In October, Alan Osbourne gave his talk on *Rosalind Franklin, the Dark Lady of DNA*. Rosalind (1920 – 1958) was a pioneering scientist, chemist, microbiologist and X-ray crystallographer. She studied at Newnham College, Cambridge, however at that time women were not allowed to graduate. In 1953 Watson and Crick declared they had discovered the double helix structure of DNA. In Alan's opinion the discovery was based on Rosalind's groundbreaking research, but she was not credited at the time because of her gender. It was an interesting talk about one of the first ladies of science who has at long last been recognised for her contribution to the discovery of DNA. Various scientific research buildings are now named after her in Cambridge and elsewhere in the world.

Old Willingham



Roll over Bus number 5a – here is your ancestor picking up passengers on Church Street. The bus is parked opposite the church and these shops still exist pretty much unchanged (apart from their use). The shop on the left appears to be a tea shop – with signs for types of tea and cocoa in the window. It is not clear if they served tea or just sold it and the pile of goods on the pavement includes various chests and small furniture. The 'Ortona Motor Bus Company' was one of the first bus services in Cambridge, founded in 1907 with a second-hand Maudslay double decker – very likely the one shown here. Ortona buses adopted a smart leaf green livery with red wheels and body trim. In front of the bus is the ticket collector and he has plenty of work as it looks pretty full. Not great in the rain!

Willingham Gardening Club

Roses make beautiful additions to any garden, but establishing and caring for one can be a daunting undertaking. At the November meeting of the Club, Simon White, from the award-winning Peter Beales Roses, conveyed his wealth of knowledge for rose care in a talk that was in equal parts informative as it was entertaining. Some of the lessons learned include:

- Be brave with pruning! Pick a date early in the year (Valentines Day is a good reminder!) and prune back all dead, damaged or diseased shoots. Prune above a bud, making a 45-degree cut away from the bud so that water falls away from it. Don't be afraid to cut into old wood. Suckers (shoots that come from below the graft, often under the soil line) should be pulled out rather than cut.
- For multiple flowerings in a single year, deadhead often. Make the cut two to three sets of leaves down the stem, not just at the base of the flower.
- For nutrition, add banana peels to the soil and avoid mushroom compost!

Nature's Names

On the first day of Christmas my true love and all that? Consider this — partridges, the Common (but seriously endangered) English Grey variety, are mainly grounddwelling birds, hardly likely to be found up a pear tree, as their reluctance to take to the wing is inbuilt. When they do fly, they're strangely noisy, which allegedly sounds like ... how do I put this delicately ... breaking wind. And that, reportedly, is how they got their name — going back way down the language tree, the Indo-European base *perd* (which meant 'to break wind') was the original stem of the word. Then there was the Greek *perdix*, the Old French *perdis*, morphing into English as *partrich*, although there were several variants of the spelling. (And therein lies a bunch of facts to mention at the Christmas Day dinner table as you tuck into your sprouts.)

The original *Twelve Days of Christmas* lyrics were based on a French song, from centuries ago, and were first published in English around 1780 in a children's book, *Mirth Without Mischief*.

The song itself was meant to be a memory game with forfeits. In the 1980s, a suggestion emerged that the lyrics had a religious connection, with secret meanings, but this has been debunked as a fanciful myth. In 1905, English composer Frederic Austin arranged the *Twelve Days of Christmas* to today's version of the jolly festive tune.

As part of the Feast celebrations, our Photo Club held its usual exhibition at the Public Hall on 5 and 6 October. Over that weekend, there was a steady flow of visitors, 173 people in all (plus several canine pals!) calling in to view the photographs, all taken by members of our village's Photo Club. The comments left by visitors were extremely encouraging — 'very enjoyable, great photos', 'great mix of photos, great skill shown', very informative members, thanks for the chat', 'as inspiring as ever!', 'amazing quality of photos...'

The Club itself encourages new members. It meets once a month and is very informal, which would suit people who don't want a competitive element. The level of photographic equipment you use is almost irrelevant — members' equipment ranges from camera phones, compact cameras, to more expensive 'kit'. Each month there are discussions about photographs taken for the monthly assignments, all constructive and never destructive! Assignments are designed to be fun, to encourage us to keep our eyes open for photo opportunities when out and about. The Night Sky in December

There was a good reaction to the item about the November night sky over our village, so let's continue over the winter months — this time it's a snapshot about what we can expect to see with the naked eye (given a clear sky) over Willingham in December.

The New Moon is on the 1st and the Full Moon on the 15th of the month, the latter rising at dusk in the east with big and bright Jupiter close by and Mars rising a little later, lower in the sky. (The glare of the Full Moon will make Jupiter seem a little less bright!) Our Moon has a slightly oval orbit around the earth and in late December it reaches its furthest point from us and will appear slightly smaller. Venus, although quite low in the southern sky, will be shining as the second brightest object in the sky at that time before it sets before 6 pm in the southwest, with Saturn following nearby.

A notable meteor shower will be the Geminids, at a maximum around 14 and 15 December. This coincides with the Full Moon, so visibility might be restricted. However, these meteors are known to be bright, and of various colours due to the metallic content of the tiny particles from an asteroid. If the skies over the village are clear, and you are patient, you may be lucky! Also impressive might be the Ursid meteor shower, peak display on 22 December — this will be active all night, but the best trails will be just before dawn or just after dusk, right above our heads, maybe up to about ten meteors per hour.

If you're heading out to the pub at about 7 pm on Christmas Eve, and need a guiding star, or in this case planet, Mars will be rising low in the east and a much brighter Jupiter visible in the skies above Rampton, where there's likely to be a stable or two. You'll be in good company on your visit to the Inn, as the Star of Bethlehem was probably Jupiter, in retrograde motion, appearing to go backwards! Behind you to the west, if you've the inclination to turn and look, both Venus (great visibility) and Saturn (not quite so bright) will be setting in the west.

Here's how people celebrate Christmas in some other parts of the world

Japan

Santa Claus is called: Santakukoru, Santa-san, or Santakuroosu How to say Merry Christmas: Meri Kurisumasu

On Christmas Eve children have fun playing games, dancing, and of course, giving and receiving presents. You might be surprised to discover that KFC is one of the most popular ways to celebrate Christmas, when many families tuck into a 'Kentucky for Christmas.'

Italy

Santa Claus is called: Babbo Natale

How to say Merry Christmas: Buon Natale

In Italy, just like here in the UK, the children get to open their presents on Christmas Day – but, they also get more gifts some 12 days later (6 January) when La Befana visits and delivers either presents for the good kids, or a dreaded bag of coal for the bad ones...

Australia

Santa Claus is called: Santa or Father Christmas (but unlike in Willingham, often wears shorts!) They do normally say Merry Christmas. Christmas Day in Australia is a bit different because it falls right in the middle of summertime, so schools are shut for the long summer holidays. Because it's so hot swimming, surfing, and snorkelling are all very much part of their Christmas.

Venezuela

Santa Claus is called: Papa Noel

How to say Merry Christmas: Feliz Navidad

They have a Christmas tradition that is very unlike any other though on Christmas morning, children and parents from around the capital city of Caracas ALL go to church on their roller-skates!

Holland

Santa Claus is called: Sinterklaas

How to say Merry Christmas: Vrolijk Kersfeest

Dutch children are given presents on 5 or 6 December and believe that Santa travels by boat from Spain and is helped to complete his deliveries by his trusty assistant, Zwarte Piet. Sinterklass rides a horse and fills the shoes left out by Dutch children with treats and goodies. If the children have been badly behaved, Zwarte Piet steals them and takes them off to Spain for a year!!!

Norway

Santa Claus is called: Julenissen

How to say Merry Christmas: God Jul

Norwegian children usually get their presents on Christmas Eve – although only after they've finished their evening meal and left porridge out for Julenissen.

Germany

Santa Claus is called: Der Weihnachtsmann

How to say Merry Christmas: Fröhliche Weihnachten

The traditional Christmas foods are stollen, gingerbread, and sweet roasted almonds.

Healthy You Falls Prevention

Falls are increasingly common as we get older, sometimes leading to injuries that can cost people their independence. The good news is that many falls can be avoided with the right help.

The Healthy You Falls Prevention Service is a FREE service for anyone aged 65+ living in Cambridgeshire or Peterborough and registered at a Cambridgeshire or Peterborough GP Surgery.

The service offers Falls Risk Assessments, which help identify falls risks before they become a problem, and FREE weekly strength and balance exercise classes to improve strength, stability and confidence in balance. They are also a great way to meet other people, receive support and build motivation.

Contacting the Surgery

Emails to the surgery are not the appropriate route for our patients to make clinical contact with the GP and we ask that you do not convey any clinical information this way. This includes, for example, asking clinical questions, letting the GP know that you are changing doses of your medication or wanting to update the GP before attending an appointment with them. On receipt of such emails, our only response will be to ask you make a GP appointment.

Please also note that we are unable to book appointments via email or our AccuRx Patient Triage system. You are able to make your appointment via SystemOnline, by using the NHS App or telephoning the surgery and speaking to our reception team.

Pension Credits – are you claiming?

1,053 households in the South Cambridgeshire District Council area are entitled to Pension Credit due to their household income and are NOT claiming it – are you one of these? This amounts to £2,801,690 per year. If you are eligible, not only can Pension Credit payments be backdated three months, but you can also claim Winter Fuel Allowance. For further information

Vaccinations

The Flu Vaccine is available for all pregnant women (including those women who become pregnant during the influenza season), individuals aged 65 years or over (including those becoming age 65 years by 31/03/25) and individuals aged 18 years to under 65 years in a clinical risk group category.

The Nasal Flu Vaccine is available for all those aged two or three years on 31/08/24 (with a date of birth on or after 01/09/20 and on or before 31/08/22)

The RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus) vaccine is available for individuals turning 75 years of age on or after 01/09/24. There is also a catch-up campaign for those with a date of birth between 02/09/1944 to 31/08/1949.

The Shingles Vaccine is available for individuals who are aged between 70 and 79 years and have never received a shingles vaccine, for individuals who reach the age of 65 or 70 years of age during the period 01/09/23 and 31/08/2028 (these individuals should be vaccinated on or after (but not before) their 65th or 70th birthday), individuals who are aged 50 years and above and meet the definition of severe immunosuppression and for those who are aged between 18 and 49 years and receiving a stem cell transplant

Thought for the Month

Finding The Lost at Christmas

Believe it or not, Christmas Day only became a public holiday in Scotland in 1958, the year after I was born there. My father had to take a day off without pay to spend Christmas with his family. Even in Scotland, this has been forgotten and many Church of Scotland parishes celebrate Christmas services. We still celebrate New Year and heavy drinking is usually reserved for that time, which makes Christmas a more sedate and family affair. In fact, Christmas was meant to run from Christmas Day, the beginning of Christmas, to Twelfth Night on 6 January. Nowadays, far from Christmas beginning on Christmas Day, we are all exhausted at the very idea of Christmas. Mind you, there is one good reason why Christmas goods arrive early in the shops, which as people in retail will tell you, is because poorer people are able to gradually buy a little every week, to build up a good spread by the time Christmas Day arrives.

I am a Catholic priest, and a lot of my priestly life has involved hospital chaplaincy. For me Christmas often meant being with the sick and sometimes the dying. I always remember a sermon I once heard about a woman who lived on her own in Glasgow, who said that all her life she had felt overlooked, but that she never felt lonely on Christmas night because she felt close to Jesus, Mary and Joseph, on the night that they too were overlooked. So how do you help people who are overlooked by the world? That's easy. You go to look for them. Christmas is a feast of a lost family in a lost world, but it is also a feast of finding the lost. The shepherds and the Magi could tell you that.

Village 20 mph Scheme

After thoroughly assessing all available information regarding the Speed Limit Order – including feedback from the consultation process and public comments—the County Council has formally approved the detailed design of the Willingham 20 mph speed limit plan through a delegated decision. Any requests for extending this limit can be considered in future projects. For instance, following the successful local highways improvement bid, which will see an extension of the Over Road footpath up to the Highgate Farm businesses, there is potential for expansion of the 20 mph scheme further to encourage active and safe travel to and from Highgate. The 20 mph scheme is scheduled to begin operating in February and, with police endorsement already in place, enforcement will commence as soon as the new zone is fully established.

Christmas Tree and Lights

The Parish Council extends its heartfelt thanks to the Co-operative Group for their generous donation of £200, which will go toward purchasing this year's Christmas tree. This contribution has made it possible for us to secure a beautiful tree, perfect for the Village Green and the heart of our community. Alongside the tree, the much-anticipated annual Christmas lights will soon be illuminating the Green, adding a magical touch as the village begins to celebrate the festive season.

Carols on the Village Green

Back by popular demand, we are excited to announce the return of a wonderful tradition this year: a festive gathering where parishioners and friends can come together to sing Christmas carols at the Village Green. This joyful event will be held on the late afternoon of **24 December**. We invite everyone to bring their family, friends, and holiday spirit to share in the music, enjoy some delicious mince pies and sip warm mulled wine as we celebrate the season. discuss potential environmental impacts. As this is a non-statutory consultation, there will be further opportunities for input as plans develop. (2) **Remote Meetings Consultation** – The Council is being consulted on the use of remote meetings to improve accessibility and increase attendance. This consultation aims to make Council Meetings more inclusive for residents and councillors who may face challenges attending in person.

Consultations that have now closed include - (3) Bus Franchisement Consultation - This consultation, outlining plans to improve bus services across the region with a focus on accessibility and efficiency, has now closed. It was shared online for parishioners and responded to by various councillors. (4) Rural Crime Consultation - Cambridgeshire Police conducted a consultation on rural crime to gather insights from residents and councillors about specific issues and locations, helping to allocate resources more effectively. This survey has now closed, but the Parish Council responded on behalf of the village, raising concerns, and providing insights into local issues. (5) Fens Reservoir Consultation - A private consultation for Councils has opened regarding the proposed Fens Reservoir near Chatteris. The Council has submitted a response highlighting potential traffic and transport concerns for the village, with the goal of preventing any disruptions. While the public cannot comment on this specific consultation, a third public consultation on the reservoir project will be held as it progresses.

Meetings are generally held on the first Wednesday of the month, starting at 7 30 pm in the Octagon. Next meeting: **4 December**. Agendas are published on the website and the noticeboard outside the Public Hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend and can speak briefly or ask questions. See Agendas for further details. January's meeting will be held on **Wednesday 8 January**, as the usual date of the first Wednesday in the month falls on a Bank Holiday. The Council has opted to delay the meeting by one week to ensure the availability of both Council members and residents. We encourage all residents to attend, as the Full Council Meeting is a valuable opportunity to stay informed about local matters, share input and engage with Council initiatives. Thank you for your understanding and flexibility with this adjusted schedule.
