Old Willingham

Nature's Names



This is the Willingham Tabernacle Baptist Church – date unknown. It resided on the same site as the current modern building that replaced it in the 1980s. The original 'strict' Baptist church which was opposite, opened in 1776 and was then replaced by a large brick building. However, part of the congregation wanted to establish a church with a less strict approach and built this 'tabernacle' on the other side of the road in 1873. As congregations declined, the original church closed and was demolished. This building was also demolished but replaced with the church that is very much still alive today. Only the wall on the street remains. It seems sad, but the cost of upkeep for such a large building really would be impractical and the church building behind was much less fancy that the imposing facade!

Enhanced Access to GP

Local GP practices are working together to offer patients evening and weekend appointments in our area. Over Surgery is open on Saturdays and other local practices including Milton Surgery have evening appointments. That means you will be able to see a GP, nurse or other health professional at a time which is most convenient for you.

These are pre-bookable routine appointments face to face with a Doctor, Nurse, Health Care Assistant or Phlebotomist and are provided by the Cambridgeshire GP Network. Services offered are:

- GP Consultations.
- Advanced Nurse Practitioner consultations.
- Nurse appointments offering dressings, asthma and diabetes reviews, contraception reviews, etc.
- Health Care Assistant appointments offering ear irrigation, wound care, blood test, etc.
- Phlebotomy: Routine blood tests are available within our Extended Access Clinics.
- Cervical Screening.

These appointments are available to all of our patients registered at Willingham and Longstanton surgeries. Please contact the Willingham reception team on 01954 260230 to book an appointment, as the Over surgery will only be able to book in their own patients.

Please note that your consent for our clinician to view your medical record will be required in order for an appointment to be booked for you.

There are no urgent on the day appointments. If you are unwell over a weekend you would need to call 111.

New Baby Registrations

New parents are advised to register their baby at their earliest convenience. Your baby will need an eight week check with the GP, therefore registration as soon as possible after birth is advised in case your child requires GP treatment in the meantime.

You can collect registration packs from reception or request postage to your home address. Forms can also be collected before birth when you attend your next midwife appointment.

This grossed £256 to which John generously added his fee for the evening. The profit from the ticket sales – and from the Feast events generally – is to be used for good causes in the village.

The Ska Dust duo appeared at the Social Club on the same night, with a good crowd enjoying Madness and Bob Marley covers.

The weekend continued with the Gardeners' Fayre at the school. This showcased a wonderful selection of flower, fruit and vegetable exhibits, including children's categories for funniest vegetables, flowers in an unusual container, Mr Potato Head and a tray garden! A selection of original art with a horticultural theme was also set up, offering a glimpse of the local talent of the village Art Group! Stallholders appeared to enjoy a reasonable footfall, supported by the WI kindly offering teas, coffees and biscuits.

The Repair Café on the Sunday was particularly successful – a real community vibe with plenty of chat between repairers and repairees. Items included a petrol brush cutter, a 100-plus year-old frayed textile-stayed folding chair that left the Ploughman Hall looking new (among other skilful sewing repairs), numerous bikes, hi-fi sets, jewellery items, vacuum cleaners – almost all given a new lease of life. One of our engineers even brought his gardening tool grinding wheels for a sharpening service.

There was an evening of seafaring song courtesy of Fenstanton's Shanty Folk at the Social Club organised by Willingham's own history group WHIGS Inquire. Update from Fen Drayton Lakes

Whilst out working around the reserve, it's quite common for curious visitors to approach us with questions about how we manage this expansive site and how many staff members are responsible for its upkeep. Their reactions are typically a mix of surprise and appreciation when we say that only two of us are entrusted with the on-site care and maintenance of this sprawling, almost 400-hectare reserve, complete with an extensive network of around 16 kilometres of pathways. It's at this point that we can take the opportunity to extol our unsung heroes without whom we would not be able to cope – our extraordinary team of volunteers, upon whose dedication we heavily rely. See photo on page 14.

These outstanding individuals play a pivotal role in ensuring the smooth functioning of our reserve. Whether they're walking the trails to pick up litter, inspecting infrastructure for signs of wear and tear, running events to engage the community, extending warm welcomes to visitors in the car park, conducting breeding bird and biodiversity surveys, or undertaking crucial habitat and infrastructure management work, it's safe to say there is virtually no aspect of our operations in which volunteers aren't deeply embedded and we simply could not manage without them. To date this year, from January through to early September, we have logged almost 2,000 volunteer hours across the various roles.

Our volunteer force is as diverse as the reserve habitats they help protect. Spanning a wide range of ages, from enthusiastic teenagers to experienced octogenarians, they represent an eclectic mix of backgrounds and interests. Some among them are keen birders and nature enthusiasts, while others simply relish the opportunity to spend a few hours outdoors either alone or with other likeminded people. What unites them all is a passion for our reserve, a shared eagerness to be actively involved and an invaluable commitment to its sustained management and success.

Highways

Following the County Council request for applications for 20 mph areas throughout Cambridgeshire, the Parish Council submission for a village wide zone has been approved. We have had a preliminary indication of this and will publish more details when these are agreed. There will not be any speed reducing measure such as road humps, etc, but signage only on posts and road markings where the limits change, all separate from and inside the current 30 mph area.

The Speed Watch group in the village has been very active, particularly along Earith Road but also in other areas such as Station Road and Green Street. They have reported that their presence has seen a reduction in speeds and letters have been sent to drivers exceeding the limits. They have also reported on untaxed vehicles as they are recorded.

Traffic calming measures along Rampton Road (funding from the Northstowe development) are yet to be implemented. The latest Local Highways Initiative (LHI) bid will be for priority give way features on Rampton Road at the 30 mph sign and at a repositioned 30 mph sign at the village boundary on Over Road.

The village has newly repainted yellow 'no parking' lines and white zigzag lines at the traffic lights near the Coop. These are particularly important near the school and the junction of Long Lane and Newington. Drivers with disabled parking permits are allowed to stop on these lines but must not park within twelve metres of a junction or they could lose these privileges. It is dangerous for all road users if these rules are not adhered to and potentially could cause an accident. The police occasionally visit, but when the District Council take over the enforcement of these from the police, those who disobey these rules will be more likely to be penalised.

Hanson and RSPB Reserve

At a recent meeting, it was reported that the first confirmed successful nest in 2022 in the UK of Glossy Ibis has been registered on the RSPB Reserve. The Little Crake, a small moorhen like bird and a rare visitor from Europe has also been reported. A low point is that avian flu has been reported on the site.

The company name has been changed from Hanson to Heidelberg Materials Aggregates to reflect the group ownership and the function of the site. The previous name will disappear from all signage, etc, in the near future. Working on the gravel site has now been increased to four days a week which is maintaining capacity at about 600,000 tonnes per year. There are plans to increase the size of the operations and meet a target of one million tonnes next year.

Meadow Road Project

The project for the wildlife pond is moving forward and hopefully by next year we will have a good bio-diverse area for residents to enjoy. Future developments will include a grassed parking area for visitors. There will be installations to encourage insects (bug hotel) and bats, and a wildflower meadow created. Nonnative tree species will be removed.

New Councillor

District Councillor (SCDC) Bill Handley's Report

Help for Residents Through the Cost-of-Living Crisis

South Cambridgeshire District Council's (SCDC) latest initiative to help certain residents through the cost-ofliving crisis is the offer of a free electric blanket/throw, which cost a fraction to run compared to central heating. Qualifying residents are those who claim Council Tax Support plus certain disability and mobility benefits. They will receive a letter in the coming weeks, explaining how to claim their free blanket.

Homes for Ukraine Landlords' Incentive Scheme

SCDC has seen one of the highest number of Homes for Ukraine arrivals for a lower tier authority with over 850 guests coming to the district since 2022. Recently, the focus has been to help guests to move on to independent accommodation. So SCDC is launching a Landlords' Incentive scheme in an effort to provide more affordable and sustainable housing options, paid for from the government's Homes for Ukraine fund.

New Bin Collection Schedule

The move to the new four-day week bin collection schedule has gone very well so far with 99.7% of bins collected in the first two weeks of the new schedule. The number of calls/complaints was below what was expected as was the number of reports of missed bins. An advantage of not collecting bins on Mondays is that we all avoid the confusion caused by Bank Holidays.

Making Connections Update

The GCP has decided not to proceed to the next stage of its Making Connections project. The aim of the project was to make travelling in and around Cambridge quicker, simpler and faster by easing congestion and offering better, fairer, and greener travel choices. The focus is now likely to fall on other areas of the City Access programme such as resident parking, road hierarchy and freight consolidation plus other infrastructure projects. These solutions will not be delivered quickly.

Four Day Week Update

The four-day week is an attempt by SCDC to reduce its agency bill and take control of serious recruitment problems linked to the high cost of living in the district. Since the start of the trial, nine posts have been filled of 23 long-term unfilled, with a saving of around £550,000 a year. Recruitment appears to have been positively affected by the trial, both in the number and quality of applicants.

Neil Gough – Cambridgeshire County Councillor's Report

Dear Residents,

Here is my update of County Council matters:

Highways - 20 mph Zone Application

The moderation of the speed of traffic through the core of our villages is one of the most frequent issues that has been raised with me by residents who are concerned by the safety, noise and the generally negative impact on public space. This was one of the key priorities for the County administration. Therefore, I was delighted that both Willingham and Cottenham were awarded high marks for the applications and was prioritised within the funding available. Rampton also scored well but unfortunately was not prioritised sufficiently highly to be funded in this round.

Highways Maintenance

We recently had a very promising meeting with the new Highways Officer, Neal Stevens, which was very encouraging. He is executing a plan to clear the backlog of maintenance jobs and we discussed the need to tackle persistent issues eg, paths and roads that are impacted by overgrowing vegetation. The quarterly meetings will continue as before.

A programme to assess and prioritise the peat soil affected roads, including the B1050 and Beach Road between Cottenham and Landbeach, has been initiated.

Planning

I have raised the issue of S106 contributions relating to secondary education at Cottenham Village College with the County team and have asked to see the detailed projections that led to the change in the requested contributions for a recent development in Cottenham. It appears that considerable weight is being placed on a new school at Waterbeach – a facility for which there is no planning permission as yet.

Young People – Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC)

The new school year started with no schools in the county closed because of concerns over Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC). All of Cambridgeshire's schools have now been surveyed and no RAAC has been found.

The County worked closely with school leaders to reassure parents, carers and pupils before the start of the new school year.
