This photo looks almost medieval but, amazingly, it is taken in Willingham – probably around 1890. We don't know the exact location, but the buildings in the background are probably Church Street and the barn on Long Lane (still there). One hopes that the shanty thatched buildings are for animals, not people. Life goes on and the woman in a ragged apron is hanging out her washing, probably washed in the big tub on the left. This photograph is labelled 'Before the fire' and there is another, with just rubble, labelled 'After the fire'. Such was the way of life in old Willingham.

Community Orchard Wassail

As has become customary, a Wassail was held in the Community Orchard on Sunday morning, 28 January; tradition dictates that it is usually held nearer the Old Twelfth Night of 17 January. Much can be read online by searching the word Wassail, but essentially it is a Pagan ritual which became embedded in local custom in the Middle Ages. The word derives from Old Norse meaning 'be in good health'.

The practice can be house-to-house drinking from a Wassail bowl, or around the local orchards to encourage the spirits into ensuring a good harvest, and by making a noise to ward off the evil spirits and to wake up the trees. Toast or bread soaked in cider is placed in the trees to encourage robins as the guardians of the Orchard.

Leading the ceremony for the second time was Alison Bigglestone-Widdows and, in the role of King and Queen of the Wassail, were Richard and Helen Foster, so thanks to them. Also, thanks to Julian Eales (Ealesphotography) for recording the event and adding the photos to the Community Orchard gallery.

Online Consultations using Patient Triage

This is a great way for you to contact our practice for non-urgent medical or administration requests. You can request results, sick notes, medical advice and order repeat prescriptions. It is a very simple form to fill in online and submit straight to the GP. You can access the new patient form via the NHS app or from our website, where the link is available on our home page. If you do not have access to the internet, or find it difficult to use a computer or smartphone, you can call reception instead and they will complete the triage form on your behalf.

Although the character count is limited on the form, please try to give as much specific and concise information as possible. Also, please bear in mind that, so as not to overwhelm the GP, there is a daily cap, so we would ask that you only send one request per patient per day.

Please note — the Practice will respond to your enquiry within two working days. If you need urgent assistance for an acute problem, please continue to call our reception team for an on-the-day appointment. Continue to use 111 for medical help when we are closed, or 999 for a life-threatening condition.

Thought for the Month

This is the story of Zacchaeus from the Bible. Zac was a man who reached the top of his profession, but was the most hated man in the district. He was a wealthy tax collector but was unhappy and lonely, for he had chosen a way that made him an outcast. He had heard of this Jesus who welcomed tax collectors and sinners, and wondered if Jesus would have any word for him. Despised by all, Zac was reaching after the love of God.

Zac was determined to see Jesus, but to mingle with the crowd was a courageous thing to do, for many would like to kick or push him. He ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree. The little man had the courage of desperation.

Amazingly, Jesus noticed him and said that he would stay that day at Zac's house. When Zac discovered that he had found a wonderful new friend, he decided to give half of his goods to the poor. The other half he planned to use to make amends for the frauds he had done. Zac wanted to show the community that he was a changed man.

The story ends with Jesus saying that he came to 'find and to save that which was lost'. The word 'lost' simply means 'in the wrong place.' A person is lost when he or she has wandered away from God. Though it seemed like Zac had been seeking Jesus, in fact Jesus had been seeking him. Jesus showed his willingness to associate with the rejected and downtrodden.

Zac didn't leave his job, but changed his approach. He started using his responsibilities for good. He did not just undo his bad actions but started working generously and truthfully. Now he was going to serve the public as someone who had received mercy and grace from God. We too should strive to forgive and reconcile with those who have wronged us and serve them with all our hearts. Jesus described Zacchaeus as a genuine member of God's people with certain unalienable rights. As we meet people of every colour, race, and creed, let us also consider them as individuals of dignity worthy of respect, and not be prejudiced against them — because God has accepted them.

Finally, we should not allow our preoccupations of life to obscure our view of Jesus, who came to live and give dignity to men and women, and to die for their sins and reconcile them to God. So there is hope for everyone.

I am sure many of you will have heard of the *Couch to 5k* training plan? The idea is to transform you from 'couch potato' to 'runner,' getting you running three miles (or 5k) on a regular basis in just two months. British Cycling have created a similar approach to encourage you to dig your bike out of the shed and get riding! It is ideal for the complete cycling novice who is currently sedentary and looking to start cycling for health, fitness, recreation, commuting or to tackle a challenge or charity ride up to 50k (30 miles) long.

Willingham Wheels are gearing up to run a *Sofa to 50k* programme in partnership with the Over Day Centre Bike Rides! We will start the eight-week training plan on **Tuesday 7 May**. Rides are on Tuesday and Thursday evenings (7 30 pm) and Sunday mornings (9 30 am). Nature's Names

Daffodils are blooming around our village. Introduced to Britain by the Romans, the Middle English name for the plant was *affodil* (previously affo dyle) which was derived from the Greek *asphodelos*. It's possible, but slightly fanciful, that a change of spelling came about in Medieval manuscripts, in which an 's' looked very much like an 'f'. There are also theories that the 'd' was added to *affodil* at the time when the Dutch led the way in exporting bulbs in the 1600s, calling it *de affodil*. The Dutch now call it *de narcissen* and, of course, we also call it *narcissus*, a word originating from the Greek *nark* (meaning numbness) which is also the root of the word *narcotic* — this may indicate the toxicity of all parts of a daffodil.

Confusingly, especially to word historians, an *asphodel* these days is a very different plant in the UK — it is a herbaceous perennial and is associated with peace after death, whereas the daffodil symbolises re-birth. In the first Harry Potter book, Professor Snape uses powdered root of asphodel in his Draught of the Living Dead sleeping potion!

There are many other names for the daffodil: *Lent Lily* is a familiar one, as is *Peter's Leek* (mostly in Wales), and *Easter Lily*. *Daffydowndilly* (with various spelling variations) is a popular one in folklore. In Chapter 14 of Dorothy L Sayers' *Unnatural Death*, Lord Peter Wimsey is warned never to use the term *daffydowndilly* in court. In real life, Parliament debated this term in the August 1843 Libel and Defamation Bill, clearly stating in the *Hansard Report* that calling a legal representative a *daffydowndilly* is a libel, as it indicates duplicity. It had, however, been a term of affectionate address for a *dandy* for many years before that.

Update from Fen Drayton Lakes

The humble seagull is the characteristic sound of the seaside. Whilst not at the top of the list for favourite birds for many, the more you get to know about them, the more fascinating they turn out to be. At Fen Drayton Lakes, gulls form a large part of the year-round bird community, and several different species can regularly be seen here. From Spring onwards, the breeding birds appear and take up residence on the islands and rafts on the lakes. These are sociable birds that nest close to each other, but they'll squabble if a neighbour gets within nibbling range.

The main species that nests at the reserve is the Blackheaded Gull, a small gull with a (confusingly) brown head in summer. Numbers have reached as high as 600 nesting pairs, but the last year or two has been very tough on them as a wave of highly pathogenic bird-flu has arrived and affected many. However, against all odds, some pairs managed to produce young in 2023.

The number of gulls increases in late summer when

the youngsters join the adults out on the water and learn how to feed — the flush of insect life encourages many of them to fly high and pluck the insects out of the air in a surprisingly



nimble fashion. Most gulls undertake large migrations and many of the Black-headed Gulls wintering in the area have come all the way from countries such as Poland, Norway and Finland, a journey they make each year.

A feature of the birders' calendar at the reserve are the winter gull roosts, when thousands of individuals come to the lakes. It takes a dedicated person to head out in the often cold, rainy, and windy conditions to stand for a couple of hours before dark to see what is arriving. The excitement factor is not knowing what birds may turn up! There are some rare species that come down from the Arctic in winter, such as the Iceland Gull, a bird that has a strikingly pale plumage, which earns it the name of 'whitewinger'. Why not come down to the reserve to enjoy these charismatic birds yourself?

Dawn Chorus Walk

Be an early bird and join us for a dawn chorus walk on **27 April**. Learn about the many different birds that sing at the peak of spring.

Wednesday Wander

Helping Each Other and Recycling!

We are lucky here in Willingham to have so many who volunteer to work together or simply help out on a voluntary basis. The list is huge: helping with sporting clubs; children and youth clubs; adult day and evening activities; being a Parish Councillor; preparing this *Willingham News* magazine — the list seems endless. We have to be grateful and offer our own energy when we can. Our village has a brilliant Action Group who organise many ways to help others in the area — the Repair Café for example, so keep a look out for the next one.

We began the year encouraging one another to re-use and to find ways other than buying brand-new stuff to fulfil our needs. However, there may be a time when we cannot repair an electrical item, but it could be recycled. The Greater Cambridge Shared Waste Service has recently begun to establish a way to make it easier to recycle small electrical appliances. There is now a roaming 'Pink Bin' for this and the Parish Council are booking this particular bin to have a short stay here. Any unwanted small electrical items that can fit through its secure 'postage' slot can be left, safe in the knowledge it will be collected by the Greater Cambridge recycling team. So do not bin your broken fairy lights, chargers, hair-straighteners, toasters, etc, because they can be recycled and not put into land fill. Keep an eye out on social media and posters around the village, and pass on the word.

Talking of Bins...

The village has an allocated number of kerb-side waste bins according to the number of properties here, and this includes dog waste bins. At our latest meeting we discussed a variety of ideas to facilitate visitors to our Meadow Road site who need to dispose of their waste. Any weekly bin emptying must be manageable for the contractors, so hopefully we can all try to keep that popular site clean and environmentally safe too. Our Orchard bins are courtesy of, yes, volunteer support, but the large one outside that gate which was damaged should have been replaced by the time you read this. This will hopefully include a recycling section too. Regarding dog waste bags, following a suggestion, we are looking into the feasibility of providing another bag station which

walkers would find useful. However, it is now possible to put your bagged dog waste in the larger general bins as well as the usual red ones spaced out around Willingham. Following a request, there has been a new large bin set by the Station Road bus stop which displays the latest signage to show it can be used for small waste items as well as bagged dog waste.



Keeping it Healthy and Green!

There will always be new initiatives which we can take on in our own small ways. Our QEII field is always an attraction with local families and has a lot of apparatus for healthy outdoor fun. The popular 'hip-hop' piece has been removed and is being repaired, ready to enjoy. Bulbs are showing a fresh start to Spring, not just on that field, but in the village tubs as well - all planted and maintained by volunteers. Eco-friendly LED lights have been bought ready to replace the broken Christmas lights around the Green. This time of the year is perfect for settling in the six new trees on the Meadow Road Field ahead of the exciting development of the Pond Habitat Action Plan to begin soon in that area. The local RSPB projects are growing in popularity as wildlife returns to our wetlands. They are easily accessible and have parking close by. 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District Councillor (SCDC) Bill Handley's Report

Annual Report on Sustainable and Affordable Homes

The Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service (Cambs City and SCDC) recently reported on the progress made during the past year on building sustainable and affordable new homes. This shows that the Councils remain on track to deliver the need for homes identified in their adopted Local Plans; 794 new affordable homes were completed in 2023/24, 472 of which were in South Cambridgeshire. Affordable housing is defined as social rented, affordable rented, and intermediate housing provided to eligible households whose needs are not met by the housing market. Also of note is the making of three new Neighbourhood Plans which show the Councils' ongoing commitment to local community development.

Staff Needed for Elections in 2024

SCDC provides electoral services for the district. This includes the general election, which will take place in the next 12 months. On **2 May** the election of the Police and Crime Commissioner takes place and SCDC is recruiting staff to assist in the process. Vacancies exist for Presiding Officer, Poll Clerk and Count Assistants (overnight on Thursday or on Friday). Civil Parking Enforcement

Civil Parking Enforcement is now operational in South Cambs. County Council Civil Enforcement Officers (CEOs) can issue Penalty Charge Notices (parking tickets) for onstreet parking offences such as parking on double yellow or single yellow lines. County Councillor Neil Gough's Report

Dear Residents,

Here is my update, based upon my report to the parish councils in my division. A more detailed version can be found in the online edition of the *Willingham News*.

Measles

Measles cases have been rising since last November. The UK Health Security Agency declared the outbreak a national incident on 19 January. It's a highly infectious disease, usually mild in children, but can be severe with one in five requiring a hospital visit.

Currently there are no confirmed cases in Cambridgeshire but there is a strong likelihood that it will spread here. A target vaccination rate of 95% is considered necessary to prevent outbreaks, and both Cambridgeshire and Peterborough have rates lower than this.

Parents should have their children vaccinated if they have not already done so. Information about vaccine outreach clinics can be found at <u>www.cpics.org.uk/measles</u>.

Weed Spraying

The Council's Highways and Transport Committee has changed its policy on highways weed spraying. It will now be reverting to regular twice-yearly weed killing in the places where it used to do this before last year's policy change. Communities which do not want chemical weed spraying in their area will, however, be able to opt out in favour of manual weed removal by volunteers.

Peat Soil Roads

The Highways and Transport Committee approved a report on action to address the problem of Cambridgeshire's collapsing fen roads. The report identified 156 such roads which are increasingly failing due to historic lack of maintenance and more extreme weather. Most of these roads were not constructed to carry the volume and weight of traffic they are now seeing.

These roads include Twentypence Road in Cottenham and Shelford Road in Willingham. Shelford Road was provisionally identified as being in the top 25 of affected roads.

Short-term measures being used include temporary speed limits, traffic signals, and consideration may be given to temporary road closures or weight restrictions. Longer term, however, the primary focus must be lobbying together with partner organisations to gain the required substantial amount of funding to provide a systemic solution.

District Councillor Dan Lentell's Report

'There are some who would happily drive a bulldozer through the Public Hall'. I'm not easily shocked but I have to tell you, savage reader, that my gast was ever so slightly flabbered when I was told that. Willingham's Public Hall is a gem. I don't suppose many architectural critics opine that it is of much global significance. Still, our Public Hall massively matters to all of us for the sake of our shared past, future, and present. Truth be told, I think most of our hardworking Parish Councillors recognise this, even on their grumpy days.

The Hall was gifted to our community during that market garden golden age when the floral and agricultural produce of Willingham was second to none in the markets of the world's metropolis. Our Hall opened in 1897 having been built on a piece of land gifted by Mr H G Few. The £600 construction cost was financed by another Willingham native, Mr Fred Crisp. Volunteer parishioners carted the sand and bricks. The furniture of the building, which became an active and well-attended social club, was given by Mr Few. The games — including bagatelle, chess, dominoes, etc - were donated by Mrs I F Thoday. No member was allowed to retain any newspaper or periodical more than 15 minutes after it had been asked for by another member. No audible conversation was allowed in the Reading Room, and neither was smoking before 8 pm if four members present objected. Spitting on the floor was (and is) strictly prohibited.

Today, our Hall is home to one of East Anglia's most active hubs for Scouts and Explorers. A solid century of young people access our Public Hall each week — more than any other building in the village (except our Primary School). The wider social benefits of Scouting to our community are immeasurable and will be immeasurably damaged should anything disrupt their access to this vital asset.

For a fraction of the cost of building something new, we can ensure that our glorious Public Hall is still standing in another hundred years. Let's face it, our modern age has many accomplishments but building well and building to last isn't one of them — Darwin Green anybody? Even if the funds could be found, the chances that a contemporary new build would see out more than a decade or two, or that such a phantom wouldn't be an instant blossoming of sabre-tooth snagging, are vanishingly small. Driving a bulldozer through the Public Hall (or worse still, selling it off for a relative pittance) is no kind of sensible solution to the long-term needs of our community. Let's make do and mend.

Let's also focus our collective effort on what this village really needs, a sports pitch that doesn't regularly flood. We have a superb football club. What's the use of building a bigger and better trophy cabinet if all we've got to show for it are water polo medals?
