Kestrels in the Community Orchard

While walking through the Orchard in late July I saw three kestrel chicks watching me from their nesting box. Just a week later, I went to check on their progress to find they had all flown their nest. But then I heard a clattering on the squirrel deterrent dish below their box — one fledgling had returned and was watching me from its safe perch!



I continued my walk and met a friend, Liz Hancock. We talked about the fledglings and she told me of her encounter with one of them the previous day. It had stayed completely still (probably terrified) and unable to fly from the path. After taking a few photographs, Liz rang the Ramsay Raptor Centre to ask for advice. They asked her to transport it in a box to their facility.

Later the Centre rang her with an update — the bird was severely undernourished and was covered in a parasite called flat fly. They would keep it in and treat it before releasing it back into the wild near where it was hatched. About a week later, again on my walk around the Orchard, I saw two healthy fledglings on their box. They watched me before flying off to nearby trees. We have since learned that the sick bird has been released back into the Orchard — healthy, well-muscled and parasite free!

Private ADHD Assessment

Recently a large number of people have been seeking assessment for ADHD in private clinics. We understand the frustration, due to long waiting times in the NHS ADHD clinics. We would like to support you to make the right decisions.

Many of you may have seen a recent BBC Panorama programme *Private ADHD Clinics Exposed*.

Before you choose a private clinic for assessment please be aware of the following facts.

- Make sure that the clinic is legitimate and that you get a full assessment, including a full psychiatry assessment; the clinic should be overseen by a psychiatrist.
- When a diagnosis is made by a clinic, and the assessment has not been comprehensive and does not fulfil the criteria recognised locally, the diagnosis may not necessarily be accepted.
- There is no guarantee that the prescription medication advised by the specialist clinic will be taken over by the GP for future prescriptions. This will need to be assessed on a case-by-case basis. The nationally agreed Shared Care only applies to providers with an NHS contract.
- The specialist clinic will still need to review you, at least on a yearly basis, even if the shared care is accepted by the GP. This may mean that you have to continue to pay for these assessments at the private clinic.

Flu Vaccinations – Book your Appointments

Please support our Surgery this year and book your flu vaccination with one of our nursing team. We are once again offering dedicated flu clinics on Saturdays. Please contact reception to book your appointment with us ASAP. Eligibility for the flu vaccine is as follows

- Patients aged 65 years and over
- Patients aged six months to under 65 years in clinical risk groups. This includes patients with:
 - Chronic respiratory disease
 - Chronic heart or vascular disease
 - Chronic kidney disease
 - Chronic liver disease
 - Chronic neurological disease
 - Diabetes and adrenal insufficiency
 - Immunosuppression
 - Asplenia or dysfunction of the spleen
 - Morbid obesity
 - Pregnant women
- Carers in receipt of carer's allowance, or those who are the main carer of an elderly or disabled person
- Close contacts of immunocompromised individuals
- Frontline workers in a social care setting without an

Dragonflies and Damselflies at Ouse Fen

We were on a leisurely two-hour ramble at Ouse Fen, the newly opened RSPB / Hanson nature reserve, guided by local dragonfly / damselfly expert David Chandler. We stared down the telescope at an exquisite creature — the migrant hawker dragonfly — clinging to a thistle stem, with beautifully patterned transparent wings, and a long thin body.

Our group, ranging from interested amateurs to some serious camera-wielders, saw many other dragonflies — such as the ruddy darter, brown hawker and emperor. We heard interesting facts — they have the largest eyes for their size in the animal kingdom, and extremely ferocious larvae. Aside from the migrant hawker, which was probably newly emerged, the other true dragonflies darted around, whereas the more delicate damselflies fluttered slowly and then settled. Most abundant were the vivid blue-tailed damselflies.

The event was organised by the *New Life on the Old West* project, one of a series to connect local people with the biodiversity on their doorstep. David Chandler is a freelance

Nature's Names

Dragonflies can be found on every continent (except Antarctica), so they have many alternative, archaic and local names. Many of the names associated the dragonfly with the devil, horses, snakes, and needles.

We can understand why *fly* is part of the origin of the name, but what about *dragon*? There are numerous suggestions how this came about, and a multitude of theories tracing that part of the name to one originating source. It is likely, however, that it is derived from the Latin *draco*, which would be translated as *serpent*. (Harry Potter fans will recall the Slytherin character *Draco*!)

Francis Bacon, in the 17th century, was probably the first to use 'dragonfly' in print. Before then, and afterwards, names originating in folklore and legend were common — such as *adder bolt, horse stinger, devil's darning needle, snake doctor, snake feeder*. Those last two would have originated in folklore because dragonflies will happily perch on the nose of a water snake if it pokes its head above water for a while. In some parts of the Americas, there was even a superstition that dragonflies can nurse sick snakes back to health. In Northern Europe, it was believed that if a dragonfly flies around your head it is weighing your soul for the devil!

Willingham Cemetery

Our cemetery is an important feature within the village. In November, the wreath-laying ceremony will again take place at the War Memorial. Visitors may have already seen the plaque on the wall near the main cemetery gate, fixed there by the War Graves Commission. Eight war graves can be found in our cemetery, and these are maintained by the Commission. There is a chart on both the Willingham Parish website and the Facebook page, giving details of these graves.

Social and Wellbeing within the Parish

There are a variety of aspects linked with village wellbeing which the Council seek to maintain and improve — from our village play park facilities, to affording alternative recreational areas for walking and enjoying outdoor spaces, plus many more!

The Over Day Centre is a popular venue for assisting our elderly villagers, and the Council currently donates £3,000 per year for this. For emergency needs, there are now four defibrillators in place around the village. The nonprofit-run Food Hubs are still being finalised and, although we hoped to bring you good news for Willingham, it is not quite ready for our village delivery. Hopefully the Willingham Food Hub will be up and running soon; we will keep you updated. Meanwhile, our valued Community Warden coordinator, Joanne Twinn, is busy and her active list for weekday help now consists of nine Willingham members and two from the Over parish.

When the set-aside field was no longer available for dog walking, the Orchard was fenced to make that a safe place for all users. The Meadow Road project is still undergoing development and our Barton Field is a great place for walking and recreation. All our open spaces have been commended and noted by experts – recently highlighted in the South Cambridge District Council officer, Luke Waddington's report — as an important part of our 'Doubling Nature Strategy'. The project of siting six flower tubs around the village was originally set up by a team including WAG volunteers and councillors. Today, we are really grateful the Gardening Club have now taken on the challenge of planting and caring for them — they are looking really good, so many thanks go to the club.

There will always be new projects and ideas for supporting our Parish where we can: it does not stop, the list will continue!

The Precept for Willingham Parish

The precept for 2023/2024 is £166,600. This is the sum of money collected with the council tax from householders in the Parish and is used specifically to maintain and improve facilities and services for local people. There are various additional grants, etc, that become available periodically, and which the Council can apply for in order to fund larger projects that would not normally be afforded by the Parish.

Parish Council Vacancy

Our Parish Council is made up of 15 Councillors all of whom are unpaid. The period of office of a Councillor is normally four years, but if they have been co-opted or elected at a by-election, they will serve until the next normal election time, which is currently May 2025. A Parish Councillor is responsive to and responsible for the needs of their Parish and, while bound by the powers conferred on them by Parliament, they have a wide remit within which to improve the lives of their local community. Due to a recent resignation from the Parish Council, there is a vacancy that the Council hopes to fill at their next meeting in October, so if you would like to know more, please do not hesitate to contact the Clerk for more information.

Update from Fen Drayton Lakes

Low Hill is an unassuming yet fascinating feature of Fen Drayton Lakes. It lies within Elney Lake (historically known as Low Fen), on a peninsula which protrudes in from the western side. For most people visiting, it merely looks like a raised mound covered by grass with a margin of reeds, but that belies the history that lies underneath. Until recently we didn't know much about it but learned more thanks to the work of a student, James Foard, who brought together literature from various sources during his studies and shared them with us.

Low Hill is a type of 'bowl barrow' or tumulus, a mound of earthen construction about 25m in diameter by 1m high. Barrows were sites for burials, just one person or many. Burial mounds were often built on higher ground so their cultural significance would be visible to people. Finding higher ground is a tricky ask in the fens as there are few areas with suitable topography, so this early example was built up artificially to raise it above the level of the floodplain.

Due to the shape and structure of the barrow, it is thought to pre-date the Romans, possibly from the Bronze Age. Barrows from this period are rare features within Cambridgeshire and this one represents an excellent example, being of a large size and well-preserved.

However, there are some unknowns regarding what else very early examples may have been used for since they were created. Within the Ouse Valley, two-thirds of barrows have been found to be either reused, modified or incorporated into other monuments over time.

The site has never been excavated, so these facets of its history can only be alluded to, based on similar sites elsewhere. Thus, what is known about Low Hill is not a complete picture and one which has more stories to tell. In the eyes of James, it stands 'as a monument to the people that have lived and died here throughout prehistory and their lost funerary traditions and ritual practices'.

When the area was dug out for gravel in the 1990s, Low Hill was preserved. We maintain the monument nowadays by making sure scrub and trees don't take over and affect the archaeology within.

Cambridgeshire County Councillor Neil Gough's Report

Dear Residents,

Here is my update of County Council matters – a more detailed, on-line version can be found on the *Willingham News* website.

County Council Meeting, July 2023

- In straitened times for many families, I supported a motion asking the council to work with and support Cambridgeshire schools in developing fair and effective uniform policies, including promoting re-use.
- Another motion reflected concerns that the implementation of new childcare entitlements will mean cuts in funding per hour, will not allow sufficiently for workforce training and supervision time, and will disadvantage children with special needs. It also noted the national recruitment and retention crisis in early years provision. The motion committed the Council to doing what it can to mitigate all this.

Free School Meals

The take-up of free school meals in Cambridgeshire has increased by 52% in the last three years as living standards have fallen. 21% of all Cambridgeshire children now qualify for the 'pupil premium'. Details online here: <u>tinyurl.com/vfsfjc9r</u>.

Highways

- Roadworks and Repairs: the programme to address the potholes continues. In particular, there are plans to make permanent repairs in Silver Street and Thodays Close (this may have been completed by time of publication).
- Winter Volunteers for Community Gritting Scheme: this scheme enables local volunteers to help to keep their community moving in freezing weather. The Parish Council decides on the most important routes to the local community and agrees them with the County Council. Details online here: tinyurl.com/ye249ct2.
- 20 mph Zones: these schemes continue to be installed to help improve road safety and reduce pollution. The Council recently put in place a new process for communities to access additional funding to install more 20 mph zones or limits. This year's schemes, including Willingham, will be going to committee later in the autumn.

District Councillor Bill Handley's Report

Cambridge Quarter Expansion Proposal

Plans by the Government for a major expansion of dwellings, along with scientific research space, in and around Cambridge were leaked to the national press. None of the local authorities affected had been informed or consulted about these plans.

The Secretary of State, Michael Gove, formally announced the plans on 24 July. A leak suggested that the Government also has plans to increase the number of homes in our area by 250,000. If this figure is accurate, it would dwarf current Local Plan projections and hugely increase the housebuilding in Greater Cambridge.

So far, the detail coming from the Government has been slow to emerge. There needs to be clarity over how many homes the Government is planning to build and where they think they should go. They need to explain how the area's environment and water supplies will be protected. I plan to post any significant and/or interesting updates, as and when I get them, on my Facebook page, with summaries for *Willingham News*.

New Webchat Service for SCDC

SCDC has just launched a webchat service on its website, which enables residents and businesses to chat with officers via their web browser. Residents will be able to ask questions and get information from advisors about all of SCDC services except planning, which is excluded initially due to the complexities of the service and the detailed / individual nature of each query.

Volunteering Opportunities to Support Asylum Seekers at Bar Hill Hotel

SCDC is looking for volunteers to help to support families living at the hotel in Bar Hill. There are two main schemes that require volunteers – a Pool Bike scheme and a Pop-up Shop / Donation Room scheme. Both schemes are ready to begin once volunteers are available. District Councillor Dan Lentell's Report

At the last meeting of South Cambridgeshire District Council two motions were discussed, both illustrating the wheat and the chaff on council agendas. One was about party political posturing. The other was about helping residents solve a realworld problem.

Motion 15 (a) called 'for a change in our outdated electoral laws and to enable Proportional Representation to be used for UK general elections'.

PR is a yellow team shibboleth. So, although this motion has nothing to do with the work of any minor local council, it was inevitable PR would turn up on the agenda eventually. Since I was elected as a LibDem, I voted in favour (despite my own strong opposition to PR). I said in the debate, 'There's a reason LibDems lose elections and it's not the voting system. The reason LibDems lose elections is because they take up policy positions, like CONgestion charging, that are massively unpopular'.

Motion 15 (b) was of infinitely more practical value. To summarise, new homes (of which there are one or two around here) are often sold with covenants limiting what future owners can and can't do on the property. These covenants often prevent the opening of small businesses on the property, including professional childcare provision. This motion progresses our local planning towards explicitly exempting childcare provision on domestic premises from future covenants as a planning condition.

Despite a rapidly growing population, these covenants mean that Northstowe has a tiny number of local registered childminders per eligible child, at a time when childcare provision nationally is already heavily oversubscribed.

As a stay-at-home parent ever mindful of the cruciality of childminders in our community, I was delighted to express my support for this superb example of the kind of people-focused policies a sensible council should be exclusively pursuing. I am happy to report that this motion was carried unanimously.
