### **Old Willingham**

Until the early 1960s the village had no sewers or drains. Houses either had underground cesspits into which drains emptied or very good rhubarb! As can be imagined, the task of installing main drainage across the whole village and connecting to the new sewerage works between Willingham and Over was a big one and very disruptive. In this photo we see the work in progress on Berrycroft. This area was difficult as there is an underground river that runs north through the village between High Street and Long Lane. If you dig one metre down in this area you find pure yellow sand. The workers had to drill vertical holes with drains along the path of the trench and then pump the water out while they dug and installed the sewer.

### Willingham Women's Institute



Our next meeting will be on **Monday 11 November** at 7 30 pm in the Social Club. Helen Green will be coming to talk to us about *The Story of Salt*, which promises to be an interesting journey back in time, following the history of the now commonplace condiment.

In August, Jeanette Moser gave her talk entitled *Everyone Has a Story to Tell*. She introduced herself by telling us that she was 87 years old and had been expelled from school when she was five years old for punching boaters left on cloakroom pegs. Her humour and sincerity kept us interested in her life experiences, with references to her book *Letting Go* and prompts from her husband Alan – an amusing double act.

Jeanette began by telling us about her mother, escaping the horrors of the holocaust in Germany, making her way through Palestine and then to Johannesburg, where Jeanette was born. As a Jewish girl with dyslexia, her time spent boarding at a convent was difficult, but her strong character got her through and enabled her to deal with the many challenging trials in her life. She joined the Rhodesian Police Force, Special Branch and was involved in a successful undercover drugs operation. Self-defence skills were part of her training and she adapted those to specialise in self-defence and life-skill classes for women.

Throughout her talk she encouraged us to record our life experiences for future generations and for our own awareness, if not in a book or journal then as an 'I have list'. Jeanette was certainly an inspiring, eccentric speaker.

### The Night Sky in November

We know of young people in the village who are interested in astronomy, and many of us, at whatever age, look up at the night sky and wonder about the points of light we can see. The following are just snippets of what you can expect to observe with the naked eye, weather permitting, in the Willingham night skies this month.

When observing, many people already know that, usually, stars twinkle and planets don't – our atmosphere 'ripples' the weaker light from stars, but not so much the reflected sunlight from planets.

The First Quarter of our Moon is 9 November, when it will appear half-illuminated; the Full Moon is 15 November. On 11 November there is an apparent 'close approach' of the Moon and Saturn, rising around 5 pm, then at its highest from our location at around 7 30 pm – this 'high' will be not-so-high to the south in the skies above Longstanton. Then, on 20 November, with the Moon waning, we will see another 'close approach', this time with the 'red' planet Mars, rising in the north-east and traversing the sky together until lost in the south-west dawn twilight around 7 am.

November, particularly mid-month, has several named meteor showers – meteors are streams of a comet's debris – and from our village there are at least four visible showers due, but mostly with best visibility just before dawn. The Leonid shower will be at its peak on 17 November, the best displays around 6 am, as the Earth's rotation turns us to face the direction of the incoming meteors.

Not really observable this month is Venus, the brightest of the planets, which can shine brightly after sunrise or before sunset; it always appears in the direction of the Sun (which you should never look directly at). November is a time of the year when Venus appears during our day and is generally very low, then below the horizon at night. But, in early December, the Moon crescent and Venus will be very close as they become visible during late afternoon and remain close as they travel low in the southern sky. Side by side, cloud permitting, that'll be a good subject for our cameras! We'll have to wait until February when Venus will be at its brightest and highest and will appear very close to both Saturn and Neptune.

If you want more information on the night skies above our village, the British Astronomical Association website is a good start.

### Safer Streets Call for Volunteer Marshals

For the safety of the pupils of the Primary School and Honeypot Pre-School, Cambridgeshire Council has implemented a legal road closure prohibiting all vehicular access to and from Thoday's Close during the times of morning drop off and afternoon pick up.

Parents and carers are politely requested that, if they are unable to walk children to and from school, they drive and park safely and respectfully in a safe and legal parking place within the surrounding streets.

With the help of parent/carer volunteers, we can enable disabled drivers with a blue badge, school coaches and pre-booked taxis for school pupils, safe escorted access during these times.

Children of morning volunteers can use the breakfast club for free while marshalling or, for the afternoon closure, children are collected from the school office at 3 30 pm. This ensures the marshals' children are safe and cared for while their parents and carers assist the safety of all pupils and young families as well as supporting the school and community.

If you can give 30 minutes in the morning or afternoon, either weekly, fortnightly or occasionally, your assistance would be greatly appreciated by the small team of volunteers that make this possible.

#### Footpath to Highgate Farm

We are pleased to report that the Council's application to the Cambridgeshire Local Highways Improvement (LHI) fund for the provision of a footpath along Over Road to Highgate Farm has been successful. As the cost exceeds the maximum LHI allowance, there will be a financial contribution from the Council and a generous donation from the site owner. There is no timetable yet for when the work will take place, but we will let you know as soon as we hear anything.

#### **Clock Minder Wanted**

The clock in Great St Mary's tower is owned and maintained by the Parish Council. It is serviced annually and so generally keeps excellent time but does need occasional intervention. This includes the twice annual change to and from British Summer Time. The Council is seeking a volunteer clock minder who is able to climb the somewhat narrow staircase. If this appeals to you, please contact the Council Office.

#### **School Parking**

The Office has received several complaints about the continued dangerous and illegal parking near the school at the start and end of the school day, including incidents of cars driving onto private property. #### Winter Fuel Payments and Pension Credit

New rules for winter fuel payments mean that only those in receipt of Pension Tax Credit can receive the extra annual payment. Pension Credit is worth, on average, £3,900 per year and, apart from the winter fuel payment, it also unlocks additional support such as help with Council Tax.

Many people who are entitled to Pension Tax Credit do not claim it, so South Cambridgeshire District Council is working to identify these people and to remind them that they have the opportunity to apply. If you know of anyone who may be in this position, please contact District Councillor Bill Handley who will connect them to the right SCDC officers.

#### **Anti-Social Behaviour**

### No Nature's Names!!!!!!!

The title says it all – the regular Nature's Names slot is taking a break, but in its stead this month is the origin of a common piece of punctuation that is much used, much over-used and quite powerful. The exclamation mark! Okay, there was really no need to slap one on the end there, but to add a bit of jollity I threw it in.

Why is the exclamation mark powerful? Apart from its use after the likes of *ah* and *oh* which, without it, look a bit sad (*ah*! and *oh*! are so much more purposeful), think of the difference to a meaning it can make. *Willingham has a library* is a statement of fact and can be quite 'so what?' But if you add an exclamation mark on the end – *Willingham has a library*! – then it adds an impetus to either pop along to scour the shelves or avoid it like the plague if books scare the daylights out of you.

Sometimes, as in the title of this piece, multiple exclamation marks are used for... well, I'm not totally sure why, except due to an adrenaline rush on the part of the writer, or as an essential in *The Beano*. Multiple marks were fashionable amongst some writers and publishers in the 19th century and hated by others at the time. The marks were labelled as *bangs*, *shrieks*, *startlers* and *shouts*.

The exclamation mark (in a slightly different form) was introduced into English around about the 14th century – then it was called a *point of admiration*. Prior to that, there's a plausible theory that it originated centuries ago, in Latin writing, where 'io' was added at the end of a sentence to signify joy or excitement.

For example: 'Strike him, Centurion, very roughly io'.

### **Thought for the Month**

November is, by tradition, a month when we remember.

As a community we will, of course, come together on Sunday 10 November for the annual ceremonies and service which accompany Remembrance Sunday. At 10 45 am we will gather around the War Memorial where the traditional words will be spoken and wreaths laid. Then at 11 am, there is a warm invitation to everyone to come into the parish church for an act of worship that will be accessible to all ages. We do not gather to glorify war – far from it – but to remember, with gratitude, all those who gave their lives in the two World Wars and elsewhere, that we might have our freedom today. We will hear again the names of those from Willingham who went away to serve and never returned. It is always a poignant occasion, perhaps more so this year as we mark the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings.

Today, our television screens and social media are constantly showing us images from areas of the world torn apart by wars. As I write this at the start of October, the horrors unfolding in the Middle East, as between Russian and Ukraine and elsewhere across the world, remind us that the price of war is costly and it is often innocent civilians (of all ages) who have to deal with the fall-out from it. Across the world, millions have no homes to call their own as a result of conflict around them. There are 3.7 million people estimated to be displaced in Ukraine alone – the figures are heartbreaking.

As Christians, we worship Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace. It is peace that we pray for regularly in our church communities and in our everyday lives. As we move through a season of remembrance in November, may we hold close to our hearts and minds the teaching of Jesus when he said, 'Blessed are the peacemakers for they will be called children of God'.

In November, as we remember, so too we pray fervently for world peace.

### **Gardening Tips for November**

The clocks have fallen back and so, hopefully, has the pace. Well, until the Christmas festivities begin, anyway. Autumn brings lots of change in the garden as the trees shed their leaves. However, while the garden itself is less productive than late summer, there are several jobs to undertake:

- November is the first month of the winter planting season and a good time to plant trees. Whether you choose rootballed or bare root, be sure to prepare the ground for planting to ensure your tree survives the winter.
- Plant the last of your autumn bulbs. This month is a good time to plant tulips. Choose a sunny or partially shaded spot with well-drained soil and prepare your bed with plenty of added compost.
- Prune your roses. Cut off most of the year's growth and take out large woody stems. (Note: Willingham Gardening Club has a speaker from Peter Beales Roses on **Monday 4 November**)
- Cut back and tidy borders.
- Cover young plants with fleece to protect them from frost.
- Make a hedgehog pile using logs, twigs and leaves. If you're having a bonfire, be sure to check for any hibernating hedgehogs.

### Willingham Gardening Club

From the fight against slugs and snails, the merits of peat-free versus peat, to the best flowers for attracting butterflies and bees, our recent Gardeners' Question Time (GQT) was as lively and informative as the first. A special thanks again to our group of panellists: Colin Gill, Selwyn Richardson and Katja Gauci, who passed on their collective wealth of knowledge.

Here are some of our key takeaways:

- When watering, peat-free compost should be treated differently from standard, peat-based compost. Due to the woody materials of peat-free, they tend to look dry on the surface, making it easy to overwater. Turn your pot over, using your fingers to check the moisture level. Pots will also be lighter if they need water.
- While you can get sprays and pellets to rid your garden of slugs, there are many natural ways. Try a beer trap, scattering coffee grounds around the plants they've been attacking or applying petroleum jelly around the rim of your flower pots or stalks of your plants.
- Toadflax, echinacea, persicaria and asters are all excellent flowers to attract bees. Most flower with an open centre, giving access to the pollen.

Our next meeting with be on **Monday 4 November** where we look forward to welcoming speaker Simon White from Peter Beales Roses with his talk: *Rose Growing Made Easy*.

Willingham Gardening Club meets on the first Monday of the month at the Social Club, with refreshments from 7 pm. The meeting begins at 7 30 pm.
