A very quiet day at the village pond nearly 100 years ago – perhaps early morning. People today often say how nice it would be to have a village pond but, in reality, this was not picturesque. The problem is that there is no stream to refresh the water and so it was just like a huge puddle – drying up in the summer and flooding in heavy rain. You will see that there is not a blade of grass because the pond was used by farmers to wash carts and animals. It would probably have been smelly and prone to mosquitoes, bringing the risk of malaria, still known then in the Fens. Eventually the 'pond' was filled in on public health grounds. Still... it would be nice.

Nature's Names

Although threatened by climate change, bumblebees are hard at work in our gardens, helping to pollinate plants and fruiting trees. In parts of Britain, the bumblebee used to be known as a *dumbledore*. Sounds familiar? Harry Potter fans will recognise it as the headmaster of Hogwarts.

The word originated from the Old English *dumble*, or *drumble*, which meant to move slowly, and *dore*, which was used to signify a humming insect. J K Rowling herself said in an interview in 1999 that she imagined Dumbledore humming at his desk as he worked, as he was fond of music.

In past centuries, the first part of the bumblebee's name has been varied – dumble-, humble-, bumble-, drumble- – all those were the most common. None other than Shakespeare (in A Midsummer Night's Dream) and Charles Darwin (On the Origin of Species, 1859) wrote about 'humble bees', which used to be the most recent alternative name for these important charismatic insects.

Fear of Flying (Flying Phobia) Prescriptions

We are often asked to prescribe sedative drugs, such as Diazepam (Valium), for fear of flying. We have recently agreed a practice policy that we will no longer prescribe these drugs for fear of flying. There are a number of good reasons why prescribing of drugs such as Diazepam is not safe or recommended as other treatments are safer and more effective.

We recognise that fear of flying is real and frightening and we don't underestimate the impact it can have. We recommend tackling this properly by using self-help resources or considering one of the 'Fear of Flying' courses run by many airlines. Heatwave and Very Hot Weather

Most of us welcome hot weather, but when it's too hot for too long, there are health risks. In England there are on average 2,000 heat related deaths every year. If hot weather hits this summer, make sure it does not harm you or anyone you know.

Why is a heatwave a problem?

The main risks posed by a heatwave are:

- not drinking enough water (dehydration)
- overheating, which can make symptoms worse for people who already have problems with their heart or breathing
- heat exhaustion and heatstroke

Who's most at risk?

A heatwave can affect anyone, but the most vulnerable people are:

- older people especially those over 75
- those who live on their own or in a care home
- people who have a serious or long term illness including heart or lung conditions, diabetes, kidney disease, Parkinson's disease or some mental health conditions
- those who may find it hard to keep cool babies and the very young, the bed bound, those with drug or alcohol addictions or with Alzheimer's disease
- people who spend a lot of time outside or in hot places those who live in a top floor flat, the homeless or those whose jobs are outside.

The top ways for staying safe when the heat arrives are to:

 look out for others, especially older people, young children and babies and those with underlying health conditions

- close curtains on rooms that face the sun to keep indoor spaces cooler and remember it may be cooler outdoors than indoors
- drink plenty of water as sugary, alcoholic and caffeinated drinks can make you more dehydrated
- never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle, especially infants, young children or animals
- try to keep out of the sun between 11 am and 3 pm
- take care and follow local safety advice, if you are going into the water to cool down
- walk in the shade, apply sunscreen and wear a hat, if you have to go out in the heat
- avoid physical exertion in the hottest parts of the day
- wear light, loose fitting cotton clothes
- make sure you take water with you if you are travelling

Traffic

The village seems to be surrounded by roadworks and quite a few parishioners have complained about the problems being caused in getting to school, work and shops. The County Council are responsible for agreeing road closures and we have been in regular contact with our county councillor on the subject, regarding issues such as access to the schools during exam times and the serious impact on local businesses. The work that is being carried out is for repair and replacement of essential services, some of which we pressed for last year. The work must be done and is bound to cause disruption, but we would like to see this minimised with better co-ordination of the projects and we will do what we can to press these points. Meanwhile please do not take it out on the contractors. They are just doing their job and are not responsible for the planning.

Buses

In June the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) published the results of their *Making Connections* consultation, which includes the controversial Sustainable Travel Zone (STZ) plus details of an improved bus network that will provide an alternative to car use, to be paid for from STZ revenues. Unfortunately, the submission from Willingham Parish Council was not included. We are trying to find out why and to get our views added before the final decisions are made. Our view, already expressed in previous surveys and at various forums, is that the proposed hourly rural route for Willingham that does not include Cambridge, or any major towns is not an improvement and not a realistic alternative to the car. We should therefore be exempt from the STZ charge, which will hit the poorest hardest.

Illegal Parking

Following the police's refusal to act on this issue, we are delighted to see that the proposal we made last year, that parking enforcement be taken on as a civil matter,

Update from Fen Drayton Lakes

Perhaps the most beautiful of our doves and pigeons, the Turtle Dove is a cherished sight in our landscape and one which has been celebrated in poetry and art since the time of Chaucer. With orange scalloped wings, rose-hued breast and black-and-white striped neck patch this is a distinctive bird. They have nothing to do with turtles themselves; the name comes from their repeated purring call which sounds like the French word – 'Tourterelle'.

This species migrates to Sahelian Africa in the autumn and doesn't return until the following May, spending longer away from the UK than here. The migration is a perilous one and is made even harder by the risk of hunting around the Mediterranean along their journey. This, in combination with a few other causes such as agricultural intensification and habitat loss, has led to the Turtle Dove becoming the UK's fastest-declining bird species with numbers down 98% since the 1970s. A national survey carried out in 2021 found that there were only around 2,100 territories left across the country.

Given this context we are pleased that Fen Drayton Lakes continues to provide a home for several Turtle Doves which have returned and are singing this year. The best places to see them are around Holywell or Far Fen where a scan of the treetops and listening out for the gentle call could help you find them. There have been up to six males in recent years, but it is very hard to tell if they have bred as they become tricky to see during the summer months. However, late last summer we were overjoyed to see young birds following their parents around, learning to feed for themselves.

As part of our reserve management to help the doves, we ensure there are thick hedges for the birds to nest in which are left undisturbed during the breeding season. They also need somewhere to feed such as wildflower-rich field margins that provide a profusion of seed. We supplement this with additional seed to give them a helping hand. The final requirement is somewhere to drink and the margins of the lakes provide lots of opportunities to quench their thirst.

As well as efforts on reserves, the RSPB also runs a partnership project called Operation Turtle Dove, with the aim to reverse the decline by assisting farmers and landowners with advice and support. The project is raising awareness of the plight of this lovely species so that generations of people in the future will be inspired by the special wildlife that chooses the UK as home.

Cambridge Community Hubs Network

Residents across South and East Cambridgeshire can continue to benefit from local support in community buildings this summer, thanks to a new initiative developed on the back of the original Warm Hubs initiative.

Hubs offered residents a chance to socialise, meet new friends, and enjoy each other's company – tackling issues of isolation and loneliness.

Thanks to new funding from Cambridgeshire County Council and South Cambridgeshire District Council, these local communities can continue to deliver and experience community connections under the newly created Cambridgeshire Community Hubs Network. The activities and services available will continue to be operated by the original 'Warm Hubs trained' volunteers.

In South Cambridgeshire, 16 Community Hubs are funded until at least the end of August with more funding under negotiation. These include Landbeach and Willingham. East West Rail

District Councillor Bill Handley's Report

Dear Residents,

This month I'm focusing my report on the recent publication of the results of the Greater Cambridge Partnership's 'Making Connections' transport and STZ consultation, which can be found here: <u>//tinyurl.com/mra44p8x</u>. The following comments are based on an initial review of the GCP report by the Lib Dem Group at South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC).

The aims of the proposals are to improve the quality of life by reducing traffic congestion and pollution. The scheme also seeks to address the serious inequalities apparent in the Greater Cambridge area and to increase the benefits, both to people and the environment, that come from enabling residents to use a modern public transport system in preference to private motor vehicles.

Residents who live and travel to work in the Greater Cambridge area understand that the rapid economic growth in Greater Cambridge needs the infrastructure and housing to support it. This was the purpose of the government's City Deal funding which underpins the STZ proposals. Respondents support better bus services but remain worried, especially during a cost-of-living crisis, about the burden of a Sustainable Travel Zone (STZ) charge. Even though the proposals give three or four years to improve public transport provision before any charging occurs, the public remains sceptical.

The planned withdrawal of rural bus services by Stagecoach in recent months shows market failure; private bus companies will put their business needs ahead of unprofitable but vital community transport provision. Franchising offers control over routes, fares, frequency and hours of operation and could be in place within the next 18 months. People who cannot drive and/or afford a car, such as some young people and the less well-off are very supportive of improved bus services.

There was clear concern about charging to access the Addenbrooke's site. We expect changes to be made such that trips will not incur a Zone charge.

Tradespeople welcome the prospect of easier city access that reduced congestion would bring but think that a premium charge on commercial vehicles is unfair. We hope that this differentiation will be removed.

Respondents thought that an all-day charge is unnecessary, and we are supportive of a scheme that charges only at peak times. This would allow family visits, care workers and delivery trips to be scheduled to take place without incurring any charge.

The final decision on the scheme will be taken by Cambridgeshire County Council later in the year but if anyone has any questions or concerns, I'd be happy to help answer them.

District Councillor Dan Lentell's Report

Last month, the Greater Cambridge Partnership published the data from their 'consultation' into the proposed Congestion Charge.

The GCP was first organised as a stopgap on the road towards the kind of slimmed-down unitary authority our county's local authorities urgently need.

In my opinion hundreds of thousands of pounds were frittered away on a marketing and branding exercise aimed at distracting from the latest round of big subsidies and small returns thrown into the coffers of the private bus operators.

What our county needs is light rail. Light rail would be happening now if the previous elected mayor for Cambridge and Peterborough hadn't got distracted - by a lot of nonsense about automated transit and a tunnel to be dug under the city - only to be replaced by a new mayor with different ideas.

In my opinion what our county most definitely does not need (or want) is a Congestion Charge, that hits the low and unpaid hardest and which puts a paywall between sick folk and their healthcare. Even the GCP's own consultation showed massive opposition across the county, especially in wards such as Over and Willingham.

As your elected district councillor, I pledge to resist the introduction of the Congestion Charge. I also pledge never to divert a single penny piece of the new and increasing local taxes into my own pocket. Councillors should not be voting themselves multiple pay rises during a global cost of living crisis. A global cost of living crisis is not the time to be spiralling up the cost of living locally.

Both Parish Councils and incorporated voluntary or community organisations are invited to apply for the latest round of funding, which is open until **12 July**.

Up to £1 million is available for all asset types (which is an increase on the previous limit of £250,000) and funds can cover up to 80 per cent of the total capital funds required, with applicants required to raise the other 20 per cent from other sources.
