New Baby Registrations

New parents are advised to register their baby at their earliest convenience. Your baby will need an eight week check with the GP, therefore registration as soon as possible after birth is advised in case your child requires GP treatment in the meantime.

You can collect registration packs from reception or request postage to your home address. Forms can also be collected before birth when you attend your next midwife appointment.

Extended Access Appointments

Our patients have access to evening and weekend appointments at Nuffield Road Medical Centre in Cambridge, Comberton Surgery, St Mary's Surgery in Ely, Royston Health Centre and Over Surgery.

You can book an appointment through our receptionists who will give you the time, date and venue for your appointment. These are for **non-urgent**, **routine** appointments only.

You will be given a choice on when you would like to book your appointment and information on where to go.

Services offered within the Extended Access are -

- GP Consultations
- Advanced Nurse Practitioner consultations
- Nurse appointments offering dressings, asthma and diabetes reviews, contraception reviews, etc
- Health Care Assistant appointments offering ear irrigation, wound care, blood test, etc
- Phlebotomy: Routine blood tests are available within Extended Access Clinics
- Cervical Screening

Please note that your consent for their clinician to view your medical record will be required in order for an appointment to be booked for you.

Extended access appointments **are not** suitable for patients identified with a potentially life-threatening medical condition which required referral to urgent or emergency care settings. Walk-in patients are also not accepted.

For support with the management of minor ailments, please contact your local pharmacist or visit the NHS website.

Staying Safe When the Hot Weather Arrives

RSPB Update on Fen Drayton Lakes

The summer is a time of riotous profusions of wildflowers. Various hues ranging from delicate pastels to eye-catching vivid colours pepper the landscape. Here at Fen Drayton Lakes, there are lots of flourishing places to observe the spectacle of colour. This article will cover a few of the better places to go searching and what to look out for.

For a brief window of time, the wetland margins on Ferry Lagoon can be a vision of purple created by Purple Loosestrife. This is a tall plant that likes to grow in damp soil and is a favourite of pollinating insects because the flower stem is a collection of many hundreds of smaller flowers offering lots of nectar. Set against fresh green reeds, this colour combination really is something to be seen in person.

The busway through the reserve creates a connection not just for people but for flowers. The banks of the busway were seeded when completed and June and July are peak times for the Ox-eye Daisies and Hedge Bedstraw which grow here in abundance. Both have white flowers but look out for the yellow centres to the daisies. Many other wildflowers also grow here such as the yellow Lady's Bedstraw and lilac Field Scabious. The long continuous banks allow seeds to spread over time, helping to maintain the diversity of species.

Perhaps the pinnacle of plants at the reserve is the rare sight of a Bee Orchid. They seem to pop up in different places every year and are rather small, so seeing them in amongst other flowers and grasses is a real botanical challenge. The Bee Orchid is a mimic, whereby the flower impersonates a female bee. This lures male bees to fly in and pollinate the flower. However, there's a twist in this story. The specific bee that does this behaviour is not present in the UK and the orchid must self-pollinate instead. Nature is often more complicated than it first appears!

Why not come to the reserve and take in the seasonal display put on by the wildflowers.

Willow Weaving Worskhop

Using willow harvested from the reserve during our winter habitat management work, try your hand at making a willow woven garden obelisk using traditional skills. You will be able to take your obelisk home with you for growing climbing plants in your garden

Thought for the Month

Nature's Names

The daisies we see in our lawns at this time of year are just one variety amongst thousands of this common plant. The name *daisy* originates from the Old English *dægeseage*, which in turn was derived from the Scandinavian *dagens auge* — both meaning *day's eye*. This is because many types of daisy flowers close up at night — the underside of the closed petals is not as bright and attractive as the flower colour, so it helps to prevent them from being eaten after dusk by hungry herbivores! Flowers that close at night are called *nyctinastic*.

WI News

At our April Meeting Liz Taylor, the CEO from Red2Green, gave a very interesting talk about how the charity supports people aged over 16 years who are living with learning disabilities and autism. Their services are available to small groups of people, helping them with independence, learning and maintaining key skills and appropriate behaviour, having fun and meeting new people.

Liz explained that girls with autism are 'hiding in plain sight' and much less likely to be diagnosed because they are better at masking their condition and therefore not getting the support they need soon enough. Compared with boys, girls are more socially motivated, may smile and make eye contact, have more acceptable special interests and are good at imitating others. Presenting themselves as quiet, shy and passive, but with the same sensitivity to light, noise, frustration and meltdowns, some attempt to control their mental dilemma with eating disorders and self-harm. Some of the problems experienced by autistic children at school include being bullied because they are different. They become exhausted by trying so hard to fit in and therefore often have poor school attendance.

Liz mentioned that Cambridgeshire is very fortunate in having a medical research unit for autism and two good schools: Cavendish, a state school, and Hope Tree, an independent school originally set up by a Mum. However, availability of places and funding remain a problem.

Resolutions

The WI resolution, 'Clean Rivers for People and Wildlife' was voted on and adopted. The national WI organisation will urge its members, the public, local authorities and Government to make, support and promote application for official designated bathing sites on appropriate stretches of rivers in their area. This will be as instrumental to the clean-up of rivers as it has been for water quality improvement at coastal beaches.

County Councillor – Neil Gough's Report

Dear Residents, here is my update on County Council Matters, based on my Report to the Parish Council.

Winter Gritting/Maintenance

The winter season has recently ended and, from a Highways Gritting perspective, although it has been relatively mild one, but this hasn't meant the gritters stayed parked up! The team carried out 51 full runs and six part runs across the County. A total distance of 69,000 miles and we used nearly 9,000 tonnes of salt.

Potholes

The winter has seen a rise in the number of potholes and surface defects across the road network. Whilst the demand has been increasing, we have been recording and fixing potholes as fast as we can. We have put in additional repair gangs and currently have eight patching Gangs and two Dragon Patchers working full time.

We are aiming to fix most permanently first time. However, we are having to do temporary repairs where the road is very poor condition and when we are fixing in wet weather. These temporary fixes are recorded, and we will be going back to do a permanent repair.

There should be a fall in potholes numbers over the coming months as the roads dry out and we repair all those that have been reported. Our normal additional proactive Dragon Patcher is now with us for the summer and will be working across the County. £3.6 million additional funding for road defect repairs from Government will be used to bring in additional Dragon Patchers to work proactively on a find, record and fix regime.

20 mph Applications

I was very pleased to be able to support applications for 20 mph zones, including from Willingham, submitted to the County Council. There will be strong competition for this pot of money so it was great to see such strong and comprehensive cases being made.

S106 Applications

It is good to see progress being made on the traffic calming measures including in Willingham. Discussions have been ongoing with the Highways team in the parish.

5A Bus Service

Following confirmation that funding for the 5A will now be extended for a further year to March 2024, I have (again!) requested a session with Darren Roe of Stagecoach to discuss performance and potential improvement ideas. I really hope to have an update soon.

No Mow May

CCC has been promoting biodiversity this spring. As part of 'No Mow May' our Highways maintenance team paused grass cutting on road verges so habitats for wildlife, plant species and pollinators can thrive. 'No Mow May' is run by Plantlife, who say more than 700 species of wildflowers grow on road verges in the UK - this is almost 45% of the total wildflower species found across the country. Cambridge County Council is committed to a greener Cambridgeshire but of course road safety remains a priority so we will still cut grass where needed to ensure visibility at junctions and bends.

District Councillor – Bill Handley's Report

£224k Funding for Community Wellbeing Hubs

I am delighted to report that South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) has secured funding of £224,000 from the Integrated Care System to further develop our Cost-of-Living Project work. The emphasis will be on the evolution of Warm Hubs, which will be rebranded Community Wellbeing Hubs. These will continue to provide much needed social connection for residents but will also improve outreach to other services which support health and wellbeing. I will share as the project develops.

Civil Parking Enforcement

We recently took another step towards the introduction of Civil Parking enforcement in South Cambridgeshire. The plan is for the Greater Cambridge Partnership to support the project in the first few years of operation but, in time, it will have to be financially self-sufficient. There is still much to do and setting up the scheme requires multi-agency involvement, including that of central government, but SCDC officers have been working on this as a priority, and it is not beyond hope that it could be introduced within a year.

South Cambs Magazine

We are aware that, in some villages, there have been glitches with the delivery of the *South Cambs Magazine* recently and I would encourage anyone who misses out to let us know via scdc@smartdistribution.co.uk or by phoning 0800 6444 011. The magazine is an important source of information on SCDC's services (including changes to bin collections) especially for those people who do not use the internet, so in future I plan to let everyone know that the magazine is due via *Willingham News*.

Grants for Voluntary Groups

Community groups in South Cambridgeshire have been given a funding boost thanks to grants from SCDC. Eleven voluntary sector groups are to receive funding this financial year as part of the Council's Grants to the Voluntary Sector scheme with an emphasis on projects that support people impacted most by the cost-of-living crisis. More details on the groups receiving grants can be found in the on-line version of this article.

Four Day Week Trial for Staff

SCDC is trialling a four-day week for many desk-based staff. The aim is to test whether this will improve employees' wellbeing and impact the acute retention problems, which currently cost £2m per year in agency fees.

The results of the trial so far have been very encouraging: (independently assessed) performance has been maintained and, in some instances, improved and some staff who were thinking of leaving have said that they are now likely to stay. Officer feedback was 88% positive; and the satisfaction feedback from residents has not been impacted. The recommendation is to extend the trial for a further year. Councillors are also soon to be asked to include the refuse collection services in the four-day week trial from this summer.

Annual Meeting of the Parish Council

At the Annual Meeting, all council posts are elected. The Chair and Vice Chair were re-elected, and all lead councillors remain in post except for Halls, where Councillor Gibbs is now the lead. All councillors and their roles are listed on the Council website.

20 mph Initiative

The Council has applied to Cambridgeshire County Council's 20 mph Initiative for a 20 mph zone in the village. To support the application, we submitted a snapshot of the results of the 20 mph Zone Survey on the Council website so far (66% in favour from 191 responses) but will keep the Survey open until July when the list of successful applicants is published.

Potholes

The dire state of local roads cannot have escaped the notice of anyone who drives or cycles. At the Annual Meeting, a parishioner spoke of his concerns and demanded that something be done. The Council agreed, but sadly has no power of its own here as Highways Maintenance is the responsibility of the County Council. Our County Councillor, Neil Gough, was present and also agreed that there is a problem. He explained the very limited funding available after 10 years of managed decline. There are currently more pothole teams than ever but a recent Government grant of £3.6 million was far too small to provide any genuine improvement in the near future. Councillor Gough encouraged everyone to report potholes, if only as a way of providing evidence of the problem.

Tree Work

Every five or six years the Council arranges a survey of all the trees it owns around the village to assess their health and condition, and to recommend any maintenance work which needs to be done. That survey was completed in November. Contractors have been appointed and the work is now underway.

Community Speedwatch

The Speedwatch group is now established and will shortly be undertaking training. They will then be actively engaged in tackling speeding drivers. The Council has purchased an additional Speed Indication Device (SID) to assist the Speedwatch group.

Citi 5A Bus

Councillor Gough reported that funding for the 5A bus will be extended until March 2024. He continues to attempt to arrange a joint meeting with Stagecoach to discuss the problems and possible improvements to this service, but it seems Stagecoach are so busy that providing a date is an almost insurmountable task.

Casual Vacancy

There were no applications for the vacant council seat. We will be readvertising the vacancy with a closing date of July this year. Anyone interested in becoming a Parish Councillor should contact the Clerk in the first instance for further information and/or an application form.
