'It's fantastic to see the Duke garden back up and running,' was the sentiment echoed by many of the locals who turned out to enjoy four days of beer, barbecue, and brilliant live music.



The festival bar offered an impressive array of real ales and ciders to suit every palate, from dark caramel milds to crisp, hoppy golden ales and refreshing elderflower cider. Those who preferred the classics were also well catered for, with the pub's regular selection available inside.

Duke Fest was more than just a celebration of great drinks – it was a celebration of local community spirit. The ever-enthusiastic Willingham Wolves football teams manned the barbecue with flair, serving up top-quality burgers and sausages sourced from Highgate Butchers. Meanwhile, the festival shone a spotlight on local brewers, with standout offerings from Papworth Brewery (Earith), Milton Brewery (Waterbeach) and Foxhay Cider (Rampton) – made from apples grown right here in Willingham.

The atmosphere was electric throughout the weekend, thanks in no small part to the live music. On Saturday, Beerbelly delivered a lively set of crowd-pleasing covers, with Stingray following suit on Sunday.

From the clink of pint glasses to the sound of laughter and dancing feet, Duke Fest proved that the heart of Willingham's community is alive and well—and ready to party.

Friends of Willingham Church

It's an expensive business looking after a church that's hundreds of years old. Our parish church St Mary & All Saints mainly originated in the 13th century but has Saxon and Norman heritage. It's a grade 1 listed building that contains nationally important medieval wall paintings.

The church community does not receive any funding from The Church of England; it is up to local people to pay for the upkeep of the church. English Heritage cannot support ongoing maintenance – they barely have enough funds to help those churches that are in danger of collapse.

Autumn Vaccination Clinic at the Hub

Willingham (Octagon) Community Hub is hosting an immunisation clinic for local people on **Monday 3 November, 10 am to 12 noon**. Save the date!

We're working with the Community & School-Age Immunisation Team that covers Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. The team plan to offer vaccinations to adults, aged 65 and over, for:

- COVID: 75 and over or 18 – 74 years if severely immunosuppressed
- FLU: 65 and over
- PPV (Pneumococcal Polysaccharide Vaccine): 65 and over
- Shingles: 70 – 79 years
- RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus): 75 – 79 years

Flu and shingles vaccines may be given to 60 – 65 year-olds based on health conditions or medications.

There is no charge for the immunisations, and your health records will be updated on a national system which gets uploaded to all GP records.

Our friendly Hub team will have the kettle on for refreshments, so please do stay on and have a cuppa and a chat with us and find out more about our free community support.

Winter Fuel Allowance – 2025 Update

Following a review by central government for 2025, most pensioners in England and Wales will receive the Winter Fuel Payment. The payment will be reinstated for all pensioners with a taxable income below £35,000 per year. If your income is above that threshold, you will still receive the payment, and it will be recovered through the tax system.

If you're eligible, you'll get a letter in October or November and most eligible people will be paid automatically in November or December.

If you haven't received a payment before, and believe you are eligible, you can contact DWP Winter Fuel Payment by telephone, post or online to make a claim.

Contacting the surgery

Emails to the surgery are not the appropriate route for our patients to make clinical contact with the GP and we ask that you do not convey any clinical information this way. This includes, for example, asking clinical questions, letting the GP know that you are changing doses of your medication or wanting to update the GP before attending an appointment with them. On receipt of such emails, our only response will be to ask you make a GP appointment.

As a result, to keep up to date with the latest national and local guidelines, changes to treatment are sometimes necessary. Nature's Names

Someone once said that swans look as though they've been reading their own fan mail. And they certainly do, with their air of *Hey, look at me!*

The word *swan* is one of the oldest names which are still in use in the bird kingdom, having stayed the same spelling since Anglo Saxon times, and before. It is highly likely that it originated from the Indo-European base word for 'sound', which was *swen*. The fact that the name is similar in many European languages – Swedish is *svan*, Dutch is *zwaan*, German is *schwan* – indicates that the name was well and truly established before the Indo-European language 'tree' split into Germanic, Scandinavian, Baltic, etc.

You may well wonder why the word for 'sound' was applied to our most common resident species, the *mute* swan. It doesn't call in flight, unlike the visiting Berwick's and whooper swans, but can make quite a racket when on the ground!

Swans appear in books and poems in abundance. Their beauty and style suggest that they deserve their place in literature. But let us allow Spike Milligan to end this item, with his poem 'Down the stream the swans all glide' –

*Down the stream the swans all glide;
It's quite the cheapest way to ride.
Their legs get wet,
Their tummies wetter:
I think after all
The bus is better.*

- Diwali is a special time for Hindus and other religions around the world when they celebrate the Festival of Lights, where families share sweets and festive meals, celebrating the triumph of light over darkness.
- The South Koreans celebrate Chuseok which is a harvest festival held in Autumn and involves communal feasts, gathering with family, and sharing traditional foods like songpyeon (rice cakes).
- In Nigeria the Igbo people celebrate the first harvest of the Yam crop with feasting, dancing and community celebrations.
- The Makgolokwe-a-Mafhleng people of South Africa celebrate Mokete wa Mokopu, which is a feast held during the melon harvest season, a key time for food and community.
- North African countries like Algeria, Morocco and Mauritania hold festivals on various dates to celebrate the harvesting of dates, olives and other crops.

Willingham Gardening Club

On Monday 1 September, we welcomed back guest speaker Simon White with his talk *Beautiful Bulbs*. From crocuses to narcissi, galanthus (snowdrops) to tulips, Simon took us on a visual tour of some of the flowers to plant for a spectacular spring garden. It was also a great opportunity to get some top tips for autumn planting.

Here are some to get you started:

1. As a general rule, aim to plant bulbs 6 to 8 weeks before the first hard frost in your area.
2. Choose your location.
3. Prepare the ground, clearing any weeds and add any organic matter, such as compost and grit, to improve drainage and add nutrients to the soil.
4. Dig the holes using a spade or bulk planter, remembering to dig to the appropriate depth for the bulb you are planting.
5. Plant bulbs with the pointed 'nose' (where the shoot emerges) at the top and the flat 'basal plate' at the bottom.

Our next meeting will be our annual Gardeners' Question Time on **Monday 6 October**. Come prepared with your questions for our panel of experts!

The Gardening Club meets on the first Monday of the month at the Social Club, with refreshments from 7 pm. The meeting begins at 7.30 pm. There is an entrance fee of £4 for non-members.



Thought for the Month

This summer, we travelled to New York to attend a family wedding. Naturally, we were excited – not only for the celebration but also for the chance to explore New York City. The children were thrilled at the prospect of seeing in real life the landmarks they had only encountered through screens – on TV, online, or in movies.

But alongside the excitement came a sense of unease. With shifting U.S. immigration policies and increased scrutiny of travellers, especially Muslims, even routine travel required extra preparation. Stories of valid visa holders being denied entry or detained prompted advice from friends and family: clear your social media, avoid certain apps, or leave devices behind altogether.

Thankfully, our experience at JFK was smooth – no extra screening, no questioning, no discomfort. It felt like a normal immigration process, and our faith or background didn't draw any special attention.

Still, I couldn't help but reflect on what it must be like to live in the U.S. as a Muslim. The media coverage of Muslims in America often seems to me to be more negative than that of other religious or ethnic groups.

Yet, conversations with our family members painted a different picture. They spoke of feeling fully integrated into their communities and as American as anyone else. In New York, where the Muslim population is close to one million, it's common to have three or four mosques within a 10-minute drive. These mosques serve diverse congregations: Americans with roots in dozens of countries, united in faith and community.

Compared to the UK, where Muslims face their own challenges, the U.S. experience seems more fraught with travel-related anxiety. For now, still, I returned home with a deeper awareness of how current policies have turned what was once a routine journey into one that demands courage, preparation, and reflection.

In the end, the trip was deeply rewarding. New York's energy, diversity, along with catching up with family and attending the wedding – which stretched over several days – offered a rich and affirming experience.

Parish Council Update

As summer draws to a close, we want to take the opportunity to update you on a number of issues and developments in and around the village. Some are matters of real concern that we need everyone's help with, while others are positive stories that remind us of the strength of our community spirit.

Fly-tipping and Bamboo

We have recently been made aware of a disappointing instance of fly-tipping at the end of Priest Lane. Among the items dumped was a large quantity of bamboo, which appears to have been cut with a chainsaw and discarded carelessly. This is troubling for two reasons. First, bamboo is not native to our wild environment and can spread extremely quickly, causing long-term damage to the natural balance of our hedgerows and verges. It does not belong in our countryside, and once established, it can be very difficult to control. Second, it is possible that a resident paid a tradesperson in good faith to remove this waste, not realising it would be illegally dumped rather than taken to a licensed facility.

We cannot stress enough how important it is to check that anyone you hire to dispose of rubbish is properly registered and that you ask where the waste will end up. A few extra minutes of diligence can help protect our village, reduce the eyesore of illegal dumping, and save you from potentially being held responsible if your waste is traced back to you. If you notice suspicious dumping, please report it promptly so that it can be dealt with quickly. Together, we can keep our lanes, hedgerows, and gateways free of this blight.

Anti-Social Behaviour

Another issue that has caused real concern over recent weeks is a rise in anti-social behaviour. Residents have reported groups of young people kicking and banging on front doors, as well as vandalism at the Pavilion on the Recreation Ground. We are saddened to say this has included graffiti, a broken bike shelter, and a smashed pavilion window. These acts cause both financial costs to the community and unnecessary upset to those directly affected.

Even more worrying, CCTV footage shows a group with a slingshot, appearing to target birds. This is cruel and deeply distressing. It is unacceptable to damage property, but it is especially concerning when the welfare of wildlife is put at risk. We have reported these incidents to the police and requested additional patrols in the area. We will continue to work closely with local authorities, but we also ask for your support: please remain vigilant, report concerns swiftly and talk to young people in your families about the serious impact of such actions. Small choices can have big consequences, and it is important that we all play our part in fostering respect for our shared spaces.

B1050 – Shelford Road Safety Concerns

We have also been discussing at length the state of the B1050 Shelford Road by the river. Conditions have worsened significantly and over the past year several accidents have been reported. This is no longer a matter of inconvenience; it is now a clear danger. We are unanimous in our view that this is an urgent safety hazard and cannot be allowed to deteriorate further.

The council has therefore agreed to write formally to the county council, the local highways authority, and our Member of Parliament to press for immediate action. While we recognise that repairs will take time and investment, we believe this issue requires a clear and committed response without delay. It is only a matter of time before a more serious accident occurs, and we do not want to look back and feel that we could have done more to draw as much attention as possible about this issue to the relevant authorities.

Community Orchard Success

On a brighter note, we are delighted to share that it has been a bumper year for fruit at the community orchard. The trees have flourished, and many of you have been able to enjoy the harvest. From apples and pears to delicious plums, the variety and abundance this year has been something special.

The orchard is a space we can all take pride in – a reminder of what can be achieved when we come together to create something lasting and positive for the whole village. We would like to thank everyone who has helped with its care. These contributions make a real difference. We encourage more residents to visit, enjoy the fruit, and use the orchard as a place to meet, walk, and relax. It is a living symbol of our community spirit and something that will continue to benefit us all for years to come.

Night Sky

Night Sky over our village is back! At this time of year, skies get darker, and objects are easier to spot. We have tended to cover those visible with the naked eye and, in the past, have concentrated on the Moon and the planets – all basic stuff, but this time let's look at a group of stars bright enough to be seen with the naked eye: it's The Pleiades (pronounced Ply-a-dees).

This star cluster is an interesting spectacle in the autumn and winter sky. It is also known as The Seven Sisters, as the seven brightest of this star cluster are commonly visible between October and April. Having said that, only six of the 'sisters' can often be picked out – one of the seven is frequently quite shy, fluctuating in brightness. They all appear blue, due to their high temperature and immense energy, with a surrounding ethereal glow of an interstellar dust cloud which the cluster is ploughing through.

And yet, the visible seven are merely part of the 1000 plus stars in the cluster – all are about 440 light years away from us; they are only youngsters (100 million years old) on the grand scale of the universe. You could use a stargazing app to pinpoint the cluster. Early in the month, for instance, despite the Full Moon of 6 and 7 October, it can be seen rising in our eastern sky. By the 20 October, with a New Moon, the sky will be darker, while The Pleiades will be even more visible. Binoculars and a steady hand, away from the streetlights in our village, will reveal much more of the cluster – it's a delightful sight!

If you're after a pointer, you may be familiar with the three stars of Orion – follow the line of that 'belt' upwards, past a bright reddish star (Aldebaran) and there's The Seven Sisters! The Sisters feature in stories and myths way back to the Bronze Age, and they appear frequently in folklore around the world. There are even supposed links to the origins of our modern-day Halloween.

Happy star cluster gazing!


