Old Willingham



Here is a photo taken on Berrycroft, almost opposite Berrycroft Stores. The men (and child) are passing the time of day outside R Smith's Tobacco Shop – a small wooden building fronting onto the road. That shop and the attached cottage are now long gone. One person of note is the man in the middle who looks very like 'Harry Williamson' aka 'Wulf Schmidt', the infamous German spy (see inset picture). Schmidt parachuted into Willingham in 1940, was captured by the local Home Guard and then turned into a double agent. He was never discovered by the Germans and spent the rest of his life living in England under the name 'Williamson'. We're not sure whether the man in the picture is him but there is a strong resemblance. For more information see: <u>oldwillingham.com/spy</u>.

Wendy read us an excerpt about life in the Fens and how her family came to live in the two Great Eastern Railway carriages, built in 1887 and converted in the 1920s. Wendy continues to live there most of the time but admits it is very cold in the winter and her daughters will not be continuing the family tradition! After the talk we were able to look at a selection of artefacts, including the one and only huge key to the carriages! It was a really enjoyable and interesting evening.

The pots we made with local potter, Linda Duclaud-Williams, at our September meeting have now been fired and we are very pleased with the results.

Nature's Names

Mention the word *mistletoe* and we might think of romance. This thought might not be so romantic if we know the commonly referenced origin of the word. We are told that *mistel* (or a close variant) was an Old Saxon word for bird poo, and *tan* (which morphed into *-toe*) meant *twig*. Yet this theory, that mistletoe grows out of bird droppings, is probably not as it seems. *Mistel* would be better translated as *birdlime*. The white berries, which are toxic, contain one seed surrounded by an extremely sticky

substance which has been used by hunters over the centuries to smear onto branches and twigs to trap small birds. That gluey birdlime substance is called *viscin*, and the Latin name for mistletoe is *viscum album* (*album* is Latin for *white*).

Back to the romantic side of mistletoe. In Britain, probably the first published mention of kissing



under the mistletoe is in 1784 in a comic opera called *Two* to One, and in Mary Robinson's poem *The Mistletoe – a* Christmas Tale (1800), in which she calls it A magic bough, and well design'd / To prove the coyest Maiden kind.

In Charles Dickens' first published book, *The Pickwick Papers* (1837), he writes: *From the centre of the ceiling of this kitchen, old Wardle had just suspended, with his own hands, a huge branch of mistletoe, and this same branch of mistletoe instantaneously gave rise to a scene of general and most delightful struggling and confusion; in the midst of which, Mr Pickwick, with a gallantry that would have done honour to a descendant of Lady Tollimglower herself, took the old lady by the hand, led her beneath the mystic branch, and saluted her in all courtesy and decorum.*

Whether it's courtesy and decorum or struggling and confusion under your mistletoe, we wish you a very happy Christmas!

Christmas Recipe – Coconut Ice

Ingredients

175 g condensed milk275 g sieved icing sugar175 g desiccated coconutRed colouring

Utensils Shallow, square dish Butter paper Sieve Wooden spoon Large mixing bowl Knife

Method

1 Lightly grease the dish all round with the paper from a block of butter.

2 Mix the condensed milk and sieved sugar together in a large bowl.

3 Stir in the coconut making a very stiff mixture.

4 Put half the mixture into the greased dish and press it down firmly with a spoon.

5 Add a few (about three) drops of red colouring to the remainder of the mixture in the bowl and mix thoroughly together making a pink mixture.

6 Put the pink mixture on top of the white mixture in the dish and press down until both halves are firmly pressed together.

7 Leave the coconut ice to set until it is firm. Then cut it into small squares as a delicious Christmas treat.

Flooding

The recent persistent rainfall brought back flooding which we last witnessed over Christmas in 2020. After those events the Council met with Anglian Water along with District and County Council representatives. Anglian Water confirmed that they planned to complete an Infiltration Reduction Plan in Willingham before 31 January 2022 to help them determine what work was required in the village to mitigate the impact of flooding from sewers. Sadly, it seems this has yet to take place. During October, both the Parish Clerk and our Cambridgeshire County Councillor, Neil Gough, were already chasing Anglian Water but have yet to receive a satisfactory response.

Octagon Community Hub

A representative from the Hub spoke to the Council to request funding for supplies so that a warm meal could be provided for those in need, which was granted. The Hub is run by volunteers and is open to everyone on Mondays from 10 am to 1 pm, in the Octagon, providing company and free refreshments. We are thankful to have such dedicated people in the village.

Multi-Use Games Area

After what has seemed to be an endless series of bureaucratic obstacles, the application for the MUGA on the Recreation Ground has finally reached the planning authority. Our thanks go to Councillor Linda King for steering this project which now appears to be edging closer to fruition.

Cemetery Topple-Testing

The Council has a duty to ensure that the cemetery and the memorials within it are kept in good order and to ensure the safety of visitors. Recent testing revealed that several headstones are in a dangerous condition and need maintenance, ideally by the burial right owners. Unfortunately, past recording of the burial rights is incomplete, and the office has been unable to contact many of the owners. Notices will be placed on the affected memorials and if nobody comes forward then the headstones will be laid flat within the grave space.

Christmas

A tree and new lights have been purchased and should be installed on the Green by the time you receive this Willingham News.

Councillor Resignation

We would like to thank Maedee Rogers for her participation and contribution to the Parish Council. Sadly she has resigned and we are waiting to hear from South Cambridgeshire District Council whether we can co-opt a new Councillor.

District Councillor Bill Handley's Report

Community Hubs

Last winter, 25 'Warm Hubs' were in operation across South Cambridgeshire in collaboration with Cambridgeshire ACRE. The benefits of these hubs quickly became clear; not only did they allow a warm space for individuals to go to keep warm but also to socialise with a hot drink and a snack. This winter these new facilities have been renamed 'Community Hubs' and 13 are either already operating or will become operational very soon. Grant funding from the ICS has again made this possible and there is sufficient funding for up to 20 hubs.

Flooding Advice

The recent storm, Babet, was a reminder of how vulnerable we are to flooding in the Fen Edge villages, with parts of both Over and Willingham being affected.

SCDC has useful advice on the flooding page of its website (<u>tinyurl.com/y6pav5c2</u>). There is a useful list of things residents can do in advance under the 'Be prepared for flooding' section.

The number of authorities and companies involved in flood management can be confusing, so the SCDC website has a list which residents can refer to for help. Here is a summary:

SCDC will help vulnerable residents, such as the elderly, to protect their properties from flooding.

District Councillor Dan Lentell's Report

Last month *The Cambridge Independent* revealed that almost £5 million was spent on the now abandoned CONgestion Charge proposals. How many rural bus routes could that money have subsidised? The Greater Cambridge Partnership costs residents hundreds of thousands of pounds



a year in salaries for its top staff as well as external consultants and the GCP is not alone in the rakes' club of spendthrifts. Cambridgeshire has 7+ councils (not including dozens of Parish Councils). This crazy-paving landscape of disjointed local authority comes at a real-world cost paid by residents and our services.

This picture is being played out across the UK with dozens of top-tier councils teetering on the edge of the bankruptcy precipice over which Birmingham City Council has already plunged. If only our political leaders were as determined to be radical about their overspending as they are in pursuing ideological agendas for personal glory.

South Cambridgeshire District Council's botched four-day week 'trial' is rightly receiving national condemnation as a grotesque waste of money about which there has been no debate and no vote by The People's Representatives. 'If council staff can do the job in four days,' residents are rightly asking, 'why were we paying them for five?'

I am 100% in favour of our society transitioning (where possible) to 4in7 models of working. Life is for living, and what's the point of all this tech if we work longer than medieval serfs? But what is being allowed to happen at South Cambs is nuttier than a squirrel's brunch. Jobs designed, advertised and filled on the basis of traditional 5in7 working are being crazily retrofitted to 4in7 working.

The result is that those staff who were already under the greatest stress are much worse off than before with the added insult that no one at the top is listening. Even the council's leaders can't hide the damage being done. But who cares? It's only other people's money that they are wasting.

Cambridgeshire County Councillor Neil Gough's Report

Dear residents,

Here is my update of County Council matters.

Budget Challenges 2024/25

Cambridgeshire County Council's estimated budget gap for 2024/25 has increased from £16 m to more than £23 m — largely due to increases in demand for services and inflationary pressure. Proposals to set the Council's 2024/25 budget will be discussed by councillors in December before a period of scrutiny during January, including an opportunity for residents to comment on the plans.

Cambridgeshire is not alone. The Local Government Association currently predicts that councils across the country face a £4 bn funding gap over the next two years.

Storm Babet

Storm Babet hit Cambridgeshire on Friday 20 October, with flooding affecting roads and residents' homes. County Council highways officers have been working through the various incidents logged, and the Flood & Water team is pulling together an overall picture of events.

We have contacted Anglian Water in connection with a number of incidents in Willingham and Cottenham where the storm water drains have been overwhelmed resulting in foul water backing up into properties. It will be of little comfort to those residents but it is important that contact is made with Anglian Water who will clean up and disinfect the areas.

Supermarket Voucher Scheme

Cambridgeshire County Council will run the supermarket voucher scheme until the February 2024 half term using the Household Support Fund from the Department for Work and Pensions and additional funding provided by the Council. The voucher can be used by those eligible at a choice of ten supermarkets.

Highways

Cambridgeshire's gritting crews have been preparing ahead of the colder months – the salt domes and barns have already been filled with 10,000 tonnes of rock salt.
