Nature's Names

There are fewer theories, it seems, about the origin of the name of Britain's favourite bird, the robin, than many of nature's names. That's because *robin* is just a nickname that has stuck. For centuries it was more likely to be formally known as a *redbreast* or a *ruddock*, words which refer to its plumage. There's consensus that *Robin*, as a diminutive of the French name *Robert*, previously the Germanic *Hrodebert*, was introduced to Britain by Norman invaders and then used, when referring to the bird, as a familiar, poetic name.

The official name *redbreast* first appeared in print around the 15th century and was commonly used for the next 400 years and more; ornithological texts as recently as 1952 listed the species as that name. Which raises the question — the bird's breast is more orange, so why is it called red? The answer is that the word *orange* as a colour didn't exist until 1557, originally from the Sanskrit *nāranga*.

It was traditionally believed that St Valentine's Day was the time that resident wild birds begin to pair up. Of course, it's more complex than that, and the robin is a bird that is likely to melodically and mercilessly stake its territory and find a mate weeks before then — the likelihood of a robin dying in the first year is high, so they have no time to waste!

Many species of bird around the world are called robins but aren't related — some, like the American robin, are actually in the thrush family. They were only called robins by British explorers over the centuries because of their colourful bellies. Michael Jackson's 1972 hit *Rockin' Robin* might not have had the same success if it had been called *Rockin' Thrush*!

Our current coordinator, Nigel Ayling, is stepping down after eight years in the post but is very happy to provide initial help and support to a new volunteer and to transfer the database, forms and artwork files. Online Consultations Using Patient Triage

This is a great way for you to contact our Practice for non-urgent medical or administration requests. You can request results, sick notes, medical advice and order repeat prescriptions. It is a very simple form to fill in online and submit straight to the GP. You can access the new patient form via the NHS app or from our website, where the link is available on our home page. If you do not have access to the internet or find it difficult to use a computer or smartphone you can call reception instead and they will complete the triage form on your behalf.

Although the character count is limited on the form, please try to give as much specific and concise information as possible. Also, please bear in mind that, so as not to overwhelm the GP, there is a daily cap so we would ask that you only send one request per patient per day.

Please note – The Practice will respond to your enquiry within two working days. If you need urgent assistance for an acute problem, please continue to call our reception team for an on the day appointment. Continue to use 111 for medical help when we are closed, or 999 for a lifethreatening condition.

Thank You

The Partners and Staff would like to send a huge thank you to the family of the late John Bevan for the very kind donation that was made for the Practice Equipment fund. It is very kind of patients and their families to think of the Practice and we are sincerely grateful. This money allows us to update equipment for the Surgery for the benefit of all patients, so once again we send our thanks for supporting us.

Car Parking at the Medical Practice

May we politely remind the wider community that the car park at the Medical Practice is privately owned and is for the use of our patients and staff only. This Year is a Leap Year

Every four years an extra day is added to February to keep the calendar aligned with the earth's revolutions around the sun. It takes 365 days, five hours, 48 minutes and 45 seconds for the earth to travel around the sun so every fourth year an extra day is added to February. This means that people born on **29 February** only get to celebrate their actual birthday every four years!

Years which can be divided by four but not by 100 are called leap years. Leap day babies are called leapers or leaplings and there is a one in 1,461 chance of being a leap day baby! These people usually have to decide whether to celebrate their birthday on either **28 February**, a day early or a day later on **1 March**.

I wonder how many of our readers, young or not so young were born on **29 February**? If you are a 'leaper' please let us know. The fictional character *Superman* is one!

This year is a leap year, so February has 29 days. Consequently we have an extra 24 hours at our disposal this February in comparison with the previous three years. Just think how many of those tasks waiting to be ticked off on your 'to do' list might be accomplished over a 24-hour period, taking a bit of pressure off you perhaps. Many of us never seem to have enough time in our busy lives.

Of course, the pattern of months, weeks, days, hours, minutes adopted around the world is simply a way to measure time as accurately as necessary for daily human life. 29 February isn't an additional chunk of time, just the adjustment needed every four years to preserve the calendar and balance our sense of the seasons.

Time cannot be increased or decreased. It is constantly available to every one of us, to be filled by work, rest or play. Problems arise if we try to fit too many tasks into the time available and then fail to complete them. Then again, we speak about 'wasting time', when we procrastinate, or use our time in fruitless or negative ways; but that's very different from spending time in rest and relaxation, which we all need to keep healthy.

Readers as old as me may remember a song by Pete Seeger, made popular by The Byrds in the 1960s, *Turn, Turn, Turn, to Everything There is a Season*. The lyrics are almost identical to words from the Bible (Ecclesiastes 3:1-8) which remind us that God gives sufficient time for everything that needs to be done; that everything has a time and a place in life.

The question facing each of us is how to use our time wisely, for our own and others' benefit. How will you spend 29 February, or today, for that matter?

District Councillor Bill Handley's Report

Local Plan Update and 'Cambridge 2040'

The Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service continues to work on the new Local Plan, an incredibly important planning framework, which is intended to supersede the one delivered belatedly by the previous administration in 2018. Progress has been hampered by matters outside of the councils' control, such as uncertainties relating to water availability.

The government's so-called Cambridge 2040 policy has further complicated matters. Although details of the plans are still very vague, it proposes supercharged development in Greater Cambridge including potentially more than 150,000 new dwellings. Responsibility for the delivery of this growth will be taken from our local planners and transferred to a development corporation which will operate remotely, answering directly to the Secretary of State.

Corporate Peer Challenge

SCDC recently published the conclusions of a Peer Review conducted by the LGA at the council's request. The review panel was made up of elected members and senior officers from other councils. These reviews are voluntary, politically neutral and act as a critical friend, highlighting strengths and suggesting areas for development. The report praised the Council's high levels of engagement with communities, especially related to the Greater Cambridgeshire Local Plan and praised its 'Statement of Community involvement'. The review noted the positive working culture within the Council and recognised the improvements made in this respect since the administration took control in 2018. The leadership team and CEO were singled out for special praise.

Most importantly, the report recognised the Council's strong financial position with a balanced budget predicted through to 2024/25 and with reserves of £61M recorded at the end of the last financial year. They identified minimal investment risk and a well-structured and robust investment governance strategy. SCDC is one of very few councils in the country able to show such a positive financial position and, as a result, the council has been able to devote significant resources to deliver cost of living support, green initiatives and positive community outcomes.

Western Park Sports Pavilion, Northstowe

The Western Park Sports Pavilion in Northstowe opens for business soon. The pavilion is impressive, with six Rugby XV changing rooms and a large event/clubroom serving drinks and food. Willingham Wolves FC are keen to use the facilities there.

District Councillor Dan Lentell's Report

Between 31 October and 3 November, the Local Government Association carried out a Corporate Peer Review of South Cambridgeshire District Council. The LGA is the apolitical national membership body for local authorities and works on behalf of its member councils to support, promote, and improve local government. Their report makes for depressing reading.

This was an external review carried out by inspectors (including the Lib Dem leader of Cotswold District Council) who really know what to look for and what they are talking about. The auditors make no fewer than 12 recommendations including: a total overhaul of the council's internal scrutiny and overview processes; a review of the 'robustness' of the data/information provided to us elected representatives to support effective decision-making; a revised business plan which 'sets the context place narrative'. These findings could not be clearer: South Cambridgeshire's internal democracy is failing to hold senior leaders (elected and unelected) to account. The inspectors say that senior leaders are avoiding proper scrutiny and external engagement with the public and other key stakeholders. They also raised concerns that South Cambridgeshire's administrative structure is too centred on the CEO rather than a broader team of well-supported senior leaders who properly understand the local context in South Cambridgeshire.

In short, the auditors say that South Cambs is adrift and in no way anchored to the council's purpose of tailoring local services to local needs. Although the botched four-day week 'trial' was not examined in their study, it cannot have helped that the council was placed into special measures via a best-value notice from HM Government on the final inspection day. The four-day week ethical omnishambles is the symptom, rather than the cause.

The deafening silence from the senior leaders' spin machine about the report also tells us something. They invited the LGA in, this wasn't a scheduled or mandatory audit. They truly believe their own press releases. They honestly think they are doing a good job. The publication of this report proves what your, not especially humble, correspondent has been saying for months, South Cambs is a mess and things cannot start to get better until my fellow elected councillor types stop pretending otherwise for the sake of their party-political games.

Cambridgeshire County Councillor Neil Gough's Report

Dear Residents,

The issues of speeding traffic and illegal parking are two of the issues most frequently raised with me by Willingham residents. It is good to see that this year will see the implementation of measures to address both.

Tackling Speeding Traffic

Willingham's 20 mph scheme, proposed by the Parish Council, was selected by the County Council for funding and the detailed design work is progressing well. The details of the scheme will be consulted upon and it should be implemented this year.

The project to introduce physical speed reduction measures along Rampton Road is also progressing following detailed design work. These measures should also be installed this year and should reduce speeding along that road considerably.

Parking Enforcement

New Civil Parking Enforcement powers have now been granted in South Cambridgeshire for the local authority to take over enforcement posts for parking from the police. This follows a long administrative process that culminated in a decision by central Government. Drivers will now be far more likely to receive a fine for parking incorrectly where there are restrictions, such as on single or double yellow lines. A process of ensuring that all restrictions have correct signage and line markings has been undertaken and completed by the County Council. This year will see more effective enforcement of these restrictions.

Winter Vaccinations

We Are Often Asked – 'What Does the Parish Council Do for Us?'

Below is a short resume of some of the things which the Council have provided/facilitated over the past 12 months.

Green Spaces

In addition to the Recreation Ground and Play Park, Willingham has three 'green spaces' that the Parish Council maintain to provide village recreational facilities, the Orchard, Meadow Road, and Barton Field. We have recently been working with 'Cambridge Acre' to develop a wildlife pond at the Meadow Road site. This should mature during this year. A hedgerow was also planted and the site continues to be improved.

Zero Carbon Communities Video

South Cambridgeshire have put together a video championing the work that has been done in the region with regards to biodiversity and reduction of community carbon footprints.

Willingham is included in the video and it can be watched via the link: <u>www.youtube.com/watch?v=PXr9YIKUp0U</u>.

Sports/Classes

South Cambridgeshire Council has recently finally approved the planning application for a multi-use games area (Tennis and Netball). Persistent work was required to comply with all the necessary criteria for this to be granted. The Council look forward to moving this project forward.

The Ploughman Hall continues to attract regular users for fitness, dance, and many other groups including badminton and table tennis.

Highways Issues.

The Council continued to tackle concerns regarding Highways issues during the past year. We have regular quarterly meetings with 'Highways' to liaise and chase up actions. There has been a recent reorganisation of the Highways Team and they have asked that residents report any concerns directly on their 'portal', Report a highways fault – Cambridgeshire County Council. It is helpful to include a photo if possible.

We applied for, (but unfortunately were unsuccessful), a Minor Highways bid to have 'priority chicanes' on Over Road and Rampton Road.

As part of Northstowe's 106 monies the County Council are looking to add speed bumps to Rampton Road.

Road marking and signage were added to Station Road to highlight the 30 mph speed limit.

Signage to highlight 30 mph and remind drivers of the school, have also been added.

The Council has helped to facilitate a 'speed watch' group in the village.

An application has been made to the County Council for a 20 mph scheme in the village. This is ongoing and the agreed scheme will be published in the press.

The Council continues to deploy speed monitoring signs at key locations around the village to remind drivers to slow down.

Buses

The Council fought hard, along with our County Councillor for a 5A Bus to be provided so that villagers had a link to the Busway. This is only

likely to continue if the service is well used. We would urge parishioners to make use of this service when they can.

Grant Support

Throughout the year the Council have supported a number of groups. These include the Youth Trust, Over Day Care Centre and Willingham Wolves Youth teams with the free use of the Recreation Ground.

The Community Warden scheme in the village is supported by the Council and regular meetings are held with the team.

For residents who require a *Community Lifeline*, the Council provide 14 of these. There is always a waiting list for these.

Defibrillators

The Council now have three defibrillators located at the pavilion, library, and telephone box on the High Street. They have also provided cabinets for the school and Social Club so that theirs can be housed outside for the public to use as well.

Flooding

The Council have an emergency plan to help manage this and other emergencies, along with some emergency equipment. We also have an ongoing commitment to keep challenging Anglian Water and other relevant authorities as appropriate.

Village Parking

Complaints are often received by the Council over instances of bad parking, and parking on double yellow lines. The Parish Council discussed this with their County Council and District Council colleagues and the Greater Cambridge Partnership have taken a civil enforcement route. This has now gone through Parliament and will be implemented during the coming months following the necessary notifications ahead of the scheme. More information can be found here:
