to all the recent transport surveys. If you agree, please give us your support, and continue to send us your thoughts on this important issue.

Highways Matters in Brief

The Parish Council and Clerk have regular meetings with the Cambridge County Council Highways department, who are aware of issues troubling parishes such as ours. Our village boundary has been extended and the signage has yet to be moved to recognise this. Repainting badly worn road markings – particularly on the busiest road junctions – continue to be on their list. Since the B1050 is now on 'hold' for at least another financial year, potholes on Shelford Road have been patched and from April there should be some levelling and maintenance work carried out. The Newington footway is scheduled to be slurry-sealed this spring.

Willingham And Over Community Warden Scheme

Just a reminder plus an appreciation of this scheme, supported by Cambridge and Peterborough Age UK. This Warden scheme offers a range of support from basic comfort – such as a visit for a chat and cup of tea, to help with day-to-day matters like shopping or facilitating phone calls, and to assistance with accessing professional services. We are lucky to have a dedicated Community Warden, Joanne, who can be contacted to discuss a trial period or a more permanent regular service.

Thought for the Month

I wonder, what does Mothering Sunday make you think of? My mind turns to the image of a mother hen and her chicks. This picture prompts many family memories for me ...

The mother hen reminds me of celebrations at my grandmother's large house in Somerset. Every Christmas and summer holiday she would gather the whole family 'brood' for a party. When I was a youngster, there would be some 25 of her 'chicks' or 'grand-chicks' there. The extended family is even larger in number now.

I also think of my mum who is a great lover of animals. She is a lady who merrily nursed lambs, piglets and pug puppies in our home and garden alongside raising my brother and me. She offered tender, loving, motherly care to us all.

These days my mum lives in a nursing home on account of her dementia. She is part of another family there – a warm and wonderful community. My mum finds herself nestled safely under the wings of the care staff. It is a safe refuge for her in this last phase of life. Such security is something not everyone knows today. I am mindful of the many refugees and asylum seekers in our world plus the turmoil of a deepening cost of living crisis.

The hen and her chicks perhaps paint a helpful picture in an age when family life takes diverse forms. Single and in my late 40s, I am unlikely to ever be a mother. Yet I cherish my nieces and godsons. Since childhood, I have appreciated being part of a church family wherever I have worshipped.

As we approach Mothering Sunday on **19 March**, may the mother hen caring for her chicks be of comfort to you, whatever your family story.

At 11 am on Sunday 2 April, we are hoping to unveil the new signage at Barton Field. If you have not yet been there it is a lovely established space, well used by walkers and their dogs too. It is off Black Pit Drove, a rough drove leading south from Rampton Road. The ever-busy supportive Willingham Action Group together with both the Greens and the Environmental Parish Councillors have all worked to prepare the site for the village. Now, the large information board which will explain some of the flora and fauna found living on the site as well as the field's history, is ready for visitors. Everyone is welcome, so come along and perhaps plan a nature trail or picnic!



Update from Fen Drayton Lakes

Lapwings are wading birds that can be found in grasslands, farmland and wetlands. They are well known for their distinctive calls, giving them the alternative name 'peewit', their complex courtship displays and their striking plumage, in particular their head crests. Sadly, lapwing populations in the UK have declined significantly over the past few decades, predominantly due to changes in agricultural practices and the loss of suitable nesting habitats, meaning that they are now a red-listed species in the UK and are deemed a conservation priority. Here at Fen Drayton Lakes, we have seen a steady decrease in breeding numbers so are working to provide suitable habitats and to implement effective habitat management measures with the aim of helping the species recover.

Lapwings are ground-nesting birds that lay their eggs in shallow scrapes, often in grassy fields. The chicks are born precocial, meaning they leave the nest after hatching and feed themselves with the help of their parents who care for them until they fledge. Nesting lapwings require suitable grass sward and vegetation conditions in order to build their nests and rear their young. The ideal habitat is an area of short, grazed grass with some scattered tussocky vegetation and bare patches with nearby shallow water margins. This type of habitat provides cover for the birds, feeding areas for adults and chicks, and reduces the risk of predation.

The grasslands of Ferry Mere along the northern edge of the lake are the best area for nesting lapwings at the reserve and we carry out management work to maintain it as a suitable habitat. The area is grazed by cattle in the summer and autumn to ensure suitable grass conditions the following spring, when lapwings are looking to nest with a majority low, even height. This enables the birds to see around them and watch out for predators, thus making them feel more secure and more likely to nest.

Having nearby tall trees and shrubs can deter lapwing from nesting as they provide cover for ground predators, such as foxes, and perching points for avian predators, such as crows, that can take eggs and chicks. In previous years we have worked to fell trees from around the ditches on Ferry Mere and this past winter we have spent time with our volunteer work group removing a dense area of tall trees from the lake edge very near to our shallow pools where lapwings are often seen and have nested in the past. Not only will this improve the area for the birds, but it also has the added benefit of opening up views of the lake from the footpath and view shelter along the north of Ferry Lake.

As we head into spring the large wintering lapwing flocks will start to disperse, but we hope that some will stay and choose to nest out on Ferry Mere or elsewhere at the reserve. We will be carefully monitoring lapwing numbers as part of our annual breeding bird surveying to see the effects of our management work and determine if there is more we can do. In fact, we are already working on plans for another project to try to ensure the continued presence of shallow pools that remain wet throughout the breeding season. Watch this space for more details in the future.

Cambridgeshire County Councillor – Neil Gough

Dear Residents, here is my update of County Council matters, based upon my report to the Parish Council.

2023–24 Budget

A proposal to set a balanced budget in 2023–24 was reviewed at Full Council on 7 February. The proposed budget bridges a potential funding gap of £21.4 million as a result of rising costs of energy and pressure on essential services, even after finding more than £10 million of additional savings or income.

The Government's provisional Local Government Funding settlement in December proposes that CCC's 'core spending power' should increase by 9.5%, but that already assumes that the Council would raise Council Tax by the maximum (4.99%) allowed without a referendum. In other words, the Government expects local tax payers to shoulder most of the extra costs. This would see band D properties in the county paying an additional £73 per year.

Highways – Current Issues

Residents will be aware of the deterioration of the B1050, which has been raised with County Highways. The longerterm structural issues have been exacerbated by the impact of the summer drought.

Many roads across Cambridgeshire have been acutely affected by extreme weather this year, including the B1050. The peat and clay soils in the area make them susceptible to shrinkage when drying out and expansion after wet weather. The extreme weather of 2022 put unbearable stress on many roads.

Unfortunately, the ultimate solution of digging out and completely rebuilding these roads would cost millions of pounds per kilometre – money the Council just does not have. Notwithstanding these long-term challenges, a short-term plan to make repairs to the B1050 was outlined at the last meeting with the Highways team and this will require a road closure.

Our Highways team have been working with counterparts

in Norfolk and Suffolk, and they are seeking a joint meeting with officials at the Department for Transport. We have also raised the matter directly with the Chair of the National Infrastructure Commission. We will continue to draw attention to these issues and the potential links to climate change at a national level.

Potholes have also worsened following the December freeze and subsequent wet weather, unsurprisingly given the long-neglected infrastructure resulting from decades of underfunding and a policy of 'managed decline' of the highways.

We have been actively working with our Local Highways Officer to log potholes and other road surface failures for action in our regular meetings. A concerted effort to fill potholes is underway and is making progress (even though it may not appear that way!).

5A Service

The reliability and timetabling of the 5A service continues to undermine the quality and usefulness of the service. This new timetable was introduced on 18 February.

Good news on Funding for Housing

SCDC has been awarded £4.5 million as part of the Government's Local Authority Housing Fund. The funding, for this financial year and 2023-24, is to help the Council to acquire 30 additional homes. These will initially be used to accommodate refugees from Ukraine and Afghanistan but, when they are no longer needed for this purpose, the homes will be available through the council housing waiting list.

Homes for Ukraine: Hosts Still Needed for Guests Already in South Cambridgeshire

Hosts are still desperately needed across South Cambridgeshire to support families who have already arrived from Ukraine, with hosts eligible to receive up to £500 a month as a thank you payment. Around 770 people from Ukraine have already arrived in South Cambridgeshire and with the war continuing - and it not being safe for many families to return - there is an ongoing demand to provide them with a safe place to stay. Under the Homes for Ukraine scheme, hosts sign up to provide a home to guests for a minimum of six months. However, around 20% of current hosts are not able to continue past that initial sixmonth point. It means that guests who have been staying with them would benefit from alternative accommodation locally, so they can continue to build on the relationships and community connections they have already been able to make. Hosts receive comprehensive support from the District Council, along with a £350 monthly Government 'Thank you' payment.

The District Council also offers an additional opt-in monthly payment to hosts of £150. This takes the total host payment to £500 per month. Anyone who can offer a spare room and warm welcome is being asked to text ROOM to 88802 so the Council can support them through the process and match hosts to guests who have already started to settle in the local area.

Voter ID

From May this year, voters will be required to show photo ID in polling stations before being allowed to vote. Although there are no scheduled elections in South Cambridgeshire after May this year, we're encouraging voters to think about this now and (if they do not have the required ID) to apply for their free Voter ID now. They can apply for their Voter Authority Certificate online.
