Historic Cup Win for Willingham Wolves Men's Team

Willingham Wolves Men's team secured their first cup victory in several decades in emphatic style on Friday 28 March, defeating Hartford Rangers 7-3 in a thrilling final.

Managed by Elliott Aldhouse, the Wolves had a nervous start, conceding a goal within the first two minutes. However, they quickly found their rhythm, going into halftime with a 3-2 lead. A stunning seven-minute surge after the break saw the Wolves net four goals in quick succession, extending their lead to 7-2 before Hartford Rangers scored a late consolation goal.

The Wolves' goal scorers were Charlie Cambridge (4), Ross Munro, Archie Munns and Sam Johnston.

This historic win marks a significant milestone for the team, which is currently undefeated this season. Fresh from promotion last season, they have won 21 games in all competitions, drawing just two, and have already scored over 100 goals. The Wolves are aiming for further silverware in both league and county cup competitions. A huge thank you to our men's Team Sponsor, NGU Uttridge, for their continued support.

Old Willingham



You may have seen photos of the huge building on George Street that was the original Baptist Tabernacle Church. This year is the 150th anniversary of its construction in 1875. This picture shows what it was like inside, facing George Street.

People came in through the two doors at the sides. In line with Baptist principles, which focus on the message of the Bible, there is a huge pulpit in the centre where fiery sermons could be preached to a large crowd. Although an interesting heritage building, by the 1980s the congregation was measured in 10s rather than 100s and the cost of upkeep was very high. The building was demolished in the 1980s and part of the plot was sold for housing. The proceeds were used to build the modern church we have today.

Trivia Corner

Who was it who once said, 'When a man tires of Lego he tires of life'? Okay, we may have got a word wrong. It might have been London, but the point still stands — who doesn't like Lego? (Maybe those who've stepped on their child's bricks in their bare feet?) However, here's a series of interesting trivia facts about these ubiquitous coloured bricks.

The Star Wars Millennium Falcon set, at around £700, is the most expensive to buy new, and a first edition has sold for nearly £12,000. Each year 36 billion bricks are manufactured. Lego makes over 300 million tyres each year, making them the biggest tyre producer in the world. Lego used to be called Automatic Binding Bricks until 1953. On his TV show *James May's Toy Stories* in 2008, James was the first person to construct and spend a night inside his full-sized two-storey Lego house, complete with Lego bed and working toilet — the house was made of 3.3 million Lego elements. And finally, it would take a stack of 40 billion standard Lego bricks to reach the Moon. It's fair to assume that, even in the Family Lego Club at our Library, it hasn't been tried and tested — we're sure the crew of the International Space Station would have reported it by now.

What Colour was Thunderbird 2?

Friends of Willingham Church organised a Quiz Night in the Octagon on 28 March, and that was one of the questions. 'How many bones are in the adult human body?' was another. As you'll see on the accompanying photograph, brains were being tested throughout the evening, but it was hugely enjoyable. May Bank Holidays — Opening Hours

In addition, we will also be CLOSED from 1 pm on **THURSDAY 15 MAY** for whole staff training.

Please plan ahead and make sure you have enough medication to last, remembering to order your repeats at least THREE WORKING DAYS before collection.

Pregnancy

If you have had a positive pregnancy test, or are pregnant and have recently moved to the area, you are able to self-refer to the Rosie Hospital and Rosie Community Midwives for your care.

For women who require a translator, or who don't have digital access, please call 01223 348981 and leave a voicemail with your name and NHS number. Please be advised to email your self-referral form or telephone the service as early as possible following a positive pregnancy test.

Travel Information

As the summer holidays are fast approaching, many of us are turning our attention to booking holidays and making our travel plans. If you are planning to travel abroad please consider whether you will require any vaccinations. By booking a Travel Clinic appointment (at least six weeks before your date of travel) with one of our practice nurses, they can offer a general travel consultation with advice. They are also able to administer the following vaccinations (free of charge): Hepatitis A; Typhoid; Tetanus, Diptheria and Polio; MMR. For any other vaccinations we would recommend you attend MASTA, a private travel clinic, located on Hills Road in Cambridge. Please visit our website for further information and to fill out a Travel Questionnaire, which must be completed BEFORE your appointment.

For those who are on repeat medication, please plan ahead and make sure you have enough medication to last for your time away, remembering to re-order with plenty of time before you travel and allowing at least three working days before collection. And, just in case of emergency, we would advise that you take a list of your repeat medication with you (your repeat prescription slip would be ideal).

Finally, just a reminder that the GP is unable to sign (as proof of identification) any passport/visa applications and they will not write 'Fit to Travel/Fly' letters for our patients.

Zero Tolerance

Sadly, we have noticed an increase in rude and abusive behaviour from our patients and, in some instances, this has been directly targeted towards individual members of our staff. We all aim to be polite, helpful and sensitive to our patients' individual needs and circumstances and we respectfully remind patients that very often our staff are working under immense pressure.

The Practice takes it very seriously if any member of staff is treated in an abusive or violent way. Aggressive behaviour will not be tolerated and may result in you being removed from the Practice list and, in extreme cases, the police being contacted. We ask you to treat your GPs and our staff courteously at all times.

Repeat Prescriptions

Repeat medication can be ordered via SystemOnline, using the NHS App or by handing in paper repeat prescription slips to the surgeries at Willingham or Longstanton as well as the Willingham Pharmacy.

Despite any notifications received after ordering electronically, our current turnaround for regular repeat prescriptions is THREE WORKING DAYS (this DOES NOT include weekends) so please be aware of this when ordering and give yourself plenty of time to ensure you don't run out of medication.

We will always help where we can with urgent orders. However, this is always subject to stock availability so we cannot guarantee we can fulfil a prescription quickly. In these circumstances we will be in contact to advise.

Vaccinations

The Pneumococcal Vaccine is available year round for everyone who is aged 65 years and over.

The RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus) Vaccine is available year round for everyone who is aged between 75 and 79 years of age and for all pregnant women who are over 28 weeks.

The Shingles Vaccine is available year round for everyone who is aged between 70 and 79 years of age and have never received a shingles vaccine, for individuals who reach the age of 65 or 70 years of age during the period 01/09/23 and 31/08/28 (these individuals should be vaccinated on or after (but not before) their 65th or 70th birthday), individuals who are aged 50 years and above and meet the definition of severe immunosuppression and for those who are aged between 18 and 49 years and receiving a stem cell transplant. Please note, when booking your second (booster) shingles vaccination, this cannot be administered any sooner (even by one day) than six calendar months after the first vaccination was given.

Nature's Names

Tulips were usually associated with April and May, but in recent years we've seen them flowering much earlier. Although they are native to Turkey, it's likely that their cultivation begin in what is now Iran. The name originated from the Persian *dulband*, meaning 'turban', due to their resemblance to that piece of headwear. It was borrowed into Turkish as *tuliband*, then into early modern French as *tulipan*.

It was in the 16th century that Holland became synonymous with tulips. Bulbs with viral infections were stolen from Leiden University, and these pilfered 'broken' varieties with flames and stripes of different colours soon became the foundation of the country's thriving tulip trade.

Tulips in literature are frequent, as they often symbolise rebirth, perfection, and the power of love.

Seeing an array of tulips makes us feel good. Not so, it seems, for Sylvia Plath in her poem *Tulips*.

'Now I am watched... The tulips turn on me... The vivid tulips eat my oxygen... The tulips should be behind bars like dangerous animals...'

Plath's poetry isn't known for its jolly demeanour, but steady on, Sylvia. It's a bit harsh on tulips!

Local groups present their annual reports and this year we are trying to arrange for an officer from SCDC to come and talk about what the District Council are trying to do to combat fly tipping. This meeting is separate from the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council held on **7 May**, which forms part of the regular Parish Council meeting timetable.

Traffic

The proposed 20 mph zone for Willingham has been approved and the works should start soon. Hopefully, this will have started by the time you are reading this article.

The SpeedWatch group have started their sessions again in earnest after a quieter winter period. For more information on the traffic monitoring in Willingham, go to <u>roadwatch.org.uk/</u> <u>Cambs/Willingham/index.html</u> where data going back to 2018 can be found. The flashing signs are moved to new locations at irregular intervals and there are plans to get more locations approved. If more residents can give an hour or so of their time at intervals to help the group, more sessions can be held, especially in other parts of the village. You can contact them on speedwatchwillingham@yahoo.com for more information

There are plans by CCC Highways for some improvements in Willingham, notably resurfacing Earith Road from George Street to Roseberry Caravan site, and preparation for pavement treatments to Newington and Church Street. We are exploring the possibility of incorporating other speed reduction measures alongside this work.

The footpath to Highgate Farm is in the final design stages and paperwork should be completed in the near future. It was hoped this work could start soon. However, due to the amount of road closures along Over Road recently, the construction work may be delayed until later in the year to coincide with other operations which involve closing the road.

Willingham Post Office

Graham Atherton, our longstanding Postmaster, is due to take his delayed and well-earned retirement at the end of May when the new owner takes over, all being well. We would like to thank Graham for carrying on running the business to ensure continuity of the much valued Post Office services in the village.

Police

Recently, a 'Coffee with a Cop' meeting was held at the Parish Council offices. These informal gatherings provide an excellent opportunity for residents to discuss local concerns directly with police officers and foster stronger community relations. Various topics were discussed including anti-social behaviour, speeding (particularly along Earith Road), and parking in general and especially around the school. The local officer is keen to hold another session, and we will plan for this later in the year.

It is worth being aware that if someone is in a dangerous situation and cannot speak when they dial 999, if they press 55 when prompted it will alert the police to their need for assistance.

Planning

There was concern recently when SCDC announced that, due to changes in the methods of calculating housing for the fiveyear plan, the council no longer met the requirements. This was similar to the situation several years ago when developers applied for sites and the planning officers could not refuse on grounds of overdevelopment. Fortunately, the position was soon resolved and SCDC is now compliant.

Hedges Maintenance and Bird Nesting

The bird nesting season has started, but can we remind residents, if they can, to carefully cut back trees, hedges and shrubs that overhang the back of the pavement line without affecting any nests. Many pavements are still too narrow to be safely negotiated due to excessive growth alongside, especially of brambles.

Thought for the Month

I know I must have been a horrid child. I can remember all too well how I had to be chivvied and cajoled into writing my thank-you letters to the honorary aunts who had sent presents for Christmas and birthdays. I had accepted their bounty greedily enough, but sulked over the chore of writing to them, sitting there chewing the end of my pen and not knowing what to put.

Did you ever have that feeling? Go on, be honest!

What I came to realise was that my parents wanted to teach me not only to be polite but to be grateful. We are not really grateful at all until we have taken the pains to say so. Sometimes it feels like a lost art. The nurses in the hospitals where I used to work were surprised and delighted whenever recently discharged patients came bounding back onto the wards bringing with them flowers and chocolates to say they were grateful. Not everyone thinks to do that. After all, a hospital can be a place where you once felt ill, lonely and apprehensive. Once you feel better again you just want to turn a page on all that and get on with your life.

The stories in the gospels are full of human touches. We all remember the ten lepers that Jesus healed, and how he remarked on the fact that only one came back to show his gratitude: 'Where are the other nine?'

When I visited a leper colony in the Philippines I was told that those who escape the ravages of the disease don't look back. It takes a lot of courage to set your face towards the place where once you were segregated, isolated and marginalised.

True religion teaches us gratitude for who we are and who has helped us to wholeness and happiness. The love of God has been poured into our hearts, and we are grateful.

On Monday 7 April, we welcomed back Gwenda Kyd who gave a fascinating talk on aromatherapy and the use of natural essential oils from plants to promote health and wellbeing. We learned that essential oils are extracted from various parts of the plants using a variety of methods depending on type, these range from steam distillation, extraction using solvents, to expression or cold pressing. Once the oils have been extracted they can then be used in a variety of ways, e.g., inhaled, applied directly on the skin or ingested.

Each scent can offer different therapeutic benefits: Lavender promotes relaxation; Peppermint can relieve headaches, muscle pain and can aid digestion; Eucalyptus helps with respiratory issues. However, safety is paramount. Only buy essential oils from reputable suppliers, diffuse intermittently, and patch test before use on skin.
