Spring Planting in the Orchard

On a cool March Saturday a hardy group of villagers gathered at the Community Orchard on Earith Road to plant wild flower bulbs. Often people plant bulbs in the autumn but bulbs 'in the green' can be planted in early to late springtime too. This means that the bulbs will have leaves growing and may have flower buds. The main reason for buying bulbs in this way is because you know they are viable and they will establish more quickly and successfully in the coming year.

Willingham Action Group (WAG) obtained a grant of £500 towards additional bulb planting and other money came in from the 'Adopt a Tree' scheme for establishing bluebells in the woodland area. In the past we have used 'Boston Bulbs' based in Lincolnshire, always very helpful and they provided all of our bulbs this time, speedily delivered. We were very pleased and grateful to have had so many willing volunteers of all ages come and give up their time to plant and although I won't mention everyone by name (you know who you are, I think) a special mention goes to Margot and Monty (plus mums) for their endless enthusiasm. Who knew snowdrops could disappear into the ground so quickly!

In total 1,600 bulbs were planted; 1,000 bluebells, 200 narcissi, 200 wild garlic, 100 snowdrops and 100 lily of the valley. Most of the flowers you see popping up this spring will be from previous years' plantings but next year we hope for a wider spread of colour and varieties. As spring creeps its way forward, flowers will be appearing across the orchard among the fruit trees. Look out for cowslips, the delicate bell-headed snakeshead fritillary, small native tulips, bluebells as well as meadow flowers like buttercups and clovers that were there before we planted anything.

It's great to see dogs with their humans using the orchard, but we did notice poops in places where they shouldn't be so please use the bins and don't let your dogs dig up the plants! The bunnies do enough of that!

In the autumn there will be further opportunities to continue planting so watch out for any announcements in *Willingham News*. More information about any WAG activities can be found at <u>www.willinghamlife.org</u>.

Old Willingham



This view in Church Street is mostly changed today although the building with the arched windows remains. The ramshackle workshop in the middle was used as a bicycle sales and repair shop in the 1910s. Behind it, the end of a larger thatched building is just visible. The big house on the right, with inglenook fireplace, is probably very old. Its most likely fate was to burn down. What a shame! The date is unclear. It looks early but, intriguingly, the post outside appears to be a lamp and gas did not come to the village until the mid-1930s. Note the dirty state of the road and lack of pavements.

The Willingham British School Trust

Liz will be discussing ADHD and its impact on women in particular.

WI News

Our quiz last month was a great success, enjoyed by all who came and won by the Pringles team. The £152 raised by the raffle will be donated to the DEC Turkey-Syria Earthquake Fund.

At our February meeting our speaker, Steve Moore, talked to us about the Sutton Hoo Ship Reconstruction Project, focusing on King Readwald and the believed connections to Willingham.

Steve looked very impressive in his full Anglo-Saxon costume with 'combat safe' weapons. He explained the importance of Willingham 'by the sea' and Belsar's Hill Fort in defending the main dykes in the area, suggesting that some of the damage sustained to the bottom of the ship at Sutton Hoo might have been caused during shallow water deliveries here. Evidence of Anglo-Saxon habitation in the village has been found in Saxon Way and Balland Field excavations, consisting mainly of long house post holes. Belsar's Hill has not been excavated.

King Readwald of East Anglia ruled in the 7th Century and was involved in many battles with the Mercians. After he died in 632, it is believed that his ship was stripped of its contents and pushed up the hill to Sutton Hoo where it was turned into a burial chamber for him.

The Sutton Hoo site was excavated originally in 1938 by Basil Brown, under the patronage of the landowner, Edith Pretty. The only clue to the construction of the ship was the imprint in the soil, rivets and a few areas of thicker timber; the rest had rotted away. The imprint was an impressive 90ft long by 15ft wide.

Citi5 Bus

After facing issues with the timetabling of the Citi5 Bus which were detailed at length in last month's edition, revised timetables have been produced by Stagecoach. However, the Parish Council has continued to raise concerns about inaccuracies regarding some of the timings and we are due to meet with the County Council and Stagecoach in the coming weeks to press them on working to rectify the present issues. The Council continues to make the provision of public transport for the village a key priority and will continue to repeatedly raise our concerns at every opportunity.

Lost Property

This is a final appeal for a small purse containing some money that was handed in during the fun fair weekend at the end of last year. Despite several appeals no one has claimed it. If you or anyone you know has lost such an item then please get in touch with the Parish Council Office (details below). If it is not claimed by **21 April** then the money will be returned to the original finder.

In addition, we still have a Mercedes car key handed into the office that was found in late February. Again, if it is not claimed by **21 April** then it will have to be destroyed.

Barton Field Unveiling Event

A reminder that, as described in last month's *Willingham News*, at 11 am on **Sunday 2 April**, we will be unveiling at Barton Field an information board organised and funded by the Willingham Action Group (WAG). It describes some of the flora and fauna at the lovely site as well as a brief history. The field was generously donated by a parishioner, and it is a peaceful, unmanaged area of trees, shrubs and grass, with no facilities. Everyone is welcome and access is only on foot from Rampton Road along Black Pit Drove. We hope to see as many faces as possible there!

Meadow Road

The Council is continuing with its project to make the site on Meadow Road a nature-friendly location for all to enjoy. There are plans for a nature pond at the back of the site and the Council is due to take delivery of 450 whips over the coming weeks. Sustainable Transport Zone (Congestion Charge)

As ever, the Council was grateful to hear from parishioners in the public forum. Concerns were raised with a powerful presentation regarding the 'Sustainable Transport Zone' put forward by the Greater Cambridge Partnership. As a non-political body, the Council has not made a formal decision regarding the proposals but has responded to the consultation raising our serious concerns about the poor standards of the bus service provided to the village.

Coronation

With the Coronation fast approaching, the Parish Council has been looking for a way to celebrate the event. The Council provided, with great success, commemorative bookmarks for all the pupils at the Primary School to celebrate the late Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee last summer and so for this monumental event, the Council is looking to provide Coronation mugs. In addition, it is hoped to hold a Coronation celebration event on **Sunday 7 May** in the village with details of the occasion to be confirmed.

Due to a recent resignation from the Parish Council, there is a vacancy that the Council hopes to fill by co-option at the May meeting **(3 May)**. We encourage anyone interested in applying to contact the Clerk for more information and the application form.

A Message from Our Dispensary

Hello from your dispensary team, who are based at the Longstanton branch surgery.

As a very small team you can imagine the volume of calls we experience. We ask patients to use the System Online service to order repeat medication as much as possible. You can also order repeats via the NHS App or deliver your paper copies into the surgery at Willingham or Longstanton to keep the phone lines open for enquires and queries. You can also hand in your repeat slips at the Willingham Pharmacy.

It has come to our attention that our phone lines are constantly ringing with no reply. This is purely because there is currently not an engaged tone in place and we will be on the phone dealing with other patients. Please be patient and we will assist you as soon as we can.

Can we also remind patients who are collecting larger items at Longstanton Dispensary to bring their own collection bags, so we can all try and help do our bit for the planet!

Our current turnaround for regular repeat prescriptions is **three** working days (this does not include weekends) so please be aware of this when ordering and give yourself plenty of time to ensure you don't run out of medication.

We help where we can with urgent orders, however this is always subject to stock availability so we cannot guarantee we can fulfil your prescription. In these circumstances we will advise on how to obtain your medication.

Missed Appointments

In February, 92 appointments were wasted as patients did not attend their appointment at Willingham and 27 did not attend appointments at our Longstanton Branch Surgery.

This included five minor operations which equates to 4.5 hours of clinical time lost, and has extended the waiting list for coils and implants even further.

In total it equates to approximately 20 hours of clinical time lost, which could have been used helping other patients who struggled to get an appointment. To put this into context, it is equivalent to having four GPs working one full day and seeing no patients at all.

Please cancel your appointment if it is no longer needed. This can be done either online, via the NHS app or by calling the surgery and selecting option 3 to leave an answerphone message.

Willingham Wheels 'Sofa to 50k'

Willingham Wheels will be running a 'Sofa to 50k' training plan starting on **Tuesday 25 April**.

I am sure many of you will have heard of the 'Couch to 5k' training plan. Reader's Letter

Safety for Horse Riders in Willingham

I am a horse rider who has ridden in Willingham for over 40 years. Generally I try to keep off the roads but I do have to use them to get to the tracks. As you are aware, a lot of our tracks are being concreted and taken over by new building but we do still try to keep away from the traffic if possible.

I have to say that the drivers in Willingham are usually very considerate and this is much appreciated but on Sunday 26 February I had two separate incidents, one that tried to crush me into parked cars outside the post office when the driver thought it was sensible to overtake me, and the other was on Green Street where a car actually drove at me, my horse took a side step to avoid it and I ended up on the ground with the car driving off. Sadly my head cam broke, otherwise I would have had a good clear film and registration number to pass on.

On 29 January 2022 new rulings came into effect for the Highway Code as follows:

- 1. The new hierarchy of road users gives more responsibility to those who present the most risk. For example, drivers have responsibility for themselves, as well as cyclists, horse riders and pedestrians, because they present the most risk.
- 2. Within the hierarchy, cyclists and horse riders are to be treated equally.
- 3. Riders have responsibility for themselves, and more vulnerable road users like pedestrians.
- 4. Other road users must pass riders at no more than 10 mph, with at least two metres of space.
- 5. Cyclists must not pass a horse on the left.
- 6. Drivers should take extra care when entering a roundabout and must not cut across riders who are continuing around the roundabout in the left-hand lane.
- 7. Horse riders should give way to pedestrians on a zebra crossing, and pedestrians and cyclists at a parallel crossing.
- 8. Horse riders should give way to pedestrians on bridleways, or other shared use paths.

I can assure you most horse riders either stick to their arenas if they are lucky enough to have them or, like me, hack along the tracks if they are safe enough to do so (which at present is also difficult due to the regular fly tipping).

Most riders wear fluorescent tabards and rugs so there is no excuse not to be seen. Please remember that horses are living creatures and can be spooked by the slightest thing and there is no such thing as a 100% safe horse.

All I ask is, for the safety of horse riders, please respect the 10 mph speed limit with two-metre width to keep us all safe.

District Councillor Bill Handley's Report

It is the time of year when all local authorities set their priorities and budgets for the year. At a recent meeting of the full Council at SCDC the following decisions were taken.

Council Tax Rise

The SCDC portion of Council Tax is to rise by 3.1%. This represents an increase of £5 per year (or 10p per week for a Band D property). All increases are regrettable, but inflation (currently around 10%, with wage inflation at 6%) affects the Council's budget as it does all others, and the Council has around 600 employees.

Council House Rents

Another regrettable consequence of the rise in inflation is the need to increase council house rents by 7%. Although this is below the current rate of inflation the Council recognises that this will be a worry for many people, and it is not a decision that the Council takes lightly. The costs attached to planned improvements in housing are high but it means that modernised homes are significantly more affordable for council tenants to live in.

Councillors' Allowances

Like MPs, councillors in local authorities have to set their own allowances, which is far from ideal. In common with many local authorities, SCDC employs an Independent Review Panel (IRP) to determine what the allowances should be and, this year, they recommended that allowances should rise by 4.25%. The accepted IRP recommendation will take the allowance for an 'ordinary' councillor to £5,501 per annum.

Business Plan

The Council's revised Business Plan was considered and approved by Council. See <u>tinyurl.com/2s8dk75e</u>. It restates that SCDC will be a green, modern and caring council which helps local businesses to grow and provides housing that is affordable for everyone to live in. This is the plan on which I and our controlling administration were re-elected only nine months ago which we will continue to strive to deliver.

Independent District Councillor

Dan Lentell's Report

Here are some of the key issues from the full meeting of South Cambridgeshire District Council which took place on Tuesday, 21 February.

General Fund Budget

I voted with the Lib Dems on budget items relating to borrowing to promote strategic investment as a means to provide alternative sources of income. However, I spoke in favour of, and voted for, the Conservative Group Budget Proposal. This included a freeze on Council Tax. At a time of spiralling inflation and a cost of living crisis, I do not consider it wise or fair to further burden residents with an increasing Council Tax bill.

This motion was defeated and the budget was passed including a rise in Council Tax.

Housing Revenue Account Budget

I voted against the 7% (maximum allowed) increase in rents from social housing properties. Raising rents for those in council housing should be the very last thing we should be doing during a cost of living crisis. I am entirely unconvinced that the promise of triple-glazed windows, to be delivered at some unspecified point in the future, justifies this. This council house rents increase was passed by 29 votes to 9.

Members' Allowances Scheme

I spoke and voted against putting a single penny piece of the increased Council Tax and social housing rents into my own pocket. To have done so would have been to negate every promise I have ever made and every value of service I hold dear. This is a simple point of principle for me. It makes me heartsick that others do not feel the same.

This unneeded, inappropriate, unconscionable rise in the remuneration paid to councillors was passed by 28 votes to 10.

Cambridgeshire County Councillor Neil Gough's Report

Dear Residents, now that spring is here I hope that you're enjoying the lighter evenings. Here is my update of County Council matters, based upon my March report to Willingham PC.

5A Bus

Cllr Firouz Thompson and I continue to work with Stagecoach to get a satisfactory response on the timetable for the 5A service to continue. The new timetable has been approved but still fails in several respects. A further meeting with Stagecoach has been requested to involve the Parish. We also had a meeting with the CPCA which funds the service.

20 mph Zones

Applications can soon be submitted for new 20 mph schemes to help improve road safety and reduce pollution through a new process and funding. Around eight schemes are expected to be delivered in each application period (per year). Applications can be submitted by any person as long as they have the support of their local Parish/Town Council and County Councillor.

Schemes deemed eligible for the 2023/24 window will be approved in September, with construction taking place between April and August 2024 following design work and consultation.
