He says, 'Attached is a photo of Prince – (who died in 1928). He worked here at 26 Station Road, Willingham for the Burling/Askew family. I still work in his stable!' David believes that the barrels were full of apples heading off to market, possibly by train. Willingham had a strong 'heavy horses' following and annual shows were held well into the 1970s. Thought for the Month

Nature's Names

As Muslims celebrated Eid al-Fitr (translated as festival of breaking the fast) at the end of March, it marked the end of fasting during the Islamic month of Ramadan. Ramadan is the ninth month in the Islamic lunar calendar and is one of the holiest months of the year for Muslims. This is a time for fasting, prayer, reflection, charity and community.

Muslims observe the fast each day during the month of Ramadan from sunrise to sunset, abstaining from food and drink (including water) to build empathy for those lacking basic resources which we sometimes take for granted. Muslims believe fasting develops humility and gratitude and enables them to deepen their connections with their fellow community members and God.

Fasting during Ramadan is one of the Five Pillars of Islam, which are the core beliefs and practices that shape a Muslim's faith and actions. The Five Pillars of Islam are Faith, Prayer, Charity, Fasting and Pilgrimage. During Ramadan, Muslims are especially encouraged to engage in acts of charity and generosity. Charitable giving during Ramadan is a powerful expression of faith, compassion, and community solidarity. It helps to strengthen social bonds and ensures that everyone can share in the blessings of this holy month.

The focus on spiritual renewal during Ramadan parallels Christian seasons like Lent, where fasting, prayer and charitable giving become key religious activities. While Christian fasting practices vary widely, both Muslim and Christian tradition of fasting embodies a universal human experience of drawing closer to God through voluntary self-denial and spiritual discipline. The emphasis on charitable giving during Ramadan strongly aligns with Christian values. Jesus's teachings about caring for 'the least of these' find beautiful expression in the Muslim practice of increased charitable giving during this holy month.

Let us embrace these common bonds and work together to build bridges of understanding and mutual respect. By focusing on what unites us, we can foster a spirit of harmony and cooperation that transcends religious boundaries and enriches our community.

It is generally agreed amongst squabbling word-origin experts that the bird's name swallow is derived from the Proto-Germanic *swalwõn*, and the Proto-Indo-European *swol-wi*, a word (from over four thousand years ago) which signifies a forked tail.

It is one of only a handful of bird names which appeared in early Anglo-Saxon and Old English manuscripts. Around the year 700 AD, it was called *Hirundo sualuuae* and, in subsequent years, the name was used for other birds with forked tails, such as the tern (now often called the sea swallow).

As Spring creeps in, we'll see swallows arriving, the males first, to suss out the territory and to be the first to greet and seriously impress the females, which turn up a week or two later. Maybe they've flown all the way from southern Africa, thousands of miles, wisely skirting around central Sahara, across the Mediterranean, and flying low over the English Channel (dodging the slipstreams of the multitude of ferries and other ships in their search for low-flying insects) before finally arriving on our shores. In our climate, they'll prefer to build nests as close to 'indoors' as they can, for the warmth, often hanging their nests in precarious places. Hence the now-obsolete name of chimney swallow.

Regarding the idiom *one swallow does not a summer make* — which feels very much like all the right words but in the wrong order — this originated in an ethical work by Aristotle around 350 BC, in which he says *one swallow does not a summer make, nor one fine day; one day of happiness does not make a person entirely happy.* (Feel free to disagree, as he's no longer around to argue with you.)

Aesop, he of the Greek fables, has also been credited with that idiom, which he writes in *The Spendthrift and the Swallow*. This is about a foolish young man who sold all his clothes after seeing the first swallow (rumour has it that he kept his underwear on, for decency's sake), only to be caught out big time by a nippy frost the next day. (Do I hear cries of 'serves him right'?) There are many different translations regarding his fate, but I'd like to think that the swallow, in its toasty layer of feathers, had the last laugh from its perch under the cosy eaves of a nearby house.

Easter and May Bank Holidays – Opening Hours

Please note the surgery will be closed for the long Easter weekend including the bank holidays on Friday 18 April and Monday 21 April as well as the bank holidays on Monday 5 and 26 May.

In addition, we will also be closed from 1 pm on Thursday 15 May for whole staff training.

Please plan ahead and make sure you have enough medication to last, remembering to order your repeats at least three working days before collection.

MyChart Patient App

MyChart is the electronic portal at Addenbrooke's and the Rosie hospitals, allowing their patients to securely access parts of their health record held within the hospitals' Epic electronic system. It is designed to improve communication between patients and their clinical teams and enable patients to be more involved and informed about their care by having access to their information.

Hospital information available electronically in MyChart includes upcoming appointments/past appointment details, current problems/conditions, clinical correspondence, test results, medication etc.

Patients are also able to check-in for appointments, message their care team, download recent visit records and securely share MyChart information electronically with other clinical settings such as the GP, community care staff and clinicians at other hospitals.

Travel Information

As the summer holidays are fast approaching many of us are turning our attention to booking holidays and making our travel plans. If you are planning to travel abroad, please consider whether you will require any vaccinations by booking a travel clinic appointment (at least six weeks before your date of travel) with one of our practice nurses. They can offer a general travel consultation with advice and are also able to administer the following vaccinations (free of charge): hepatitis A, typhoid, tetanus diphtheria and polio and the MMR. For any other vaccinations we would recommend you attend Masta, a private travel clinic, located on Hills Road in Cambridge. Please visit our website for further information and to fill out a travel questionnaire, which must be completed before your appointment.

For those who are on repeat medication, please plan ahead and make sure you have enough medication to last for your time away, remembering to re-order with plenty of time before you travel and allowing at least three working days before collection and, just in case of emergency, we would advise that you take a list of your repeat medication with you (your repeat prescription slip would be ideal).

Finally, just a reminder that the GP is unable to sign (as proof of identification) any passport/visa applications and they will not write 'fit to travel/fly' letter for our patients.

Waiting Times

We apologise that, due to the increased demands on the GPs, there may be delays in being seen for your routine or emergency appointment. Please bear in mind that our staff are working hard to minimise this but it is always advisable to allow a little extra time, just in case.

Repeat Prescriptions

Repeat medication can be ordered via SystemOnline, using the NHS App or by handing in paper repeat prescription slips to the surgeries at Willingham or Longstanton as well as the Willingham Pharmacy. Despite any notifications received after ordering electronically, our current turn around for regular repeat prescriptions is three working days (this does not include weekends) so please be aware of this when ordering and give yourself plenty of time to ensure you don't run out of medication.

We will always help where we can with urgent orders. However, this is always subject to stock availability so we cannot guarantee we can fulfil a prescription quickly. In these circumstances we will be in contact to advise.

Zero Tolerance

Sadly, we have noticed an increase in rude and abusive behaviour from our patients and, in some instances, this has been directly targeted towards individual members of our staff. We all aim to be polite, helpful and sensitive to our patients' individual needs and circumstances and we respectfully remind patients that very often our staff are working under immense pressure.

The practice takes it very seriously if any member of staff is treated in an abusive or violent way. Aggressive behaviour will not be tolerated and may result in you being removed from the practice list and, in extreme cases, the police being contacted.

We ask you to always treat your GPs and our staff courteously.

Councillor Vacancy – Co-Option Opportunity

The Parish Council is currently seeking a new councillor to fill a vacancy on the council. We are now in the process of co-opting a new member and encourage interested residents to consider applying. The closing date for applications is **1 pm** on **Tuesday, 27 May**. If you're passionate about contributing to the future of the village and making a difference in our community, we strongly encourage you to apply. Duke of Wellington – Re-Application for Community Asset Status

At the most recent Parish Council meeting, councillors voted unanimously to re-apply for community asset status for the Duke of Wellington pub. Securing this status would mean that the building would be listed for a period of five years, protecting it from being sold without the community being given a chance to step in. If the pub were ever put up for sale during this time, community members would be given the opportunity to put together a bid to purchase and maintain the building as a local asset. This is a crucial step in ensuring that the Duke of Wellington remains part of our village's social and community fabric for years to come, and we hope the application will be successful.

Seeking Land for Cemetery or Leisure Space

The Parish Council continues to explore options for acquiring land for either a new cemetery or a leisure space to cater to the needs of the growing community. Finding suitable land is an important priority, and we are particularly interested in properties that could serve either as a final resting place for future generations or as an area for outdoor recreational activities. If any residents know of any available land that might be suitable, or if you are a landowner willing to sell or lease your property, we would love to hear from you. Having these essential spaces is key to the ongoing development of our village, and any assistance or advice on available land would be greatly appreciated.

Meadow Road Site – Pond Area Improvement

In partnership with Cambridgeshire ACRE, the Parish Council is pleased to announce that further improvements will be made to the pond area on the Meadow Road site in the coming weeks. The aim is to enhance the natural beauty of the area and improve its ecological value. This project is part of a broader effort to ensure that the village continues to offer green spaces that are both sustainable and beneficial to local wildlife.

MUGA – Update on Proposals

The Multi-Use Games Area (MUGA) project has been several years in the pipeline due to the need to resolve various issues, including flooding, sizing, and ecology but it is important to get it right. The final application to the planners currently includes a floodlit tennis and netball court that will be slightly raised. However, the Environment Agency has strict rules about raising any part of a flood plain, requiring a compensatory removal of material. Assessment of this removal is—hopefully—the final piece of information needed for the planning application.

It's quite hard to imagine what these youngsters would go through, with the Second World War just around the corner. But the teachers obviously encouraged them to write about our village and, in the case of the following poem, maintain their sense of humour!

FLOWER GROWING

Willingham has been described as "a place of fruit and flowers". I wish to tell you something about the indoor flower growing, as it would take too long to deal with every side of flower cultivation.

There can be seen many huge glass houses in which many types of flower are grown. In the beginning the soil is dug and prepared in these glass houses ready for the different flower bulbs, while outside men are putting soil into small boxes and planting the bulbs in rows. After that they are watered, then soil and straw are thrown over them, and lastly more soil is added. Two or three weeks later the green shoot appears. The bulbs are then uncovered and the dirt around the little green shoot is cleaned away. They are then put into the large glass house, which is soon crowded with lovely spring flowers.

Now the worker's busiest time begins, for all the flowers have to be cut, packed and sent away to different towns and cities such as London, Birmingham, Manchester, Bradford and Halifax. Occasionally a man may come from another village to buy flowers to sell them again himself.

The flowers are cut when in bud, for if they were allowed to be in full bloom they would not last long in the customer's house. On the next day they are bunched in dozens and packed very neatly into trunks or cardboard boxes which are stacked in neat rows of sixes. The heads of the flowers are arranged on either side of the box so that the stalks are together in the middle. About three o'clock in the afternoon they are packed on a lorry and taken to the Railway Station to commence a long journey to the waiting markets of England.
