It shows village life with two women chatting (one holding a well wrapped baby) and children gathered – probably playing a game on the ground. One woman is carrying buckets probably after getting water from the village well on the Green. Do we know where this is? Well, there is a clue on the gatepost which is capped with a decorative stone. These were (and still are) on the wall to the Baptist Tabernacle. So, these cottages are on the corner of George Street and Love's Lane.

Volunteer Drivers Needed In Willingham

OWLS Community Car Scheme provides a valuable and much needed service to those people living in Over, Willingham, Longstanton and Swavesey, who need to attend medical appointments or make some social journeys but are unable to access other means of transport.

There are currently about 250 customers using OWLS with over 80 of them living in Willingham, the largest number of the four villages.

We have a great team of volunteer drivers but have recently lost a couple due to personal circumstances. So, we urgently need to recruit more drivers, especially in Willingham, as demand for the service continues to grow. Are you retired or about to start retirement or perhaps working part-time? Drivers do not have to commit to regular days or times but being able to do one journey a week is really helpful.

Drivers use their own cars and receive 45p a mile in total. A (free) DBS check is required, and additional insurance cover is provided by Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority.

The OWLS mobile phone is manned by a rota of volunteer coordinators who have the phone for a fortnight at a time. We would also like to have an additional coordinator to help with this.

News from Ouse Fen Nature Reserve

The RSPB have been working in partnership with Heidelberg Materials on the transformational wetland project at Needingworth Quarry for more than two decades. Turning their aggregates quarry into the largest reedbed in the UK creates a wetland that will support birds of huge conservation importance – like the Bittern – along with many other wildlife species. It's a great place to visit!

Summer Wildlife Highlights

The spring and summer seasons just past are the key seasons for us when we hope to see breeding birds and other wildlife benefitting from our work over the previous year.

Very positively, the number of male Bitterns returned to its second highest record since the project began, with 11 booming birds this year and two returning to Cuckoo Fen, which has received intense management rejuvenation in recent years. Whilst we did not record turtle dove breeding on the reserve, this year there still appear to be good numbers dotted around the wider project area and at neighbouring Fen Drayton Lakes.

On a more sombre note, Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) killed dozens of breeding Black-Headed Gulls and Common Terns at Ouse Fen and Fen Drayton Lakes this year. The full impact on wild bird populations across the country still needs to be fully assessed but conservation concern only increases.

But our final and most remarkable wildlife news dates back two years! It has now been confirmed that a pair of Glossy Ibis bred successfully for the first time in the UK in 2022 within our local 'Ouse Valley' reserves. Winter Prospects – Take a Look!

Expected highlights coming up over winter include the chance of seeing of wintering birds of prey from the reserve trails such as a Merlin or Short-Eared Owls, both seen already last October. Otherwise, you might like to simply soak up the wide open vistas, enjoy a healthy walk or plan a longer hike via public rights of way to one of our neighbouring reserves and the wider countryside beyond.

Nature's Names

Snowdrops used to be associated with February and the coming of Spring, but these days it isn't unusual to see them much earlier. Archaic names for these flowers include *Snow Piercer, Candlemas Bells*, and *White Ladies*.

There's much folklore about snowdrops — some believed that the flowers signified purification and it brought good luck to bring them indoors, others believed that they were Death's flowers, and should never be found in the home.

The first English book which detailed the snowdrop was in John Gerard's *Generall Historie of Plantes* (1597), in which he listed the name of the plant as *Timely Flouring Bulbous Violet*, despite it being nicknamed snowdrop after being introduced into England a hundred years before. At that time, it was purely a collector's plant, only found in the gardens of the wealthy gentry!

Distaff Day – Fun and Fire!

Distaff Day falls on **7 January** each year and its celebration was very popular in East Anglia between the 13th and 17th centuries. A distaff is a tool used to hold the spinner's unspun fibre. It's the day after Twelfth Night, traditionally the day when Christmas was done and dusted and the women went back to their regular daily work of spinning.

The men's equivalent day was Plough Day; the Monday after Twelfth Night, which every few years fell on the same day as Distaff Day. That's when the mischief took place. According to folklore, the men would come home and put the women's flax on the fire. The women would get their own back by pouring buckets of water on the men.

It is sometimes interesting to reflect on how life went on some years ago. Back issues of *Willingham News* can provide a snapshot of life in the Village in years gone by and are worth a look – see page three for access details. Here are three extracts from the Magazine published

10 years ago in January 2014, which provide interesting details of different aspects of life in the villager and its residents.

Parish Council Report

From the Parish Council January 2014

Precept

There is good news and bad news. The good is that the Parish Council has set a zero increase for next year. The total remains at £112 000 or about one pound per week for each household. This helps pay for the Parish Office and its staff, the provision of two halls and a pavilion, the recreation ground, play areas and play equipment, the village green and the cemetery. Council funds also go to help support a host of other village facilities including youth activities and this magazine. Perhaps not such bad value at a pound per week, but we mentioned bad news. Unfortunately many of you will see a rise in your Parish precept. This is because of a change in the way the charges are allocated and is imposed on us by Central Government. We have no control over this and as a Parish Council receive not one penny more from it.

Staff Changes

As mentioned last month, following the resignation of Dawn Spouge, who relocated with her family at the end of October, Mandy Powell has been appointed as our Parish Clerk. Now Halina Szulakowska has been appointed as Administrative Assistant. Mandy has been with us for several years as Admin Assistant and during this time has trained to become a fully qualified clerk. We offer a warm welcome to Halina who will start work regularly in January.

Councillor Vacancy

There is currently one vacancy on the Council which will be filled at the elections next May. There is plenty of time to think about it and if you feel you would like to put yourself forward then do have a chat with the Clerk or any of the existing Councillors to find out what is involved. The duties are not too onerous and you will be helping the Council in the work it does for our community. It would be particularly nice to hear from female candidates. Not through choice, the current Council is all male.

New Year Resolution

By the time you are reading this you may have made and possibly already broken several New Year resolutions. But here is one for us all that was the suggestion of one of our previous Councillors. It is to try and make our village an even nicer place to live in 2014. Here is the challenge. Drop no litter, drive slowly and carefully, park considerately, smile often, meet and greet friends, neighbours and colleagues warmly and see if every day you can do one little kindness. Not an easy challenge but worth a go. Meanwhile the Parish Council wishes all our parishioners a very Happy New Year.

Tribute to a soldier of The Great War

by Graham Rose, a descendant.

Sidney Hopkin was born and bred in Willingham and attended the school in Fen End. Afterwards he cultivated the land around his home in the Black Pit and Berrycroft area, now known as Balland Field.

As a young man he volunteered as an engineer to fight in the First World War and joined the Cambridgeshire and Suffolk Regiment and trained in Bury St Edmunds before being sent to the Somme. When he returned home, he told of laying barbed wire fences and spoke of the fighting, the mud in the trenches – where not even toilets could be properly dug – and of the explosions around him. But as with many who fought in the Great War he kept some things back about his dreadful experiences. He experienced a period of convalescence in Wales before returning to Willingham to resume his farming life.

Sidney's rehabilitation included driving the first Fen Pump Old Oil Engine sited along the Earith Road.

After the war, life was very hard for most working people Apart from poverty there was a lot of sickness. Sidney had two children of his own, Edna Rose and Eric, but also cared for three of his deceased grandmother's sister's family – Henry, Gordon and Phyllis. There was not much room in their old home but they managed and worked at sending fruit and flowers to market.

During the floods of 1947 their livestock from Bridge Farm was also lodged at their Berrycroft house! Sidney had many stories about those days of farming, of the railway through Earith which carried goods but not passengers to markets on the other side of the river.

One story he told was how one of his new heifers went missing after being offloaded from the railway yet managed to appear the next day having crossed the river unaided simply by following the call of her herd!

Sidney kept going to a ripe old age. He moved to a smaller place on Rampton Road before he died; he is buried in Willingham churchyard. His family is proud of his achievements and the contribution he made to his country in 1914.

Introducing Alaine Bunce, our Social Prescriber

What does a Social Prescriber do? Well, social prescribing enables GPs, nurses and other primary care professionals to refer people to a range of local, non-clinical services to support their health and wellbeing.

It is designed to support people with a wide range of social, emotional or practical needs, including focusing on improving mental health and physical wellbeing. This can range from advising people about unclaimed benefits, helping them complete forms, referring people to statutory services such as Social Care, Home Improvement Agencies and Occupational Therapists, to advising what support is available in the voluntary and community sector, including social support groups, exercise groups and specialist organisations such as AgeUK, Mind, CAB and the Trussell Trust. This can also include helping people back to work, into volunteering, introduce them to arts activities and healthy eating advice.

People who could benefit from Social Prescribing schemes include people with mild or long-term mental health problems, people who are socially isolated and those with multiple longterm conditions, who frequently attend either primary or secondary health care.

Social Prescribers are employed to give time to people to focus on 'what matters to me' and using local knowledge, signpost people to services which will provide more dedicated advice and support. It is not long term support but is designed to work with people over several sessions to help them achieve their goals and social outcomes that impact positively on health and wellbeing. On occasion this can mean acting as a short-term advocate to assist with a time-limited issue or helping someone join, for example, a befriending group, an art class or community gardening project, based on what works for them.

Report from Lucy Frazer MP

As we welcome in the new year, I wanted to spend some time reflecting on 2023 and letting you know about some of the work I have been doing for you as your local Member of Parliament.

2023 was a year of highs and lows. I think most people would join me in recognising the coronation of Charles III and Camilla last May as a memorable highlight. As the first coronation in 70 years, the event was always bound to be a special occasion, but I was moved by the many displays of national unity and celebration I witnessed over the Bank Holiday weekend. However, the year did present us with challenges. Not only did we have a second year of war in Ukraine, but another conflict has now started in the Middle East.

I know how important quality healthcare is to my constituents. That's why I have been working with my neighbouring MP, Anthony Browne, and senior leaders at Addenbrooke's Hospital to secure a new cancer hospital at Cambridge Biomedical Campus, which will enable better diagnosis and precision treatments from 2026-27.

As MP for a largely rural constituency, I also appreciate the need for effective bus services. Following my efforts at the end of 2022 to prevent Stagecoach from axing or significantly altering 23 local bus routes, including the Citi5, I was pleased to assist the Combined Authority with the re-tendering of bus services for at least another 12 months from April 2023. Recently, I wrote to the Mayor to call him to identify how he intends to utilise the new £2.3 million government funding for Cambridgeshire's bus network.

I have been working with Cambridgeshire Constabulary and the Police and Crime Commissioner to get crime down, so that my constituents can feel safer in their communities. The force is at a record size following the government's 'Police Uplift Programme' and I am pleased that it is paying dividends, with neighbourhood crime down 30% and rural crime down 21% across Cambridgeshire.

County Council Funding

Cambridgeshire County Council leaders have expressed disappointment about the lack of any additional funding for local government in the Chancellor of the Exchequer's Autumn Statement.

Councillor Lucy Nethsingha, Leader of Cambridgeshire County Council said: 'The failure to address the funding crisis faced by the whole local government sector, caused by rising levels of inflation and spiralling need, in the Autumn Statement is disappointing for all County Councils.'

Winter Vaccinations

December Meeting

Two important issues were raised in the public forum at the December meeting. The first was with regard to the increased incidents of surface water flooding and sewage back up in areas not previously prone to these problems. Frustration was expressed by the Council with the lack of progress they had been able to make with Anglian Water who were blaming discharges from Longstanton. Doubt was expressed whether this was the cause rather than the number of new properties in Willingham discharging surface water into an over-loaded system. The Parish Council agreed to debate this at the January meeting with a view to seeing if they could get further independent advice and District Councillor Handley said he would discuss the matter with the planners at the District Council.

The second issue was the lack of a footpath on the last section of the roadway to the Highgate Business Park, which has been growing strongly in recent times and where the number of visitors has increased sharply. The Parish Council said that it was an issue very much on their radar and that they hoped to be submitting a bid to the Minor Highways Improvement Scheme shortly. If that was successful and County Council funding could be added to some Parish Council and local business contributions, then hopefully progress could be made next year.

20 MPH Limit

Another hot topic was the proposed village-wide 20 MPH Speed Limit. No members of the public were present on this subject and so the Council reviewed the detailed scheme drawn up by the County Council on the basis of the information already provided. After some debate they decided that it should proceed. The matter is now with the County Council who will be undertaking further consultation on the matter next year.

Precept

On a majority vote, the Council agreed to accept the recommendation of the Finance and General Purposes Committee for an increase of 7.9% in next year's precept. It will mean an additional cost of 15p per week for a band D property.

Open Spaces

If you fancy getting out into the fresh air on a bright winter's day there are several contrasting parish-owned pieces of land to visit: the well-established Community Orchard on Earith Road, Barton Field off Black Pit Drove (no cars please) – a small largely untouched area of part woodland part grass, and the larger Meadow Road site – grassland, trees, shrubs and soon to include a wild life pond. The surface of Meadow Road has been improved making for easier access to the site, about half a mile from Rockmill End, and there is parking for several cars. Dogs are welcome at all these sites but please clean up after them. These sites were showcased in the Autumn 2023 District Council's Zero Carbon Communities Newsletter.

Topple Testing

A reminder that the Council is legally required to check on the safety of tombstones. Those that do not meet the topple test requirement must be strengthened or laid flat. The Council will contact owners of the graves that are affected when known.

Volunteers

The Council is grateful to Ed Gilbert, Oliver Gawthroup and other volunteers, who helped with Christmas lights on The Green. Thanks are also due to the volunteers who looked after other Village events in 2023 as well as the many clubs and societies, who were involved. The Village would not be the place it is without them. Parish Councillors are of course also unpaid. If you feel you could help contribute to their work, please contact the Parish Clerk, and find out what is involved. A vacancy is due for co-option at the February meeting.

Meetings:

The next full Council Meeting will be in the Octagon on **Wednesday 10 January** starting at 7 30 pm. Note that this is the second Wednesday in January because of the Christmas holiday. Meetings in February onwards revert to the normal date of the first Wednesday of the month.

Mobile Food Hub

Council's Social Housing Maintenance

Just over a year ago SCDC entered into a completely new contract with Mears for the repair and maintenance of the Council's social housing portfolio. A year on, a full contract review has been conducted. This shows that performance over the previous contract has improved significantly across the piece. Overall tenant satisfaction is high, with 93% of residents reporting satisfaction with the service they have received. The Council will continue to monitor Mears' performance closely to try to drive standards higher still.

Dan Lentell's Report

On Monday 20 November SCDC held an extraordinary meeting to discuss the Best Value Notice issued by the UK Government at Westminster. Ministers had repeatedly warned SCDC that paying staff five days' salary, while only expecting them to work four days, was a non-starter. Certainly, there are better fitting forms of four in seven working days available than the Four Day Week trial imposed on us without a debate or vote.

While the senior leadership team at SCDC might not like to admit it, it seems to me that our local District Council is now in special measures. At the extraordinary meeting, which was held, several things became crystal clear.

- First, SCDC will continue its Four Day Week trial no matter what. Senior leaders (elected and unelected) have nailed their colours to the mast, they don't want to lose face by backing down under Government pressure in front of all their friends in other Councils. If only they cared so much about what voters and taxpayers in South Cambridgeshire feel.
- Secondly, complying with the Best Value Notice will consume huge amounts of officer time. 'Onerous' is how the Deputy Leader of the Council phrased it. If the trial was ever cost neutral – and if you think it was, then I need to tell you that in my opinion South Camb's version of the Four Day Week is now going to divert a very great deal of the Council's money and resources from other priorities such as vital frontline services.

At the meeting I pointed out that this titanic project was doomed to failure from Day One by (1) a lack of wider stakeholder engagement; (2) deliberate interference with the independent report on it by senior officers, (3) a total disinclination by top politicians to obtain any kind of public support for their controversial project.

I also suggested that flushing any amount of other people's money into a hole that cannot be filled is a less than sensible approach for a Council subject to a best value notice.
