A new overall 10k race winner, Sam Stratford, was crowned, for finishing the course in a remarkable 33:47. The 4-mile race had a new winner, with Ollie Anderson achieving a time of 25:52.

The Fen Gallop team has always been proud to present prizes to our own Willingham runners and the trophies themselves have been named and dedicated to past Willingham residents that have made a significant impact on the village.

The Eileen Askew Trophy winners this year were Leo Brittain and Olivia Smith for the fastest 4-mile U16s male and female Willingham residents. Both runners retained their titles for a second year, and were awarded their trophies by Primary School Headteacher, Mona Paalanen.

The Penry Jones Cup was awarded to Mark Sampson as the Willingham fastest male resident for completing the 10k course with chip time of а 34:06, knocking milliseconds off his 2023 time.

The Rene Gould Cup was awarded to Lucy Willis as the fastest female resident, with a chip time of 52:05.

The Glyn Smith trophy was awarded to Jeremy Rodgers for our fastest veteran (over 50) in the 10k, with a chip time of 48:44.

### **Eid-al-Adha Celebrations**

### What is Eid-al-Adha?

Marking the culmination of the annual Hajj pilgrimage and commemorating the willingness of Prophet Ibrahim (Abraham) to sacrifice his son as an act of obedience to God, Eid-al-Adha is a time of reflection, charity and unity. This year Eid-al-Adha fell on 16 June.

The local Muslim community, Willingham Muslims, gathered on 30 June to celebrate Eid-al-Adha as one of the most significant festivals in the Islamic calendar.

Willingham Muslims organised the celebrations and a feast in the Ploughman Hall and, in the spirit of inclusivity and harmony, Muslim neighbours from diverse backgrounds were invited to the celebrations, fostering a sense of togetherness and mutual respect. Attendees not only included people living in Willingham but also the surrounding areas.

As part of building interfaith relationships, we had great pleasure in welcoming Minister Kwaku Efah from the Baptist Church. We were also delighted to have local Councillor Dan Lentell come and give a talk, *Golden Words in a Dark Age*, on how coins from the Muslim world found their way to England in the early Middle Ages. Local residents Aisha and Sarwat gave a talk on the Cambridge Ladies' initiative that provides support and friendship by connecting women in Cambridge and the wider Cambridgeshire area through a variety of events.

Children were particularly excited, donning their finest clothes and engaging in various fun activities from games and crafts to storytelling sessions about the significance of Eid-al-Adha. There was even time for fun games for adults before everybody was invited to partake in a delectable array of dishes.

The event concluded with heartfelt thanks to everyone who contributed to making the day special. Willingham Muslims look forward to continuing this tradition, strengthening bonds within the village and beyond and showcasing the rich cultural tapestry that makes our community so special.

### Willingham Brownies Sleeping with the Tigers

Well not quite ... but our Brownies did sleep (sort of) next to the tiger enclosure at Shepreth Wildlife Park on their recent sleepover. We had a fun-packed 22 hours at the wildlife park in May. We had two private tours of the park, one in the evening after all the visitors had left and some of the nocturnal animals had come out and one in the morning before the visitors arrived when we learnt lots of fascinating facts about the animals and how the park tries to enrich the lives of the animals there. Did you know that the maned wolf is not really a wolf but is more closely related to the fox, or that the yellow-breasted capuchins douse themselves in their own urine like we would wear perfume? We even saw a baby wallaby poking out of its mother's pouch to feed.

We also learnt about animals' feeding habits and where the animals in the park were on the International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red List status of endangered species.

The highlight of the sleepover was making enrichment feeders out of egg boxes, straw and shredded paper and filling them with mealworms and then giving them to the meerkats. It was fun watching the meerkats find the feeders and then working out how to get in to get to the mealworms. The meerkats will not be replaced after the current batch as the park only takes animals that are endangered and meerkat conservation is a success story as they are no longer endangered.

### Willingham Women's Institute



We are having a Summer break in August.

On 10 June, there was a car sharing visit to Margent Eco Farm.

Gemma Fletcher invited us to visit her home, after coming to talk to us about it in November 2023.

Her father Steve Barron, a film producer in London, decided in 2015 that he wanted a better environment for his grandchildren to grow up in. He bought a farm with some old cattle barns on it, near Pidley and decided to convert them into living accommodation, with help from architect Poloma Gormley, using home-grown hemp.

Gemma and her young daughters showed us around Margent Farm. Their home was very impressive. The iron girders and brickwork of the original cattle barn have been extended with a huge timber framework, triple-glazed units and most importantly hemp building products. The outside walls are clad with Hempcrete. The two main rooms have vaulted ceilings and textured hemp walls. The super-efficient wall and ceiling insulation throughout the house was made from hemp as well.

The farm is a show home; a research and teaching facility for architects from around the world. Students built a 'Yoga House' in the grounds, in five days using hemp materials and similar construction techniques.

We saw the hemp growing in the fields, small seedlings at the moment but ready for harvesting in 90 days – an interesting, green alternative to traditional building products.

### **Old Willingham**



This photo was taken on the High Street towards the crossroads in about 1913. It shows the 'Hospital Sunday' parade. There was no NHS then so each year money would be raised and given to Addenbrooke's Hospital which would be kept in a 'Willingham Fund'. This fund was to allow villagers who could not afford to pay, to get treatment. People were expected to contribute generously. What is interesting is the 'hat hierarchy'. In those days your hat designated your social status. We see one man with a top hat - the highest rank. This is Reverend Charles Hannibal Crossley, the rector from 1906 to 1923. The men by him in bowler hats would be the next in line and these are possibly the churchwardens. Middle-class men wore the trilby and working-class men wore a flat cap. Similar rules applied for women, although less structured. Woe betide anyone who wore an inappropriate hat as they would be shunned by both their own class and those of the class they aspired to. How things have changed!

### **Olympic Cheats**

(The last known use of strychnine by athletes was, unbelievably, in the 2016 Summer Olympics.)

Going back awhile, to the year 67 CE, the Roman Emperor Nero bribed his way into becoming an entrant in the four-horse chariot race. To help him in his quest to win, he decided to use ten horses – Four? Ten? Whatever! If you're Emperor, who's going to argue with you? He won, despite falling off his chariot and not finishing. We can imagine that his armed guard, lurking behind the judges, might have had some influence regarding that decision!

### Nature's Names

Ah, the wasp. Everyone's friend. Even the word sounds, well, aggressive. The word *wasp* originally meant *weaver*, originating from the Indo-European language *wobhes*, the source of the English *weave* or *web*. We can safely assume that it refers to the papery nest which some species of wasp build. The word travelled down the language family tree to West Germanic, where it became *waps*. The process of metathesis (a reversal of sounds in language) produced *wespe* and the English *wasp*. The Latin *vespa* originated down a different language branch from Indo-European, via Italic, and the common wasp is called *vespula vulgaris*.

When we're relaxing in a pub garden in late summer and a wasp fancies your pint of cider just as much as you do, think kindly of it. Easy to say if you're not the one trying to protect your precious drink! But wasps are ecologically valuable, extremely beneficial to the environment and to gardeners and farmers, acting as highly effective pest controllers and important pollinators. Interestingly, male wasps don't sting, but who's going to try and check their gender before swiping one away from their drink?

If you're slightly nervous of these little critters, the advice is not to read H G Wells' *The Food of the Gods*; it has wasps



which have been fed growth hormones, ending up ten times their usual size; similarly, don't watch the 2015 sci-fi film *Stung*, where the mutated wasps are much *much* bigger! Be reassured that such fictional wasps will not be bothering us around Willingham!

### The Salt of the Earth

If someone tells you you're 'the salt of the earth' you probably take that as a compliment – but what does it mean? Well, it comes from the Bible (Matthew 5:13) where Jesus says, 'You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste how shall its saltiness be restored?' This seems even less clear so let's dig deeper.

In the time of Jesus, salt was connected in people's minds with special qualities. Salt was related to purity. No doubt its glistening whiteness made the connection easy. The Romans said that salt was the purest of all things – the sun and the sea. Salt was indeed the most primitive of all offerings to gods and to the end of the day the Jewish sacrifices were offered with salt. So, people who are the salt of the earth, must be examples of purity.

In the ancient world, salt was the most common of all preservatives. It was used to keep things from going bad and rotting. So if people are going to be 'salt of the earth' they must have a certain antiseptic influence on life; they must be the ones who by their presence defeat corruption and make it easier for others to be good.

But the greatest and the most obvious quality of salt is that salt lends flavour to things. Food without salt is sadly insipid and someone who is the salt of the earth must bring flavour to their own life and that of others.

Jesus is connecting these things to life and how, in following him, you can be purer, better and deeper in your life. The tragedy is that people have often connected Christianity with precisely the opposite. They have connected with that which takes the flavour out of life. We need to rediscover the radiance of the Christian faith. Christians must be diffusers of joy.

So if you are described as the 'salt of the earth' you may take it as a great compliment – but you'll have to live up to it!

### Whooping Cough (Pertussis)

Cases of whooping cough are continuing to rise. If you are pregnant, it's important to get the whooping cough vaccine to protect your new-born baby, as they are at greatest risk. Young babies with whooping cough are often very unwell and many are likely to need hospital treatment as it can lead to pneumonia and permanent brain damage.

The immunity you get from the vaccine passes to your baby through the placenta and protects them until they are old enough to be vaccinated at eight weeks old.

You can access a whooping cough vaccine from your GP and through some antenatal clinics. If you are more than 16 weeks pregnant and have not been offered the vaccine, talk to your midwife or GP and make an appointment to get vaccinated.

### Willingham Bus Service

Your Parish Councillors continue to press for an improved bus service for Willingham and attended a meeting organised by the Cambridge and Peterborough Combined Authority on new bus routes to be paid for by the Mayor's extra precept. They propose combining the 1A and 5A to make a return route from Bar Hill to St Ives via Longstanton, Willingham, Over, Swavesey and Fenstanton, which would be an improvement on the current one-way circular route. We pressed for increased frequency as well as evening and Sunday services. We also asked that the 8 route from Cambridge to Cottenham be extended to Willingham to provide a link to Cottenham. This would also provide a direct bus route from Willingham to Cambridge and we emphasised again the need for this. Having to take two buses is not conducive to getting people out of their cars.

### **Tiger Bus Scheme**

Cambridgeshire County Council now has a scheme to enable under 25s to apply for a discount card. This will enable them to travel anywhere within Cambridgeshire for £1. Contact Cambridgeshire County Council for more information.

### **Hedge Cutting**

Recent weather conditions have encouraged a lot of new growth in hedges. Many hedges in the village have grown over the pavement and at times over footpaths This poses a risk to residents when using footpaths as they often have to use the road. Hedges can be cut and trimmed back at this time of year using hand trimmers only as we are still in the bird-nesting season.

### **Cemetery Matters**

Grass cutting – our thanks go to MC Garden Maintenance who have taken over the contract to cut the grass at very short notice. We appreciate the effort which has been made to get the grass back to a manageable state.

Topple-testing – this is carried out to see if a memorial stone is unsafe. Last year and earlier this year this was carried out on all memorial stones. Those identified as unsafe were marked and the Council contacted the 'Burial Right Owners' whose details we had. Where the owners responded, remedial work has been carried out. Notices were displayed in the Cemetery identifying a time for work to be completed. Where there was no response the memorial stones have now been laid flat on the grave as a health and safety matter.

### **Community Lifelines**

The Parish Council pays for 14 'Community Lifelines' in Willingham which was run through SCDC. 'Sanctuary' has now taken over running this lifeline for people who are alone and may need emergency help. SCDC is keeping the programme running until 'Sanctuary' has all users up and running on their system.

#### Standing as a Parliamentary Candidate

At 16 30 on 7 June 2024, candidate names for the general election were published. At 16 41, I received a barrage of questions from Over & Willingham Councillor Dan Lentell: Are you Bev White the Party of Women candidate? Will you come to our hustings? Can I have a photo? Where is your social media? Here is an invite to a local engagement. Dan's questions made me realise how woefully ill-prepared I was for this journey I'd embarked on three weeks before, after being told by an individual resembling a Cambridgeshire County Councillor, that we were 'a waste of f'ing space' while leafletting about women's rights.

Hustings were always going to be a challenging and hostile environment for a woman campaigning on rights, safeguarding and free speech, when the other candidates, the main parties and many of their supporters advocate for Self-Identification. I was pleasantly surprised therefore to be approached by several members of the public after each husting who would say, 'I won't vote for your party, but...', 'thank you for standing', 'well done', 'you're brave'. Anthony Browne's supporters were invariably on hand offering friendly conversation, which helped to alleviate the stress, especially as the online aggression and vitriol rose.

During the morning of Thursday 4 July, Dan sent a generic 'best wishes' message to candidates.

That evening, friends and I were approached by several people offering messages of support and encouragement. Causing us to reflect on why these same people, with experience in business, management or politics were unable to raise these issues themselves?

As expected, Party of Women didn't attract many votes, but campaigning did give me the opportunity to speak to many members of the public who were open, supportive and welcoming and I'd like to thank each of you. Thanks to Dan for your unexpected initial messages, Facebook posts, reminders and good wishes throughout the campaign.

In May South Cambridgeshire District Council met for its annual meeting. The only significant piece of business in this largely procedural caucus was a discussion of HM Government's extension of the 'Best Value Notice' served on the Council as a result of the Four-Day Week trial. I know from my own lived experience how massively beneficial 4in7 working can be, especially for those of us with young families or other caring responsibilities. There are, in my opinion, plenty of better-

informed, more appropriate routes towards a better work/ life balance available. My hope is that His Majesty's new Government will want to take one of those routes while also rigorously ensuring that local councils deliver local services, within a properly scrutinised process, delivering on their legal duty to provide best value for the money they spend.

### County Councillor Neil Gough's Report

#### Dear Residents,

Despite the election, the CCC continues with matters that are in the ordinary course of business. I have summarised a few items that may be of interest.

#### **Tiger Bus Scheme**

Anyone under the age of 25 can now apply for a Discount Card which entitles them to travel anywhere within Cambridgeshire for £1.

The Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) is developing the business case for 'bus franchising' meaning control for the bus service rests with CPCA rather than with the bus operators.

#### Good Life Fund, CPSL Mind

The Good Life Fund, partially funded by CCC, grants up to £1,500 to community members establishing groups that connect people – like book clubs or craft classes. To qualify, activities must promote wellbeing, involve at least four participants and rely on volunteer efforts. Further details can be obtained by emailing goodlifefund@cpslmind.org.uk.

### **Children's Services**

Ofsted recently inspected Cambridgeshire's Children's Services. They say that CCC has created strong foundations to drive improvement in Children's Services, but the service overall requires improvement. The commitment to better outcomes for children is evident. However, there is still a considerable amount of work to be done.

### New Recycling Provisions at Cambridgeshire Household Recycling Centres

Vape recycling has just been introduced at all nine of Cambridgeshire's Household Recycling Centres – including at Milton (<u>tinyurl.com/2wfjvv4k</u>). Disposable vapes contain lithium-ion batteries which can catch fire if damaged. Three million vapes are currently thrown away each week across the UK.

CCC has also introduced coffee pod recycling at all Household Recycling Centres with new coffee pod bins to separately dispose of both aluminium and plastic coffee pods. Over 1 billion coffee pods are sold each year in the UK alone. Collected pods are shredded and cleaned of coffee. The shredded pods can be made into new products, while the coffee grounds are used to help create renewable energy and soil improver.
