### **Old Willingham**



Many of you will have noticed that the exterior of this house, near the traffic lights on High Street, has recently been renovated by the current owners. It has been done using all traditional materials such as lime mortar, since it is a listed building. We would all agree that it is a real asset to the village. In this picture we see it being re-thatched in 1983 – a process which will have been done many times in its lifetime. It was originally three cottages in a row, and probably built in the 1600s. Reputedly, Oliver Cromwell evicted the original tenants and gave the houses on that side to his friends. Then, when monarchy was restored, these people were thrown out and the houses given to Cambridge colleges. It is not known when the three cottages were combined but they look set now for another 100 years!

### Willingham Welcomes – a Summary

Conscious of the influx of new residents to the village in recent years, Willingham Action Group (WAG) invited every club, group and association in the *Willingham News* directory, plus organisations such as Over Day Centre and Fen Edge Community Association (FECA), to attend this inaugural 'recruitment and awareness fair' on 14 July.

On the amenities side, Carlo Verrecchia's ice cream was in high demand, while Sharda's Boys complemented Beaufort Box mobile bar and WAG's BBQ. There was music from Willingham Jam Club and Stone Cold Stumble, and a youngsters' dance display from Studio Fogg.

The feedback after the event was an overwhelmingly positive response.

**Room for Improvement:** Several groups noted that visitor numbers dwindled after 4 pm, suggesting that future events could be shorter or better structured. Additionally, clearer communication regarding equipment requirements and better signage, plus a handout showing where the exhibitors were located, could enhance the experience for both participants and visitors.

**Looking Forward:** Overall, the event was a testament to the strength of our community and the potential for growth when we come together. We look forward to addressing the lessons learned and making the next Welcoming event – probably in two years' time – even better.

### Fen Edge Archaeology Group (FEAG)

FEAG is a local group of amateur archaeologists in the villages of Cottenham, Rampton and Willingham. We meet regularly for interesting talks, usually by professional archaeologists, about digs where they have taken part, or of which they have excellent knowledge.

We also get invites to view live digs, and are guided by the professional on site, giving us in-depth insight into the discoveries they have made. We have also taken part in professional digs at development sites such as Northstowe, and carried out our own investigation of a Romano-British site just outside Cottenham.

These are details of our next talk: *Historic Building Mythbusting*.

Stories about old buildings tell of secret passages, ships' timbers used in the construction of buildings inland, spiral staircases that advantage right-handed defenders, doorways blocked in churches to keep the devil out... and much more! In the words of archaeologist James Wright, 'Go to any mediaeval building in the land and there will be interesting, exciting and romantic stories presented to the visitor. They are commonly believed and widely repeated – but are they really true?'

James will tell us about truths behind the myths. Sometimes the realities behind the stories are even more remarkable than the myths themselves; these are the subject of his latest book *Historic Building Mythbusting*.

This special talk will be presented by the Fen Edge Archaeology Group and Cottenham Village Society at All Saints Church, Cottenham, on **Saturday 7 September**, **2 30 pm.**

### Nature's Names

The name earthworm comes from the Proto-Germanic words *ertho* and *wurmiz* and, going back to the Indo-European language (around 5,000 years ago) from *er* meaning 'ground', and *wrmi*, from the root *wer*, meaning 'to bend'.

Worms are tremendously beneficial engineers in soil eco-systems, helping to create drainage and aeration.

They breathe through their skin, and are covered in tiny bristles called *setae*, which help them move around. They can't hear or see, but sense vibrations and changes in light. Earthworms have both male and female reproductive organs but they still need to seek out a mate to reproduce. It's not strictly true that cutting a worm in half will result in two — it can regenerate to a certain extent but most likely it will die. Worms don't have hearts as such; instead they have up to five sets of thicker blood vessels near the head, which act as pseudo-hearts.

If you're short of a riveting holiday read, look no further than Charles Darwin's 1881 catchily titled bestselling book *The Formation of Vegetable Mould Through the Action of Earthworms with Observation on Their Habits*. (It sold more than *On the Origin of Species*.) In it, Darwin gives us a slightly disturbing insight into his weird wormy experiments — 'Worms do not possess any sense of hearing. They took not the least notice of the shrill notes from a metal whistle, which was repeatedly sounded near them; nor did they of the deepest and loudest tones of a bassoon. They were indifferent to shouts, if care was taken that the breath did not strike them. When placed on a table close to the keys of a piano, which was played as loudly as possible, they remained perfectly quiet.'

Hmmm. Those images raise so many questions! But if you see someone in the village, in their garden, playing a bassoon or shouting at their lawn, don't worry — they're probably trying to charm a worm.

### **Thought for the Month**

#### The Sower Went Out to Sow his Seed

September is a time of beginning and of ending: the end of summer, the start of a new year for school and college, when joy and enthusiasm, anxiety and trepidation unforgettably combine.

In the farming year it is a time of change too, and the same feelings arise. It's the end of the grain harvest and sowing of new crops has already started. In the fields around us, farmers are busy, mindful more than ever that the weather may turn against them as it did last year.

The story of the sower is one of Jesus' best-known parables. However, the story isn't about the sower; it is about the seed, and where it falls. The seed is broadcast, and some falls on rocky ground, some amid weeds, some by the path, some on good soil. (You will find the story in full in Chapter 13 of St Matthew's Gospel.) Jesus' companions ask him to explain — '... the seeds are his teaching, and where they fall are his hearers...'; some don't grasp it, some try but soon give up, some find there is too much going on in their lives to pay much attention. Some take hold of God's word and let it deep into their hearts.

Jesus was speaking not only to people who scattered seeds on the rocky fields of Galilee, but to us as well. Those grains fall on us too! Those who have heard Christ's words can listen more intently. Those who have let it slip can listen again. Those who have never heard can grasp hold and find their lives transformed.

The sower in the story may seem rather haphazard in the way that he scatters his seed, but good seed is precious, chosen to suit a purpose, and no-one sows without hope of a harvest. Jesus' message is for every one.

#### **Recreation Ground Flooding**

As mentioned often on this page, in recent months the lower Recreation Ground keeps flooding after heavy rain, even during the summer months — which has never happened before, although some older residents might know different! Several cricket matches have had to be relocated to Over. Our variety of village sports continues to grow; we are actively seeking additional land near the Recreation Ground that could be bought, leased, or rented to add to our current stock.

However, if our original Recreation Ground is ever going to be usable again, we need to look at causes and whether there is any way of mitigating them. Contributing factors include a generally higher water table and the under-pitch drainage pipes not functioning due to high water levels in the lode and silting up, most of which is outside our control. However, we have enlisted the help of a drainage consultant to look at options.

Meanwhile, although a complicated project, our Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) is nearing its final stages and we are keen to complete this. Our village already has a thriving netball club which would use the MUGA, and if there are any interested tennis players who would like to contribute to its development, we would like to hear from you!

#### Wildlife Meadow, Meadow Road

This summer, an expert from the Lottery funded Cambridgeshire ACRE was able to give his time to add his expertise to help with our Meadow Road site. Visitors will already have seen the four newly dug pond areas at the top end of this Meadow. Although planting-up gives immediate aesthetic impact, in most cases it is best to allow the ponds to be colonised naturally. However, this will take longer, and doesn't look as nice at first, but it allows the species that 'want' to be there the best chance of success, and ultimately produces the most natural habitat. Also, planting to cover the surrounding banks quickly is subject to a big risk: a period of adverse weather (too dry, too wet, too cold, etc, which are increasingly common as a result of climate change) can kill off what we plant or put into the ponds. So, we hope walkers who enjoy that site will understand that a naturally evolved pond, along with the banks, is far more likely to be able to buffer itself through tough periods. Meanwhile, we are planning more improvements to the whole Meadow to include seating, as well as a few changes to encourage further colonisation by animals and birds.

#### Walking and Parking

The Community Orchard management has changed a little this spring, and we thank all who have helped, as well as those who are taking over their roles in order to ensure continuity. Dogs and their walkers continue to enjoy our Orchard, as they can access by car, or on foot along the new Earith Road pathway. The fruit trees, hedgerows, willow growing patch and wild flowers all add to an enjoyable walk.

The Wildlife Meadow welcomes dogs as well, and has parking at its entrance. Barton Field, however, does not have access by car along that droveway, and parking is along Rampton Road only.

#### Cemetery

Work will commence over the next couple of weeks on the repair to the small gate at the back of the cemetery. The gate will be taken away for repair and then returned once work has been completed.

#### Meetings

The next Parish Council meeting will be at **7 30 pm on Wednesday 4 September** in the Octagon. Agendas are published on the website and the noticeboard outside the Public Hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend and can speak briefly or ask questions.

### History of the Bells in Willingham Parish Church

The six bells in Willingham Parish Church are 100 years old this year! Here is their potted history.

**14th Century** — the tower and steeple were added to the church, and it is reasonable to assume that there would have been a bell installed at the same time.

**16th Century** — Edward VI (reigned 1547 — 1553) ordered an inventory to be made of every church in the country. The inventory for our church showed, quote: 'In ye steple there iiij Bells and i sanctus bell'. The Sanctus bell was rung to inform people not present in church that the special part of the service (blessing of the bread and wine) had been reached.

**18th Century** — in 1755, the five existing bells were melted down and five new bells were cast in pits dug in the church grounds. The new bells were cast by the bell founder from St Neots and then hung in an oak frame. This frame gradually became unstable; ringers feared that, when ringing them, they would fall to the ground. Thus, for safety, the bell ropes were pulled by ringers standing in the main body of the church, not in the tower directly under the bells. If you look up at the stone arch, surrounding the glass screen at the base of the tower, you can see grooves made by the bell ropes, having been pulled in this way.

**20th Century** — in 1924, the five existing bells were again melted down, recast, and a sixth bell was added; the bells were hung in a new steel frame. The work was carried out by Taylors Bell Foundry at Loughborough, the cost being £580.2s.6d. The bells are tuned to the key of G. The smallest bell, known as the treble, weighs just over three cwt (152kg), diameter 64cm. The largest bell, known as the tenor, weighs nearly 12 cwt (610kg), diameter 100cm. The inscriptions on the 1755 bells were transferred to the new bells when they were recast in 1924. The fifth bell shows the inscription: 'The first time these bells rang was for Thomas Wallman's wedding. Joseph Eayre St Neots fecit'. The inscription was premature as, sadly, the first time the bells were rung was for the funeral of Thomas Wallman's fiancée. Thomas Wallman later died a bachelor.

#### When are the Bells Rung?

The bells are rung for church services, including weddings and funerals, as well as practice nights and local and national events. When ringing for funerals or Remembrance Sunday, the bells are often half muffled, giving a distinct sound, alternating between the normal level of sound followed by a slightly softer (muffled) sound. The softer sound is achieved by putting a leather cover on one side of the clapper. Willingham bells are also rung by visiting ringers from many other towers wishing to ring this fine set of bells. They will often ring a quarter peal, about 1,250 changes, which takes about 50 minutes.

#### **Change Ringing**

Change ringing developed in England in the 16th and 17th centuries. Before this, bells were rung in no particular order. Changing the order in which the bells are rung follows a strict pattern, so each ringer knows where they are in the sequence. With six bells, there are 720 possible different ways to change the order of the numbers 123456 — e g 214365, 241635, 426153 might be the first three changes. To achieve the level of control required for change ringing, wooden wheels were fitted to the bells with a rope going round the rim of the wheel, which enabled the bell to be rung full circle, through 360 degrees.

#### **Church Clock**

The church clock was installed in 1887 to celebrate Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee. The clock uses only some of the six bells to chime the hours and quarter hours; however, the sound of the clock chimes is not made using the clapper inside the bell, but by a large metal hammer hitting the outside of the bell.

**Fen Drayton Lakes** 

As a nature reserve, Fen Drayton Lakes is managed with specific species in mind. These target species are determined in conversation with our ecologists and are based on the habitats present on site, the UK Red-list of endangered birds, and by the RSPB's list of priority species.

The mosaic of diverse habitats that make up our reserve, including lakes, reed beds, and woodland, means that we have a wide range of animals, plants and fungi on site. Each habitat has different target species that we aim to attract, whilst also drawing in many other species that make their homes in similar environs.

Our year is split between the breeding and non-breeding seasons. During the autumn and winter, when many of our breeding birds are down in Africa and other creatures are hibernating or just overwintering, we carry out large-scale work to maintain and improve our habitats. Much of this work is carried out rotationally around the site and following specific methods known to achieve the required results.

The culmination of this work is when spring comes around and we carry out our breeding bird surveys. The hope is that numbers of each species have remained stable, maybe even increased, and that areas where work was carried out in the preceding months are being used. Surveys often start early in the morning, none more so than for bittern. These specialist reed bed herons are territorial, with the males calling from pre-dawn and gradually quietening down as the morning progresses. Other species we survey include a variety of songbirds in the hedgerows and scrubby areas around the site; waders and waterfowl out on the lakes and wetland margins; gulls and terns on the islands and the man-made rafts.

As we enter autumn, we will be reviewing our breeding figures for the year and planning our work for the next few months to keep Fen Drayton Lakes in the best possible condition for our target species.
