Old Willingham



In 1890 a new rector, John Watkins arrived and, unlike previous rectors, he intended to live in Willingham rather than just visit from time to time. He must have been fairly wealthy as he used his own money to restore the church and, in 1891, set about building a big new rectory that is, today, Willingham House. This month's picture is reputed to be the old rectory prior to demolition. It looks quite grand but this is most likely an extension to an older building. The original rectory was built prior to 1662 when it is reported to have '8 hearths'. It is likely that, behind this façade, the building was pretty dilapidated, hence Watson's decision to rebuild.

Sunday 12 May

With a sunny day and gentle breeze, 214 walkers enjoyed the challenge of visiting the five pubs on the 12.5 mile walk, along the River Great Ouse, adjoining meadows, Fen Drayton Nature Reserve and Over Orchard, then back to the Community Centre at Over.

With 37 cakes baked by volunteers, and 22 raffle prizes donated by local businesses and friends of the Over Day Centre, walkers enjoyed a party atmosphere when they collected their well-earned finisher certificates, for this the 12th year of the 5-Pubs Challenge Walk. Thanks must go to the pubs: Pike & Eel, Needingworth; Ferryboat, Holywell; Three Tuns, Fen Drayton; White Horse, Swavesey; and Community Centre, Over. Thanks, too, to our generous sponsors Nick Uttridge (Builders) and Ashcroft Vets, whose contributions met event expenses so that all donations from walkers will go to the Over Day Centre — this year to enhance the garden areas around the Centre so that clients can enjoy gardening activities, including raised beds and a greenhouse. In all, a sum of very nearly £3,700 was raised.

Particularly pleasing was the good number of walkers who joined the walk for the first time from several local villages, as well as those who travelled some distance to join their families and friends in Over. We now look forward to the 13th 5-Pubs Challenge in May 2025.

Increasing populations and the diversity of birds (including the elusive bittern), mammals, fish, amphibians and plants are evidence of this success. The future of the Ouse Fen Nature Reserve looks exciting, with expansion plans as more gravel is extracted.

We all agreed how lucky we are to have such a special place so close to home.

Update from Fen Drayton Lakes

Our year on the reserve is split into two halves: the autumn-winter habitat management season and the spring-summer breeding season.

During the colder months of the year there is plenty for us to do. With our volunteer groups, we are kept busy as we go around the reserve carrying out work to maintain or enhance areas for our key breeding species. Nesting islands and rafts on the lakes are cleared of vegetation, willow is removed from reedbeds, scrub is coppiced, and many other tasks are carried out to provide the ideal habitats for our target breeding species.

The spring and summer are when we get to see the results of all this hard work, as millions of birds pour into the UK to take advantage of the warmer weather for breeding. There is always some apprehension early in the season as we wait to see which species arrive on site to set up territories and nest. Many of our breeding birds are long distance migrants, spending the winter throughout Sub-Saharan and Southern Africa.

Sub-Sanaran and Southern Africa

Some, like the Common Whitethroat, may have been in Nigeria for the winter. Averaging just 14g, this small bird will fly thousands of miles over its lifetime, often coming back to the same patch of scrub year after year to nest.



As the summer progresses,

why not come down to the reserve to look for these, and many other charismatic birds around the trails.

Here's a picture of sunflowers for you to fill-in! And some facts that you might not know about these useful plants. They turn their flowers from east to west to follow the sun. Sunflowers can grow to over four metres! The bloom of a sunflower has two parts — the centre is a disk of small brown, purple or yellow flowers packed together. The flowers around the outside are called ray flowers. Sunflower plants have many uses — the flowers make a yellow dye; the leaves are used to feed animals; the seeds that come from the disk flowers contain a sweet, yellow oil. Sunflower

oil is used in cooking and in making soaps and p a i n t s . M a n y people eat dried or r o a s t e d s unflower seeds as a snack.

Travel Information

As the summer holidays are fast approaching, many of us are turning our attention to booking holidays and making our travel plans. If you are planning to travel abroad please consider whether you will require any vaccinations. By booking a Travel Clinic appointment (at least six weeks before your date of travel) with one of our practice nurses, they can offer a general travel consultation with advice. They are also able to administer the following vaccinations (free of charge): Hepatitis A, Typhoid, Tetanus/Diphtheria/Polio, and the MMR. For any other vaccinations we would recommend you attend MASTA, a private travel clinic, located on Hills Road in Cambridge. Please visit our website for further information and to complete a Travel Questionnaire, which must be completed BEFORE your appointment.

For those who are on repeat medication, please plan ahead and make sure you have enough medication to last for your time away, remembering to re-order with plenty of time before you travel, and allowing at least three working days before collection. And, just in case of emergency, we would advise that you take a list of your repeat medication with you (your repeat prescription slip would be ideal).

Finally, just a reminder that the GP is unable to sign (as proof of identification) any passport applications and they will not write 'Fit to Travel/Fly' letter for our patients.

Pharmacy First Scheme

Patients can now get treatment for seven common conditions (see below) directly from their local pharmacy, without the need for a GP appointment or prescription:

- Sinusitis
- Sore throat
- Earache
- Infected insect bite
- Impetigo (a bacterial skin infection)
- Shingles
- Uncomplicated urinary tract infections in women

Pharmacy First will enable community pharmacists to supply prescription-only medicines, including antibiotics and antivirals where clinically appropriate. You can get treatment for these conditions by walking into the pharmacy or contacting them virtually. The pharmacist will be able to speak to you privately in a separate consultation room and they may perform an

examination or ask to access your medical records. The pharmacist will be able to recommend the best course of action on an individual patient basis, including issuing prescriptions for antibiotics or antivirals where necessary. By reducing the number of patients visiting a GP with common conditions, needing blood pressure checks or oral contraception, Pharmacy First aims to free up ten million GP appointments a year by next winter. This will give GPs time and space to see patients with more complex conditions, and we thank you for your support by using this new initiative.

Stop! Do You Really Need It?

There has been a significant increase of uncollected information that has been requested by our patients. This includes private referral letters, To Whom It May Concern letters, Patient Summaries, GP reports and medical records. This type of work can be very time consuming and, as our GPs have to prioritise their clinical work, these requests put a great deal of additional pressure on them. We would ask that you take the time to consider whether your request for information is absolutely necessary and that you do need it.

If you are a carer for someone and need advice and financial or emotional support, please come along to our carers' support meeting on **Wednesday 3 July** at the Willingham Surgery, where we will be holding a drop-in session between 2 and 4 pm. Please come along and get some support from other people in the local community. Refreshments are provided, there's no need to prebook and it's completely **FREE**! Nature's Names

Thrift, sometimes called sea pink, sea thrift or lady's pincushion, is an intriguing native plant. We probably won't see much of it around the village apart from in our gardens, as it's predominantly a coastal plant. (Phlox, a different plant family, is sometimes called thrift, just to confuse!)

The name *thrift* originates from *thrifask* in Old Norse (8th to 14th century) and then Middle English *thryfte* (11th to 15th century). Originally, *thrift* meant *thriving*. Today's meaning — 'to be frugal' — evolved around the 16th century. It's not known exactly why the plant gained its name from the 'frugal' meaning, but it's been suggested that the tight formation of the leaves may have been the inspiration. Or, just as believable, the fact that the plants can grow in harsh places (such as clinging to rock faces) with very little water. Thrift is a *halophyte*, a small group of plants which can cope with salty conditions; sub-species of it grow in salt marshes and even on heavily polluted ground. As long as it's not rich soil, nor damaged beneath regular footfall, the plant will thrive! Being salt-tolerant, they will also have fewer competitors.

In Robert MacFarlane's inspirational spell-poem book *The Lost Spells*, he says: 'In saltmarsh, dune, morraine... Thrift digs in, growing quietly on through drought and rain... Thrift's gift is... a glimpse of hope in the tightest of spots, the toughest of places.'

I also construct the What's On page. There is a detailed editorial guide which lays out the editing routine and house style. The new volunteer would be supported by me and the editors. Willingham News — the Process from Start to Finish

The editorial team is sometimes asked about the process of producing the *Willingham News* magazine. It makes sense to 'start at the very beginning'... but let's not, because one of the most important tasks in the process is right at the end — getting the magazines to each household. And for that we have to thank the deliverers. Without them, we're lost. The editorial and management team have always appreciated their crucial role.

Now we can go back to (almost) the beginning. The allimportant adverts! The Advertising Coordinator, amongst other tasks, manages the contact with advertisers, the typesetter and the management team. We're always on the lookout for new advertisers, but our thanks go to the loyal local businesses — without them, it wouldn't be financially viable to produce the magazine.

There is a rota of five volunteer editors (one is a husband and wife team) who, three times a year, take on the role of reviewing all the copy that is sent to the Willingham News email address each month. While they aren't journalists, it's their job to make sure that there are enough items from our valued contributors to fill the month's edition, and that regular 'must-have' items such as the Medical Practice are included. The month's editor will check that items are suitable regarding content and length, that strict editorial guidelines are followed, and will then allocate each item to a page. Some months can be quite 'lean' (January is one), so the editor might look for additional material for the edition. The month's editor is responsible for sourcing a cover photograph relating to the village and environs. We have often used photos submitted by a village resident, maybe to accompany an article, or by WAG when special village events are due.

Following a strict schedule, the editor will send the draft

magazine copy to the typesetter, who will combine it with the advertisements for the month, rearrange accordingly, and return a proof. Our meticulous proofreader will then scan every detail of the proof, discuss corrections and changes with the editor, who will return it to the typesetter for a second proof to be produced and returned. This is quickly rechecked before the typesetter sends the copy to the printers. The timing between the submission deadline (the 8th of each month) and the final proof going to the printer, is typically around 12 to 14 days.

The printed copies are sent to the Distribution Coordinator, who is in charge of sorting the magazines into batches, getting them to the deliverers, and all the administration required to ensure that all goes well each month in that regard.

All except the typesetter and the printers are volunteers in the village. The management team, including editors, meet formally twice a year to discuss progress, problems, finances, and potential changes. *Willingham News* is registered at Companies House and is obliged to register accounts, so one of the management team has the responsibility of keeping track of the finances. There is also a representative of our Parish Council at the meetings — the Parish Council have always been extremely supportive of the magazine.

And that's it! About 50 volunteers are involved in producing and delivering *Willingham News*, and the process can be quite intensive at times, but it is definitely worth it when we see the result and hear the positive comments. This is where we must thank you, the reader, for your feedback, for sending in items (please continue to do so), and for making it all worthwhile.

The Editors

Community Orchard and Plantation

The orchard and plantation have been sitting in water throughout the winter and spring but, surprisingly, all the fruit trees have survived, although two apple trees had fallen and have now been lifted and reinforced with stakes. A few native trees such as whitebeam and holly have died and have been replaced, mostly with ash and hornbeam. Many bulbs, fritillaries and cowslips have flowered in the wild and woodland flower areas, including some that were planted last autumn and winter. Recently we have cut back the grass in some areas and planted a range of wild flowers to provide food for bees and butterflies. We are planning to lay one of the hedges this autumn, guided by an expert. We will be arranging practical hedge laying classes for those who are interested, so do get in touch if it's something you are interested in.

The orchard is managed by a team of volunteers, and we would particularly like to thank Graham Mumby who was responsible for establishing the orchard and has since been leading the volunteers. Graham's contribution to the village has been huge over the years. Once a leading light in the Willingham Amateur Dramatics Society (WAMADS), and heavily involved in the 2008 Village Survey (which led directly to the establishment of the Willingham Action Group), he eventually turned his talents to upgrading the village environment. He has recently retired from his 'WAG Enviro' management duties but still keeps in close contact with

orchard activities, and continues to assist the team with his extensive expertise.

We welcome new members to assist with the management of the orchard and woodland, and with activities such as pruning, weeding, planting, grass cutting, etc. In addition we welcome visitors to our orchard, which is on the Earith Road; the entrance is on the edge of the village by the speed restriction sign. There are picnic areas with tables and benches, and there is a small car parking area. Dog bags and a bin are provided. Guided visits for small groups can be arranged and you can sponsor a tree with your own message attached to your adopted tree. Flooding

Five representatives from Anglian Water attended the annual parish meeting and made a presentation. It was mainly a PR exercise, leaving many questions unanswered. A response is still awaited on questions tabled. The council will keep pressing for replies to these as well as questions raised at a previous meeting between the council and Anglian Water. There is now a dedicated page on our website for flooding matters (accessible via the top-level menu *Flooding*).

The volume of surface water being discharged through the sewers is a contributory factor, but it has also been a bad winter and spring for rainfall, with ground water levels more than a metre higher than they were at the start of the millennium. The bottom half of the Recreation Ground has been unusable for much of the football season. The council is actively seeking more land which is less liable to flooding, for recreational use and for a new cemetery. They will consider renting or outright purchase. Please let us know if you can help.

Grass Cutting

There have been a lot of complaints about the state of the grass in various public spaces, particularly the cemetery. Weather has been a major factor but also the loss at short notice of our major contractor. Action is in hand to arrange extra cuts and some ground improvements.

Regarding ground improvements, the Wolves Football Club plans to apply for a grant from the Football Foundation to cover pitch maintenance at a cost of £100,000. Twothirds of this will be provided by the Football Foundation and the remaining third jointly by the Parish Council and the Wolves. This will result in a significant saving for us, and we are very grateful for the work put in by the Wolves in making this application.

Open Spaces

The new pond at the Meadow Road site has been installed and is well worth a visit. The surface of Meadow Road has been improved making access easier (about half a mile from Rockmill End), and there is parking for several cars. Dogs are welcome but please clean up after them.

EV Charging Points

The council is exploring the possibility of installing some electric vehicle charging points outside Ploughman Hall. Under the proposed scheme, offered by Cambridgeshire County Council, the parish provides the location but the other costs are met from the Government's local EV infrastructure fund.

Police

A paper has been presented to us recommending the expansion of the police liaison role. Good communication is vital in securing general police support. The matter is due for further debate at the July meeting.

Public Hall

The council has been notified of major problems with dampness in the walls and floors of the Public Hall. Investigations are ongoing but initial estimates indicate that remedial costs will be significant.

D Day

A short service was held at the war memorial to mark the 80th anniversary of the D Day landings. A wreath was laid by the council chairman on behalf of the village. Canon Jan Payne, licensed lay minister of St Mary and All Saints Church, led the service.
