The evening started with an informal acoustic session where local singer-songwriters, Charlie and Luke, led the group through the chords needed to play a variety of songs. Once everyone was happy they knew the chords, the group then played through hits by the likes of Tom Petty, Johnny Cash and Bob Marley with everyone playing together and singing along. This first part of the evening gives people of all abilities a chance to play together and build their confidence in an informal and supportive setting. The second half of the evening saw the focus switch to the stage with artists taking short turns to perform to the warm and receptive audience. Nature's Names

Squirrels, depending on your point of view, are a pest or cute or somewhere in between. The name originates from Greek, *skíouros*, a word meaning *shadow* (*skiá*) and *tail* (*ourā*), passing through other languages such as Old French (*escureil*) and Latin (*sciūrus*). In Anglo Saxon, it was known as an $\bar{a}cweorna - \bar{a}c$ meaning *oak*, and *weorna* derived from a Celtic word



denoting *squirrel*. The origins of the name, and its journey through many languages, are as complex and debatable as any names in nature.

In literature, Beatrix Potter published two 'Tale' books with a squirrel as the title character – *Squirrel Nutkin* (1903) and *Timmy Tiptoes* (1911). In other areas of literature, literary titans such as Shakespeare, Chekhov and Kafka used squirrels in their text, often to convey havoc, mischief or discord.

In real life, the grey squirrel turned out to be one of the most ecologically damaging of any animal 'imports'. The first two were introduced into Britain in 1876 as 'amusing novelties' (compared to the then-abundant native reds) followed by 10 more at Woburn Abbey; they quickly spread and established themselves, proving to be enthusiastic colonisers! It wasn't until 1938 that laws were passed to make it illegal to import squirrels or to keep them as pets.

Many will be surprised to know that the Black Bull pub – now renamed the Porterhouse – was on the corner of Station Road and Berrycroft long before the current pub was built in the 1960s. As can be seen, it was right on the corner and was demolished when the junction was upgraded and widened. The pub was owned by Greene King and the landlord was George Lack with his wife Ruth. Their daughter Peggy later took over as landlady. There were many pubs in Willingham during the 20th century before television took over for evening entertainment!

Willingham Women's Institute



Our next meeting will be on **Monday 8 April** at 7 30 pm in the Social Club and will be on *Spring Cleaning*. Topics will be put on the tables for discussion and then feedback given to the meeting, for example, how best to clean windows, ovens, brass and silver, how to get rid of limescale and how to keep your knives sharp. We're hoping to hear lots of neat ideas, tips, myths, old wives' tales and poems.

At our February meeting Kate Osborne from Beach Bonkers gave a talk on *Suffolk Shingle: Tales of Treasure and Trash.* Kate was a very enthusiastic and knowledgeable speaker. She encouraged us to become curious adult beachcombers but to only walk on the bare areas, avoiding the specially adapted plants such as the yellow horned-poppy, sea kale and sea pea that grow on the rare, vegetated shingle.

There was a selection of items from the beach to identify: a limpet shell, a top shell which the Victorians used to make mother of pearl buttons, whelk egg cases looking like a sponge, a shark egg case known as a mermaid purse, sea glass, hornwrack which looked like seaweed but was the remains of a colony of tiny animals and flint formed from fossilised sea sponges and other creatures.

Sadly, Kate also told us about the unwanted items on the beach with plastic topping the list. Her collection of small pieces in a jar contained bits of beach toys, balloons, labels, tags, teabags and confetti. She told us that plastic flushed down the toilet such as wet wipes and cotton buds block drains and can end up in rivers and the sea. Animals and birds ingest the plastic and are dying in increasing numbers. Kate encouraged us to reduce our purchases of plastic, dispose of any bought or found in the recycling bin and, if possible, buy alternative biodegradable products, eg bamboo toothbrushes. She also suggested we check cleaning products before buying for 'Harmful to aquatic life with long-lasting effects' labels, eg Fairy washing-up liquid and washing powders.

After her talk Kate invited us to look at a fascinating collection of things she had found on shingle beaches and answered lots of questions. She told us that we should not remove shells, wood or plants from the beach, all potential homes for insects and sea creatures. She assured us she would be returning her collection after she retired.

Why not join us? Our friendly group is open to all women. As well as our meetings, all members receive a copy of the monthly *WI News*, the national magazine, and can also join outings and activities organised by the Cambridgeshire Federation. RSPB – Fen Drayton Lakes

As spring breathes new life into the landscape, the shimmering lakes come alive with a vibrant tapestry of avian wonders, offering a sanctuary for both seasoned birdwatchers and curious adventurers alike. This is one of the best times of the year to connect with nature as birds arrive back from their winter travels, bumblebees emerge from hibernation and blossom lights up the hedgerows.



This year we are putting on a series of events to enable people to explore the reserve in various ways. Starting in April with what is undoubtably one of the highlights of the season, we

will be running a **Dawn Chorus Guided Walk**. The reward for the early start will be the wonderful soundscape that can be heard around the reserve with help identifying the numerous species, both resident and migrant, singing from trees, hedges, and reed. At the other end of the spectrum, we have an **Evening Guided Walk** scheduled in May. Take advantage of the opportunity to be guided to various parts of the reserve and be expertly shown the animals which are more active later in the day up until dusk.

Wild(ish) Camping is again featuring this year for organised groups at our secluded location on the shores of Ferry Lagoon. You will have a great opportunity to connect with nature, taking photos and only leaving footprints.

Our monthly **Wednesday Wander Guided Walks** have been running successfully for many years, led by knowledgeable volunteers. By joining one of these walks, you will get to explore some of the best parts of the reserve and learn what can be seen throughout the year. Every walk is different so why not try it for yourself?

Ever thought of learning a traditional skill? Our annual **Willow Weaving Workshop** will be back this year during which you will weave your very own garden obelisk for climbing plants. The event is led by a very experienced weaver and uses willow sourced from the reserve.

For the first time this year, we will be running a Canoe Tour at the reserve in the autumn. Slink through the reeds on our new water-based trail to discover one of the harder to view lakes from a new perspective. Guided by experienced staff you will be in good hands.

Whether it's the tranquillity of a leisurely stroll along the lakeshore or the thrill of spotting a rare bird in flight, Fen Drayton Lakes beckons with the promise of inspiring encounters and unforgettable moments.

Thought for the Month

After the festivities and rejoicing during the Easter Octave, the next Sunday was commonly known in the Christian churches as Low Sunday, a time for calm and quiet reflection.

Pope John Paul II dedicated this Sunday to the Divine Mercy when he canonised a young Polish nun, Faustina, who was a nun in the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy. During her years in the convent the Lord endowed her with the gift of contemplation, with a deep knowledge of the mystery of the mercy of God, with visions, revelations, the gift of prophecy and of reading into human souls.

To this simple, uneducated but courageous woman, who trusted Him without limit, Jesus consigned the great mission to proclaim His message of mercy to the whole world. Faustina was also instructed by Jesus to record all that He said to her in a diary, available throughout the world in many languages.

What is mercy? It is a concept integral to an understanding of God's dealings with humankind. The term 'merciful' describes a quality of God and one that God desires of His people denoting compassion and love expressed in tangible ways.

Throughout the Scriptures God's mercy is spoken about and exhibited many times. Jesus teaches: 'Blessed are the merciful for they will be shown mercy.' This verse emphasises the importance of displaying compassion and forgiveness towards others. It suggests that those who show mercy will in turn receive mercy from God, reflecting the reciprocal nature of the grace.

Shakespeare, in his play, the *Merchant of Venice*, says: 'The quality of mercy is not strained, it dropeth as the gentle rain from heaven upon the place beneath. It blesses him that gives and him that takes. It is an attribute to God himself and earthly power doth then show like God's when mercy seasons justice.'

Is it time for each one of us to 'cry out to God for mercy' for ourselves and this troubled world?

Ralph Thoday (1895 – 1981)

Many of you will no doubt remember Ralph Thoday who lived in Fen End. Although Ralph was born in Hemingford, his family were well known in the village and owned various properties and market gardens. His grandfather left the small Reedground Farm in Earith Road to go to America; Ralph's father was born at sea. The next two children were born in the USA and then Lewis was born in Willingham in 1860 when the family returned.

Ralph served as a Sergeant in the Royal Army Medical Corps during the Great War. After the war he married a nurse and they settled in Cambridge and Ralph was appointed as a gardener at St John's College. He became Head of the Kitchen Garden in 1928, then Head College Gardener in 1931. He retired in 1973. He had inherited Reedground Farm from his uncle Lewis in 1945. In 1949 Ralph discovered a new apple tree growing in the derelict orchard which he named Thoday's Quarrenden. He sent apples to the Royal Horticultural Society as a sample and scions to the National Fruit Collection. The apple is a dessert type of medium size with bright red flush and creamy white flesh, sweet and juicy, picking in October.

To mark 100 years since Ralph was first appointed, St John's asked me if I could obtain two trees of this apple as we grow it here at the Bushel Box and could provide scions. Simpson's Nurseries raised the trees from our scions and they were planted at the College in January.

Ralph was well known for his radio contributions, the first in 1953 on the BBC Home Service as well as newspaper articles. The tradition was carried on by his son Peter who died last year, known for the Victorian Kitchen Garden and other programmes on TV and was involved with the Eden Project.

Many locals were amused that Ralph's own garden was always overgrown and untidy but he was very good at saying how things should be done. His daughter Muriel, also a horticulturist, was killed in a huge motorway pile-up in 1973.

New Recycling and Waste Bins

We welcome the introduction of new recycling initiatives aimed at promoting sustainable waste management practices. Residents can expect to see the arrival of a pink bin on loan from the South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC), dedicated to recycling small electrical items. This bin will be conveniently located in the Ploughman Hall Car Park, just inside the entrance gate. Please use it before it leaves us! Additionally, the Council has purchased and plans to install two replacement bins outside the orchard – a standard bin and another for recycling – in the coming weeks, further enhancing our efforts towards a cleaner and more environmentally-friendly parish.

Cemetery and Safety Measures

Ensuring the safety and cleanliness of our community spaces is a top priority; the Council has approved the replacement of the Euro bin with a smaller alternative. This new bin will be emptied weekly, providing a more efficient waste management solution for cemetery visitors. In addition, the Council conducted 'topple testing' on headstones at the end of last year, with affected headstones marked and known burial right owners notified. The advisory period for rectifying these headstones concluded on 29 March and the Council will arrange for any headstones not rectified to be laid down with the grave plot.

Barton Field

With Spring now here, more people might be tempted to visit the Council's Barton Field, to look at the blossom and other new growth. However, we continue to receive reports of unauthorised vehicle access down Black Pit Drove. Black Pit Drove is a bridleway and only cars belonging to Drove residents are permitted along it. Furthermore, all land bordering the field is privately owned, with no public right of way across them. Your cooperation in adhering to these regulations will be greatly appreciated.

Recreation Ground Concerns

The wet winter has been a disastrous one for the lower part of the Recreation Ground. It has not been fit for football matches, or much else, since October. It is likely that this situation will recur in future winters. Recognising this issue, the Parish Council is actively seeking alternative solutions and trying to identify any suitable plots of land, preferably close to the existing Recreation Ground, that could be donated, rented, leased or perhaps sold to the Parish Council. If you know of any such land, please contact the clerk.

Potholes and Flooding Concerns

In recent times, the Willingham community has faced

escalating challenges with potholes, surface water and flooding issues. These problems not only impact the quality of our infrastructure but also pose safety risks to motorists and pedestrians alike. We emphasise the great importance of residents reporting such issues to the relevant authorities promptly, either on the County Council website or by clicking on 'reporting' on the Parish Council website.

By reporting potholes and water problems, residents play a crucial role in helping authorities identify problem areas and allocate resources effectively. Providing detailed reports, including multiple photos of the problem areas, can help address these issues. It is essential to remember that multiple reports from different residents corroborate the urgency and demand for action. By collectively raising awareness and documenting the extent of these challenges, we can ensure that the relevant authorities are informed and motivated to take proactive measures.

Community Survey for Healthy Places

Residents of Willingham are invited to participate in a joint initiative by Cambridgeshire County Council and Peterborough City Council's public health team. Your input will help shape healthy, supportive and inclusive communities in the region. The ongoing development of the Healthy Places Joint Strategic Needs Assessment for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough aims to create healthier, easily accessible and inclusive communities. Your feedback is crucial in identifying priorities such as access to healthcare services, inclusive green spaces, active travel opportunities and affordable healthy food options. 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District Councillor (SCDC) Bill Handley's Report

Council Budget

Full Council recently voted to approve the administration's Budgets and Business Plan for the next 12 months. SCDC is on a very sound financial footing and remains one of the lowest taxing authorities in the country, with a £5 per year increase – 42p a month - for the average band D home, equivalent to a below inflation rise of around 3%.

Two more Environmental Enforcement Officers (Envirocrime) are being employed to tackle the increasing problem of fly-tipping and two new posts created for highways litter-picking.

Four-Day Week Update

SCDC's four-day week trial finished at the end of March. The Council undertook the trial because of the acute recruitment and retention issues it faces, which is amplified in Greater Cambridge due to the high cost of housing. A full report where we will assess how well the four-day week has gone will now be compiled. Some of the benefits include spending £434,000 less on agency staff between September 2022 to 31 December 2023, route optimisation of waste collection and a positive impact upon health and wellbeing.

Cambridgeshire Home Improvement Agency (Cambs HIA)

Cambs HIA is a strategic partnership of local councils dedicated to enhancing the living conditions of residents. Last year it helped more than a hundred families in South Cambs to access grants such as Disabled Facilities Grants and Special Purpose Grants. District Councillor (SCDC) Dan Lentell's Report

On 27 February South Cambs met to discuss the budget. The debt ceiling, taxes and council house rents went up. All those promised savings from the Four-Day Week Trial haven't amounted to much. You'll be glad to know that remuneration for us councillors is also going up (backdated) despite a verbosely elegant speech from your not-especially humble correspondent arguing that this might tend to annoy residents. As with last year's rise, my ill-gotten gains will go directly to registered charities in Over and Willingham.

With the exception of three late-arriving rays of sunshine, it was a bleak and gloomy picture overcast by the botched Four-Day Week Trial. I am 100% in favour of our society moving towards more 4in7 working models. I know from my own family set-up how beneficial a day away from the regular grindstone can be, especially for those of us with young children. However, the proposed (and imposed) 'Five Days Pay for Four Days Worked' model was successful in Reykjavik only because it had been adopted across the economy, public and private. No one was left behind. Other, more inclusive approaches were available but not considered. It goes to show why debate in public policymaking matters is important. Big ideas need a lot of little adaptations if they are going to be successfully adopted. Want to go fast? Go alone. Want to go far? Go together.

So, I am pleased to say that, towards the end of the meeting, South Cambs got together and got some really useful work done. The final item on the agenda, proposed by Councillor Anna Bradman, means that: 'Future decisions, services and policies made and adopted by the Council should be assessed through Equality Impact Assessments to determine the impact of changes on people with care experience, alongside those who formally share a protected characteristic ... This Council will treat care experience as if it were a protected characteristic.'

The penultimate item on the agenda, standing in the name of Councillor Heather William (leader of the Conservative opposition) requested 'that the Cabinet expands its 'Cost of Living Support' scheme to include providing free sanitary products to those who may not be able to afford them.'

The antepenultimate item, standing in the name of Councillor Daniel Lentell (Independent, Over & Willingham) but drafted and redrafted by the Lib Dems' Councillor Judith Rippeth and Labour's Elizabeth McWilliams, supported the Council's move towards accreditation from White Ribbon, the UK's leading charity engaging men and boys to end violence against women and girls. Anti-domestic violence, anti-period poverty, pro-kids in care measures were passed with unanimous, cross-party votes of acclamation. Want to go far? Go together, Mrs Landingham! What's next?

County Councillor Neil Gough's Report

Dear Residents,

I hope that this update finds you well. The following is based upon my report to the Parish Councils in my division.

County Budget

The Council agreed its budget on Tuesday 13 February. Councillors have prioritised a number of key areas, based on residents' feedback from last summer's 'Quality of Life' survey. The budget:

- Sustains critical adults' and children's social care services.
- Includes record levels of highways funding to strengthen and improve the standard of roads and pavements, including tackling potholes, weeds and gulleys, in direct response to residents' concerns.
- Prioritises support for vulnerable communities, including continuing to provide holiday supermarket vouchers for those children most in need.

The Council agreed a Council Tax rise of 4.99% (2% for adult social services and 2.99% for general services).

Measles Update

With cases of measles rising in some areas of the country, the Council is asking everyone to check their MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) vaccination status and get vaccinated if not up to date. Walk-in vaccination clinics are taking place across Cambridgeshire. More information at www.cpics.org.uk/measles.

Secondary Schools

A greater percentage of Cambridgeshire students will be going to their first-choice secondary school this September. A total of 87.9% have been offered a place at their firstchoice school — up from 87.1% last year. The proportion offered a place at their first, second or third preference school has also risen, from 95.4% in 2023 to 95.8% this year. The total number of places offered this year was fewer than last – 7,220 compared with 7,413.

Reporting Flooding
