## **Old Willingham**



Here is a lovely picture you may have seen before. Set around 1900 it shows an idyllic country scene with barn and well-trimmed thatched cottage. The woman carries a heavy wicker basket in her right hand while the man idles his time away leaning on the fence.

However, this enclosure has a purpose. It is the Village Pound. Animals such as goats etc. were everywhere and sometimes they would get out and wander off. Stray animals would be rounded up and put in this pound. The pound keeper (perhaps leaning on the fence) would charge a fee to get the animal back. The location is just by the bridge over the Lode at the recreation ground – to this day called Pound Lane.

## Nature's Names

The horse chestnut is often referred to as a conker tree, and in autumn it's tempting to pick up the shiny brown nuts and imagine becoming world conker champion! But why is it called a horse chestnut?

As ever, there are different theories about such word origins, but the first part of the word chestnut most likely came from the 14th century Middle English *chesteine*, which in turn came from the Greek word *kastenéã*, meaning *nut from Castana*. In the centuries between Greek and Middle English, the word morphed into Latin and Old French forms before producing the modern English form, nut being added later.

Regarding horse, there are two notable possibilities -

that the conkers were originally used to cure horse's coughs, or that the scar left on the twig after leaf-fall is shaped like a horse shoe, complete with nail holes!

## **Urgent News**

Willingham Youth Trust is in urgent need of support and without new volunteers to help run both the administrative side of the charity and our weekly Youth Club, the charity will be forced to dissolve by **31 October**.

This will be an incredible loss for both Willingham and the young people of this village, especially considering the results of the recent village survey. As Chair of the Charity, I am reaching out to the community to ask for your help.

Our amazing team have worked tirelessly to bring the charity and weekly youth club back after the COVID-19 pandemic, but there are not enough of us to sustain the charity long term. Without more support, the charity will have to dissolve and our funding will be passed over to the Parish Council.

#### If You Would Like to Volunteer:

Willingham Youth Trust collaborates with the Connections Bus Project to run a weekly Youth Club during term time from 7 - 8 30 pm. As a volunteer, you will be asked to attend one or two sessions per term and will support the Connections team by preparing soft drinks, supervising indoor and outdoor activities, and chatting with the young people. You will need a DBS (Data Barring Service) certificate, but we can organise this for you.

#### If You Would Like to Become a Board Member:

Willingham Youth Trust is in desperate need of a new Secretary. As Secretary, you will be responsible for responding to emails, organising the hire of the space, helping to maintain social media pages and arranging the Youth Club volunteer schedule. This is a voluntary role, which should only take up a few hours every week. We are also looking for new Trustees to join the charity, to help us apply for grants so that we can run workshops for local young people, their parents and guardians outside of the other Youth Club activities.

## Willingham Medical Practice Patient Participation Group

Future healthcare arrangements concern all patients registered with Willingham Medical Practice and probably others within the catchment area.

I express concern as Chair of (and on behalf of) our Patients Participation Group (PPG) in respect of local healthcare provision for the future, in view of substantial housing development locally, particularly in Northstowe and Waterbeach.

I have been taking part in the Cambridge Primary Care Patient Group (CPCPG). We had a meeting on **7 September** and have a further meeting on **5 October**, with among others, senior members of the Integrated Care Board (ICB), plus:

– Heather Noble: Leading the integration of health and care in South Place, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough.

– Healthwatch: Julian Stanley, CEO and Karen Igho, Project Manager.

The purpose was to discuss and agree mechanisms for sustainably linking primary care patients in the Cambridge area to the integrated care system in order to enable patients to influence the development of new integrated care initiatives and to give South Care Partnership and Healthwatch access to patient representatives for consultation and co-production projects.

I am setting out below an extract from the Northstowe Community Forum presentation in July:

'Residents are to continue to register with Willingham and Longstanton Medical Practice. Currently 2,750 patients from Northstowe are registered. There is the capacity to take a further 5,550 patients – workforce and operational hours to increase as necessary.'

This will bring the number of patients from Northstowe to over 8,000!

I don't think many are aware of the current plans. New residents of Northstowe and existing surrounding

residents may well have expected a new medical facility within the new town at an earlier stage.

A permanent medical facility is not foreseen in Northstowe until 2028.

Apparently, the intention is to increase the Willingham Medical Practice patient base up to 17,000–18,000, almost double what it was a few years ago. Additionally, general NHS treatment delays have caused more people to return to local Medical Practitioners for extra care while awaiting treatment. Workload per patient therefore has also increased.

I'm not alone in having some reservations about our Medical Practices being able to cope and infrastructure, traffic, parking will also be affected.

Of course, PPG is ready to support, but, particularly following COVID-19, I'm asking the Willingham Medical Practice, the Integrated Care Board and the District Council to review and share their plans.

Appointment lead time is already up to six weeks!

The Patient Participation Group has a meeting with Willingham Medical Practice on **3 October** to discuss this, among other current matters, and a public meeting is booked in Northstowe Community Centre for 1 pm on **19 October**.

We recognise this may not be convenient for all patients, but please try to attend or send a representative.

There's also a Northstowe Community Forum meeting at the Community Centre at around 7 pm on **4 October**. I encourage those interested to attend and we will be requesting a few minutes on the agenda.

## Derelict Mansion in Fairytale Setting – For Sale

Residents who have lived in the village during the eighties and longer will be aware of this house, Redlands, situated on the outskirts of Willingham. You will have driven along the B1050 and seen its sad decline as the remains were visible just beyond the trees on the left-hand side of the road just beyond the crossing as you drive, cycle or walk into the village.

There was an aura of mystery about it and no doubt children will have made up stories about it being haunted.

In fact, amongst locals there may have even been all sorts of stories about what happened there. These days it cannot be seen from the road as the beech hedge has grown so high.



The mansion dates back to 1905, when it was built for Sidney Thoday, a well-known Willingham seed merchant. It was last occupied in the 1950s. In 1956 much of the inside and most of the roof were destroyed in a fire. In the following years there were two more fires, the worst being in 1996, which destroyed all the internal floors, most of the 16 rooms and the remains of the roof.

#### Dear Residents,

Here is my update of County Council matters.

#### Highways

Our division has a new Local Highways Officer responsible for maintenance, who appears to have a very can-do attitude which is encouraging. At the time of writing (early September) I had tentatively scheduled the next quarterly meeting with him for the Parish Clerks for 28 September to discuss outstanding issues and communication. Progress has been made on the most pressing of the maintenance issues, but please let me know if there are outstanding problems. Around £5 million is being invested into a programme of surface dressing, which will prevent damage, prolong the life of the county's roads, as well as ensuring they continue to be safe for all road users.

#### Home to School Transport

The Education and Social Care Transport Service has a small team of fantastic volunteer drivers as part of their home to school transport provision. They're hoping to increase the team of volunteer drivers to provide this service to more local families. Full training and support will be offered. ## Thought for the Month

# The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it John 1 v5

It's getting dark earlier in the evenings and what a great time to focus on celebrating the light this month instead of the dark!

When was there a time you were afraid of the dark? For me, it was when I was a child. I used to live on a dairy farm in Kent. There were no streetlights at night and it was pitch dark. In my room, I couldn't even see a hand in front of my face. I'd stay in bed and not move until I fell asleep or it got light outside. I was too scared to run across the room and turn my light on! Years later, when I think about it now, the darkness isn't that powerful at all. As soon as the light goes on the darkness has to go. No matter how deep the darkness it cannot extinguish the light. We can see things as they actually are.

The Bible uses the image of light to offer us a deeper understanding of God's gift to us in Jesus Christ. The stark contrast between light and darkness helps us better understand the gift of God's light and the grace Jesus Christ brings to our dark, sin filled world. Darkness can be seen as a symbol of evil and of ignorance of God and His truth, while light can be seen as a symbol of righteousness, life, truth and God's ways. The world is shrouded in the darkness of evil and falsehood. Jesus Christ is the only light that not only shines in the darkness but dispels it. There is no darkness in Jesus: 'This is the message we have from him and proclaim to you, that God is light, and in him is no darkness at all' John 1 v5.

We have the choice to follow Jesus and have His light lead us. Jesus said 'I am the light of the world. If you follow me, you won't have to walk in darkness, because you will have the light that leads to life' John 8 v12.

Jesus is the light of the world. He was sent into the world to cast out darkness: to point people to God and to call people to repentance of their sins. If you have any further questions or would like to understand it more, there are people in our places of worship in the village, who would love to help you.

#### **Shingles Vaccination**

Almost a million more people (900,000) became eligible for a shingles vaccination from 1 September.

The extension of those eligible for the shingles vaccine is complicated and will be phased until 2028.

From 1 September, those turning 65 and 70 will also be able to get the vaccine after their birthday, in addition to those already aged 70 to 80.

You ARE eligible for the vaccine this year if:

- You are aged 70 to 79 years.
- Your date of birth (DOB) is between 1 September 1953 to 31 August 1954.
- Your DOB is between 1 September 1958 to 31 August 1959.
- You are severely immuno-supressed and over the age of 50 (please do not call the surgery you will be invited if you fall into this category).

You ARE NOT eligible for the vaccine this year if:

- You are aged over 80.
- Your Date of Birth is between 1 September 1954 and 31 August 1958.

Please contact the surgery to book your appointment with a practice nurse.

Please note, the nurse will check you are eligible for the vaccine after booking, and you will be sent an SMS cancelling the appointment if you do not fall within the eligibility criteria.

## District Councillor Bill Handley's Report

#### **Crackdown on Fly Tipping**

SCDC is cracking down on illegally dumped rubbish, prioritising it as a key objective in its Business Plan by:

- Prompt clearance of rubbish to reduce further occurrences at the same site.
- Deterring criminal activity using 'fly tip under investigation' stickers to highlight ongoing investigations.
- Joint roadside check initiatives with the Police, HMRC and other partners.

Fly tipping is a criminal offence which can result in a Fixed Penalty Notice of up to £400 or could end up in court with fines of up to £50,000 or even a prison sentence. You can report fly-tipping to the Council on this link: <u>www.tinyurl.</u> <u>com/mrxrks72</u>.

#### A Reminder – Changes to Bin Collections

Optimising collection routes is something that takes place every few years to accommodate housing growth. At the time of writing, revised bin collections were due to start on 18 September. Even residents that are not affected by the changes may find that crews reach their property at different times to usual and it may be much earlier – so they should put out their bins by 6 am. ## District Councillor Dan Lentell's Report

CONgestion charging is dead, but it is not buried and may be reanimated after the next round of local and national elections are done. The apologists and enablers for this terrible answer to the wrong question may try it on again. We cannot let them.

The question is not whether Cambridge (cities, shire, towns, and gown) badly needs a transport tomorrow vitally different from our transport today. Clearly, we are long overdue light rail and buses that exist to get folk from A to B, rather than to fill the coffers of private companies with public subsidies. The question is how to (or who should) pay? The mega-developers? The billion-dollar corporate interests? A bond issue? Or working people, the sickest and the poorest in society, via a flat-rate poll tax that hits the low and unpaid hardest and which puts a paywall between residents and their healthcare. Communities like Over and Willingham will be so much worse off if this watered-down treatment is administered, it makes the head spin that anyone in their right mind could want it to happen.

From day one, I have argued that CONcharging is wrong for Over and Willingham. The M11 access roads, with which we access our NHS at Addenbrooke's, play zero part in Cambridge City's traffic management issues. To charge us to use them in order to subsidise bus services which aren't designed to benefit us is wrong.

In 2005 CONcharging was rejected by Edinburgh voters in a referendum, yet better buses and actual trams were made to happen. What we have seen over the past 12 months is proof positive that the GCP is broken beyond repair and should be scrapped. As ClIr Naomi Bennett (Green Party, Abbey ward) said, 'The GCP brand is so toxic it's getting to the point where if the GCP promised us free ice cream and sunshine and puppies, our residents would say no thank you.'
