RSPB Update on Fen Drayton Lakes



The common tern, with its sleek white wings, pointed tail feathers and bold black cap, is a true symbol of summer. They are migratory birds and travel thousands of miles each year between their UK breeding grounds and their

wintering grounds in Western and Southern Africa. These graceful birds, known for their incredible aerial acrobatics, can be found nesting in large colonies along the coast, but they also frequent inland lakes where they dive and hover over the water in search of small fish.

Common terns, like all ground nesting species, are highly susceptible to disturbance from human activities such as boating, fishing or simply walking along a beach. Tern rafts have therefore become a key tool in the conservation of the species, providing safe nesting sites that can help to boost the birds' overall population numbers. On inland sites like Fen Drayton Lakes, tern rafts are particularly important for providing additional nesting habitat for common terns which often face competition from other bird species, such as the larger black-headed gulls that nest on the lake islands here.

The tern rafts themselves are sturdy platforms of recycled plastic anchored out in the lakes and designed to mimic the natural nesting habitat. Terns lay their eggs in shallow depressions on the ground so the raft is topped with a layer of gravel to provide a secure base for the nests.

As you approach Ferry or Moore Lakes from May onwards, one of the first things you may notice is the sound of the common terns calling out to each other. Looking up, you may see them darting and swooping over the lake, islands and tern rafts, often carrying fish for partners or, a bit later in the summer, their young. As the summer months roll on, the common terns begin to flourish, with fledged chicks taking flight and joining their parents as they prepare for their mammoth migration back south.

Watching the common terns nesting and interacting with each other on their rafts is a truly enchanting experience and a window into the natural world that is so often overlooked in our hectic lives. Why not come down and enjoy this all too brief annual spectacle this summer?

Old Willingham



Willingham has few old cottages. Many were lost to fire but others were demolished to build something 'better'. To be fair, they were often quite dilapidated and, in a time when heritage was less valued and new things admired, it made sense. Here is the demise of one, next to the old Methodist Church on the Green. It is clearly quite old from the inglenook style chimney and was good quality, built from brick rather than clunch (chalky limestone). It appears to have two doors so may have been two cottages; earlier photographs of the Green show there was another smaller chimney on the end which, here, has already been demolished.

A Coronation Goes Wrong

There is no doubt that preparations for the Coronation of King Charles III have been exemplary. But spare a thought for Queen Victoria, whose ceremony in 1838 was thereafter known as 'the last of the botched coronations' by many historians. It was under-rehearsed and underprepared, most of those involved in the actual ceremony didn't have a clue regarding the proceedings. It was blighted by accidents and errors. An ageing peer had to be helped up by the Queen herself, after he fell down the steps on his way to pay her homage.

Benjamin Disraeli recalled that 'those involved were always in doubt as to what came next, and you saw the want of rehearsal'. Queen Victoria herself wrote in her diary that 'The Archbishop had (most awkwardly) put the ring on the wrong finger, and the consequence was that I had the greatest difficulty to take it off again, which I at last did with great pain.' And, during the ceremony, she was informed by a bishop that the service was over when it wasn't, so she had to be brought back to continue.

The whole ceremony took five hours and two dress changes for Her Majesty. And yet, thankfully, she spoke very fondly of the ceremony in her diaries.

Book Review

Rebecca by Daphne du Maurier

Set before World War II, Rebecca was the first wife of Max de Winter, the rich owner of Manderley, a mansion in Cornwall. She drowned at sea and, to cope with his grief, Max spends time away in the south of France and Monte Carlo. Here he meets a young woman, whom he marries and brings back to live in Manderley.

The housekeeper, Mrs Danvers, who adored Rebecca, makes life difficult for the new Mrs de Winter, who is young, gauche and has no experience of running such an establishment.

However, the plot thickens when a ship goes aground in a fearsome fog and, while assessing the damage caused, the diver discovers Rebecca's sailing boat on the seabed, containing a body. Whose is it? It was thought she always sailed alone. How does the mystery unfold? Copies of the book are available in the library.

Nature's Names

Dandelions are displaying their yellow heads around the village, then dispersing their tufted seeds in the wind. The name *dandelion* was borrowed from the French *dent-de-lion*, meaning *lion's tooth*, presumably so-called because of the toothlike points of their leaves. The plant has many local dialectal names, including *clocks*, *farmer's clocks*, *tell-time* and *time flower*.

Coronation

The Parish Council is supporting proposals for celebrations of the Coronation of King Charles III on **6 May**. This is being organised by Willingham Action Group and will take place on **Sunday 7 May**. As you will have noticed from the cover of the magazine, the theme is a '*Big Lunch*'.

Highways

The County Council is supporting applications for 20 mph areas throughout Cambridgeshire. The Parish Council is planning to apply for a village-wide zone. We need the support of residents for this, so an online survey has been organised. The application needs to be in by **30 April** and the results will be coordinated before then. Please try to complete the survey (if you receive the magazine in time) so we can give an accurate indication of the level of support for such a scheme.

There has been a great response to setting up a SpeedWatch group in the village. This has been supported by the Parish Council and Community RoadWatch. Residents of Earith Road are the largest group, but other areas such as Station Road and Green Street are also actively interested in taking part. Cambridgeshire Police SpeedWatch section has instigated training and, on completion, sessions will be started. The police's Casualty Reduction Unit has also visited the village and will be conducting extra checks on our local roads.

Other traffic measures will hopefully be finalised and completed soon. These include traffic calming measures along Rampton Road (funding from the Northstowe development) and priority 'give way' features on Rampton Road at the 30 mph sign, and at a repositioned 30 mph sign at the village boundary on Over Road.

There are plans to complete the water main installation along Over Road between High Street and Aspinall's Yard between **29 May and 7 July**, although the map indicates closure up to Haden Way. The diversion is via Over and Longstanton. Hopefully the works on the crossroads scheduled to finish on 16 May will not overrun.

Buses

Stagecoach has proposed new timetables operating from 16 April. The Citi 5, which no longer operates beyond Longstanton Park and Ride, will now be a half hourly service. The 5A, which serves a circular route from the Park and Ride via Swavesey and Over to Willingham and back to Longstanton, runs hourly; the connections with the Citi 5 involve a minimum wait of 15 to 20 minutes, assuming all run to time! The Parish Council continues to press for a better and more consistent service for the village, both now and when future Greater Cambridge Partnership proposals come into being.

Hanson and RSPB Reserve (Ouse Fen)

A snow bunting was reported in December, and a family group of four otters. Water and rock pipits could be seen over winter and up to 15 cattle egrets also fed behind a working excavator. There was a peak roost count of 35 marsh harriers in January. The Konik ponies from Wicken Fen are doing well, apart from one tragic loss. For visitors, the new circular 'Quarry Life' walk was opened around Cuckoo Fen over winter, promoted as part of this sustainable access project. Access is at the top of Long Lane in Over.

Work on the Hanson site is being reduced to two days a week until the end of the year, although deliveries are not affected. HCVs are banned from using the B1050 through Willingham between Earith and the Northstowe development. Any marked Hanson vehicles doing this should be reported to the company, with the date and time, and the direction in which they were travelling.

Meadow Road Project

This is progressing well, and many new whips and trees have been planted. A water feature is being planned and biodiversity is to be enhanced with help from a development site in Over.

The practice is not able to provide fit-to-race statements for sporting events, as the GPs are not qualified sports medicine doctors and not indemnified to provide these. If you need this please contact a private GP with expertise in this area or a sports medicine doctor.

GPs will complete insurance documents; however, they are not covered under the NHS contract. This means they can take up to a month to complete and charges may apply.

Electric Vehicle Charging Points

South Cambridgeshire District Council recently installed two Electric Vehicle Charge Points (EVCPs) in the car parking spaces outside the SCDC Sheltered Accommodation communal building at Wilford Furlong. The EVCPs are for public use including SCDC tenants, local residents and visitors. Please note that only the two marked *EV Charging* parking spaces will be available for public use; the remainder of the car park spaces are retained for SCDC tenants and users of the communal building.

The chargers are dual-socket 7kW chargers able to charge two vehicles simultaneously. Electricity used must be paid for by the users of the EVCPs and will cost 35p per kilowatt hour. Payment can be made using a contactless card, and there is no need to download a mobile phone app to access the charger.

Thought for the Month

The word that seemed most uppermost in everyone's mind over Easter was 'Journey'! This year many friends and family have made and talked about journeys they hoped to make, some to faraway places with the prospect of warmth and sunshine, some to renew relationships with loved ones, and others on their journey of discovery or renewal of faith.

Travel, it is said, broadens the mind; it should be fun and make good memories. To get the most from a journey we need to make preparations, open ourselves to new experiences, be brave enough to take a risk maybe in what we eat, where we go or how we travel.

Lucy Frazer, MP — Potholes

It is important that our roads are kept in good condition to ensure the safety of road users, cyclists and pedestrians. Over the past months, the combination of heavy rain and freezing temperatures has led to new potholes, which I know have caused concern for many of you. I am pleased that, in the Spring Budget, the Chancellor announced that the Government will place an extra £200 million towards the Potholes Fund. This takes the total pothole budget for UK local authorities to £700 million in the 2023/24 financial year. The uplift will mean an additional £4.1 million for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough.

Although it is the responsibility of Cambridgeshire County Council to repair the highways in my constituency, I have always been happy to report problems on behalf of my constituents and follow up with the authority if any issues remain outstanding.

Cambridgeshire County Councillor Neil Gough's Report

Dear Residents, this month's report is, as usual, based upon my report to Parish Councils in my division.

Children's Services Funding

Pressure on school places for children in Cambridgeshire with additional needs could be eased thanks to an agreement forged by the County Council with national Government which will see almost 600 new school places created in the next three years. Without this funding, the Council would have to make widespread cuts in its support for children with SEND.

Cost of Living Support

A further £7.1 million will be spent over the next year to support Cambridgeshire households with their cost of living through the Household Support Fund (HSF). The HSF is a government-funded scheme with the latest award to be spent from April until the end of March next year.

Details on the schemes can be found on the County Council's website.

Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) - Cambourne to Cambridge

The Council supported the GCP's proposal for a Transport and Works Act Order on a preferred route for the Cambridge to Cambourne busway - which follows seven years of public consultation and modelling.

The GCP will make an application to the Department for Transport this summer and it is likely that a public inquiry will be called later in the year, after which the Secretary of State will take the decision. If the proposed route is approved, the GCP is committed to planting 1,500 new trees which is significantly more than will be removed. Around 500 trees would be removed from Coton Orchard, comprising mainly relatively young trees on dwarf rootstock. The proposed route avoids constraints posed by the Madingley Wood, a biodiverse ancient woodland and a Sight of Special Scientific Interest, and the American Cemetery.

5A Bus Service

Councillor Thompson and I have been in touch with the Combined Authority and Stagecoach regarding the 5A service:

Stagecoach is organising updated roadside timetables for Willingham and Over, and the same A4 printed timetables we offered before. They will ask their drivers to take some of these with them on their runs, once printed. Stagecoach also agreed to correct the timetable on their website. Passenger numbers show over 20% increase in the six weeks to 19 March.

Highways – Quarterly Meeting

A meeting for Parish Clerks and the Highways Officers was organised for 27 April. At the time of writing (early April), there were a number of outstanding issues due to be raised!

S106 Northstowe Funding

I am pleased that the plans for the traffic calming schemes in Willingham, Rampton and Cottenham have been produced by Highways and are being reviewed by the Parish Councils.

General Funding

The business plan agreed by the Council in February included a budget of £32.76 million for maintenance of the highways. This is an increase on the previous budget as proposed by preceding administrations. A difficult balance is having to be struck between the immediate challenge of potholes and preventative maintenance to avoid longer term road deterioration - more details are shown in the on-line version of this report.

District Councillor Bill Handley's Report

Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) 'Making Connections' Consultation

A motion at the last meeting of full Council suggested that SCDC support a referendum on the introduction of a Sustainable Travel Zone in Cambridge. The motion stimulated a lively debate but was voted down. Councillors were reminded that the GCP's public consultation document deliberately asked a range of open and closed questions, to gauge not just whether or not respondents supported the scheme, but also which elements they did or did not support, what they might like to see done differently and what alternatives they would propose. This was intended to provide richer and more nuanced feedback than a simple referendum could give and would allow decision makers to balance the wide range of different perspectives.

Since the consultation closed, the GCP has been processing around 24,000 responses. The analysis is ongoing, but the majority of concerns seen so far have been related to how the proposals will affect patients and visitors to the Addenbrookes Campus, those wishing to visit friends and loved ones, and those needing to enter the zone for business.

It was always intended that the issues raised by the consultation would be dealt with by positive, practical changes and these are likely to include exemptions, dispensations and discounts, underpinned by the latest technology. This is what the GCP is now working towards, and they have a clear remit to protect the least well off.

The results of the consultation will be included in a final report on the proposals and next steps, scheduled for the GCP Board in June, after which they will make a recommendation to Cambridgeshire County Council on whether to proceed with a scheme.

New Government Funding to Decarbonise Council Homes

SCDC has successfully bid for £1.7 million of Government funding, to continue its work to decarbonise its Council homes. This will be added to the projects the Council has already started to improve, and help the Council achieve its own and the Government's Net Zero targets. The District Council owns and maintains around 5,600 Council homes; the new funding will go towards energy efficiency upgrades such as insulation, replacement windows and doors, draft proofing and solar panels. These measures could save tenants between £220 and £400 a year on energy bills.

Action Taken on Fly Tipping

Reducing fly tipping in South Cambridgeshire is one of the Council's goals for 2023/24, and fines of £400 have recently been issued where waste has been illegally dumped. In two recent cases (in Impington and Cottenham) homeowners had not checked that the operator had the necessary

permit and when SCDC officers visited the site, they found evidence linking the waste to the owners.

District Councillor Dan Lentell's Report

Here are some key issues from the full meeting of South Cambridgeshire District Council on Thursday 31 March.

Result of the Cottenham Ward By-Election

A by-election in Cottenham was held following the death of Councillor John Loveluck. Councillor Loveluck won the seat (in May 2022) with 1,545 votes. His predecessor as councillor ran to fill the vacancy and was returned with 864 votes.

Assistants for Political Groups

Along with Councillor Dr Richard Williams, I was one of only two councillors who voted against the introduction of Assistants for Political Groups at SCDC. While I agree that the Leader of the Opposition requires dedicated administrative support, in my opinion this proposal simply diverts taxpayers' money away from frontline services.

Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority

I took the opportunity to request that SCDC's best wishes be passed along to Rob Bridge, the CPCA's newly appointed Chief Executive. There are lots of positives about this appointment. However, more and better managers will only get us so far. In my view we need a slimmed-down unitary authority, such as the one in North Northamptonshire which Mr Bridge helped introduce and has been running since 2021.

Greater Cambridge Partnership

I took the opportunity to state that in my opinion the GCP is broken beyond repair as a result of its poor handling of the Congestion Charge proposal. That proposal would have been 1000% times less dire if our hardworking Parish Councils had been given much earlier access to the policy formation process.

Motion Standing in the Name of Councillor Heather Williams

I was pleased to second a motion at the invitation of Councillor H. Williams for a referendum on the introduction of a 'sustainable travel charge' otherwise known as the 'Cambridge Congestion Charge' and for the chance to reiterate my view that none of us elected-councillortypes have any kind of a mandate to introduce congestion charging. The ballot box is the foundation of our system of government. Consent matters.
