Fen Gallop

After many months of planning, the Fen Gallop Family Running Festival returned to the Recreation Ground on Sunday 2 July, with an army of enthusiastic volunteers and eager runners awaiting that famous bugle start. With the heatwaves of June behind us, our 400-plus runners were treated to almost perfect running conditions across our running events: the chip-timed 10k and 4-mile races, the 1 mile for under 11s and the Mini Sprint for under 5s.

This year saw a new overall 10k race winner, which made for a very exciting finish! Johannes Arens finished the course in an amazing 34:36. The 4-mile race had a new course record with Ben Slow completing it in an incredible 23 minutes, breaking the previous course record of 23:49 in 2017.

The Eileen Askew Trophy winners this year were Leo Brittain and Leo Chamberlain (joint winners) and Olivia Smith for the fastest 4-mile U16s male and female Willingham residents.

The Penry Jones Cup was awarded to Mark Sampson as the fastest Willingham male resident for completing the 10k course with a chip time of 34:58.

The Rene Gould Cup was awarded to Nina Norden as the fastest female resident, with a chip time of 54:03.

On the last weekend in June, 55 young people from Willingham embarked on a weekend of adventure in the Norfolk countryside. It's been four years since our group was last able to run a large camp for all our young people, so this was an important milestone for us.

We were based at the Eaton Vale Activity Centre near Norwich, and during the camp we had the opportunity to take part in climbing, kayaking, archery, air rifle shooting, axe throwing, making catapults, campfire cooking, obstacle courses, artificial caving and canoeing. The traditional element of campfire entertainment was also a massive highlight of our weekend.

With ages ranging from six to 14, some of our young people were on their first camp and, for a few, it would be their last camp with 1st Willingham Scout Group, having notched up over 20 nights away during their time with us. We are very fortunate that we have a fantastic group of leaders that strongly believe these experiences develop independence and team working that will set up our young people for life.

The publication of the latest Community Plan Survey has highlighted the continued demand for youth services in the





community that we currently don't have the capacity to meet. Neither do we have sufficient clarity regarding the future of our meeting space at the Public Hall to be confident of meeting this demand. What we do have is a great structured programme that is able to provide opportunities for young people from all backgrounds. We also have a fantastic team of experienced leaders who would be more than happy to welcome you to the team in any capacity.

Old Willingham

The Old Church Hall on Church Street was built around 1890 in the grounds of the Rectory (now Willingham House). In the 1990s it was sold and converted into a private house.

It never really worked as a church hall as it's a fair walk from the church. but it was used widely for all sorts of village events including WAMADS amateur dramatics productions. During World War 1 it was used as а hospital for recovering soldiers. This month we see a picture from

a very elaborate Christmas nativity play with Angel Gabriel meeting Mary. On the wall behind appears a plaque commemorating its service as a hospital. That plaque can now be seen on the wall in the Octagon – the church hall that was built to replace it.

A Willingham Connection

An obituary recently appeared in *The Guardian* which gave an account of the life of Peter Thoday, the eminent horticulturist who was fundamental in setting up the Cornish tourist attractions, the Eden Project and The Lost Gardens of Heligan. The author could not know of the family's Willingham connections, although it does mention Peter's father, Ralph Thoday, who was for many years the head gardener of St John's College, Cambridge.

In the 19th century there were many branches of the Thoday family in this area, including adjacent parts of Huntingdonshire. Ralph was born in Brampton but worked in Cambridge, first as a gardener at the Botanic Gardens, and then at St John's.

Ralph's father, Ebenezer Thoday, although born at sea, was the son of a Willingham family, and this may have influenced Ralph's decision to come later in life to live in the village at 30 Fen End. He died in 1981, and for a short time I helped to deliver meals on wheels to his widow, Mabel. Seeing their neglected garden, I commented to my colleague that Ralph would have been upset to see the state it was in, whereupon she laughed and said that he was never much interested in looking after his own garden.

Thank you to everyone that came to the Open Meeting on 28 June. It was great to see so many people there representing a whole range of village groups

and organisations. Their stamina in sitting through short presentations on the drafts of all eight sections and the Youth survey is to be applauded! They provided insightful questions and useful feedback.

In total 864 people answered the survey. 41% were not living in Willingham at the time of the last survey in 2008.

The good news is most people like living in the village, giving it a four-out-of-five star rating – which means if Willingham were a product on Amazon, its inhabitants would probably buy it! The range of shops and amenities, our post office, watering holes, friendly people and community, good school and location close to Cambridge all contributed to this positive overall picture.

Of course, it's not all roses – improvements could be made. The table below shows the main headings and the percentage of respondents that see them as a concern.

What do you think should be improved about living in Willingham?	% of answers
Road, Transport and Traffic Issues	36%
Amenities and Community Events	16%
Health Services	13%
Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Safety	11%
Power and Internet Services	10%
Water Management and Flooding	8%
Development and Infrastructure	9%

Feedback from the meeting will enable us to finalise the report which will then be published on the 'Willingham Life' website along with the numeric data. Individual comments won't be published to help preserve anonymity. Paper versions will be lodged in the library for the people without internet access, with copies also going to the Parish Council, South Cambs District Council and Cambridge County Council as part of the required process for community-led planning.

On a final note, the report will contain many recommendations to improve life in our village. This will require people of all ages to engage and act – what's your contribution going to be?

Nature's Names

Foxgloves are stunning summer plants but their name doesn't make much sense. There are many theories on how the name came about, yet etymologists over the centuries have never really agreed on the origins of the name. Even in Anglo-Saxon days, when the name *foxes glofa* started to be used, it's unlikely that foxes ever wore gloves, except in folklore!

The scientific name for foxglove is *digitalis*, after the Latin *digitus*, meaning 'finger'. This, we might guess, is because the flower looks like a thimble and can be fitted over a finger. The name *digitalis* itself was coined by Leonhart Fuchs in the sixteenth century – confusingly, and coincidentally, *fuchs* is German for fox. (The fuschia flower and the colour are named after the same botanist.) Some alternative local names for foxgloves are *goblin gloves*, *witches' gloves*, *witches' thimbles*, *tod-tails* and *dead men's bells*.

I wonder what your step count is so far today. A tap on a 'fitbit' or relevant phone app would give an immediate answer.

In his 1950s adventure novel, John Buchan writes about the mysterious '39 steps' – the spy's escape route leading from the cliff to the sea. Psalm 121 is one of 15 'Songs of the Steps' in the Bible. They are the songs of pilgrims striding up the steps that led to the city of Jerusalem from the surrounding area all the way to the Temple. They would often walk in procession, making music along the way.

The author of Psalm 121 invites the reader to trust God for every step of life's journey with these words:

My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth....

He will not let your foot slip — he who watches over you will not slumber....

The Lord will watch over your coming and going both now and forevermore....

This Psalm was a source of strength for me when I moved to Bristol in mid-July. It was reassuring to know that God was there in all the packing, travelling and unpacking. I sensed Him with me every step of the way, up and down staircases with countless boxes. It remains a comfort as I start to settle in and travel around an unfamiliar setting.

New Councillor

The Council filled its vacancy by co-option at its meeting on the 5 July and we are pleased to welcome Stephen Moore.

Citi 5 Bus

The Council continues to liaise with Stagecoach and our County Councillor regarding bus provision in the village. During a recent meeting with Stagecoach they advised that, regarding direct buses to Cambridge and Cottenham, they would only consider changes that were 'data driven'. The Council is looking at the best ways to gather that information.

Mobile Food Hub

We have been liaising with South Cambs District Council who are working with 'Hope CIC' to provide a mobile food hub in the village, that started on 17 July at the Octagon.

Black Pit Drove

Since our last article, we are pleased to see a reduction in the number of vehicles travelling down the Droveway and would like to thank residents for taking this on board. Residents wishing to access the Council-owned open green space, Barton Field, may do so on foot and we would again ask residents to ensure they clear up after their dogs and use the bin provided on Rampton Road or any of the others located around the village.

Highways

Residents will be aware of the works that took place on Over Road to install water mains, as well as the work scheduled on Berrycroft at the end of July. We understand that these necessary works can be frustrating for residents and would like to thank you for your patience while these were completed.

We have been advised of some future planned works at the junction at the High Street and Over Road. This will be closed overnight (for one night) in August to repaint the road markings in this area. We also understand that a section of Station Road will be closed for a short period during the summer holidays to repaint the markings which had not been done adequately earlier in the year. We have not been given a date for these works but believe they are likely to take place during the weekend. The Council will add updates on the Council's website as and when we receive them.

Tennis and Netball MUGA Planning Application

The application that the Council submitted in September 2022 had to be withdrawn in November as further objections were raised regarding the impact of the floodlights on bats, the parking arrangements and the possible danger of a cricket ball strike. The cricket ball assessment was speedily if expensively done and the site was deemed safe, but the bats were hibernating so the survey had to be done in May/June. Two surveys have now been completed and our ecologist has concluded that there are low numbers of bats and there will be no loss of foraging habitat or availability of dark dispersal routes through the Recreation Ground site, if we follow various mitigation measures. We hope that this will be acceptable to the planners and we can resubmit soon.

Cambridgeshire County Councillor Neil Gough's Report

Dear Residents,

With summer in full swing, I hope that you're able to have time for a well-deserved break. Here is my update of County Council matters.

Financial Position

Cambridgeshire County Council ended the past financial year with an overspend of just 0.2% of its annual budget, despite inflation on all the goods and services the Council buys. The Council set its 2022/3 budget in February 2022 and during the year had to manage more than £43m of additional cost pressures. The Council noted that while the outcome demonstrates good financial controls, it is woefully underfunded by central government. All four political group leaders wrote again to the Secretary of State for Levelling Up earlier this year, putting our case for change and a funding settlement which truly meets our local needs; he hasn't even sent an acknowledgement.

Stop Smoking Campaign

There are an estimated 62,500 smokers in Cambridgeshire (13.2% of the population) and national estimates suggest that smoking costs society approximately £12.6 billion a year, including costs to social care, the NHS and lost productivity.

The new anti-smoking strategy incorporates new research into the behavioural obstacles for local people in their efforts to stop smoking. Cambridgeshire County Council will apply to become a pilot site for the national Swap to Stop initiative a scheme to provide one million UK smokers with free vape starter kits. Cambridgeshire and Peterborough are jointly proposing to apply for this initiative. This will be part of plans to pilot a universal vape offer for a period of one year in the commissioned stop smoking service ('Healthy You') to see if this increases engagement and quit rates.

District Councillor Bill Handley's Report

Mobile Food Hub

SCDC is providing funding to help Hope CIC set up a mobile food hub in the district. They will provide fresh fruit and veg and supermarket items with a short shelf life at a low price or free of charge. Willingham is one of the initial group of villages which will host the service. The van will be easily identifiable via the 'Mobile Food Hub' logo. Residents will also be able to buy essential affordable items. For more information, please see <u>tinyurl.com/4zr3hcca</u>.

Continued Support for Residents During the Cost-of-Living Crisis

The Communities Team at SCDC has created a new leaflet advising residents of support available during the cost-ofliving crisis. The Council is trying to encourage more people to apply for Council Tax support since many people who are eligible for this scheme are unaware that it exists.

Proposed Waste Collection Round Changes

The Greater Cambridge Shared Waste Service is currently working on a review of its collection rounds. The rounds are

normally reviewed every few years to make sure that they are still as efficient as they can be.

The Shared Waste Service suffers from recruitment problems (especially for HCV drivers). For this reason the service is seeing how a four-day week might work with a trial planned similar to that already in operation for desk-based staff. Adopting the four-day week for the waste service will mean that the Council does not have to buy extra vehicles. It will retain an end-of-service vehicle for the trial's duration and, if successful, the cost of any new vehicles should be offset by the reduction of agency staff.

When the new rounds are introduced, the Council will inform residents with a series of adverts in the *South Cambs Magazine* and on social media.

District Councillor Dan Lentell's Report

Less is not more: South Cambs four-day week 'trial' is a costly failure.

Local government is supposed to deliver effective public services efficiently and diligently. Meaningful improvements can't happen simply by giving staff a massive pay rise, (ie more money per hour) no strings attached. At South Cambridgeshire District Council, office staff now only have to work four days a week but they still get paid for five. Is this 'trial' a good use of your money?

Even the most cursory glance at SCDC's Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) – the carefully selected measures recording the 'trial's' impact – make for grim reading. For example, in January this year, SCDC took an average of six working days to process new Housing Benefit Claims – one of the most mission-critical services our Council undertakes on behalf of some of society's most vulnerable. In February, the average number of days had risen to 10. In March, it was taking 14 days.

SCDC has lost focus on 'why' it does what it does and for 'whom'. Unlike Cambridge's big retailers (the ones warning of catastrophe if CONcharging is brought in), our Councils can't lose customers to better run competitors.

I am in favour of society transitioning to a four-day week. Life is for living and what's the point of all this tech if we work longer than a medieval serf? But I want the four-day week to happen for the many, not just the few who work in local government. I want the four-day week to happen sustainably with more and more jobs (in both public and private sectors) being designed, integrated and then advertised as four days.

What's happening at South Cambs is that the four-day week is being crazily retrofitted onto jobs designed to be worked for five. Council services are groaning under the strain. Now Whitehall is getting involved. The Minister has written to SCDC and ordered an immediate end to this 'trial' which is so badly designed as to be in breach of all kinds of duties and commitments to which every local authority must conform.
