The youth club re-launched in 2018 seeing many kids come to the club on Wednesday nights to have fun with their friends.

In 2018 the Coding Club attracted around 75 young people and finished with an exciting project combining computer programming and some basic electrical engineering of robotic cars. They used Raspberry PIs and robotic cars supported by code that the children had worked on in previous blocks. They showed great creativity and ingenuity in building the cars, writing code for driving, using sensors to detect objects and responding to speech and music. We are planning to take the next group of children to a local company, where they design and programme driverless cars, so that they can see how the technology is used in the real world.

Note from a student - How to capture a unicorn

OWLS Community Car Scheme



Demand continues to grow for the services of the OWLS (Over, Willingham, Longstanton, Swavesey) Community Car Scheme. In 2018 from October to December requests for journeys rose to over 100 journeys a month. The total number of journeys undertaken in 2018 exceeded 1,100. With this increase comes the need for more drivers. Can you help to maintain and grow this valuable Community service?

OWLS offers a door-to-door return service to those people who are unable to access other means of transport to attend medical appointments or make some social journeys such as attending lunch clubs or exercise classes. Many of the journeys undertaken are for people to access facilities in their own or a nearby village.

Drivers receive 30p a mile (\pounds 3 min charge) from customers and 15p a mile from Cambridgeshire County Council. It is helpful if they can offer a minimum of one journey a week.

Please ring the scheme's mobile number $-07505\ 254363$ between 9 am and 4 pm on Monday to Friday for further details on what is involved as a driver or to book a journey. If you reach the answerphone please leave a clear message, including your telephone number, and the coordinator will return your call as soon as possible.

WILLINGHAM 100 Years Ago – February 1919

As part of a regular series, Anne Kirkman recounts events from 100 years ago this month.

On 21 February 1919 the *Cambridge Independent Press* was full of reports of the severe flooding which had affected the whole area. Willingham itself got off fairly lightly, but the railway line to St Ives had to be closed at Swavesey on the afternoon of 19 February and did not re-open for three days. In Swavesey itself planks had to be laid in several areas to enable pedestrians to move about the village. Cambridge was badly flooded and the Cam burst its banks at Waterbeach, which lessened the damage further downstream. It was reported that the water level was at its highest since 1879.

A week earlier the members of the West Cambs Fruit

Growers Association had heard a lecture at the Public Hall on the spraying of fruit trees. This was in three parts – *What* to spray with, When to spray and How to spray – and was described as very instructive. The lecturer, Mr F R Petherbridge was from Rothamsted Research Institute and was obviously an authority on the subject, as he gave the same talk a week later at Cottenham.

At the same time Mr William Few, a local farmer of Osborne House, Church Street, had died after a short illness at the age of 54. His wife was so overwhelmed by the many tributes received that she used the paper to acknowledge them and regret there were too many to answer personally.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' REPORT

It's been a busy time on South Cambs District Council (SCDC) matters and there are plenty of issues that we are dealing with in Willingham and Over.

Construction Traffic

One particular area of focus is that of heavy construction vehicles using the B1050 through Willingham. Vehicles serving the construction of Northstowe and the A14 are not permitted to use this route, however, residents have long suspected that some drivers ignore this ban.

There is a very keen group of volunteers in Willingham who are willing to gather evidence to present to the District Council Enforcement Team, including following lorries to the construction sites and recording details such as licence plates. This will help the authorities enforce the ban. We have also been trying to get additional signage installed to warn construction vehicles not to use the route.

Progress has been slow and frustrating here – the contractors concerned appear to deny that any of their vehicles are involved. Anecdotally at least, there seems to have been some improvement in the rate of construction vehicles using the B1050 since October. We have noticed a reduction to about a half to a third in construction traffic.

How much of this apparent reduction is due to the Christmas break or is related to a particular phase in construction is not known. We may see an increase when construction resumes after the holidays, so we need to keep monitoring this. A residents' Action Day was cancelled before Christmas due to the perceived improvement, but another one was being planned at the time of writing and may have been held before this is published. Either way, we will keep you posted with updates here.

Customer Service at SCDC

The Council is delivering a number of service improvements, focussing initially on the Planning Department. They have had exceptional volumes of activity in recent months and difficulties recruiting staff. The Council Cabinet has undertaken to improve staffing levels and to explore the 'upskilling' of Technical Support Officers to deal with straightforward planning applications.

A new online customer portal will soon be rolled out which should improve the experience for the Council's customers. Shared with neighbouring councils, it will be multi-functional allowing customers to create secure accounts to apply and pay for Council services and track progress. The customer portal will be called 'mysouthcambs'.

Cambridge Ice Rink

Construction of the new Cambridge Leisure and Ice Centre (CLIC) off Newmarket Road was halted last year following the discovery of 194 grenades from World War 2. CLIC will provide a permanent, high-quality, ice rink and leisure facility that will benefit the health and wellbeing of the community, creating up to 25 jobs. The construction delays have added to costs so Councillors have approved additional loan funding of up to £550,000 to enable the venue's completion. SCDC had already provided a £1.85 million loan in September 2016. The opening date for CLIC is to be confirmed but could be as early as April.

District Council Business Plan

The Council has released its draft business plan for the next year and are inviting the public to have a say here: www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/businessplansocialmedia.

Thermal Imaging Camera

Easy to use thermal imaging cameras can be borrowed for free from SCDC. They can help residents find where heat is escaping from their home, so they can potentially reduce energy bills. More details here: <u>tinyurl.com/yddv3jlt</u>.

Cambridge Northern Fringe Area Action Plan

SCDC and Cambridge City Council have published a joint plan for how a new residential district could be created on a brownfield site on the northern fringe of Cambridge. The site is near the Guided Busway and will have good walking and cycling links, reducing reliance upon cars. The public consultation will be carried out early this year and more details will be published then.

Home Improvements for older people

Older people owning their own home and who are struggling with minor repairs can seek help from Cambridgeshire Homes Improvement Agency (CHIA), which is supported by SCDC. This initiative is to help older people stay safely in their own home. <u>www.cambshia.org</u> or phone 01954 713330 for further information.

'Support Cambridgeshire' Free Practitioner Event – 27 February, 12 – 2 30 pm

This event is being held at Over Community Centre, with the aim of enabling people to make successful funding applications. It is free to any community individual or organisation that operates in the voluntary sector within Cambridgeshire. Our Parish Clock

Our Parish Clock has not worked since October 2018. The Parish Council was able to identify only one clock company – Smiths of Derby – prepared to advise on and complete the work required to get the clock working again. Smiths advise that the clock's equipment requires a major overhaul. It also suggests restoration work on the dial is carried out at the same time. The Parish Council understands that this complex level of maintenance and renovation has not been carried out since the clock was provided in 1887 at a cost of £125. It will be discussing these proposals and the budgetary implications further.

Parking at Road Junctions

Vehicles parked on streets should not cause a danger or unnecessarily obstruct the road. Parking is not allowed within 10 metres of a junction or anywhere where the kerb is lowered. This helps users of powered mobility vehicles, wheelchairs and prams. The Parish Council receives residents' comments about dangerous or unnecessary car parking close to the junctions of Saxon Way, Covent Garden and Bourneys Manor Close with the High Street. It has been suggested that yellow lining is placed around these junctions to restrict this parking. The Parish Council has investigated this. It has been advised that parking restrictions could be introduced but the police would not undertake routine enforcement. Neighbouring parishes report that recently introduced parking restrictions, without enforcement, are often ignored. The police are encouraging villages to approach the County and District Councils to seek de-criminalisation of these parking offences. Parking offences could then be managed as a civil offence and enforced by traffic wardens. The Parish Council will be discussing how it should respond to this situation in the village. Vehicle users can also play a part by parking with a greater consideration of the needs of other residents and vehicle users.

Black Pit Drove: an Update

Shortly before the Christmas holiday the South Cambridgeshire Principal Planning Enforcement Officer and a legal representative attended the High Court to seek resolution of this issue. In the absence of traveller representatives, the Judge declined to reach a final decision. It is anticipated that a further hearing will be held with a final judgement made at that time.

We have been asked by Cambridgeshire County Council to remind residents to try to complete any hedge cutting or tree trimming by the end of February – certainly before birds start their nesting activity!

The picture is of a Hospital Sunday parade as it moves up Church Lane in around 1920.

In those days there was no NHS and visits to the doctor or hospital had to be paid for. Most ordinary families could never afford a stay in hospital so, once a year, the village had a parade and everybody donated what they could afford. The money collected was quite substantial and was passed to Addenbrookes Hospital as a sort of insurance payment for the village so that Willingham residents could get treatment even if they could not afford to pay. At the head of the parade is the Rector of St Mary's followed by a brass band and various floats. Only the Rector wears a top hat. Some other men wear bowlers, while most wear trilbys or flat caps according to their social status.

PASTORAL LETTER

New Year Resolutions

Forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things which are ahead.' Philippians 3:13

Be honest: how many of last year's resolutions did you keep?

They say, 'Procrastination is the thief of time.' We keep promising ourselves we'll do better. But 'resolutions' only happen when you're 'resolute'. That means having a mind that's made up.

So here are four resolutions you need to make up your mind to keep this year:

1) Take time for what really matters. Get up earlier in order to read your Bible and pray before entering the day. Make more time for your family. Start exercising and eating right. Take better care of your body; it's God's temple (see 1 Corinthians 6:19).

2) *Tackle one thing at a time.* Taking on too many things at once dilutes your focus and makes it harder to stick with things. When you start too much, you finish too little. So start where you are and build on your successes by mastering and maintaining one thing at a time.

3) *Start small.* Don't try to swallow the 'whole thing' in one bite; baby steps are the name of the game. Talk in terms of what you *will* do instead of what you *won't*.

For example, instead of saying, 'I'm not going to be so critical,' try saying, 'Today I'm going to look for something good in everyone I meet' (see Philippians 4:8).

4) *Remember, your goals can change.* What's needed today may not be right for you in the future. So reassess your plans regularly and be willing to change direction. 'We should make plans—counting on God to direct us' (Proverbs 16:9). When your spiritual gut says no, pay attention and always remember when God is on your side, you'll prevail.

Somebody asked Abraham Lincoln if he was sure that God was on his side. He replied, 'I haven't thought much about it. I just want to know I'm on God's side.'

It's normal to speculate about how you'd like things to turn out, but God alone controls the future. Just trust Him. 'Commit your actions to the LORD, and your plans will succeed.' (Proverbs 16:3).

Missed GP Appointments

NHS England have recently published a report indicating that more than 15 million general practice appointments are being wasted each year, at a huge cost to the NHS. Around 1 in 20 (5%) are missed without enough notice to invite other patients. That's around 15.4 million missed slots.

Of these, around 7.2 million are with busy family doctors, which adds up to more than 1.2 million GP hours wasted every year or the equivalent of more than 600 GPs working full-time for a year.

Each appointment costs an average of £30, adding up to more than £216 million pounds, to say nothing of the disruption for staff and fellow patients.

This sum would pay for: the annual salary of 2,325 full-time GPs; 224, 640 cataract operations; 58,320 hip replacements; 216,000 drug treatment courses for Alzheimer's disease; the annual salary of 8,424 full-time community nurses.

Unfortunately, this is a problem we experience at Willingham Surgery and Longstanton Branch Surgery. In December 2018, 102 patients did not attend their booked appointments with a GP or nurse, and we were unable to offer the appointment to someone else as we had no notice. This is an estimated average cost of $\pounds 3,060$.

Library News

Engage in the Afternoon

Libraries for All!

Cambridgeshire Libraries offer various services to users who are housebound due to mobility or health problems and people with hearing difficulties or visual impairment. Concessions are available if you or someone you know fall into any of these categories:

Library at Home Service – This service (formerly known as the Doorstep Service) is for people who cannot leave their homes because of mobility, health problems, or because they have full time (unpaid) caring duties. You may wish to use this service if you are housebound and you have no one to visit the library for you. A coordinator will contact you to discuss your needs and try to find a suitable library volunteer to provide you with monthly visits, to bring you library books and audio books. The volunteer will also be able to bring you essential health information leaflets from national health campaigns (such as Winter Warmer packs etc) and can bring you hearing aid batteries if you have a National Health hearing aid.

<u>Blind and Visually Impaired</u> – people with a visual impairment can request:

- The Library at Home service (as above) to receive largeprint books, or audio books on CD delivered by a volunteer visitor every month.
- The Digital at Home service to receive e-audio books downloaded onto USB sticks, and posted to you in pouches (via 'Articles for the Blind' posting service) to listen to on a USB player. The customer must provide medical confirmation of a visual impairment to be eligible for this service.

<u>Deaf and Hearing Impaired</u> – Hearing Induction Loops are available in all libraries but the portable versions are only available in Cambridge Central Library. Anyone with a suitable hearing aid should switch it to the 'T' position in order to use the system. The induction loop allows users to benefit from improved sound and should also help reduce background noise.

<u>Adaptive Technology</u> – A range of adaptive technology equipment is available in Cambridge Central Library and our learning centres.

Belsars Hill

I am writing about a piece of really old Willingham history that has interested me for a long time. When I was a youngster I used to ride our bicycles through the fen to see if we could find any pottery or artefacts at the site.

This oval shaped fort was once situated on higher ground above the waterlogged marshland of the fens. Now it sits amongst peaceful farmland to the east of the village. It is situated mostly on private land however the Aldreth Causeway and track run right through it.

William the Conqueror's troops used the site and adapted it during their campaign against Hereward the Wake after 1066.

The site gets its name 'Belassise' from the Old French bel assis (meaning well seated or placed). The Normans built or adapted a causeway across the wetlands to Aldreth during their campaign. The Trackway however dates back to much earlier times and is an ancient route from Cambridge to Ely.

Due to the original French name, the fort has often been thought to be of Norman origin. However, it was only the original entrance that was changed in Norman times - so that the entrance was then via the Aldreth Causeway. The fort had an earlier existance as an Iron Age fort sitting on the border of the Iceni and Catuvellauni tribes.

It is thought that the Great River Ouse was the boundary between the Iceni, Catuvellauni and Coriltavi tribes. This would mean that the Belsars Hill fort sat on the Catuvellauni side of the river. However, some records suggest that it was an Iceni fort. The problem that is no artefacts have been found to confirm the position. The Iceni were allegedly named after the 'Iken' or Ouse River. The Old West river is the lower reach of the Ouse River. The Icknield Way is the ancient trackway which passes down through North Norfolk and Cambridgeshire then on as far as Wiltshire.

If you were at Willingham School hearing about the history of Willingham dating back to the Doomsday Book or are interested in Belsars Hill and the history of the village back to Iron age times, then I would love to hear from you.

I am a member of the Fen Edge Archeology group in Cottenham however I am especially interested in the Willingham area as I lived in Willingham from 1972 to 1990 and I come back to Willingham every weekend. My email address is Richiematt@live.co.uk.
