This poor fellow appears to be in some sort of outdoor shelter – perhaps erected temporarily to house patients. Since his upper body appears fine, we must assume his injuries were to the legs. Someone has thoughtfully put flowers on the table and, on the back wall, is a pocket watch, his badge and a poster with five faces, probably the King and important generals. Maybe these were intended to give encouragement – but perhaps they would just remind him who put him there!

Meet the oldest person to represent Great Britain in International Speed Skating.

Bones to Carbon Fibre – a brief history of Fen Skating.

How do you cover over 150 years of skating history – from shaped bones to custom-made carbon fibre boots, some of the history and atmosphere of a typically Fenland pastime and sport?

David Smith was born and has lived all his life in Sutton. He started skating on the Fens at Bury Fen Earith, in the dark on a moonlight night, in the late 1970s. He won his first race at Sutton Gault in 1981 and started skating at the newly formed Fenland Indoor Ice Speed Skating Club, at the Peterborough Ice Rink, shortly afterwards. In 1984, David won the British 'Short Track' Junior Championships and set three British records on the way.

We had severe weather in the winters of 1985, 86 and 87, which made for fantastic skating conditions and Fen skating racing, at Bury Fen Earith, Welney, Baston Fen in Lincolnshire and Whittlesey.

David was quite competitive during those winters. In 1989 he started skating marathon races (12 miles) in Holland, which he continued to do until 2016, when he reverted back to the time trial race format, to compete in World Masters competitions, and for four years was the oldest person to represent GB in International Speed Skating.

David retired from competitive skating in March this year after 42 years.

News from RSPB Ouse Fen Nature Reserve

A New Quarry Partner

At Ouse Fen the RSPB are working in partnership with minerals the industry to transform the aggregates quarry at Needingworth into the largest reedbed in the UK. This will create a wetland home supporting priority conservation species like



bittern and their reedbed neighbours. It's a great place for the community to connect with nature too. Having worked to do this very successfully with Heidelberg Materials for more than two decades, this year will see a new owner take over quarry operations and help develop the growing nature reserve. We look forward to working with Brice Aggregates, building on the great success of the project so far and the continued creation of Ouse Fen Nature Reserve.

Recent Wildlife News

Winter wildlife highlights have included peak roost counts of 35 marsh harriers and up to 32 cattle egret, the latter still a relatively new colonist to Cambridgeshire. Another peak count was 40 bearded tits reported from Cuckoo Fen. Across the reserve up to four short-eared owls have been seen along with merlin, regular all winter, and a single sighting of a long-eared owl. Waders feeding on Berry Fen included 925 black-tailed godwit and 31 ruff with three white-fronted geese and seven whooper swan also dropping by. A few visitors have been lucky enough to encounter otters which are now regularly being seen up and down the valley now.

However, the news that has drawn most attention in recent months has been the starling murmuration over the reedbeds, mustering an estimated 100,000 birds. The reserve car park near Earith was filled by visitors flocking to see this amazing attraction.

Nature's Names

What have the Romans ever done for us, apart from the sanitation, the medicine and the wine? Well, they introduced pet cats to Europe, in the first century AD. But where does the name *cat* actually come from?

The Latin *catta* replaced the early Latin word *feles* over a thousand years ago, and reached the English language via the Proto-Germanic *kattuz* and the Old French *chat*. Before then, the name probably originated in Africa, several thousand years ago, from the likes of the Berber language's *kadiska*. The name was extended to larger cats like lions and tigers around 1600 and, well before then, came the folklore about a cat's nine lives. Shakespeare's Mercutio referred to that myth in Act 3 of Romeo and Juliet.

What about *tabby cats*, with their striped or brindled coat? The word *tabby* is named after a textile manufacturing quarter of Baghdad, so called after Prince Attab. The cloth was known as *attābi*, a rather posh silk taffeta with a brindled pattern. This became the Old French *atabis*, modern French *tabis*, then English *tabby*. Samuel Pepys, in his diary entry for 13 October 1661, described his 'false taby wastecoate with gold lace'. It was around this time that *tabby* started to apply to cats of a similar colour and markings to the cloth.

The term *cat* has also had several alternative meanings — a jazz player, for example, a slang term first recorded in the 1930s. That might have been because both the animal and the musician are graceful, spontaneous and unpredictable, and often prefer to go out at night!

Measles

Measles cases in England are rising. Measles is an infection that spreads very easily and can cause serious problems in some people. Having the MMR vaccine is the best way to prevent it and protect our communities. Measles symptoms include: high fever, sore, red, watery eyes; coughing; aching and feeling generally unwell; and a blotchy red brown rash, which usually appears after initial symptoms. If you have symptoms of measles, stay at home and phone your GP or NHS 111 for advice. Stay away from GP surgeries and A&E departments. Stay off nursery, school or work for at least four days from when the rash first appears. It's never too late to be vaccinated. You need two doses of the MMR vaccine to be fully protected against measles, mumps and rubella.

Travel Information

As the summer holidays are fast approaching many of us are turning our attention to booking holidays and making our travel plans.

If you are planning to travel abroad, please consider whether you will require any vaccinations. By booking a Travel Clinic appointment (at least six weeks before your date of travel) with one of our practice nurses, they can offer a general travel consultation with advice. They are also able to administer the following vaccinations (free of charge): Hepatitis A, Typhoid, Tetanus Diptheria and Polio and the MMR. For any other vaccinations we would recommend you attend MASTA, a private travel clinic, located on Hills Road in Cambridge. Please visit our website for further information and to fill out a Travel Questionnaire, which must be completed before your appointment.

For those who are on repeat medication, please plan ahead and make sure you have enough medication to last for your time away, remembering to re-order with plenty of time before you travel and allowing at least three working days before collection. And, just in case of emergency, we would advise that you take a list of your repeat medication with you (your repeat prescription slip would be ideal).

Finally, just a reminder that the GP is unable to sign (as

Barrow Hill Roundhouse – Men's Breakfast Trip in April

In April a group of us from the Men's Breakfast Club went on a trip to Staveley near Chesterfield, Yorkshire. I had heard of this only remaining working rotating railway turntable in the country, last year.

My great grandfather Charles Reboul Sacré, designed steam locomotives in the 1850s. Starting as a 15 year-old apprentice engineer in 1831 in Boston and Peterborough, he ended up at the tender age of 23 as chief engineer of the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincoln Railway Company based in Doncaster. One of his engines was a massive 0-6-0 goods train (the middle figure 6 is the number of drive wheels). In five years 60 were built, and so successful was

the design, they ran the Pennine coal runs continuously from the 1860s till the 1920s. **

Barrow Hill Roundhouse comprises 24 'railroads', each radiating out from a huge centrally pivoted turntable capable of carrying at least 200 tons! Which is just as well as some of the diesel locomotives weigh in excess of 160 tons. Opening in 1870, Roundhouse operated until 1991 after 121 years continuous use. Finally double-ended diesel locomotives took over and redundancy loomed. With demolition threatened from a housing developer, it was rescued after several years of dereliction and, refurbished, opened to the public in 1998, the only working roundhouse railway in Great Britain.

There are steam days and talks throughout the summer, and recently, volunteers spent two years restoring the

signal box and levers to full working order for visitors to try out. There must be at least 45 locomotives on display, some steam shunters and mainline engines, many operational, or privately owned or being lovingly restored.



The museum includes displays of explosive charges which could be laid on the tracks to warn drivers of impending hazard on the line! Five hours wasn't enough time to see it all, especially with an hour for a good hot lunch in the café. From group feedback, a really good day out was had by all.

Later this year we shall follow up with a meal reunion, short talk, with film and photos, plus a short journey on my great Grandad's life (affectionately known as 'Hellfire Charlie' because of his booming north country voice).

All those interested, even if you did not go this time, are welcome. Watch this space!

Just lately, we have certainly had our fair share of variety, from unseasonably heavy rain which has left persistent puddles in the fields; cold, easterly winds which have delayed the greening of our trees and hedges; and the short periods when we have seen the sun and enjoyed some warmth have been rather too far apart! It's been an odd spring and has left many of us wondering what sort of summer we will get! Long may this continue, and may it be a real blessing to all who live and have associations with this lovely village of Willingham!

District Councillor (SCDC) Bill Handley's Report

Five-year Land Supply

A reassessment of the housing land supply has just been published which shows that we have six and a half years of housing land supply for the 2024-2029 period. This means that there will be no repeat of the loss of planning control as happened several years ago and which led to the approval, on appeal, of several developments that were outside of our agreed village framework.

Low-income Family Tracker (LIFT)

As part of its support for the cost-of-living crisis, SCDC is to employ a new database platform called the Low-Income Family Tracker (LIFT). This will allow the council to identify low-income families, so that they can be encouraged to claim the benefits to which they are entitled. The software is used by over 70 Local Authorities in England, including Cambridge City Council and once in operation it will, in the longer term, allow the council to make efficiencies.

An Improved Homes for Ukraine Landlord Incentive Scheme

SCDC's Landlord Incentive Scheme offers incentives to landlords willing to let their properties to 'Homes for Ukraine' refugees. It is for an initial minimum six month tenancy and the amount offered varies based upon rent rates and property size. The scheme has recently been enhanced to make it more attractive to landlords and is fully funded from the government.

Empty Houses

SCDC is encouraging people to bring empty properties back into use. They are collaborating with various entities to trace owners or agents and offer assistance in renovating empty properties.

If someone wishes to take on a property that has been empty for two years or more to improve it and make it their home, the Council's Empty Homes Officer can provide a letter, free of charge, so that you will pay only 5% VAT on renovation work instead of the usual 20% if you employ a registered builder. District Councilor (SCDC) Dan Lentell's Report

Think global. Vote local.

The results of the election for Cambridgeshire Police and Crime Commissioner are in. Darryl Preston, the former frontline officer and previous incumbent, will serve another four year term. So what? So, everything. This is the single most important job in our beloved county's crazy paving landscape of disjointed local authority. I don't know if there's an actual Bat Signal sitting on the Police Commissioner's desk but, if there is, it really does matter that the office holder is not an unqualified joker. Time and again Commissioner Preston has delivered for South Cambridgeshire in general and for Over and Willingham in particular, so I'll be popping a bottle of Smirnoff Ice to celebrate his narrowest of narrow wins.

Cards on the table, I was (once upon a not so very long ago) one of those who did not think very much of the whole PCC concept. Then I started seeing what a real-world difference an inquisitive, industrious and integrity-minded individual can make happen (and help stop from happening) in that all too overlooked role. So, the low turnout on Polling Day – just 25.6% overall was disappointing. Cambridge City had the largest turnout of our council areas (37.65%); Fenland had the lowest (17.44%); while we in South Cambridgeshire were on (25.37%). Up and down the land, the 24-hour Party Political People will have spent the following days poring over the local council and PCC results with an eye to the coming UK parliamentary general election.

In the meantime, I just want to say that for all the attention and focus we as a society put on our national pantomime at Wastemonster, it's local decision-makers who have the real power to blight or benefit us. Don't believe me? Take a wee shufti at your council tax bill, a document getting so heavy it no longer requires a paperweight in a near or moderate breeze.

Isn't it time to have a proper conversation about whether one English county requires quite so many separate councils? All those half-empty office buildings, top brass salaries and pensions come at a price and are a drag on efficiency like a breeze block tied to a carrier pigeon. Our underfunded and underperforming local corporate media outlets are overwhelmed, simply unable to comprehensively report the incomprehensible cacophony.

Shouldn't the power to determine Cambridge's path ahead be where the people can see it and hold it to account, not hiding away at a £1,000 a head conference in Leeds? Without a shift towards a slimmed down unitary authority model – Cambridgeshire North Great Ouse and Cambridgeshire South Great Ouse District Councils perhaps – our democracy and ourselves will continue to get poorer even as gentrification on an industrial scale tears at our social fabric and withers our body politic.

County Councillor Neil Gough's Report

Dear Residents,

I hope that you are enjoying the longer evenings and the warmer weather. Here is my update of County Council matters.

Domestic Abuse Survivors with Learning Disabilities

A campaign has been launched to find carers for people with learning disabilities who have experienced domestic abuse. It's a joint scheme between Cambridgeshire Shared Lives and the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence Partnership. It aims to recruit self-employed carers with the scheme paying their fees. Carers can offer support just for a few hours in the daytime, for an overnight stay or for an extended break. More details online here: <u>tinyurl.com/7hrursfy</u>.

Vape Recycling

Vape recycling has been introduced at all of the Council's Household Recycling Centres. The new bins offer a safe, environmentally friendly way for residents to dispose of single use and reusable vapes. Anything containing batteries, including vapes, should never be placed in waste or recycling bins at home. Disposable vapes contain lithium-ion batteries which can catch fire if damaged. Three million vapes are currently thrown away each week across the UK; electrical items, including vapes, disposed of in the wrong bin, cause more than 600 fires every year in refuse collection vehicles and at waste sites.

Peat Roads £5m Programme Underway

The Council's planned investment in maintenance includes £5 million specifically to deal with the worst of our peatbased roads which are deteriorating much more quickly than they used to.

Work has already started to recycle and stabilise sections of the A1101 between Littleport and Welney. In the coming twelve months another nine locations will also be treated, including stretches of the B1050 from Earith to Willingham and Hill Row Causeway in Haddenham.

In the longer term, however, the County Council will need around £300 million to fully solve these problem roads.

Annual Meeting of the Parish Council

At the Annual Meeting, all council posts are elected. The Chair and Vice Chair were re-elected, and all lead councillors remain in post. All councillors and their rôles are listed on the Council website. A new Council Buildings Committee was established, to look at the various challenges facing the Public Hall, Ploughman Hall and Pavilion – maintenance, storage, and possible future expansion.

Parish Clock

We have been notified by residents that the chimes and the time shown on the clock are not currently synchronised. A service has been organised, which should rectify this and restore harmony.

Duke of Wellington

A group of concerned villagers have gathered sufficient signatures to apply for an Asset of Community Value (ACV) listing for the Duke of Wellington, and the Council agreed to submit this for them as it might give more weight to the application. There is no guarantee that the application will be successful. If it is, an ACV only grants a six-month delay in any sale to allow the community to make a bid, but the Council is completely supportive of any endeavour which could restore this well-loved local.

Flooding

The Council Chair and two local expert volunteers had a meeting with Anglian Water (AW) to address the ongoing flooding and associated problems which beset the village whenever there is heavy rainfall. It was a friendly meeting, AW explaining that the main problem is the currently very high water table. Legally, they are only consultees for planning applications (much like the Parish Council), and they cannot refuse to connect a new development's surface water drainage to the existing system. Additionally, when assessing flow rates for surface water, they must use 'dry weather flow.'

There are many actions to be taken, not least investigations of the Village Green, Bourneys Manor Close and Covent Garden. We will keep you updated.

Cemetery Biodiversity

Following a request from the Wildlife Trust for Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Northamptonshire, it was agreed to leave a small section of the cemetery (against the wall by the Social Club) occasionally unmown to improve habitats for wildlife, wildflowers, insects, small mammals, amphibians and birds. This 'Wild Garden' will now be part of their 'Cambridgeshire Churchyard Conservation Award Scheme.'

D-Day 80

This year will be the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings on Normandy. As part of the commemoration, the Council will be laying a special wreath on the War Memorial to coincide with the national event on **5 June**.

Casual Vacancy

There is a vacant council seat. Anyone interested in becoming a Parish Councillor should contact the Clerk in the first instance for further information and/or an application form.

Access to Barton Field

In the pages of *Willingham News* the Parish Council has repeatedly made it clear that visitors to Barton Field must not drive vehicles down Black Pit Drove. It is a bridleway. As this request has been repeatedly ignored, a sign was erected at the junction with Rampton Road but within a few hours it had been stolen. If you have any information about the theft, please contact the Parish Council so that the thief can be brought to justice.
